

PineyWoods Join RevEdu1776 at Humble Museum





Anthony lives just across the street from Kim Morton, our long time chapter Genealogist who pass away last year. Compatriot Love descends from Patriot 2nd Lt James Buchanan who served in NC (now Tennessee), and his spouse Margaret Kennedy. He was born in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania on 12 Jan 1759 and died in Nashville on 7 Nov 1832. John Buchanan became one of the first settlers, of what is now Nashville, TN joining General James Robertson in December 1778. Tennessee was Washington County, NC in 1778, and Nashborough Fort, at present day Nashville, was a place of refuge for the few that ventured there. There was a constant threat from the Indians with many small confrontations. Walking to the farm field to work was not safe with men laying in wait. The Battle of Bluff at Fort Nashborough in 1781, where John's brother Alexander Buchanan died, was one of the larger confrontations on the frontier in Tennessee.



In last November's message, I discussed the history of Veteran's Day, and while very worthy of repeating, I do not want to recycle my previous columns. I thought I would discuss Veterans Day and salute our veterans with some statistics.....

The United States military ranks in the top five biggest militaries in the world; in terms of active-duty members, we rank just after China and India. In 2020, the most current year for which I could find statistics, there

are 2,395,993 active duty, national guard, and reserve forces broken down by branch as follows:



Army	1,092,475
Air Force	532,107
Navy	443,219
Marine Corps	279,910
Coast Guard	48,282

The total represents just .727 percent of our population. Amazing such a small percentage of our population keeps our country safe and protects our freedoms and those of many around the world.

In our nation's history, from the American Revolution through Desert Storm/Desert Shield, more than forty-one million served in the military during wartime. The number of veterans who served in the Revolutionary War is unknown but estimated to be between 184,000 and 250,000. The last surviving veteran of the Revolutionary War is murky. John Gray is the last veteran of the Revolutionary War who was able to prove his service in the Continental Army; he died in 1868 at the age of 104. Daniel F. Bakeman, who died on April 5,

1869, at the ripe old age of 109, is the last soldier to receive a pension. No specific records validating his service survived, but authorities deemed his testimony credible.

Please help me in celebrating our veterans on this Veterans Day as we thank them for their patriotism, love of country and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good. We owe them all a great debt of gratitude.

One matter on which I am being pinged quite often as we approach the end of the year is the service of Flag Certificates. Please help me in identifying worthy individuals or businesses who are patriotically displaying our nation's flag. Both Compatriot Larry Stevens and I have certificates we can personalize for presentation. We should be able to serve a few before the end of the year. Once served, we need to report the service to the state flag coordinator. Presenting Flag Certificates is a great way to recognize patriotism and discuss our organization.

Lastly, we are quickly approaching the end of the current officers' terms and are actively seeking new compatriots to step forward to lead the chapter for the next two years. Franklin suggested we should "pay them in kind with rattle snakes".

The image of a rattlesnake was used as a symbol of the American colonies from the beginning of the French and Indian War to the end of the War for Independence. It appeared in printed caricatures, newspapers, and paper money, in addition to other media including flags, buttons and even on a cemetery monument. The basis of this pervasive imagery can be traced back to a May 9, 1751, tract by Benjamin Franklin. Franklin wrote a satirical article entitled "Rattle-Snakes for Felons."



For years England had been shipping convicted criminals to her American colonies, which she justified as a way to help them grow in population. Franklin wrote,

"such a tender parental concern in our Mother Country for the welfare of her children calls aloud for the highest returns of gratitude ... In some of the uninhabited parts of these provinces there are numbers of these venomous reptiles we call rattle-snakes: felons-convict from the beginning of the world. These, whenever we meet with them, we put to death, by virtue of an old law: Thou shalt bruise his head. But as this is a sanguinary law, and may seem too cruel; and as however mischievous those creatures are to us, they may possibly change their natures if they were to change the climate; I would humbly propose that this general sentence of death be changed for transportation"

Further, "In the spring of the year, when they first creep out of their holes, they are feeble, heavy, slow and easily taken; and if a small bounty were allowed per head, some thousands might be collected annually and transported to Britain. There I would propose to have them carefully distributed in St. James Park, in the Spring Gardens and other places of pleasure about London; in the gardens of all the nobility and gentry throughout the nation; but particularly in the gardens of the prime ministers, the lords of trade, and members of Parliament, for to them we are most particularly obliged."

Franklin Closed this article, "Rattlesnakes seem the most suitable returns for the human serpents sent us by our Mother Country."


The following letter from "An American Guesser" was published in the Pennsylvania Journal on December 27, 1775. Its author has been identified as Benjamin Franklin.

"I recollected that her eye excelled in brightness, that of any other animal, and that she has no eye -lids. She may therefore be esteemed an emblem of vigilance. She never begins an attack, nor, when engaged, ever surrenders: She is therefore

an emblem of magnanimity and true courage. As if anxious to prevent all pretensions of quarreling with her, the weapons with which nature has furnished her, she conceals in the roof of her mouth, so that, to those who are unacquainted with her, she appears to be a most defenseless animal: and even when those weapons are shown and extended for her defense, they appear weak and contemptible; but their wounds however small are decisive and fatal. Conscious of this, she never wounds 'till she has generously given notice, even to her enemy, and cautioned him against the danger of treading on her."
