

"Freedom is never more than one generation away from extinction. We didn't pass it on to our children in the bloodstream. It must be fought for, protected,


and handed on for them to do the same, or one day we will spend our sunset years telling our children and children's children what is was once like in the United States where men were free." President Ronald Reagan.

The Revolutionary War

10 May 1775 - Continental Dollars - The Thirteen Colonies were at "War" with the mother country after Lexington and Concord when militia units drove the British task force back to Boston inflicting many causalities. The Continental Congress have no money to spend on an Army, Munitions and Supplies, Ships, or any thing else. After much very secret debates, it was jointly decided to issue paper currency. In his paper, "The Continental Dollar: Initial Design, Ideal Performance, and the Credibility of Congressional Commitment", Farley Grubb, Professor of Economics and NBER Research Associate in the Economics Depart-



ment, University of Delaware, Newark, DE, writes that the first emission, was three million, with the date of May 10, 1775 printed on the bills. He states then Continental Congress passed redemption instructions on 29 July 1775, where the states would remit fixed quotas of Continental Dollars to the Continental treasury to be

burned. States were assigned quotas base on population. It was left to the states to decide how to redeem Continental dollars from its citizens. The remittances would be over a four-year period "beginning 30 November 1779 and ending on 30 November 1782". The result of this plan can be summed up in the saying, "NOT WORTH A CONTINENTAL DOL-LAR!"

> Paper Currency included notes for 1/6, 1/4, 1/3, 1/2, 2/3 of a dollar; 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 dollars.

19 June 1775—On this day George Washington was commissioned Commander and Chief of the Continental Army. Over all other candidates, he was selected because of his military background and the hope that a Virginian could unite the colonies. Many thought the was would be short and the Militia would fight hard, win the day, and then could go back home. Washington believed neither. Arriving in Cambridge Massachusetts July 3, 1775 with a small force of Virginia men, he began trying to organize the band of militia. He summoned all the unit colonels to meeting. Most had no identifying uniforms or



emblems of rank. Washington devised ribbons and braids of rank to be worn on clothing for each command level so they could be readily recognized. He then began addressing the lack munitions, supply, and money to purchase needed goods pay his men. Washington knew had had to create a seasoned continental line. In February 1776, he wrote to John Handcock, "To expect then the same service from Raw, and undisciplined Recruits as from Veteran Soldiers is to expect what never did, and perhaps never will happen."



George Washington's General Order of October 2, 1779, which fixed blue as the color for all branches of the service, and for all the state regiments in the Continental Line, with distinctive differences in linings and facings.

The **blue coats** of the infantry regiments were all to be lined with white, and have white buttons, and states were distinguished by different colored facings, as follows:

- New England states, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Connecticut, white facings;
- New York and New Jersey, <u>buff facings</u>;
- Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, and Virginia, red facings
