In Memoriam

Compatriot Dr. Thomas McCall passed away on January 28, 2021 at the age of 84. Besides being a member of the Chapter, he was also the Founding President Emeritus of the Piney Woods Chapter of the Sons of the Republic of Texas. In memory of Dr. McCall, Compatriot Jeff Austin made a memorial donation to the Chapter which will be allocated to our scholarship. On behalf of the McCall family and the Chapter, we thank Jeff for his thoughtful donation. Dr. McCall was admitted to the Chapter on September 18, 2002.

The Compatriot's Patriot

This is the inauguration of a series describing our Compatriots' patriot ancestors.

Compatriot Dickie Warren joined the Chapter in 1999. His patriot ancestor was Robert Bean but he would later submit supplementals on Robert's parents, William and Lydia Bean. The story of this family is more than a story of the Revolution.

William Bean was a hunting companion of Daniel Boone and is credited as being the first permanent white settler in what is now modern-day Tennessee. His son Russell, Robert's brother, was the first white child born in Tennessee. Born in 1721 in St. Stephens Parish, Northumberland, Virginia, William married Lydia Russell in 1741. In May 1769, he moved his family to near modern-day Johnson City, Tennessee. William was Watauga rifleman and was a captain of a company that routed Tories at Watauga in 1778. He probably served under Colonel John Sevier at the Battle of Kings Mountain in 1780. He was active in the Watauga Association and the affairs of Washington County. He served as Justice of the Peace and Judge of the County Court and would be granted 3,000 acres for his service in the Revolution. Robert Bean, his son, was also a Watauga rifleman serving under Colonel John Sevier. Robert fought at Musgrove's Mill and Kings Mountain. The William Bean Cabin is maintained by

the John Sevier Chapter NSDAR.

Lydia Russell Bean is a legend in East Tennessee. In July 1776, Lydia was captured by the Cherokee, along with Robert Moore, on their way to Fort Caswell (later named Fort Watauga). Questioned by the Cherokee on the strength of the fort, she refused to cooperate and was sentenced to be burned at the stake. With the fire ready to be lit, she was rescued by the Cherokee woman, Nancy Ward. Nancy had the title of "beloved woman" among the Cherokee and had more influence with the tribe than most female members. She took Lydia under her protection and nursed her back to health. This gesture had a positive affect on the Cherokee. Lydia would teach the women how to use a loom and make clothes. This eliminated their use of hides for clothing and their dependence on traders. When Lydia was captured, the Cherokee also captured several cows with her. She taught the Cherokee how to care for the cattle, milk them, and make butter and cheese-again changing their lifestyle. Lydia would eventually be released.

American Revolutionary War Patriots – Buried in Texas From the TXSSAR Website

Thomas Blair Hogg was born April 16, 1768 on the Enoree River in the Newberry District of South Carolina. In 1790 he married Martha Chandler and the family moved to Georgia, where he lived when he fought in the War of 1812. He served in the Georgia Legislature before moving to Alabama in 1819, where he also served in their Legislature, before moving to Choctaw County, Mississippi where he was again elected to that state's Legislature. In 1849, at the age of 81 he moved to Texas where he died and is buried next to his wife in the Hogg Cemetery east of Rusk, Texas in Cherokee County. These are the grandparents of the first native-born Texan to be elected Governor of the state, but there are no markers on his grave, according to Clovis. An SAR marker was placed on Thomas Blair Hogg's grave by the Capt. William Barron and Athens Chapters on 11 September 2004.

Thomas C. Holmes was born in Wayne County, North Carolina in 1759 and married Elizabeth Jourdon in 1794. He served as an express rider for Capt. Benjamin Harrison's 1st South Carolina Regiment, under General Francis Marion, the Swamp Fox, and carried a message from General Marion to General George Washington. He applied for his pension in 1854 while living in Newton County, Texas where he had been living since 1835, and he died there in 1861. There is brass U.S. Government marker on his grave but not a SAR or DAR marker. Due to the fact that the actual grave site is inaccessible without serious off-road capability, a memorial marker was erected by the DAR and SAR in the Holmes family section of the Trout Creek Cemetery in Trout, Texas.
