

S.A.R. Flag Certificate on Monday, June 24 at the club's annual new officer installation meeting in the Fellowship Hall of the First United Methodist Church.

The presentation was made by Past PineyWoods Chapter President and Texas Society Genealogist, Thomas Green; PineyWoods Chapter Vice President Donald Lemon; and PineyWoods Chapter Secretary and Texas Compatriot Editor, Jeff Meadows.

The certificate reads: "The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. This Certificate of Commendation Is presented to Liberty Lions Club In Recognition of Exemplary Patriotism In the display of The Flag of the United States of American," dated June 24, 1996 signed by Chapter President Bernard

The Flag Certificate was approved by a unanimous vote of the Board of Directors of the Piney-Woods Chapter, Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution for the Liberty Lions Club's sponsorship of "Flags Across Liberty" project and their patriotic efforts of placing over 430 American Flags for the Olympic Torch Run, Memorial Day, Flag Day and Jly 4th. The flags, increasing in number, will also be displayed on the Labor Day, Columbus Day and on Veterans' Day. The American Flags are put up and taken down by the member of the club and now by an increasing number of non-member volunteers.

The Flag Certificate presentation to the Liberty Lions Club resulted in front page news coverage by The Vindicator newspaper and The Advertiser, their shopper.

The PineyWoods Chapter was exposed to 16,000 homes in Liberty County with this news coverage.

MICHAEL D. YOUNG #145813-TX7828 URIAH TIPPIE - 6TH GREAT GRANDFATHER

Uriah Tippie was born 16 July 1759 in Monmouth, New Jersey. He was the son of Johannes Tippie, who immigrated from the Rhineland in Prussia.

Tippie was a shoemaker, living in Bucks County, Pennsylvania at the time of his enlistment as a private in the 6th Company, 4th Battalion, Northampton Militia.

His company marched to General George Washington's army, camped on the west bank of the Delaware River and crossed over on the morning of the 26th of December, 1776 to fight and take Trenton, the first American victory.

He served a total of four tours of several months each, dur-

ing the next 4 years.

He died 27 June 1848 in Ames, Athens Co., Ohio at the age of 88. During his life, he was married twice, producing 7 chil-

dren and losing two children in the "Tippie" flood of 6 October 1786.

He held several tracts of land on the present day location of the Ohio University, in Athens township.

I descend from his 3rd oldest son, Michael Tippie who married Elizabeth Hewlitt.

JERE BANEWSKI #143423-TX7496 ISRAEL HART - 5TH GREAT GRANDFATHER

Israel Hart was born in Virginia in 1754 and lived in Pulaski County, Virginia at the time of the American Revolution. He assisted in establishing American independence while acting as a private in the Virginia Militia.

Hart married between 1774-1775, probably in Pulaski Co., VA, wife's name unknown. He moved to Crab Orchard, Lincoln Co., KY and on 20 September 1786 his wife and four of their five children were massacred by Shawnee Indians. The fifth child was abducted by the Indians and was not returned until 1795, as the result of a treaty. Israel Hart married for the second time to Elizabeth price in Lincoln Co., KY on 17 March 1788. She was the daughter of Benjamin Price.

Hart died in Somerset, Pulaski Co., KY after 12 November 1838.

KEVIN THOMAS LUCAS #143986-TX7558 AQUILA CORLEY - 5TH GREAT GRANDFATHER

Aquila Corley was born in 1752 to Richard and Effiretta Corley in Culpeper Co., Virginia. On 4 January 1775, he married Mary Ann Maddox also in Culpeper Co., VA. To this union, 4 children were born: Richard, Susannah, Nancy and Aquilla.

During the Revolutionary War, Aquila served in the Culpeper Militia "Classes," "The Minutemen" under the commands of Colonels Throne and Alcock. He served two tours of three months duration, the last in the year of Cornwallis' surrender.

The first tour was probably in September of 1780 to serve under the command of Captain William Duncan. They first rendezvoused at the Culpeper Court House and became attached to a regiment under the command of Colonel Thorn. From there they marched to Fredericksburg, VA where he remained until being discharged from his tour.

The second tour was likely to have begun in July 1781 where he was again drafted to serve 3 months as a private militia man under the command of Captain Green. The rendezvous would have been at the Culpeper Court House or Racoon Ford, where they were attached to a regiment under the command of Colonel Alcock. From there they marched to Fredericksburg, VA and joined the main army under Lafayette. This group marched to York and participated in the siege that caused the surrender of Cornwallis. Aquila was discharged at the James River and returned to his home in Culpeper County.

He died in January of 1783 from a fever which his wife Mary Ann believed was caused during his last tour of duty.

KEVIN THOMAS LUCAS #143986-TX7558 NOTLEY MADDOX - 6TH GREAT GRANDFATHER

Notley Maddox was born 13 April 1731 to John and Mary Maddox in Saint Mary's County, Maryland. On 13 January 1758 in Port Tobacco, MD he married Susannah Burch. To this union, 10 children were born: Mary Ann, Justinian, Sarah, Samuel, Susannah, Nancy, Notley, Elizabeth, John and Bennett.

Notley served as a matross, as a bombardier, as a corporal and as a sergeant in Captain Drury Ragsdale's company, First Artillery Regiment, Continental Troops commanded by Colonel Charles Harrison.

On 7 February 1777 Notley enlisted into the Revolutionary War and around March 1780, he was transferred to Captain James Pendleton's regiment. He was subsequently transferred to a detachment of artillery commanded by Captain Lieutenant Booker. He was discharged 15 January 1781.

1 August 1783 Maddox received and land grant of 200 acres near Flint Hill, VA; about 1813, Maddox moved to Pleasureville, Kentucky where he died 11 March 1820. His grave is located in the countryside outside of Shelbyville, KY.


On 4 November 1993, the John Marshall Chapter of the DAR received permission to place a marker at Notley's grave.

RAYMOND "MARTY" Cox #144635-TX7660 AUDLEY PAUL - PATRIOT


Audley Paul, Sr. was born about 1728-1731 in England. He was a Captain in the French and Indian War and according to family tradition was presented a sword by George Washington for an act of bravery.


Captain Paul was a local hero in the Rockbridge Co., Virginia area and a state marker was placed on the highway near where Audley Paul's Fort stood. It states "Captain Audley Paul, noted Colonial Frontier Soldier served in the Sandy Creek Expedition against the Shawnees in 1756, at the Battle of Point Pleasant in 1774 and in repelling Indian raids in 1761; the fort was crowded with settlers families seeking protection against marauding Shawnees.

Audley married Jane Lynn Mathews about 1758 and by the time the war began, he was in his 50's. Having suffered from wounds of earlier wars, he was now only able to participate as a Patriot who gave beef, corn, oats, and clothing. Audley Paul died 6 September 1802 in Botetourt Co., VA.
