Significance of the Culper Spy Ring

In 1775, during the Second Continental Congress, George Washington was appointed as Commander-in-Chief and Major General of the Continental Army (The Revolutionary War, n.d.). This was after the Battle of Lexington and Concord during the American Revolution at a time when the dispute between the North American colonies and the British had heightened to armed conflict. It is said that Washington was the best possible choice as general for several reasons. For one, he did not face any serious competition for the position, but he also had plenty of military experience and because of his charisma and prestige he was the perfect man for the job. On the other hand, George Washington was not necessarily qualified or trained in how to fight a war in the open-field style of battle against Great Britain, the world's most powerful nation at the time; however, he was determined and smart enough to keep one step ahead of the enemy (George Washington, n.d.). The result was a secret intelligence network called the Culper Spy Ring. By gathering information, creating codes and methods to hide messages and letters, and getting the information to Washington so that he could create better war plans, the Culper Spy Ring is one of the most influential innovations leading up to the defeat of Britain.

In 1778, a cavalry officer named Benjamin Tallmadge created a small group of trustworthy people to track every movement that the British troops made. Tallmadge was to take any necessary precautions to make sure that the Ring remained secret; in fact, Washington did not even know who was part of the ring. The Culper Gang consisted of Robert Townsend, Abraham Woodhull, Austin Roe, Anna Strong, and Caleb Brewster; the code



name for the gang was Samuel Culper (The Culper Gang, n.d.). There were many ways that the Culper Ring gathered information. Robert Townsend was a reporter for an American newspaper and the owner of a small dry goods store. As a reporter, Townsend was able to easily talk to British soldiers at various society gatherings. He became the ring's primary source in New York after Woodhull, who lived in constant anxiety of being discovered, recruited him (The Culper Spy Ring, 2010). Townsend's sister, Sally, also helped gather intelligence by flirting with British soldiers (Sally Townsend, 2016). Anna Strong used her laundry to aid the spy ring. She would hang up a black petticoat on her clothesline to tell the other members of the ring that Caleb Brewster had arrived in town, and the number of white handkerchiefs that were hanging on the line indicated in which of the six coves Brewster was hiding in (Allen, T.B. and Harness, C., 2004). Brewster's job was to get the messages back and forth between Townsend and Tallmadge, and then Tallmadge would get the letters to Washington. Last but not least, Austin Roe was a tavern keeper and he acted as a courier for the Culper Ring by traveling to Townsend's store to give him a message from Tallmadge under the cover of buying supplies for his tavern.

Each member of the gang had a code name that they went by. For example, Robert Townsend went by the name Culper Junior, Abraham Woodhull was called Culper Senior, and Tallmadge's code name was John Bolton. Additionally, after an incident where Tallmadge was raided, and his secret papers and a letter from Washington were stolen, Tallmadge started using invisible ink and codes (The Culper Gang, n.d.). He invented a numerical code system to identity important places and people. For example, the number seven hundred and eleven indicated George Washington; in all, seven hundred and sixty-three numbers were used. Tallmadge made four copies of his code, and gave one each to Woodhull, Townsend, and Washington. As for the invisible ink, George Washington got help from Sir James Jay, a British doctor. Jay's invisible ink was made of two chemicals, neither of which would reappear when heated like lemon juice does. Jay would use one chemical to write a letter, and then brush the second chemical across the paper to make the message visible (Allen, T.B. and Harness, C., 2004).

The Culper gang created an elaborate plan on how they would get the information to Washington. Austin Roe would ride from Setauket, Long Island first and stop by Townsend's store to buy food, and put in a request in writing from a John Bolton (code name for Tallmadge). After Roe would leave with his requested goods, Townsend would run out back to a little room near his store and read Tallmadge's letter and write his answer (Williams, V., n.d.). Roe then would show up later at Townsend's room and hide the letter in his packages to take it back. On his way back to Setauket, Roe would hide the letter on Abraham Woodhull's field where Woodhull would retrieve it and notify Anna Strong. Strong's job was to know if Caleb Brewster had arrived in town and to hang up her black petticoats and handkerchiefs to indicate where Brewster was hiding. When night fell, Woodhull would sneak to the coves and give Brewster the message. Brewster would then row back across Long Island Sound to Connecticut where Tallmadge would be waiting for the letters; the letters then were passed along by a series of riders until they reached Washington (The Culper Gang, n.d.). This plan worked well most of the time, but its complexity sometimes caused problems, like when Tallmadge got raided on the way to his drop-off point.

Without the Culper spy ring, it is highly unlikely that the Continental Army would have won the Revolutionary War. By the end of 1776. the war was not going well for Washington, especially after Nathan Hale, a famous patriot and spy, got captured and hung by the enemy. The Culper's changed the tide around for the Americans by spying on the British troops and helping Washington to create better war plans. By making complicated codes and elaborate schemes, they were able to get information around in secrecy and had many achievements. They managed to save the Franco-American alliance by warning Washington of Great Britain's plans to ambush the French who had arrived in Rhode Island (The Culper Spy Ring, 2010). The Culper ring was also credited with exposing Benedict Arnold, an early American hero who later became one of the most infamous traitors in United States history after he switched sides and started fighting for the British. Additionally, they uncovered a British plot to produce counterfeit American currency to cause financial turmoil (McConnell, R, 2014). In the end, George Washington could not have won the war for America's independence without the Culper spy ring, and that makes them one of the most significant group of people in American history.


