Autumn is a busy time for the Dallas Chapter

Three of our country's important milestones are remembered Leach Autumn. September 19th recalls that occasion in 1787, when the Constitutional Convention, meeting in Philadelphia, completed its work and sent the document to the States for ratification. It should be noted that in June the Convention was in shambles with disagreements until Benjamin Franklin took the floor and with eloquence requested that each day's session begin with prayer to the Almighty. This was done each day thereafter until the great work was completed.

This year our SAR supported the DAR luncheon with several members in attendance. President General Nathan White and our own Gary Sisson (aka Patrick Henry) addressed the luncheon.

October 19, 1781, is when General Charles Cornwallis surrendered to the American and French forces at Yorktown thus ending over six years of fighting. The Treaty of Paris was finally signed two years later. The Virginia SAR plans a celebration to mark the 225th anniversary of "the glorious victory."

November 11th remembers that day in 1918 when at the 11th hour the guns fell silent ending World War I. Our SAR chapter will meet at 8:15 A.M. on 11/11 so that we can proceed downtown afterward for the 10:15 A.M. formation for the Dallas Veterans Day parade. Marchers, banner-carriers, and float riders are needed. Please come a little early for breakfast, so we can start on time, and wear your uniform or period clothing to the meeting.

In addition to these historic activities, State Fair is time for our biggest recruiting activity of the year. Please call Ralph McDowell at 214-348-8737 if you can devote 3 hours to the recruiting effort between now and October 22.






What's the Point?


A Delightful Journey into Texas' Past

ttendees of the TXSSAR August 4-6 Board of Managers Meeting in Lake Jackson were feted to a truly rare treat by our hosts, the Cradle of Texas Chapter. That entire area is saturated with the early history of Texas. A huge statue of Stephen F. Austin clutching his longrifle greets visitors as they enter Lake Jackson. Although the first Texas Rebellion against Spain was the much-earlier Battle of Medina. That August, 1813 battle was a disaster for the Texans who were all slaughtered by the Spanish Army. The first bloodshed of the Texas Revolution against Mexico, the Battle of Velasco, took place on June 26, 1832, just down the road from Lake Jackson, in an area now known as Surfside. All of the pictures shown below were taken on the "Cradle of Texas Tour" that was organized and narrated by Compatriot **Don Pugh**. At left below is a photocopy of the Power of Attorney that Austin wrote to brother-in-law James F. Perry from a jail cell in Mexico City. At right is Perry's descendent holding the original and rare "SFA"

branding iron that is still in use today. Bottom left are pistols made by the Dance & Brothers Company for the Confederate Army. Bottom right is Austin's original tombstone in the Gulf Prairie Presbyterian Churchyard, Jones Creek, Texas; Austin's remains were moved to the Texas State Capitol grounds in 1910.


