Angela says, “I have enjoyed going to the various conventions and BOM’s with him.” One can recognize the pair at many lineage events, Larry has a huge camera taking photos.



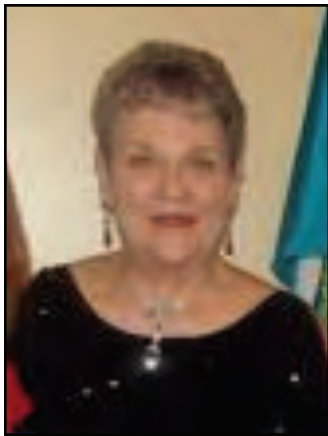
Secretary: Eileen Walcik

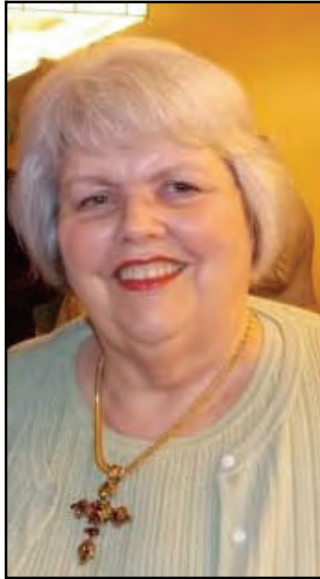
Sylvia began her teaching career in January 1964 with the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) on the Navajo Indian Reservation at Nazlini, Arizona. Bill joined her there after their marriage. In 1967, Bill and Sylvia were promoted and moved to the headquarters school at Chinle. There she was given an opportunity to attend a workshop conducted by the famous Indian musician, Louis Ballard. The BIA wanted to encourage Indian youngsters to learn their own music. The Principal at Chinle Boarding School actively encouraged the program and provided resources to enable a choir devoted to Indian music. The children sang music from all tribes. In 1970, Sylvia moved to the Chinle Public School and was encouraged to develop a full program of music to include Native American music. Her Indian choir, named Naatsiiliid Nizhoni Singers, traveled extensively, including Europe.

In 1983, Bill moved to Fort Hood to begin working for the Army and in 1984, Sylvia began her new career with the Texas Public Schools at Copperas Cove Intermediate School. There she had a highly honored choir for many years until her retirement in May, 2002.

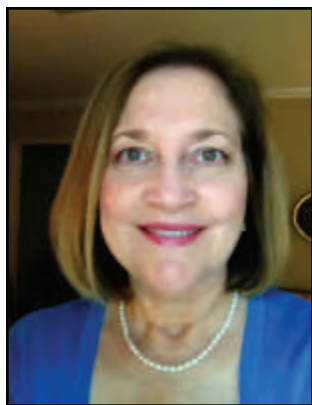
Chaplain: Mary Louise Gulley

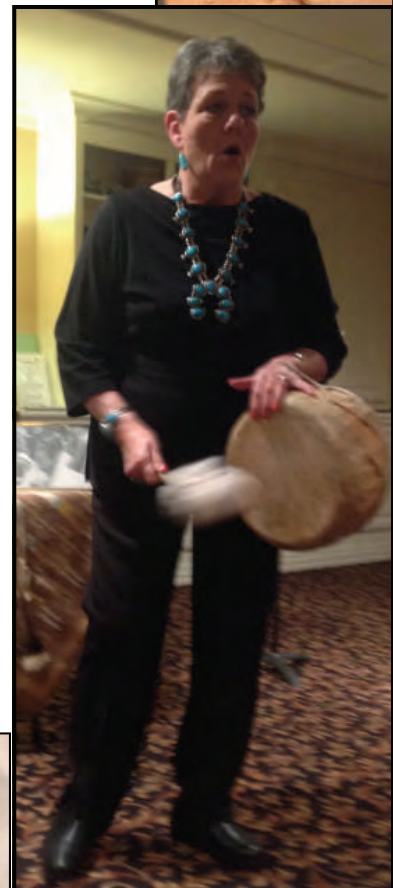

[Please see below.] A Phoebe Hartline quilt will be such a treasure and we look forward to seeing her design. We want to thank the committee and look forward to a very successful project.

Project Proposal Ladies Auxiliary TXSSAR Recommendation to the Board

After discussion and approval by members, the Project Committee is very excited to announce a recommendation for the new fund raiser for the next two years. Phoebe Hartline (whose husband Chuck is a new member of the Panhandle Plains Chapter) has graciously agreed to donate her artistic creativity, time and materials in making a new quilt for this two year venture. Phoebe is currently working on the design using cream, red, white and blue with stars. Flyers will be ready for the October meeting in Houston with the possibility of an earlier release. The first flyers will have a caveat that the finished product might be slightly different as details are worked out during the piecing of the quilt.

Phoebe wants no reimbursement for time or materials but asks that she maintain complete artistic freedom in developing the design of the quilt – e.g., fabric type(s) and stitching style(s) will be left to Phoebe's discretion. Phoebe is an experienced Panhandle quilter having designed and completed over 50 quilts. She maintains a personal quilt workshop on her ranch between Wheeler and Canadian where her family settled in the early 1900's. Phoebe says quilt making is a personal therapy for her, and she chooses to donate this quilt as her service to the youth programs of the TXSSAR, and in honor of her husband, Chuck, and his new membership in the SAR.

Tickets should be priced at 3 for \$5, or \$2 apiece. Sales would begin in October 2013 with the final drawing to be held at least two years from that date, but the final date is at the discretion of the board.

I am looking forward to serving as your next President for two years. I feel it is a great honor to be a part of this group of ladies, and I ask for your support and prayers.

Nancy Hart, Georgia Heroine

Nancy Hart was one of those heroines that would make an exciting movie. A plucky woman whose courage, steely wit and pioneer ways made her bravery legendary. She would have been played by one of the glamorous starlets; this would have been done an huge disservice to this woman. No one quite knows just when or where she was born, but it was probably sometime in the 1730s or 1740s in North Carolina or Pennsylvania. She was a cousin of Rev War General Daniel Morgan and her husband was related to the Hart-Benton families of Tennessee and Missouri. The families moved to Georgia in the 1770s.

She was an imposing woman. She was described as tall (six foot) and gangly, with red hair and pox marked (not unusual for the day) and crossed eyes. The Indians called her Wahatche or "war woman." She was never slow to avenge a wrong done to family or friends. She had eight children.

One of the most famous of her exploits during the Revolutionary War happened in her cabin on the frontier of what is now Elberton Co., GA. Five or six Tories came by her cabin looking for Whigs or food. They shot her turkey and then demanded she cook it for them. While cooking she sent her daughter Sukey to

the well for water, instructing her to warn the neighbors. She fed them and wined them and when they were properly off their guard began slipping their guns out to Sukey through a hole in the wall. One of the Tories saw what they were doing and ordered her to stop. She told him to sit. He didn't and she shot him and another man who rushed her. When her husband and other men returned they hanged the rest. The Tory's skeletons were found in 1912 by road crews.



Other stories of her bravery include her

service, while dressed as a man. She would enter Tory camps posing as a man who was somewhat simple. They did not consider the "slow" man a threat and carried on their business while she was there. She reported her intelligence to the patriots. Some stories place Nancy Hart at the Battle of Kettle Creek.
