This is the first year that the SAR is allowed to honor Sea Cadets with the Bronze JROTC Medal and Certificate.

The Chapter acquired the proper scripts for the ROTC presentations from TXSSAR Corresponding Secretary, John C. "Jack" Haughton, as they stress the importance of these medals.

Part of the script is as follows: "The PineyWoods Chapter of the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution appreciates this opportunity to recognize meritorious members of the ROTC. The Sons of the American Revolution ROTC medal is the only medal of its kind that is recognized by the US Department of Defense and all the US Military Branches. The recipient of this award will be allowed to wear this medal (at the discretion of their Commanding Officer) if they go into a College ROTC program, or go on Active Duty. So this medal will become a badge of recognition of outstanding leadership and military bearing for many years to come."

JOHN OLIVER ALBRIGHT - NSSAR #119889 - TX 7911 PATRIOT ENSIGN ZERAH BEACH, SR. -4TH GREAT GRANDFATHER

Zerah Beach was born on 23 June 1746 in Salisbury, CT, the son of Barnabas Beach and Sarah Thompson. Zerah's family, especially his father and grandfather, invested heavily in land between Goshen and Salisbury, CT and from his later pursuits Zerah seems to have also had an aptitude for business interests. On 27 November 1768 in Salisbury, Zerah married Lucy Stevens whose father Ebenezer Stevens was both a Patriot and a land speculator.

Following the announcement of the Declaration of Independence, Zerah was appointed Ensign 30 August 1776 and served one year as Quartermaster of Colonel Burrall's Regiment in the Connecticut Line. According to his grandson, Zerah was at Valley forge with General Washington, but that has

as yet not been proven. Later in the War, Zerah was appointed a Justice of the Peace in Connecticut and was a Commissioner at the singing of one of the treaties assembled during the War with the Native American population. Apparently his patriotic actions straddled the border between Connecticut and New York since after the War, he was granted Land Bounty Rights in the State of New York.

After the cessation of hostilities, he moved his family to New York in 1786. In 1790 he was granted a license to operate a tavern in Amenia, Dutchess Co., NY where he was appointed magistrate in 1793. By 1796, he had moved a bit farther north and west to Saratoga County, where he was named as a country coroner.

He remained close to his children in Saratoga until he passed away on 09 June 1836. I am descended from his daughter Deborah.

at Houston Fire Station 101 and responded to a situation where two worke r s touched a 19,000 volt electri-

cal line with an aluminum ladder. Both workers were in critical condition when the team arrived. One of the men was "straight-lining," and they revived him and both were transported to the hospital. Both have recovered. A week later they responded to a call for a man who had fallen out of a tree. The victim is a professional tree man. His back was broken, and the team worked for about 45 minutes to stabilize him for transport. He is not back home but will be a paraplegic for the rest of his life.

Fire Safety Medals and Certificates were presented to Layne W. Sauls and Charles W. Key, who are with the Community Relations Division of the Houston Fire Department. Sauls has edited several videos and films making them useful for teaching fire safety and prevention to young children in

Chaplain in July, 1997. To qualify for this, one has to be a Police Chaplain for 5 years, have 250 hours of continuing education, either through the ICPC. ATS or RTS, various law enforcement academies. One also has to provide evidence of having made

a significant contribution to law enforcement chaplaincy, by teaching workshops. Endorsement also has to be provided by the Chief of the department he

serves, as well as his ecclesiastical body. Rev. Watson has also completed a degree with a major in Law Enforce-

ment Chaplaincy. Rev. Watson initiated the first National Police Week Recognition and Memorial Service in Liberty on May 15, 1991. The 7th

annual Police Recognition and Memorial Service was held Sunday, May 18 at First Baptist Church in Liberty. He has attended a number of emergency situations in Liberty County over the past 7 years, giving support to those in need; also giving death notifications to relatives whose loved ones died in accidents

and conducting funeral services. He has also included the Fire & EMS officers, as well as the Sheriff's

deputies and the Dept. of Public Safety troopers. Rev. Watson and his wife Marian left Liberty May 19 for a short vacation in England prior to returning to Australia where he will be the minister in Tasmania, Australia. Rev. Watson's 5th great grandfather fought at Bunker Hill and at Fort Niagara, although he was an Eng-
