From the Desk of the Chaplain

"HAPPY COLONIAL VALENTINE'S DAY" !!!

Holidays were very different during the colonial era. Most of the holidays that we enjoy today were hardly even recognized by the first generation of Americans - due to the fact that they had a very

different set of social and cultural norms. As far as **Valentine's Day** is concerned, the differences are almost night and day. First off, colonial America did not celebrate Valentine's Day with chocolates and cards. This does not mean, however, that they were void of celebration. Instead of Valentine's Day, many colonial Americans joined in celebrating festivities like:



- **1.** The **Roman holiday of Lupercalia** which was a holiday to commemorate both Romulus & Remus, the two fabled founders of Rome. During Lupercalia men would chase women around in goat-skinned clothing, hoping to be able to catch a virgin. The women were also lightly whipped with leaves as they were chased
- 2. In addition to these festivities, **young colonial women** were known to have regularly pinned five bay leaves to their pillow (four leaves on each corner and one leaf in the middle). The belief was that the leaves would inspire the dreams of the young damsel, who would recognize her true valentine in her dreams. Young women also wrote the names of the village men on pieces of paper, which were then rolled into clay. The clays were then dropped into a vessel of water, where the women would wait for the first clay piece to rise to water's surface. It was believed that the first clay piece to rise to the top was the young woman's true valentine
- **3.** Early **Dutch settlers** in the American colonies also celebrated a few Valentine's Day customs as well. The most popular tradition of young Dutch women was the belief that the first man she laid eyes upon on Valentine's Day was to be her future spouse. As a result, many young women would arise in the morning, keeping their eyes shut until a friend or family member advised them to open their eyes. It was usually planned by the family to have a pleasing male awaiting the young woman's first gaze. One can only imagine how much fun it would have been to play a practical joke on these poor young ladies.

Things may have changed today but one truth from God's Word still holds true: "But now abide in faith, hope, and love...these three but the greatest of these in love" (1 Corinthians 13:13)




Education Chairman

HOW TO MAKE A FRENCH STYLE MUSKET CARTRIDGE

MATERIALS NEEDED:

Proper size cartridge paper

Former: round end for blanks; concave for ball.

Musket balls if loading live rounds

Clear stationery glue. One brand is UHU which comes with a handy applicator


Black powder Powder measure

If using a dip type measure, pour powder in a small bowl to dip from.

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1 Lay former on paper as shown. Glue should be put on slanted edge (dotted area). Use
- 2 rounded end of former for blank cartridges. Distance A should be about 5/8 inches. Roll paper around former, starting with straight edge of the paper. Insure that paper is rolled tightly and edge is glued securely.
- 2 This is how a properly rolled cartridge should appear at this point.
- Fold top of paper at the seam, over the ball or former. Put a small dab of glue on top of the seam. Too much glue may stick paper to former or ball.
- 4 Fold edge over and stick to glue. Press momentarily with your finger to insure it is firmly stuck.
- 5 Fold final portion over and press together, holding momentarily.
- 6 Press edges over ball or former to achieve rounded appearance. Insure that glue is firmly set, then slowly remove former with a twisting motion.
- 7 Load open end with desired charge of powder.
- 8 Flatten top portion of paper and fold over at a 90 degree angle, forming a trough over the powder.
- 9 Fold both edges of the "tail" toward the center.
- Bring the tail toward the front and fold alongside the powder charge. Do not glue, as the tail is needed to pull cartridges from the cartridge box.

NOTE: Some folks have eliminated the glue when loading blanks by using the concave end and pressing the folded end into the cavity.
