The recognition program is designed to encourage and recognize those compatriots, chapters and societies that participate in local, state, national and international events which publically educate, and recognize, honor, and celebrate the events and heroes of the period surrounding the American Revolution. Participation involves the planning and execution of these events, as well as attendance. The medal covers the celebration of any event's 250th anniversary where said event related directly to acts of resistance to British attempts to coerce the residents in America: from the first Parliamentary Acts protested after the conclusion of the French and Indian Wars, through the armed struggle of the American War for Independence, to the ratification of the Treaty of Paris by the Continental Congress.

This therefore will cover any public celebrations in the period from 2014 to 2033. Form may be submitted to

cover multiple years and following the first submission be submitted in multiple years, only covering activities since the previous submission. Scorekeeping is the responsibility of each compatriot and awarding authority. You will receive an email authorizing the purchase from merchandising. 

Who We Are (My Patriot)

By Joseph Sidney Smith



Fielding Lewis (my 5th great grandfather) was born on July 7, 1725, at Warner Hall, a plantation in Gloucester County, British Colonial Virginia, the son of John Lewis IV and Frances Fielding. John Lewis was a merchant and a planter. Fielding's mother died when he was only six years old; and his father remarried, to Pricilla Churchill Carter, a widow. (A paternal uncle, Robert Lewis, would become the grandfather of Meriwether Lewis, of the Lewis and Clark Expedition to explore the lands of the Louisiana Purchase.)

In the 1750's, Lewis worked with his father, trading grain with markets in the West Indies. After his father's death, he continued in this business; and he also became engaged in real estate and bank stock investments. Lewis acquired a plantation near Fredericksburg in Spotsylvania County, Colonial Virginia. Therefore, like his father, Fielding was a successful merchant and a planter prior to the Revolutionary War.

On October 18, 1746, Lewis married a second cousin, Catherine Washington, a cousin of George Washington. They had three children before she died in early 1750. He remarried, to Elizabeth "Betty" Washington, a sister of George Washington, as well as a second cousin to himself. Therefore, Fielding Lewis was a brother-in-law of George Washington. Fielding and Betty Lewis had eleven children together, the oldest of which was Fielding Lewis, Jr.

Betty Washington Lewis' mother, Mary Ball Washington, enjoyed visiting the plantation of her daughter and son-in-law, having a favorite spot, which she called "meditation rock." She ultimately asked to be buried there, which she was. In 1769, Fielding and Betty Lewis started the construction of a Georgian mansion at the plantation, which was completed in 1775.

In December 1757, Lewis was commissioned as head of the Spotsylvania Militia, became a County Lieutenant in 1758, and then Commander-in-Chief of the County Militia in 1763. Prior to the 1760 colonial session, Lewis was also elected to the House of Burgesses, representing Spotsylvania County. As relations with Great Britian were becoming troublesome, he accepted an appointment as Commissary General of Munitions, with

the rank of Colonel. He continued in this capacity throughout the Revolutionary War.

Fielding Lewis died in Fredericksburg on December 7, 1781, at the age of 56, shortly after the Battle of Yorktown, the end of the Revolutionary War. He is buried at Saint Georges Episcopal Burial Ground in Fredericksburg, Virginia. Betty Washington Lewis died in 1797, outliving her husband by 16 years.

In 1999, the Virginia Society of the Sons of the American Revolution chartered the Colonel Fielding Lewis Chapter SAR, representing membership in several counties.


This Month – 250 Years Ago

The king and Parliament rejected Congress's appeals, and in March 1775 the second Virginia Revolutionary Convention met in what was later called Saint John's Church in Richmond to elect delegates to the Second Continental Congress. On 20 January 1775, the *Virginia Gazette* contained a small notice, advising that "The several counties and corporations in this Colony are requested to elect delegates to represent them in

Convention who are desired to meet at the Town of Richmond in the County of Henrico, on Monday the 20th of March, next." The second extralegal convention was called by Peyton Randolph to elect delegates to the Second Continental Congress to be held on 10 May 1775.

A Proclamation to Virginia, March 28, 1775

By his Excellency the Right Hon. JOHN Earl of DUNMORE, his Majesty's Lieutenant and Governor General of the Colony and Dominion of Virginia, and Vice Admiral of the same:

VIRGINIA, to wit,

WHEREAS certain Persons, stiling themselves Delegates of several of his Majesty's Colonies in America, having presumed, without his Majesty's Authority or Consent, to assemble together at Philadelphia in the Months of September and October last, have thought fit, among other unwarrantable Proceedings, to resolve that it will be necessary that another Congress should be held at the same Place on the 10th of May next, unless Redress

of certain pretended Greivances be obtained before that Time, and to recommend that all the Colonies in North America should chuse Deputies to attend such Congress, I am commanded by the King, and I do accordingly issue this my Proclamation, to require all Magistrates and other Officers to use their utmost Endeavours to prevent any Such Appointments of Deputies, and to exhort all Persons whatever within this Government to desist from such an unjustifiable Proceeding, so highly displeasing to his Majesty.

GIVEN under my Hand, and the Seal of the Colony this 28th Day of March, 1775, and in the 15th Year of his Majesty's Reign.

DUNMORE.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

The outcome of the Second Virginia Convention, held in Richmond in March 1775, was a decisive shift towards military preparedness and a crucial step towards Virginia's involvement in the American R evolution. Patrick Henry's passionate "Give me liberty or give me death!" speech swayed the convention to pass a resolution to arm and organize the Virginia militia, putting the colony in a posture of defense against potential British aggression.
