As we approach a new decade, one cannot miss the SAR reporting of the approaching 250th Anniversary of our Constitution. What occurred before we got to that time period in our history? We begin with the French and Indian War 1756-1763. It is not an easy war to understand nor were there detailed enlistment records. Great Britain and the Colonies joined forces against France and the Indians. It was a bloody war and on February 10, 1763, the Peace of Paris Treaty was signed ending the war and removing the French threat to the Colonies. The British Parliament believed the Colonies should pay for the war (even though they had no money) and passed the Sugar Act April 5, 1764, taxing Colonial imports. Then on March 22, 1765, the Stamp Act became law, it levies a direct tax on the Colonies. Patrick Henry, speaks out against it calling it "Treason" and they should disobey it. It should be repealed! On March 18, 1766, the Stamp Act was repealed, but Parliament says it has the right to tax the Colonies. Here again 1767 the Townshend Acts were passed. It was more duties on Colonial imports. As the Colonies became disgrunted with Parliament and looked for ways not to pay these taxes, British troops land in Boston to keep order October 1, 1768.

There are some of the events that led up to the Constitution. We now celebrate the signing of the Constitution in many ways one of them being Constitution week.

It is now September 17, 2019, a day refered to by the DAR as Constitution day and the Preston Trail Chapter requested the Edmund Terrill Chapter of the SAR to be part of the reading of the Constitution by posting and retiring the colors. We would be joined by the VFW Post 2772 and their Ladies Auxiliary. After the reading we adjourned to north steps of the County Courthouse and ran bells to note the event. The Color Guard included Ted Wilson, T. L. Holden, Bill Hurst, and Don Babbs.



On Thursday, September 19, the Martha Jefferson Randolph Chapter of the DAR invited us to join them as they celebrated the week with Benjamin Franklin as their speaker. Bill Hurst and Ted Wilson were in attendance. It was a nice presentation.

The Edmund Terrill Chapter finished Constitution week by accepting an invitation from the Brig.Gen.Edward Balkley DAR Chapter in Greenville, TX, to post and retire the colors. 




Jane Douglas DAR House
