

This Day in History

1778 February— Provision shortages led to what Washington called a "fatal crisis" the threatened the continued existence of the army. Poor management of commissary and transportation problems caused by bad weather plus not enough wagons combined to bring about a logistical collapse of procurement and transport of needed provisions; almost of a halt. Bread and meat were nearly non existent. The soldiers were dressed in rags. There was a threat of a general mutiny. Washington efforts to save his army was probably the highest point of his career.

1778 March 1st— Washington writes praising his troops for their "uncomplaining Patience during the scarcity of provisions in camp" and exhorting them to persevere in the face of any "occasional" shortages that might yet occur. Indeed, the letters written by Washington during January and February about the stay in Valley Forge demonstrate that although the crisis had passed, shortages, especially clothing, continued to concern Washington. The problem was magnified as the commander in chief turned his attention to gathering men and supplies for the upcoming summer campaign. Washington continued to question the readiness. This was an ongoing theme in his correspondence. The campaign readiness





issue was addressed through training although hampered by shortage of officer. One problem had been resignations and absenteeism which Washington continued to address. To alleviate that problem, Washington continued to urge Congress to make the reforms that he had recommended to improve the status and organization of the officer corps. During this period , systematic drill continued under the instruction of Steuben and the increase army discipline.



1779 March 29 - George Washington causes the completion of Major General Steuben's Regulations for the Order and Discipline of the Troops of the United States. Final reviews and revisions were made during his encampment at Middlebrook and Congress ordered the publication printed on March 29, 1779.

TREASURER'S REPORT: John Beard reported a balance \$ 2,411.76. Motion was made and seconded to approve the treasurer's report. Motion carried.




Members joined together in the SAR closing followed by the Benediction by Kermit Breed. President Jim Pinkerton adjourned the meeting at 2:45 PM

Family letters and Family Bibles found in Kentucky lead to the supporting proofs for the Mc Kinney Line. The Mc Kinney's' were sponsored by Registrar Larry Stevens.

Creekwood Middle teachers that made it happen. Tara Framer and Jan York.



Larry Stevens, Alternate Texas National Society Trustee Report for the Louisville Leadership/Trustee's meetin March 3, 2018

The Trustee Meeting began at 9:45 am, Saturday morning, March 3rd, 2018.

The Minuteman Class of 2018 was announced.

Motion to approve \$7000 to be used by the Education Committee to continue the development of an education program, "America's Founding Documents". There were also personal donations of \$3500 to be used in the development of the education program.

In Education, Colorado has produced a video on a "Trunk Program", on life during the colonial period, which is an instructional guide for those wanting to begin making presentation to to schools and other groups. This DVD can be obtained from the Colleen Wilson our SAR Education Director in Louisville. The Education Committee is investigating digital access.

A motion was made to create a special fund for money donated by Past President General Mike Tomme and his wife Pricilla or Celia and other donors to Youth Education. This would be a special fund and not a part of the SAR Foundation.

Motion to approve a significant change in the Tom ad Betty Lawrence American History contest. Past Texas State President and Past President General of NSSAR and his wife Mickey Jo will donate \$15000 annually to be used by the American History Contest Committee for three teacher contests; namely, to the winning entry in a High School History, Middle School, and Elementary History teacher at \$5000 per contest. Money allocated to each, \$5000, if not used will remain in the fund for the next year. The donated money will be held in a special fund by SAR and not be a part of the Foundation fund. This motion was approved; however, some details need to be resolved before publishing the "New" American History Teacher contest. The proposed contest update would be effective 2019. (The proposed American History Teacher Contest presented to the Trustees is attached)

A motion was made by Past PG and Past Texas President Nathan White for \$200,000 to buildout some of the office space on the 2nd Floor of the new building. Using an Overhead, PG White displayed the additional office space that would be constructed on the 2nd Floor. This was apart of the approved buildout plan. The motion passed.

The EXCOM recommended that the Board of Trustees issue an RFP (Request for Proposal) for a new website within 60 days with specifications supplied by the IT Committee in 45 days. After discussed, this was approved.



UNSUNG HEROS OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

Nancy Morgan Hart ca 1735-1830



Georgia frontierswoman Nancy Morgan Hart was a legendary hero of the American Revolution who made it her mission to rid the Georgia territory of British Loyalists (Tories). According to various accounts, she captured six, killed one, and oversaw the hanging of five others. She also served as a spy.

A good deal of folklore surrounds Hart's story. Born Ann Morgan in either Pennsylvania or North Carolina around 1735 (little is known of her actual birth date); Hart was called "Nancy", a nickname for Ann. She was said to be an imposing, red-headed woman who grew to be six feet tall and muscular. Hailed for her fearlessness, local Cherokees referred to her as "Wahatche" or "war woman." Possibly a relative of frontiersman Daniel Boone, she was illiterate but knew much about frontier survival. She was a skilled herbalist, hunter and an excellent

shot, despite being cross-eyed. She married Benjamin Hart at the late age of 36, and in the 1771 the couple settled along the Broad River in Wilkes County, Georgia. She had six sons and two daughters.

During the Revolution while her husband was away, Hart managed their farm, though she often snuck off to spy on the British. Dressed as a man, she would enter British camps pretending to be feeble-minded to gain information, which she handed off to the Patriots. Hart also engaged in the war and may have been present at the Battle of Kettle Creek on February 14, 1779.

The British frequently stopped at the Hart house, keeping an eye on the patriotic woman. In one instance, Hart's daughter noticed a Tory spying through a hole in the wall. Hart was making soap and threw a boiling ladle-full through the crack, scalding the spy. She and her daughter then tied him up and turned him over to the Patriots.

Hart's most famous act involved five or six British soldiers, who killed her last turkey and demanded that she cook it for them. She devised a plan to get the soldiers drunk on her corn liquor, take their guns and hold them captive. Hart sent her daughter Sukey to get some water and to use a hidden conch shell to alert neighbors of the British presence. While the soldiers ate and drank, Hart began sneaking their guns out through a hole in the wall. Caught holding the third gun, she drew it and threatened to shoot. When a soldier rushed at her, she killed him and wounded another; the rest surrendered.

When her husband returned, Hart was holding the British soldiers at gunpoint. They, along with neighbors, hung the soldiers from a nearby tree. In 1912, six bodies were found buried near the Hart home, believed to have been those of the British soldiers, giving credence to the Hart legend.

In the late 1790s, the Harts moved to Brunswick, Georgia, where Benjamin died around 1800. Hart then returned to Broad River, but found her cabin had been washed away. She settled in Henderson County, Kentucky in 1803, near her son, until her death at roughly age ninety-three. In the 1930s. the Daughters of the American Revolution erected a replica of the cabin, using some of the original stones. A Georgia county, city, lake, and highway are all named for the state's most famous female Revolutionary War hero.
