ORGANIZATIONAL RECRUITING

MAY MEETING



Americanism Quiz from March-April issue: Why was the city of New York named New Amsterdam originally?

Following the explorations of Henry Hudson in 1609, the West India Company—already prominent in the West Indies—moved up the Hudson Valley and established Fort Orange in 1624 in the site of present day Albany. Traveling to the mouth of the Hudson, the Dutch settled at a site called New Amsterdam, where the director of the company, Peter Minuit, consummated his legendary trade with the Indians, giving them blankets and other goods worth less than a hundred dollars for Manhattan. If you look at the official city seal of New York now it has lots of symbols from the days when it was new Amsterdam.
