The Founder of Revolution Education 1776 is our Lunch Speaker at Union Kitchen

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From the President:

Members and Friends,

In this month of February focusing on love and relationships, I thought it would be interesting to research how love was manifested in Colonial America.

In seventeenth and early eighteenth century New England, courtship was not simply a personal, private matter. The law gave parents 'the care and power...for the disposing of their Children in Marriage,' and it was expected that they would take an active role overseeing their child's choice of a spouse. Puritan New Englanders did not regard love as a necessary precondition for marriage. True love, the Puritans believed, would appear following marriage. A proper marriage, in their view, was based on rational considerations of property, compatibility, and religious piety.

As parental influence over courtship declined, a new romantic ideal of love arose. In the years just before the Revolution, a flood of advice books, philosophical treaties, and works of fiction helped to popularize revolutionary new ideas about courtship and marriage. Readers learned that love was superior to property as a basis for marriage and that mar-





riage should be based on mutual sympathy, affection, and friendship. One indication of a decline in parental control was a sudden upsurge in the mideighteenth century in the number of brides who were pregnant when they got married. As many as 30 to 40 percent were pregnant at the time of their marriage.

The emphasis attached to romantic love can be seen in in the proliferation of new kinds of love letters exchanged between men and women. Courtship letters changed by the nineteenth century from brief notes to longer, more effusive expositions of feelings and emotions. By the late eighteenth century, love letters, particularly those written by men, had grown more expansive and less formal. In their love letters, couples described feelings of affection that were deeply romantic and began to use such terms of endearment as 'dearest' or 'my beloved.' Members of all social classes exchanged love letters.

Women were largely excluded from the public stage, but their role in the early republic was nonetheless a vital one. Perceived as the more virtuous gender, American women were charged with inspiring their spouses, suitors, and sons to moral conduct. At a time when the nation's fate was closely linked to the virtue of its citizens, female influence was considered a powerful force.

In those years after the Revolution, with all the emphasis on virtue, sin-



cerity, and companionship in the period's writings about marriage, beauty and fashion were far from forgotten. Even Thomas Jefferson counseled his daughter to attend to her appearance. In 1783, taking time away from his duties as Virginia's representative at the Continental Congress, he reminded Patsy that her clothes should always be "neat, whole, and properly put on." Although he did not wish her to be "gayly clothed at this time of life," he warned, "Nothing is so disgusting to men as a want of cleanliness and delicacy in women." At the tender age of eleven, Patsy may have found her father's advice rather premature. Most young people did

not begin participating in mixed social activities until they were teenagers.

Thank you to those who responded with information for the Stark and Americanism Reports which are completed at the beginning of each new year. These reports validate the mission of the SAR as a 501(c)(3) non-profit and document the many hours of volunteering, supporting our veterans, recognizing our youth for their accomplishments and educating them about our great Republic. America in the Revolutionary War

February 10, 1763 – King Phillip's War, or the French and Indian War in North American, ended with the signing of the treaties of Hubertusburg and Paris. France lost all of her claims to Canada and gave Louisiana to Spain. Britain gained Spanish Florida, Canada, and many French overseas holdings. The treaty ensured the supremacy of Britain in Colonial America and at sea. The American colonies were strengthened by removing their European rivals to the north and south of the colonies. These losses of Frances contributed to their intervention in the American Revolution.





February 27, 1776 – The Battle of Moore's Creek – In February 1776, British General Donald McDonald marched 1,660 Scottish Highlanders and North Carolina Loyalist or Regulators toward Wilmington, North Carolina to join British forces coming from Boston and England. The plan was to control the Carolinas. McDonald's march would take him to the bridge at Moore's Creek about 18 mile northwest of Wilmington. Waiting across the bridge were 1,000 North Carolina rebels commanded by Colonels Alexander Lillington and Richard Caswell. Reaching the bridge,

McDonald order the Highlanders to charge and take the bridge. Raising their broadswords, the Scots rushed the bridge and were quickly dispatched by the rebels. McDonald was defeated ending British military activity in the Carolinas for about three years.



February 6, 1778 – The treaties of Amity and Commerce were signed, and in May 1778 the Continental Congress ratified them. The treaties were the result of a diplomatic commission sent to France in 1776 consisting of Benjamin Franklin, Silas Deane, and Arthur Lee. The French had been secretly sending aid to the colonies since 1775. When American forces defeated the British at the Battle of Saratoga, France decided the Americans could win their struggle against Britain. One month after the treaties were signed, British Warships fired on two French vessels formerly begin-

ning the French aid to America. The French fleet proved critical to the defeat of the British at Yorktown.

February 14, 1779 – The Battle of Kettle Creek – At 10 a.m. Colonel Andrew Pickens launched a surprise attack with 350 men on a Tory force of about 800 commanded by Colonel John Boyd. Boyd's goal was to unite with British General Archibald Campbell's force, which had successfully captured Augusta, Georgia. By that evening the Tories abandoned the field leaving most of their gear.

February 4, 1889 – General George Washington (ret) is elected the first President of the United States of America unanimously by the 69 presidential electors from the States. Article II of the U. S. Constitution stipu-

lated that each State could appoint a presidential elector for each member of the Senator and one for each member of the House of Representatives for which they were entitled. Each elector had two votes. John Adams received 34 votes and elected Vice President. Article Twelve of the U. S. Constitution of 1804 changed voting by having a separate ballet for the Vice President. New York State, the Capital State, was not represented failing to elect their Electors in time. Virginia and Maryland electors, two each, did not vote, they were late due to weather. North Carolina, with seven possible Electors, and Rhode Island with three, had not ratified the Constitution therefore were not eligible to vote.

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Riverton, Wyoming -WIND RIVER CHAPTER

When PineyWoods member Karl Falken relocated to Riverton a few years back, there was no SAR Chapter, and he set about to remedy that. He founded and chartered The Wind River Chapter", with the help of PineyWoods. The chapter is thriving, becoming very active with Patriot Chest Programs, just like PineyWoods.

Last summer at Lander, Wyoming, during the weeks around Independence Day, 2022, the Lander Library graciously displayed the Patriot Chest of the Wyoming Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. A portion of the Resource Room at the library was dedicated to public display of reproduction artifacts from American colonial times. This is part of a program sponsored by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. Karl helped set up the display cabinets and the hallway exhibits.

The SAR Patriot Chest Program is an interactive presentation, intended to compliment Elementary and Middle School lesson plans on the Revolutionary War and Colonial Period of American History. The program purpose is to bring that history alive, while providing students with a sense of the times and appreciation of the Patriot men and women who founded our nation. Each state society is ex-

men and women who founded our nation. Each state society is expected to create and maintain a Patriot Chest. The one for Wyoming was put together by the Wind River

From June 27th through July 16 the contents of the chest were on public display. They were not only viewed, but could be handled as well! For a number of the items are tools and toys that can be used and played with. Other items included reproduction coins and bills, writing instruments, a telescope, sextant and compass. Some items like sugar nippers, a candle snuffer and a bird whistle were novel enough that the use was not obvious to many. A challenging item was the candle holder/tinder box with flint and steel (tinder was not in-



cluded to avoid the possibility of starting an actual fire). Accompanying the chest was a reproduction militia uniform and two costumes with tri corner hats. (The hand sewn uniform was made in Casper, Wyoming by seamstress Alison Youngberg!) The latter two costumes could be worn by children and adventurous adults for photo opportunities. The intent of the hands on arrangement is to promote living history, demonstrated to be a particularly effective way to inspire an interest in historical subjects.

"I think the patriot chest display, especially the uniforms, were awesome!" exclaimed Noah Simpson of Lander. "I wish I had something like that myself. I hope to get in-

volved in living history someday."

Overall, the exhibit was a popular attraction that complimented the other festivities in town and around the county that celebrated our nation's independence from Great Britain. It reminds us and connects us to the people who were essential to the founding of America and contributed to making this, the greatest of all nations. KARL FALKEN **Dual Piney Woods 51**



PINEYWOODS OUTREACH EDUCATION

PineyWoods Members have been very active this year working with Revolution Education 1776 founded by Johnny Schmonsees. Some of our members are members to that organization also. In my editorial, I discussed American History Education. Here, I want to share the concerns of the 40th President of the USA.

Our 40th President Ronald Reagan was not the first United States President or national leader to speak of the necessity of teaching American History to American Citizens, but his was most memorable, largely due by his personable presentation. His view on teaching American History, as it was, how it happened, is a great concern today. It is not a political opinion but something all of us should strive to maintain today.

In his final address on January 11th. The President said, We've got to do a better job of getting across that America is freedom—freedom of speech, freedom of religion, freedom of enterprise. And freedom is special

and rare. It's fragile; it needs protection.

"So, we've got to teach history based not on what's in fashion but what's important—why the Pilgrims came here, who Jimmy Doolittle was, and what those 30 seconds over Tokyo meant. You know, 4 years ago on the 40th anniversary of D-Day, I read a letter from a young woman writing to her late father, who'd fought on Omaha Beach. Her name was Lisa Zanatta Henn, and she said, 'we will always remember, we will never forget what the boys of Normandy did.' Well, let's help her keep her word. If we forget what we did, we won't know who we are. I'm warning of an eradication of the American memory that could result, ultimately, in an erosion of the American spirit. Let's start with some basics: more attention to American history and a greater emphasis on civic ritual".

Many parents, teachers, the Sons of the American Revolution, and Daughters of the American Revolution, many other lineal societies, citizens, believe President Reagan was correct in his assessment of teaching which has not changed today.

Revolution Education 1776 was founded, by PineyWoods Associate member Johnny Schmonsees, because of the need to bring the story of America's founding to not only our stu-





dents, but to their parents and the American Public. The organization founders and members are school teachers, US Military members and veterans, parents, grandparents and its mission is supported by patriotic lineage societies such as Sons of the American Revolution and the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Rev Edu and SAR

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Rev Edu 1776 has been presenting programs since 2019 to 5th grade classes, and then 8th grade classes, and beginning last January to the public at the City of Humble Museum. This February, two have events have been completed. The Humble Museum program this year on February 4th, included a short stage play, period crafts for young people and outdoor military camp and cooking area. Visitors could sample foods of the late 17th century and learn the recipes and cooking methods. Young visitors joined a "militia training march" with wooden muskets concluding with joining a Continental Army and Continental Militia live musket firing.







On February 11th, at Jesse Jones Park in Harris County, was an outdoor program in the park's frontier village which included an re-enactment of the siege at Pensacola in 1781. The battle included units of the British and Loyalist Army, Spanish soldiers under Bernardo de Galvez with his American advisors, and the French from New Orleans, to show the public the importance of the other allies of the American colonies. There was the cooking demonstrations, crafts and musicians playing period music. The battle included fifers and drum and musket firing to the delight on of about 200 onlookers. A special event for young attendees was a scavenger hunt to discover a
