





An observer took a video of the parade and shared it with me after the parade. The video shows the police car leading the parade with a short break of nothing. Then it showed the very tops of four Colonial flags coming up a slight hill. Slowly emerging were four uniformed SAR Color Guard members caring the flags and flanked by militia musket bearers on each end of the line.

Join the Denton Chapter Color Guard



DPL Online Genealogy Resource Spotlight: HeritageHub

We're kicking off a five-part series on various genealogical resources available to all Denton Public Library cardholders—accessible from the comfort of your own home through your DPL account!

In this first post, our focus is on HeritageHub. In coming posts, we'll feature Newspaper Archives, Heritage Quest, The Denton Record Chronicle Collection, and Fold3.

HeritageHub's databases includes obituaries and death notices published in newspapers as far back as 1704—though most of the publications are much more recent. HeritageHub also includes databases of funeral home notices back to 2019, and Social Security Death Index (SSDI) records between 1935-2014.

HeritageHub has some great features:

Narrow your search results to a manageable number by using the options on the left side bar. Sort results by best matches, newest, or oldest matches. Narrow the dates included in the results, or choose various sources, such as particular newspapers.

Create a free account by clicking the "Session Folder" at the top of the results page. You will be prompted to create your account there. This gives you access to various features:

- Save your searches. For example, if you plan to search often for items on "John Smith" you can create that saved search. When you return to Heritage Hub at a later time, you simply run that saved search.
- Create an Alert, and Heritage Hub will send you an email when there are new matches for your search criteria. Convenient!
- Create Personal Folders to keep track of your finds. Save them in one main folder or create individual folders, such as for various surnames.

After viewing the quick tutorial available at this link https://www.newsbank.com/videos/heritagehub-tutorial, I decided to do a little searching for myself. I decided to look for an obituary for my great-grandfather Edward Joseph Baker, who died in 1961 in Cleveland.

First, I viewed the "A-Z Source List" on the home page to see what was available in Cleveland. HeritageHub lists just a few publications from Cleveland, with starting dates ranging from 1845 to 2008. The only two publications that included 1961 were the *Plain Dealer* and the *Cleveland Leader*. Ticking those off, I then chose the "Search Within These Selections" button at the page bottom.

On the search page, I entered *Edward*, *Baker*, and *1961* in the search fields. I got one hit: an obituary that I do not have—published on 29 December 1961 in the *Plain Dealer*.

Though I already know a great deal about my great-grandfather Edward and his death information, I still learned a few new facts from this obituary: He had 12 grandchildren; the Riczo Funeral Home handled his arrangements; and his funeral was held at St. Henry Catholic Church in Cleveland.

BAKER, EDWARD J. Age 73; beloved husband of Catherine ince Cassidy (deceased); dear father of Charles (deceased). Mrs. Joseph (Josephine) Gilbride, Peter (Kathryn) Henry (Gertrude) Mrs. Henry (Marybelle) Kosak and grandfather of 12: grandfather of two; brother of the Vincent Fr. Ina Fitzgitbons, both of Canada. Friends received at the Riczo Funeral Home, 17504 Harvard Ave., where services will be held Saturday at 10:30 a. m. and St. Henry Church at 11 a. m.

Edward J. Baker's Cleveland Plain Dealer obituary.

This treasure of an obituary also included the name of his wife (including her maiden name); his children's names (including the daughters' married names and their husband's names), and the names of his living siblings in Canada. It also noted which family members were already deceased. Had I not been more familiar with Edward Baker, finding this obituary would have been like striking gold for the wealth of information it includes.

- Choose HeritageHub from the menu.
