## Ten Counter-Concepts

 $\overline{ }$  ach President's Message this year amplifies an aspect of the American Revolution as a revolution of ideas which actually resulted in the Revolutionary War.

The February Issue pointed out that these radical ideas had their roots in the surge of literacy in England that was brought on by William the Conqueror in the 11th Century. The April Issue discussed the development of the concept of elected representation. The June and August issues outlined 18 specific grievances against King George III of Great Britain, as stated in the Declaration of Independence.

On June 8, 1789, just over a month after Washington had been inaugurated as First President, Congressman James Madison introduced his twelve proposed amendments to the newly ratified Constitution. After debate, the First Congress sent these twelve to the State Legislatures on September 25, 1789. Of the twelve, 10 were ratified and became known as The Bill of Rights.

It is interesting to see the parallels between the 18 grievances previously discussed and the Bill of Rights. Each of these Amendments addresses one or more grievances:

- 1. Freedoms of religion, speech, the press, and peaceable assembly
- 2. Right to bear arms
- 3. Freedom from forced quartering of troops in one's home in peacetime
- 4. Freedom from unreasonable searches and seizures without a warrant

5. Right to indictment by Grand Jury for serious crimes, right to just compensation for seized property, and freedom from self-incrimination

- 6. Right to a speedy and public trial
- 7. Right to trial by jury, and freedom from double jeopardy
- 8. Freedom from excessive bail

9. Recognition of natural rights beyond those stated in the Constitution 10. Powers not delegated to the Federal Government by the Constitution are reserved to the States or to the people

The citizens of the 13 colonies had certainly been scarred by the numerous abuses of power by the British Crown. Before they would agree to ratify the Constitution, they had extracted promises of a Bill of Rights for the New Nation. It was certainly fitting that the First order of business in the First Session of the First Congress was to fulfill that promise.
