Alexander Hamilton (1755 – 1804), a soldier, statesman, politician, first Secretary of the Treasury, attorney, banker, and finally a duelist. The rendering above by H. Charles McBarron, depicts the victorious assault on Yorktown Redoubt 10, led by Lieutenant Colonel Hamilton. The taking of Redoubts 9 and 10 enabled General George Washington to complete the siege lines surrounding Yorktown and force the surrender of Lord Cornwallis. This British defeat ultimately ended the Revolutionary War and secured the independence and formation of our United States. We proudly honor our chapter's namesake!

Bit of History

Between January 1 and July 1, 1775, several key events unfolded in America as tensions between the colonies and Britain escalated:

- 1. **February 9**: King George III declared Massachusetts to be in a state of rebellion.
- 2. **April 19**: The Battles of Lexington and Concord marked the official start of the Revolutionary War.
- 3. **May 10**: The Second Continental Congress convened, taking steps toward organizing colonial resistance.
- 4. **June 14**: Congress began debating the appointment of a commander-inchief for the Continental forces and agreed on the formation of an Army and Navy.

The Battles of Lexington and Concord, fought on April 19, 1775, were the opening conflicts of the American Revolutionary War. Their significance lies in several key aspects:

- 1. **Start of Armed Resistance**: These battles marked the first military engagements between the American colonists and British forces, signaling the transition from political protest to armed rebellion.
- 2. **Mobilization of Militia**: The battles demonstrated the effectiveness of the colonial militia system, with thousands of Patriots rallying to confront the British troops.
- 3. **Boost to Morale**: The colonists' ability to repel the British forces and inflict significant casualties bolstered their confidence and resolve for the war ahead.

These events set the stage for the eight-year struggle that ultimately led to American Independence.
