Was John Singleton Copley, Boston artist providing historical masterpieces, a spy? Submitted by James E. Mitchell March 5, 2020

Setting: The unclassified review of *A Counterintelligence Reader*, *Vol. One, Nat'l. Counterintelligence Center, WDC, Editor Frank J. Rafalko* identified that the earliest formation of organized American Intelligence (intel.) gathering and counter intel. methods were begun in New England at Boston's North End. Staging for American ideas of liberty and independence were suggested early on at Boston's *Old South Meeting House* built in 1729 as a Puritan house of worship: see, "*Freedom Trail*" a brochure pub., by the Boston Nat'l. Historical Park, MA, Nat'l. Park Service, U.S. Dept. of the Interior. Mapping and recording of military movements, regimental identification and names of officers and *in particular direct access to officer sources* were critical and essential for counter-intel. gathering and forming counter-intel. measures, writer -JEM.





John Singleton Copley was born on 3 Jul 1738 at colonial Boston, Suffolk County (Co.) Massachusetts (MA). His parents were Richard Copley, a tobacco merchant and wife (w.) Mary Sarah nee Singleton. They immigrated to Boston's North End from Ireland for financial opportunity; however, before John's birth his father passed away from illness while traveling to the West Indies, where his death was recorded. Widower -Mary Sarah remarried Peter Pelham prior to her son John's 10th birthday. Peter was an immigrant engraver originally from London, Great Britain. John's stepfather logically shared his *tradecraft i.e., engraver's eye that promoted John S. Copley's skill for portraiture! During 1753, his stepfather died, when John was age 15.

Importantly Copley successfully set-up a trusted and professional, *friendship circle* during 1763. Before 1769, John was recognized locally at Boston for his *accomplished portrait work* utilizing everyday *trade-craft* background objects, i.e., embroidered cloth, vest buttons with *frog* figures set upon men's fine wearing apparel. He made friendships easily and his *engraver's eye* endeared him with North End Boston gentlemen including Joseph Warren, M.D.; John Hancock, Boston merchant; Paul Revere, silversmith; British Gen'l. Thomas Gage's wife, **Margaret Kemble Gage (1734-1824); and Samuel Adams, a *North End* brewer, see: separate sources, *Dr. Joseph Warren: The Boston Tea Party, etc. by Samuel A. Forman, (2012)* published by Pelican Publ. Co., Gretna, Louisiana, pgs. 113 - 115, [pg. 142 (ca1772) Sam'l Adams portrait], 180, [pg. 181 (1772) Eliz. Hooton Warren w., of Joseph Warren, M.D.], pg. 350; *see,* ***Copley's portrait of Joseph Warren, M.D., now on display at the Boston Museum of Fine Arts, pg. 379. Also, read *The Muse of the Revolution: The Secret Pen of Mercy Otis Warren* (1728-1814), 1st female historian of the American Revolution by Nancy Rubin Stuart, *(2008) published by Beacon Press, Boston, MA, pgs. 6 and 179*.

Mercy Otis Warren, Stuart wrote, was a sister of James Otis, Whig Patriot *firebrand* that first declared, "taxation without representation is tyranny". Mercy Otis married in 1754, a 2nd Cousin James Warren, a farmer and trained attorney-at-law, Whig Patriot critic of the Stamp Act of 1765, elected speaker of the Massachusetts House in 1775 and paymaster general of the Continental Army. Although sharing the Warren surname, James was unrelated to Joseph Warren, M.D., of Boston and his brother John.

Aside: the writer attended between Jul 8 -14, 2016, the 126th Annual Congress of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) held at Weston **Copley Place** on Huntington Ave., one block east of the Boston Public Library the oldest public (U.S.) library founded by Benjamin Franklin; source, *MapEasy, Inc., All Rights Reserved, copyright 2009*. A *straight-line-of-sight* walk between the mapped **Copley Square** to Boston Common along Tremont St., past King's Chapel and Burial Ground at Beacon St., to **Faneuil Hall** and **Paul Revere's House** on North St. only, took an hour. Not surprisingly, **Copley Square** now, mapped at Boston, MA appeared named John Singleton Copley; source, https://search.yahoo.com/search? fr=mcafee&type=E211US105G0&p=Copley+Square%2C+Boston%2C+Mass

Samuel A. Forman wrote that **Joseph Warren**, a medical apprentice (1761) became inactive and dropped out of his St. Andrew's Masonic Lodge at Boston during the 1763-4 small pox epidemic, where Warren's friend, Paul Revere was admitted. Revere and [Codename: Mechanics or Liberty Boys] were the 1st Patriot intelligence network on record. This secret group logically grew out of the old organization identified at Boston as the Sons of Liberty that had successfully opposed the hated Stamp Act; source, Intelligence in the War of Independence a publication of Public Affairs (Staff) Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Washington, DC 20505.

During 1769, John S. Copley married Susanna Farnum Clarke, daughter of Richard Clarke the local agent for the British East India Company. Richard Clarke was a native Bostonian, born 1711 and died at age 83 during 1795 at London, Middlesex, England. The Copley's would have four surviving children; see: https://smarthistory.org/copley-the-copley-family/

Copley's artistic drive to expand, coupled with his wife's family business ties and politics, led to their *permanent departure* from Boston in the late 1770s! The family traveled to Europe (London) and re-settled there. David McCullough, author of *John Adams*, (2001) published by Simon & Schuster, pgs. 150, 297-98, [pg. 336 (ca1796) John Quincy Adams portrait, No. 30] and pg. 363, wrote that Abigail Adams in Jul 1784 safely arrived at Britain, off shore near the town of Deal. She had received a letter from her husband, newly appointed ambassador to the British Court that he looked forward to her quick arrival by vessel because, he dearly missed Abigail. His friend John S. Copley had painted (1783) John Adam's full-length portrait. Lastly, wrote McCullough that during the final days of May 1786, John Adams was ordered to Amsterdam, to secure another desperately deeded loan for the U.S. Among a

few family friends invited to the Adam's Grosvenor Square, London residence were the (John S.) Copley's.


After 1800, John S. Copley's portrait commissions cooled. Regrettably, he grew depressed as his age, advanced. He died at age 77, after lingering some weeks following a stroke. Still, his burial tomb might be visited at Greater London, St. John the Baptist Churchyard, Borough of Croydon for a clue to his country's allegiance. **Margaret Kemble Gage was born in New Brunswick, Province of New Jersey and, although she was beloved by her husband, some thought her sympathy could be found laid at the rebellion's feet in the Cause of the American Revolution.

Guest Speaker Presentation:

Kermit Breed introduced our special guest, Drake Peddie who spoke briefly on our history – whether its American History or our own personal ancestry history. He noted that our school history books have always been about the same size, even though our history grows deeper, more detailed and nuanced as each successive year passes. It is important that we know our history and share it by the written word of books and papers, as well as the spoken word of personal stories. He told us the story of two great American patriots, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson who were fierce political adversaries but remained friends throughout the many years following their services as the 2nd and 3rd Presidents of the USA. An amazing anecdote is that on 4 July 1826, exactly 50 years after our nation's birth, both great men passed away within hours of each other. And on 4 July 1831, exactly 5 years later, James Monroe, our 5th President passed away. What an incredible coincidence that 3 of our first 5 US Presidents all died on the anniversary of our nation's birth!


Benediction by Alan Bowman was followed by the SAR closing. Our new PineyWoods President, Michael Anderson adjourned the meeting at 11:10 AM.

"Josiah, my father, married young, and carried his wife with three children into New England, about 1682." The conventicles having been forbidden by law, and frequently disturbed, induced some considerable men of his acquaintance to remove to that country, and he was prevailed with to accompany them thither, where

they expected to enjoy their mode of religion with freedom. By the same wife he had four children more born there, and by a second wife ten more, in all seventeen; of which I remember thirteen sitting at one time at his table, who all grew up to be men and women, and married; I was the youngest son, and the youngest child but two, and was born in Boston, New England. My mother, the second wife, was Abiah Folger, daughter of Peter Folger, one of the first settlers of New England, of whom honorable mention is made by Cotton Mather, in his church history of that country, entitled Magnalia Christi Americana, as "a godly, learned Englishman," if I remember

the words rightly. I have heard that he wrote sundry small occasional pieces, but only one of them was printed, which I saw now many years since. It was written in 1675, in the home-spun verse of that time and people, and addressed to those then concerned in the government there. It was in favour of liberty of conscience, and in behalf of the Baptists, Quakers, and other sectaries that had been under persecution, ascribing the Indian wars, and other distresses that had befallen the country, to that persecution, as so many judgments of God to punish so heinous an offense, and exhorting a repeal of those uncharitable laws. The whole appeared to me as written with a good deal of decent plainness and manly freedom. The six concluding lines I remember, though I have forgotten the two first of the stanza; but the purport of them was, that his censures proceeded from good-will, and, therefore, he would be known to be the author.
