I guess my favorite Christmas, as a child, was 1953 when Santa brought me a red Schwinn Hornet bicycle. As an adult it would be Christmas when my sons were young, seeing their faces on Christmas morning.

My ancestors were Puritans from New England they did not celebrate Christmas at all. The Southern Anglicans revelries most closely match our modern Christmas celebrations.

Most of the traditions we have today were passed down from our ancestors. Some say the Christmas Tree was introduced during the Revolutionary War by our enemy the Hessian solders. While on the frontier people seemed to have kept a day which they called "Old Christmas",

on January 6th. This custom continues into the 20th century. Visitors to Appalachia and the highlands of North Carolina found the practice of "Old Christmas" is still celebrated with bonfires and the firing of guns.

Celebrating the twelve days of Christmas was common in early America. On Saturday, January 6, 1759 George Washington married Martha Dandridge Custis – on the twelfth night of Christmas. Resigning his

military commission to take up life as a husband and planter. In my family research I know of two direct line ancestors couples that were wed on the 25 of December.

We all know that during one of the darkest moments of the American Revolution, Gen. George Washington led his army over the frozen Delaware River on the evening of December 25, 1776. The now famous Crossing of the Delaware that led to the Battle of Trenton.

This event is a member-guest event so please bring your significant other or a friend.






American History

The United States and George Washington

As we approach Christmas 2019, I believe we should reflect on the wards of our first President of the United States and be thankful for his leadership through those first years.

With his had resting on the Bible open to Deuteronomy Chapter 28, President George Washington delivered his Inaugural Address to both houses of Congress just after taking the oath office on the balcony of Federal Hall..



"Such being the impressions under which I have, in obedience to the public summons, repaired to the present station, it would be peculiarly improper to omit, in this first official act, my fervent supplications to that Almighty Being who rules over the universe, who presides in the councils of nations and whose providential aides can supply every human defect; that His benediction may consecrate to the liberties and happiness of the people of the United States a government instituted by themselves for these essential purposes; and may enable every instrument employed in its administration to execute with success, the functions allotted to his charge.

In tendering this homage to the Great Author of every public and private good, I assure myself that it expresses your sentiments not less than my own; nor those of my fellow citizens at large, less than either.

No people can be bound to acknowledge and adore the Invisible Hand which conducts the affairs of men more than


the people of the United States. Every step by which they have advanced to the character of an independent nation seems to have been distinguished by some token of providential agency.

And in the important revolution just accomplished, in the system of their United government, the tranquil deliberations and voluntary consent of so many distinct communities, from which the event has resulted,



can not be compared with the means by which most governments have been established, without some return of pious gratitude, along with an humble anticipation of the future blessings which the past seem to presage ...

We ought to be no less persuaded that the propitious smiles of Heaven can never be expected on a nation that disregards the eternal rules of order and right which Heaven itself has ordained; and since the preservation of the sacred fire of liberty and the destiny of the republican model of government are justly considered as deeply, perhaps finally, staked on the experiment..."



1775—GW's Weather Diary

George Washington kept personal diaries in one, he wrote daily Prayers, farm transactions, and even one for the weather. He wrote of the United States in this book,

"It is impossible to rightly govern the world without God and the Bible.


It is impossible to account for the creation of the universe, without the agency of a Supreme Being. It is impossible to govern the universe without the aid of a Supreme Being. It is impossible to reason without arriving at a Supreme Being.

Religion is as necessary to reason, as reason is to religion. The one cannot exist without the other. A reasoning being would lose his reason in attempting to account for the great phenomena of nature, had he not a Supreme Being to refer to."

George Washington Picture Fact or Fiction

This famous painting of Washington and his stead with Washington kneeling in prayer was painting many years after the Valley Forge. Let the Historians debate whether the man responsible for our victory for freedom was seen in prayer at Valley Forge, and dwell on what we do know as fact. George Washington kept a Diary, more than one,

which where note books of his experiences each day from 1748, his first surveying trip, until the year of his death in 1799. One was for the Weather, one was for who his was with for even breakfast, one for events, and one for his daily prayers. Many of these survived although some are just pieces of pages from his note-



Seven-thirty a.m., arrived at Greentree. Ray Cox just behind Larry Stevens. John Schmonsees was already

there. Not pictured was Jim Pinkerton. The COB OVEN fired up with wood charcoal and bread loaves baking by a parent Patriot Day volunteer. John's Meat Pie aka 1776 Cook Book was hot and cooking in a Dutch Oven. A fruit pie was awaiting its turn. A




pot of Soup in a covered iron pot was steaming over coals. Three eight man tents were pitched and a canvass shade covered the prep table by the OVEN. The Revolutionary War era mock camp was ready for the Greentree Elementary School 120 plus 5th Grade students celebrating the school's Patriot Day. Here the

school's Patriot Day. Here, they would taste the bread with their

freshly made butter spread atop. They would see the soup and pies cook, pitch the tents. The girls would discuss nursing the sick and wounded; learn to make a field stretcher, and the boys would drill as a militia unit.

The bread and butter, and the beef pie were very good!



their teachers watching as Larry Stevens talked to life during the revolutionary war period using artifacts from his "**traveling trunk**". Sugar for the Sugar and Molasses Act, Cards and documents for the Stamp Act, and Tea Act. A 3 Lb. Sadd Iron ca. 1800 and candle molds to discuss chores, plates, bowls, utensils to talk about common foods and cooking. Revolutionary Uniforms and every day dress, powder horns, flint and steel are all items used during the presentation. Ray Cox presented the Fife, A Weapon of War. He talked about everyday life in a Continental Army encampment and the roll of Musicians, playing songs heard throughout the cam, such as when to get up, assemble, eat. Turn in for the night, and alarms.
