


#### Our Luncheon Speaker, Mayor Pro Tem Hank Schmidt

Editor's Note: The recognition of the Speaker with a COA and coffee mug is a Rankin tradition first implemented by Kelly McBride.

It is based upon action taken by the NSSAR during the late 1890s, recorded in their minutes, to recognize the evening speaker (a member of the DAR) with a silver engraved cup and written note of acknowledgement. The Rankin Chapter continues this tradition with every speaker, although with the price of silver, the cup is ceramic. Previously, the Chapter awarded penand pencil sets.

# Registration!



Stephen Tanner was the Registrar and Treasurer for the BOM. In this capacity, he interfaced with the State Treasurer for those Compatriots who paid via Pay Pal in addition to those Compatriots who preferred snail mail. Seventy-six compatriots registered, while eighty-three individuals attended the luncheon and one hundred fifteen were present for the evening banquet. As registrar, Stephen contributed over eighty hours prior to the event and three verl long days during the event. Helping at the registration desk were Ash Jackson, Allen Greene, Tom Jackson, and Fred Jackson.

As registrar he accompanied Tom Jackson on a final walk though of the Hilton before the event as well as the settlement meeting on the following Tuesday.

Name tags and table name tents were the responsibility of Rankin Friends Marti and Alex Thorne. When they were called away, Stephen and Tom stepped up to complete the tasks.

Fred Jackson was in charge of the "Welcome Bags' for Compatriots. Working within a budget, he chose the content and drafted the welcome letter. He and his wife Brenda completed the first phase of assembly work, aided by Theron and Olga McLaren.


