

Dooktip from the TXSSAR Publicity Committee, Dr. Joe Allen Rice, Chair:

The best of historian John Ferling's several books may be *A Leap in the Dark: The Struggle to Create the American Republic.* It follows American politics through a crucial third of a century. This 2004 study takes the reader from the Stamp Act of 1765 to Jefferson's win in the fiercely-fought 1800 presidential election.

In a review, BOOKLIST said: "Ferling addresses readers already well grounded in the disputes leading to the formation of the U.S." That points it at SAR members.

In his introduction, Ferling says: "Militarily, of course, an American victory was not assured. That has been well remembered by subsequent generations. However, the labyrinthian political struggles that accompanied the war and persisted in its aftermath have been long forgotten, save by a few scholars."

He makes "labyrinthian political struggles" interesting. They almost seem taken from today's front pages and newscasts.

The Annual George Washington Parade in Laredo, TX, is a tradition that has been building for more than 113 years. Today, it has become the largest single project in the whole town, and probably the largest annual patriotic event in the U.S. Planning and events start in the early autumn and culminate in the debutante ball on Friday and the parade on Saturday, which this year occurred on February 20. The picture **above** shows a typical portion of the crowd sitting hip-to-hip along the 3.5-mile parade route. The total crowd estimate for 2010, counting both sides of the street, was 400,000. (Not bad for a city of 240,000!) Street vendors sold everything from soft drinks to pizza, breakfast burritos to Tex-Mex. Many people in the crowd camped overnight.



he TXSSAR unit of the parade was "#173" out of more than 200 units. Our unit consisted of those hardy enough to march the 3.5-mile route; trailer (shown at Left) carrying most of the "non-marchers"; the Liberty Bell trailer carrying the Liberty Bell, Commandthe Ten ments and George & Washington; Martha and the Belladier.
