

This Day In The Revolution

April 19, 1775 – British General Thomas Gage learns of weapons being gather in Concord and secretly sent around 700 British regulars commanded by Lt Col Francis Smith to seize and destroy them. Word of the British advance was spread by couriers, The Battles of the American Revolution began at Lexington, Concord, Lincoln, Menotomy (present day Arlington), and Cambridge.






1776 – Early 1776 General Charles Lee sends two Continental Army Officers to New Orleans to request supplies from **Spanish Governor Luis de Unzaga (1717-1793)**. Unzaga covertly agreed to provide supplies not wanting to provoke the British without a declaration of war. Unzaga authorized a much needed shipment

of gun powder in a transaction brokered by Patriot Oliver Pollock. When Bernardo de Galvez y Madrid, Count of Galvez, was appointed Governor of New Orleans I January 1777, he continued to provide supplies.

March 1777 – Benjamin Franklin wrote to the Congressional Committee of secret Correspond-

ence from Paris that Spain had quietly granted Continental access to the rich Port of Havana. New **Spanish Prime Minister Jose Monino y Redondo** (1728-1808), Count of Floridablanca, wrote, "The fate of the colonies interest very much, and we shall do anything for them that circumstances permit".




kansas Post, located about 35 miles up the Arkansas river from the Mississippi with 100 partisan militia and Indians. After 6 hours of heavy fighting in which the Spanish





fired more than 300 cannon balls, **Spanish Captain Jocobo Du Breuil** ordered a sortie that surprised the British force causing them to run for their boats. Quapaw Indians aiding the Spanish caused the fleeing British to release prisoners they had taken from the town located just outside the fort. Word of the signing of Peace between the British and the French, and Britain and Spain, in January 1783 had not reached the Mississippi Valley. (See Anglo-Spanish War History)

THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR BEGINS

What's Going On In Texas. Well, a number of things. Our Executive Board will be meeting this week to discuss the election of State Officers for 2020-2021. Our Annual Election of Officers is held each year at the Spring Texas Convention. This year the 125th Annual Convention was CANCELLED. It has been rescheduled for July 29 to August 2, 2020. President David Temple will be discussioning election options.

Our Oration Contest was cancelled and unless something changes fast, we will not have a Texas contestant at the 130th Annual NSSAR Congress in Richmond, Virginia on July 12, 2020. The **Texas Oration Contest Chairman Mark Harrison** has come up with a brilliant idea. He is working on videoing each speech



contestant, from their homes using ZOOM and having judges watch and rate the contestants. We have six Contestants in Texas this year. Mark is hoping all will participate. The 1st Place Contestant will be invited to compete in Richmond, Virginia.

Our Youth Awards Luncheon will be on August 1st, 2020. All of the Orations Contestants and all of the 1st Place Youth Contests Award Winners, Eagle Scout, Essay, CAR Essay, JROTC, and 4 H are invited to attend and present their winning essays and speeches, and then be presented their Scholarships.

John Beard, Janisue Rigel, and Larry Stevens were able to have the Texas Convention rescheduled with no penalty to July 29-August 2, 2020. The Hotel Reservations link has been posted on the TXSSAR Website by Ray Cox. The Event Registration is exactly the same except the dates, with a Texas Color Guard Black Powder Safety meeting on Thursday afternoon, July 29th, and with the Color Guard holding a "raising" of the SAR Flag with the hotel staff in front of the Hotel around 5:00 pm.

The Color Guard Commander Ted Wilson and our State President with like everyone to attend, in uniform if you have one. You can carry your musket or rifle; but no black powder. The will not be a Black Powder "Salute". This is a short ceremony with pictures. This will be a National Color Guard event for any of you trying to earn National Color Guards points for the NSSAR Color Guard Medals. There is a Color Guard Manual on the Texas Website and the NSSAR Website. This year, Texas will have three National events. The Annual George Washington Parade in Laredo this past February, our 125th TXSSAR Annual Convention, and the South Central district meeting on August 28-29, 2020 in Richardson Texas. If you attend the Annual NSSAR Congress in Richmond and join the National Color Guard in some of the ceremonies, this would be another National Event.

APPLICATIONS! What is happening with New and Supplemental Applications. First, the SAR Office in Louisville was closed because of Virus guidelines for businesses in Kentucky. Applications are not being processed and the Genealogy Staff and the National Registrar have asked states to hold applications until the ALL CLEAR is sounded and we go back to work. 
1780 – The Battle for the Carolinas'

Ramsour's Mill North Carolina

Sir Henry Clinton dictated the terms of surrender at Charleston after Major General Lincoln surrendered and British forces were occupying the vital courthouse towns of Camden, Cheraw, Georgetown, and Ninety-Six. Under the proclamation of June 3, 1780, parolees could return home and remain neutral for the remainder for the war. Patriots, or those commonly known as Whigs, were compelled to take an oath of loyalty to the king or be regarded as rebels and enemies of their country. Feeling well about the situation, General Clinton returned to New York leaving Lieutenant General Charles, Earl Cornwallis in command of the army in the south.

Outrage of the massacre of Patriots at Battle of Waxhaw's on May 29, 1780 spread throughout the Carolinas across the Blue Ridge into Washington County North Carolina, and into Virginia. This outrage and fear of the encroaching British forces spreading into the Carolinas lead by the feared Lt. Colonel Tarleton and Major Wymns caused Patriots to prepare for worst.



During this time, Loyalist L. Col. John Moore, of Hamilton's Tory Regiment, had returned to his home near

Ramsour's Mill, Lincolnton, North Carolina, from Charleston. He had served at the Siege of Charleston. The resounding victory by the British at Waxhaw's caused Moore to plan action against the Patriot Rebels. He called together a group of forty Loyalist on June 10, 1780, and shared with them instructions from Cornwallis that they should avoid organizing before the British were in the area. News came to Moore that about twenty Patriots were looking for them. Moore tried unsuccessfully to confront them and sent fellow Loyalist home. He instructed them

to meet him at Ramsour's Mill on June 13. On June 13 two hundred men met him at the Mill. The number grew by June 20 at the camp to about 1,300 men.

American General Griffith Rutherford encamped just to the east near Charlotte, North Carolina, learned in early June 1780, that a large body of Loyalist was assembling at Ramsour's Mill. Rutherford began moving his forces in that direction but did not want to jeopardize his position. He was aware the British General Lord Ramdon had settled his British forces at Hanging Rock, North Carolina, some 40 miles the west of the mill.

On the evening of June 14, he ordered to Lt. Colonel Francis Locke of Rowan, Major David Wilson of Mecklenburg, and Captains Falls, Knox, and Brandon, to call up their men and advance to the area of Ramsour's Mill and attack the Tory Camp.

Locke had about 400 men at Mountain Creek, after he was joined by Major Joseph McDowell and Falls, Knox and Brandon, and they were about 16 miles from Ramsour's Mill. His intelligence told him the Loyalist force was three times his size, but he made the decision to attack early the next day without hearing further any information on Rutherford's movement. At daybreak on June 20; his force was poised about a mile from the Loyalist. His battle plan was for the mounted men under McDowell, Brandon, and Falls lead the attack followed closely by the infantry. The Tories and Loyalist were camped on a hill about 300 yards east of the mill on a hill or ridge. On the morning of June 20, 1780, Locke's Calvary charged up the road and encountered the pickets. The Tory pickets fired and retreated to their positions up the hill. The patriot horsemen charged up the hill followed by the infantry. The battle quickly became hand to hand, using rifle butts, knives; they were not equipped with bayonets. Lt. Col. John Moore's Tory or Loyalist militia lost that morning. Casualties were


high on both sides; Loyalist 150 killed and wounded; Patriots 150 killed and wounded. Many are buried on site in a mass grave. A statue com-

memorates at the site.

This was the first of many battles after the Waxhaw's Massacre. Williams Plantation or Huck's Defeat on July 12,

1780, the same day Cedar Springs, Gowan's Old Fort 13 July, Rocky Mount 30 July, the first battle at Hanging Rock 30 July, the second battle at Hanging Rock August 6, Carey's Fort August 15, and then the first battle at Camden August 16, 1780 where General Gates was soundly defeated by Lord Cornwallis.

Ramsour's Mill was like many other battles in the colonies between opposing militia companies with neighbor fighting neighbor. This battle was no exception. Nearly all the militia men, Whigs and Loyalist, lived in the four or five counties around Charlotte and present-day Lincolnton, North Carolina.

There are many authors who have written accounts of the different battles in the Carolinas, and Ramsour's Mill is no exception. Rev. War Pension Applications give you an appreciation of some battles, and list the commanding officers by name and unit. In this brief account, I used material from the following references:

Temple who shared some little known history associated with 3 of the most prominent Generals involved the American Revolutionary War – American General & 1st President of the USA, George Washington; British General, Charles "The Earl" Cornwallis; and French Marshall General, Jean-Batiste Donatien Rochambeau. All three of these Generals engaged in leading their respective Armies in the American Revolutionary War. Cornwallis was perhaps the most renowned British hero of the era leading the most powerful Army (Great Britain) in the world when he was defeated at the Battle of Yorktown by the collaborative forces of Gen. George Washington and French Gen. Rochambeau commanding French forces in Revolutionary America. All three of these Noblemen and Generals ultimately retired quietly to their respective countries in the early 1800's.

AWARDS/Recognition:

John Worm was presented with an SAR Meritorious Service Award Medal and Certificate recognizing his long-standing efforts to collect household grocery coupons that continue to be sent to our overseas military
