


He was presented with two Vietnam Era Pins for family of those who served in Vietnam, his daughter and son.

November 15, 2025 Meeting Notes

Los Cuco's Restaurant, Kingwood, Texas

Meeting began at 11:32 AM with the opening prayer, Pledge Allegiance, Texas Pledge, and SAR pledge by chapter president Abe Abdmoulaie.

Members present included: (17) Joe Potter, Bill King, Jeff LaRochelle, Merv Hartwick, Connor Pritchard, Ray Cox, Jim Pinkerton, Abe Abdmoulaie, Lewis (Skip) Hawley, Larry Stevens, Ben Baskin, Bernie Kent, Ski Grumboski, Kermit Breed, Larry Blackburn, Harry Salisbury, Trevor Points.

Guests included: (10) John Orndoff, Jeannie Hartwick, Susan Grumboski, Mark Fishlock, Sharon Fishlock, Kim Points (CAR), Kaia Points (CAR), Elayn Points (DAR), Don Albe, One Guest not named.

Abe asked all top to introduce themselves and to include whether they are veterans and to include the military branch in which each serve. Abe then asked which veteran organization was first veteran organization established. Several chapter members correctly identified the Society of Cincinnati, organized on April 30, 1889, was the first.

Officer reports are as follows:

2nd VP Skip Hawley noted that two checks were presented to Cleveland High School JROTC and Splendora High School JROTC Cadets and instructors. And on Veterans Day, November, Hawley and Stevens, met with the Splendora staff and the Splendora ISD Education Foundation and presented our check supporting their History Fair again this year.

November 7th, at the Bear Branch Elementary Patriot's Day, Ray Cox and Larry Stevens made historical presentations to 150 Bear Branch 5th grade students, and on November 14th, at Willow Creek Elementary, Pa-

triots' Day, Ray Cox, Skip Hawley, and Larry Stevens made historical presentations to about 125 5th grade students.

On December 4th at Greentree Elementary, they will have their Patriots' Day. Cox, Hawley, and Stevens of PineyWoods will present programs.

Secretary King noted that the previous month's meeting minutes are included in the chapter newsletter.

B Ray Mize, who was traveling, had sent a copy of the chapter's

financial statement to Abe to be included in the November meeting minutes.

Registrar Kermit Breed reported that he would work with Don Albe on an SAR application. Larry Stevens reported that he was sent the name of a potential member by Texas Communication Secretary Ray Cox. a Mr.

Garcia, and he has sent Mr. Garcia a note to contact him.

Larry reminded everyone to please send SAR dues for 2026 to TXSAR!

Veteran coordinator Ski Grumboski reminded everyone to consider buying a veteran wreath. Cutoff date is November 30th. Any member activities supporting veterans should be documented on the Stark Report. Send these to Ski Grumboski.

Larry Stevens will host the Annual Chapter Christmas party scheduled for December 13th at his home. Please arrive by 11:00 AM. The chapter will provide the main dish. Members will be asked to provide desserts, fruit trays, veggie, etc. The Kingwood Madrigal Choir will arrive at 11:30 am to entertain us with Christmas tunes.

The PBS revolutionary War series created by Ken Burns will first air on November 16th.

After lunch, Abe introduced our November speaker John Ormdorff. John's presentation was on his personal experiences during the Vietnam Nam Khe Sanh battle that started on January 1968. Don enlisted in the USMC in 1967, attended boot camp, and was assigned to the USMC 3rd division.

The Khe Sanh battle lasted 45 days which started prior to the Tet offensive. The battle was the most intense battle in Vietnam Nam. An artillery barrage started the engagement and lasted continuously for 2 days along with mortar, and small arms fire. The Khe Sanh encampment was completely surrounded by15000 NVA troops. The American camp was only six thousand strong. On February 28th, the NVAR launched 1500 artillery blasts.

The encampment was resupplied by American C-130 aircraft that were harassed by enemy fire while unloading. Additionally, Chinook and Huey helicopter provided supplies and evacuated injured Marines under constant enemy fire.

USAF F-4 phantoms and B-52's made bombing drops on enemy positions to provide air support. Marine Sky Raiders provided close air support with napalm drops on enemy positions. Marine snipers kept NVA soldiers under fire.

Chaplains were continuously providing spiritual relief to the troops while the NVA fired on them.

Trenches were constantly under artillery attack. Marines deepened their trenches for cover; some were dug eight feet deep.

The firing ended with NVA troops evacuating in mid-March 1968. The USMC troops were withdrawn starting on April 1st, and all were out of Khe Sanh by April 15th.

In reports released years later General Westmoreland considered using tactical nuclear weapons, but orders were never given for this.

Abe presented a certificate for John's sometimes very personal reflections on his days at Khe Sanh in 1968.

After John finished his USMC service and entered San Francisco University Law School in 1978. After successfully finishing law school he started a career in the Houston Oil and Gas industry. Along with a lot of other veterans before him, he kept his war time experiences locked away for many years.

Abe adjourned the meeting at 1:00 PM. Jim Pinkerton ended the meeting with a closing prayer. Abe followed with the SAR closing.
