Compatriots of the PineyWoods Chapter are hereby notified of proposed Constitutional and Bylaws changes proposed by the PineyWoods Chapter Board of Directors. These proposed changes will be voted on by PineyWoods Chapter Compatriots at the October 16 "Members Only" Meeting.

The following additions and/or changes to the Chapter's Constitution and Bylaws are as follows: (changes are in bold print)

Patriot Private Ebenezer Stevens, Sr. 5th Great Grandfather

Ebenezer Stevens, Sr., was born on 4 April 1713 in Killingworth, CT, the son of Jonathan Stevens and Deborah Stiles. On 2 Dec. 1742 in Killingworth, he was joined I marriage to Lucy Griswold, daughter of Benjamin Griswold and Abigail Norton. Within ten years, Ebenezer was a wealthy man as evidenced on 20 April 1752, by he and his partner paying 3,000 pounds for land and iron ore rights in Salisbury, CT. He appears to have done considerable speculation in land since the land records contain numerous transactions where he is either the assignor or assignee. A particularly interesting transaction was one where rather than buying a piece of land outright, he bought a 987 year lease on it — today there still being 746 years left on the lease! He must have also been active in the Colonial Militia since by April 1772, he was addressed in legal records as "lieutenant" Ebenezer Stevens.

Being sixty three years old at the time of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, Ebenezer appears to have resigned his militia commission in favor of representing the town of Salisbury in the Connecticut Assembly. He did return briefly to the militia as a private when the British invaded Connecticut from New York City, but returned to private life when the British abandoned their campaign.

Following the war, he remained in Salisbury where his will was probated on 4 July 1798. His children include Ebenezer Stevens Jr., who was an Ensign in the Revolutionary War and died in battle and Lucy Stevens from whom I descend.
