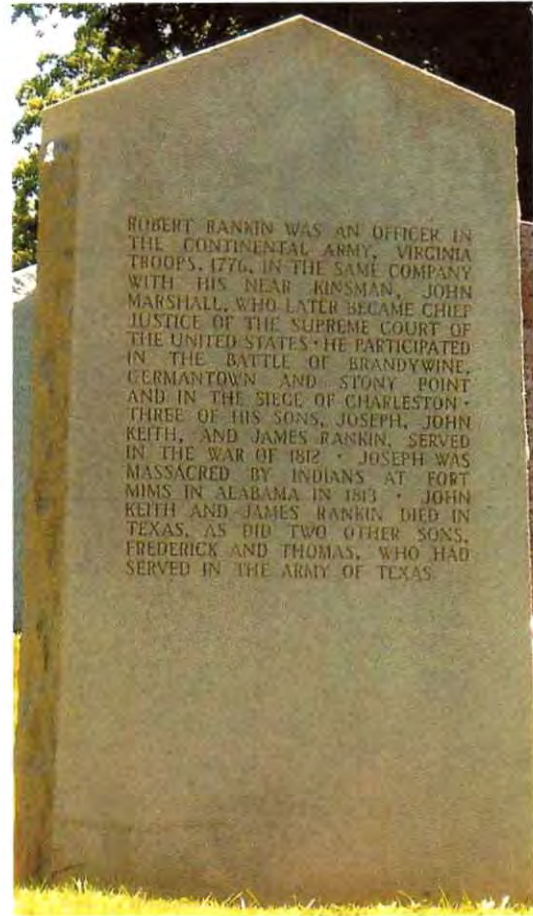


## Robert Rankin - Our Namesake

Lieutenant Robert Rankin served in the Third Regiment of the Virginia line of the Continental Army in 1776. His participation in the battles of Germantown, Brandywine, Stony Point, and the siege of Charleston earned him the commission of Lieutenant, which he received on his release as a prisoner of war.

He continued to serve until the war's end. After the war, he served in the Virginia legislature as one of nine trustees for the newly established town of Washington, in Bourbon County, Kentucky. He also served as an elector to the Kentucky Senate in 1792.

Robert Rankin was a friend and ally of Sam Houston during the war for Texas Independence. He was instrumental in maintaining good relations with the Indians, in the spring of 1836, during the Texan retreat toward San Jacinto.



Robert Rankin was born in Colonial Virginia in 1753. On October 1, 1781, he married Margaret Berry while on military furlough. Four of his sons served in the War of 1812. On November 13, 1834, he received land grants in Joseph Vehlein's Colony in Texas. He was issued the necessary certificate of character on November 3, 1834, by William Grimes.

The town of Coldspring, Texas, was founded on Lieutenant Rankin's original land grant. Robert Rankin died November 13, 1837, in St. Landry Parish, Louisiana.

In 1936, his body was re-interred at the State Cemetery in Austin. Robert Rankin was a soldier, patriot, and good citizen.



# Sons of the American Revolution



## History

In 1876 there were many celebrations to commemorate the centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. As part of this patriotic fervor, a group of men in the San Francisco, California, area who were descendants of patriots involved in the American Revolution, formed an organization called the Sons of Revolutionary Sires. Their objective was to have a fraternal and civic society to salute those men and women who pledged their lives, fortunes and sacred honor to the battle for independence from Great Britain. They desired to keep alive their ancestors' story of patriotism and courage in the belief that it is a universal one of man's struggle against tyranny -- a story which would inspire and sustain succeeding generations when they would have to defend and extend our freedoms.

Out of the Sires grew the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, which was organized on April 30, 1889 -- the 100th anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as our nation's first President. We have used the acronym SAR to identify ourselves for over 100 years. The SAR was conceived as a fraternal and civic society composed of lineal descendants of the men who wintered at Valley Forge, signed the Declaration of Independence, fought in the battles of the American Revolution, served in the Continental Congress, or otherwise supported the cause of American Independence.

The National Society was chartered by an Act of the United States Congress on June 9, 1906. The charter was signed by President Theodore Roosevelt, who was a member of the SAR. The charter authorizes the granting of charters to societies of the various states and territories and authorizes the state societies to charter chapters within their borders.

## Our Members

Today the SAR consists of over 32,000 members in over 500 chapters in the United States, Canada, France, Germany, Switzerland, Mexico, Spain and the United Kingdom. Almost 165,000 descendants of the men and women Patriots of the American Revolution have been admitted since our founding. SAR members include: 16 presidents of the United States, Brigadier, Lieutenant and five star generals, presidents of colleges and universities, ambassadors, members of the Supreme Court, the U.S. Senate, and the U.S. Congress. Additionally, members include small businessmen, doctors, lawyers, school teachers, CPAs, elected local, state, and federal officials, and government employees, all of whom have a deep affection for America its heritage and institutions.

SAR members answered their country's call in every major American conflict beginning with the battle of Lexington and Concord on April 19, 1775 up to the present, including Operation Desert Storm, Bosnia and the current actions in Afghanistan and Iraq. SAR members have received the highest awards America can bestow, including the Medal of Honor.

Our country's Founding Fathers were dedicated not only to securing America's independence, but also to establishing a free and democratic system of government for the new nation. Thanks to the faith and fortitude of our ancestors, freedom has flowered on our shores and has brought us a legacy of liberty and opportunity.


Some of our ancestors faced hardships that we shall never know in order to win and preserve our precious freedom. From the battles of Lexington and Concord to the Saratoga and Yorktown campaigns, soldiers in Revolutionary War faced the dangers of enemy attacks, as well as threats of hunger, disease, and exposure to severe weather. We can never forget how George Washington's troops suffered from lack of food and warm clothing during the long winter at Valley Forge. The selfless spirit and great love of country that carried out the hearts of the American people.

The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution was established on April 30, 1989, to perpetuate the spirit and memory of the brave individuals who won our Nation's independence and defended the cause of liberty and self-government during the Revolutionary War. Activities in support of this goal help us to remember the tremendous debt we owe to them.

The Congress, by Senate Joint Resolution 84, has designated April 30, 1989, as "National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution Centennial Day" and authorized and requested the President to issue a proclamation in observance of this occasion.

*Now, Therefore, I, George Bush*, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim April 30, 1989, as National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution Centennial Day, and I call upon the people of the United States to observe this day with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

*In Witness Whereof*, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-eight day of April, in this year of our Lord nineteen hundred and eighty-nine, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and thirteenth.

### **Flag Day Observation Launched**

The first NSSAR National program was the observance and general display of the "Stars & Stripes", the National Ensign, on Flag Day, June 14, of each year. The program was a result of a Connecticut Society resolution in 1890. In 1891 throughout New England, New York, Chicago, Washington, and many other cities, thousands of American Flags were flown. In 1895, with the cooperation and political persuasion of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the observance of June 14<sup>th</sup> as Flag Day was in scope. An SAR resolution in 1895 resulted in the American Flag being flown continually above the White House. Previously, it had been flown only on special occasions.

The Robert Rankin Chapter prides itself on recognizing citizens for flying the American Flag. The first Flag Certificate was awarded by the chapter in 2006. The Robert Rankin Chapter has been the unofficial, small chapter, leader in the awarding of Flag Certificates in Texas ever since

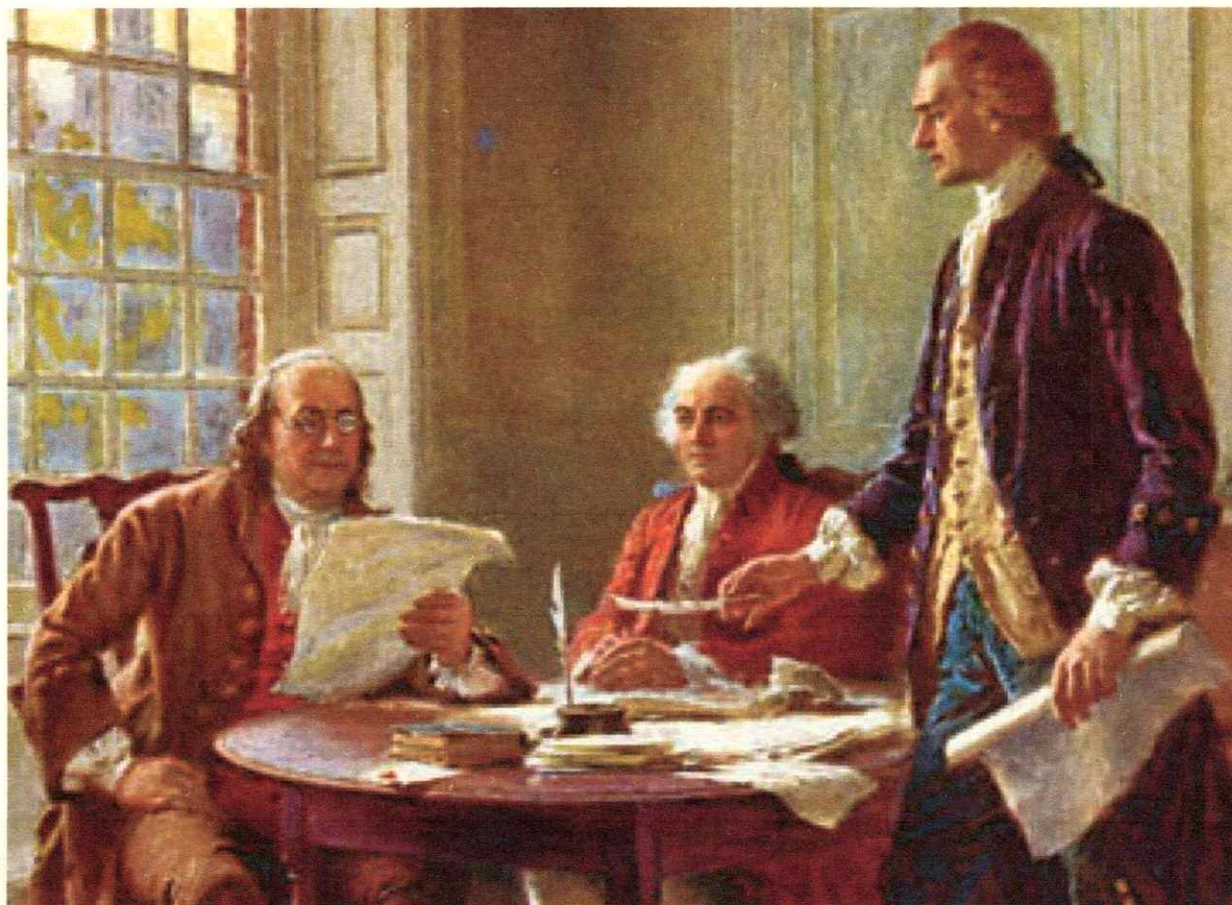

The USS Stark Memorial Award, authorized in 1988 (revised 2003), was established to memorialize those brave men and women who continue to stand at the forefront to preserve the freedoms our patriotic ancestors fought so long and hard to achieve. Its purpose is to recognize outstanding chapters and the most outstanding state society within the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution for their participation with the Veteran community, and supporting activities of the NSSAR Veteran's Committee.

The reporting period for the USS Stark Award competition is January 1 through December 31 of the previous year, the Contest Year. Total points for a participating chapter or society should be reported to the NSSAR Veterans Committee Chairman and Executive Director no later than February 1. **This form must be completed for this competition.** Supporting documentation may be asked for.

Awards will recognize the most active state society and/or most active chapters. One first place streamer and certificate award for Chapters will be offered by membership size: 1 to 49, 50 to 99, 100 to 199, over 200, and a first place award for State Societies will be offered by membership size: under 1,000 and over 1,000 members (will be judged using weighted equation on a per member basis). A USS Stark Streamer is awarded to the winner of each Chapter category and one State. A first place award may not be won for two consecutive years. An Honorable Mention Streamer may possibly be awarded at the discretion of the Veteran's Committee.

In 2002 the NSSAR authorized the creation of the SERVICE TO VETERANS Medal to be presented to the individual Compatriot that has supported the Veteran's program and is able to document 5000 points of support to our Veterans, using the point scale of the USS Stark Contest. An individual may count points for the LAST five years, BUT only the points that pertain to the current calendar year may be reported on the USS Stark Memorial Competition for the current year.

## The Mighty Pen

Starting in the 17<sup>th</sup> century and continuing throughout the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries, western society faced massive social changes. The rise of a middle class, the legacy of religious warfare, and the birth of Science converged, calling into question the political status quo and beginning the tumultuous shift towards democracy. After America's success with our own revolution against the British crown, countless other European nations would unsuccessfully try to emulate it. Consider the violent bloodbath and paranoid dictatorship of France or the century of oppression brought about by the Russian revolution. The philosophical and political roots of the Mensheviks and Robespierre who conducted the Russian and French revolutions, respectively, mirror the same tradition of revolutionary thought as America's Thomas Jefferson and Thomas Paine. However, the central difference that caused Russia and France to fail but America to succeed was not political prowess – it was literacy.

The American colonies were the most literate societies in the late 1700s. In fact, on the eve of the American Revolution, 85% of New Englanders, 70% of New Yorkers and Pennsylvanians, and 55% of Virginians could both read and write (Gade). The United States' high literacy rates, particularly in New England, were due to the Puritanical custom of ensuring that everyone could comprehend the Bible. Even after Puritanism had lost its following, the culture of learning remained. The result was a burgeoning population who embraced revolutionary ideas in written form. Not to mention, a well-read, educated population with a tradition of self government was less susceptible to manipulation and tyranny, which was absolutely vital to the future success of our young nation.

Serving as mouthpieces for the American Revolution, the colonists frequently read newspapers and pamphlets. One such famous pamphlet was Thomas Paine's *Common Sense*,

which explained the key objectives of the revolution and also supported the philosophy of Enlightenment. *Common Sense*, and other similar Revolutionary Era pamphlets, like John Dickinson's *A New Essay by the Pennsylvania Farmer*, conveyed the exemplary notion that every man is equal – a radical statement at the time. To this point, Paine denounces the British “monarchy...[as having] laid...the world in blood and ashes” (Paine). Similarly, Dickinson urges colonial men and women not “to leave wealth to [their] children; but...to leave [them] liberty” (Dickinson). Consequently, the colonists became more unified in their support of the war with Britain. And, more importantly, they became more knowledgeable about the ideology underpinning the formation of their new government—becoming active, thoughtful participants in the war effort.

Ultimately, our newly founded government was held accountable to its people because they understood the reasons for the revolution—“Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness” (Jefferson). In France and Russia, on the other hand, the poor, illiterate masses were powerless to oppose a cycle of dictatorships. As Thomas Jefferson rightly observed, “Whenever the people are well informed, they can be trusted with their own government; that whenever things get so far wrong as to attract their notice, they may be relied on to set them to rights” (Jefferson). Indeed, a literate society is a powerful society. Thankfully, our country's forefathers were a community of readers and writers who had genuine concern for political and social affairs, which was necessary to secure liberty and prosperity for our nation today. The Revolutionary pen was truly mightier than any sword.

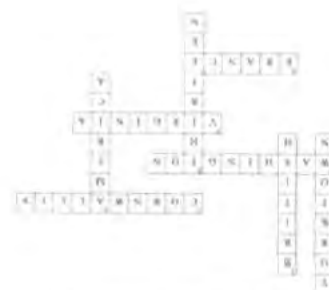

**PROCLAIMED**, That the Senate of the State of Texas hereby join the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution and Texans throughout the state in celebrating February 22, 2018, as President George Washington Day; and, be it further

## Presentations

Over the years the Robert Rankin Chapter has recognized those who contribute to our democracy by maintaining or supporting our voting process. We have recognized election judges, precinct chairs and tonight we recognize those who are involved with the election education process.

The League of Women Voters is a nonpartisan volunteer organization of both men and women. Their mission is to encourage informed and active participation in local, state and national government. League members encourage voter registration and informed voter participation. Members also provide teacher resource materials, advocacy training and issue research on their website.

The League of Women Voters U. S. evolved out of the of the National American Woman Suffrage Association which was dissolved when the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment was ratified in 1920. The LWV-TX was founded in 1919. Many early members of the League and its predecessor organization were also members of the Daughters of The American Revolution, including First Lady Florence Kling Harding, Susan B. Anthony and Francis Williard whose statue stands in the U.S. Capitol.

The Cy-Fair Unit of the League was organized in 2015 to focus on voter registration, voter participation, and community involvement in local issues.

Tonight, we honor and recognize Marlene Lobberecht.

She currently serves as the Cy-Fair Unit President/Coordinator of the Leadership Team and is a member of the CFISD Community Leadership Committee.

She also serves on the LWV-Texas Board of Directors, and has been the League Early Childhood Issue Chair since 2005 serving three Legislative Interim Committee appointments. She authored the Texas Advocacy Training Guide used by the Texas Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and TX colleges/universities. She has received the 2015 LWV-Texas Capitol Corp Outstanding Achievement Award, the 2011 Houston-Area League Achievement Award, and numerous other state and national awards.

We also honor and recognize Leah Stephanow. Leah won the Cy-Fair Council for Social Studies High School Teacher of the Year. Leah Stephanow has been a government teacher in CFISD for 27 years, teaching at Langham Creek High

School from 1990 to 2008 and currently at Cypress Woods High School. Leah began the district's elective course "Street Law" in 1995 & the course is now taught in all of the district's high schools. In 2008, she was selected to attend a week-long study of the U.S. Supreme Court in Washington, D.C. At Cypress Woods she serves as the Government Team Leader & the school's Project Safety liaison. Leah also serves as the school's Voter Registrar & took students on an early voting field trip last year for them to vote in the 2016 election.

Tonight, the Robert Rankin Chapter presents the Bronze Good Citizenship Medal and certificate to Marlene Lobberecht and Leah Stephanow.



Fire Prevention Week was established to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire, the tragic 1871 conflagration that killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres. The fire began on October 8, but continued into and did most of its damage on October 9, 1871. President DONALD J. TRUMP proclaimed October 8 through October 14, 2017, as Fire Prevention Week.

During the month of October the Rankin Chapter for over a decade has recognized individuals with the presentation of the **FIRE SAFETY COMMENDATION MEDAL. This year is no different.**

The Jersey Village Fire Department is a combination department and volunteers are the primary force that protects the community. Over the past 63 years, Jersey Village Fire Department has had a member who has served for 43 years and is still an active member of the department. In 1974, Frank Maher and his family moved to Jersey Village. Frank joined the fire department because he recognized the need to protect the community when other community residents were away from their homes. Frank was already experienced as he was a firefighter with the Houston Fire Department since 1968 and in the service beginning in 1963. Frank's experience and knowledge helped to set a new chapter for the Jersey Village Fire Department. After a few years as a member, Frank moved up in rank and eventually named Fire Chief. It was a volunteer position during this time. The first few years as Chief, Frank was instrumental in establishing new programs that are still in use today. He established a fire hydrant program to check fire hydrants, the first fire prevention programs in schools in Jersey Village, the first record keeping and reporting of all activity, the first fire fighter awards recognition and annual banquet, the first Junior Member program for high school students and the first open house ever. There are many more established programs over the years started by Frank, but these are just a few of the instrumental programs that he started that continue year after year.

Today, Frank Maher is still serving Jersey Village. His current role is Assistant Fire Chief. Over the past several years, Assistant Chief Maher averages 43% call volume per year. One of the highest out of all membership. It is his continued leadership, guidance and mentorship of our members, that keeps our volunteer ranks viable. Without his dedication and passion to serve, Jersey Village Fire Department would not be the same.

Colonel Mitchell was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps in August 1973. In June 1974 upon completion of The Basic School, he was assigned Platoon Commander, Lima Company, 3<sup>rd</sup> Marine Division Okinawa, Japan. During this assignment, he participated in "Operation Frequent Wind", the evacuation of Americans, foreign Nationals, and refugees from the Republic of Viet Nam. Released from Active Duty November 1976, he joined the Marine Corps Reserves in February 1977. In February 1979 he promoted to Captain and promoted to the rank of Colonel in 1996. In September 2002 assigned duties as J-3, Task Force Consequence Management, 1 Marine Expeditionary Force in support of Operation Enduring Freedom/Iraqi Freedom. This Task Force was assigned to the Kuwaiti theatre to mitigate any Chemical, Biological, Nuclear, or High Explosive attack by the Iraqi Regime on the citizens of Kuwait. Following this tour duty, he was sent back to the states and released from Active duty, and retired from the United States Marine Corps September 1, 2003.

Colonel Mitchell's decorations include: Humanitarian Service Medal, National Defense Service Medal w/bronze star in lieu of second award, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Organized Marine Corps Reserve Medal, Armed Forces Reserve Medal, Navy Unit Commendation, Meritorious Unit Commendation, Navy Presidential Unit Citation, War on Terror Expeditionary Medal, War on Terror Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, and the Legion of Merit.

### Evening Speaker

The primary speaker for the January meeting was Sheryl Jones, Vice-Commander American Legion 22nd District and Commander American Legion Post 164, Katy. She spoke of the common bonds of our two organizations. She spoke of the contributions of women in defense of our country. Sheryl mentioned Deborah Sampson, born in 1760 in Plymouth, enlisted in the Continental Army in 1778 under the name of Robert Shurtleff Sampson. As part of the 4th Massachusetts regiment, Deborah fought distinctly in several skirmishes until she was wounded during her first battle in 1782. She was shot two times in the leg; she removed one of the two musket balls in her leg herself with a penknife and a sewing needle. She also spoke of Mary Hays McCaully, also known as Molly Pitcher, who took her husband's place loading a cannon in the battle of Monmouth, June 28, 1778, during the American Revolution.

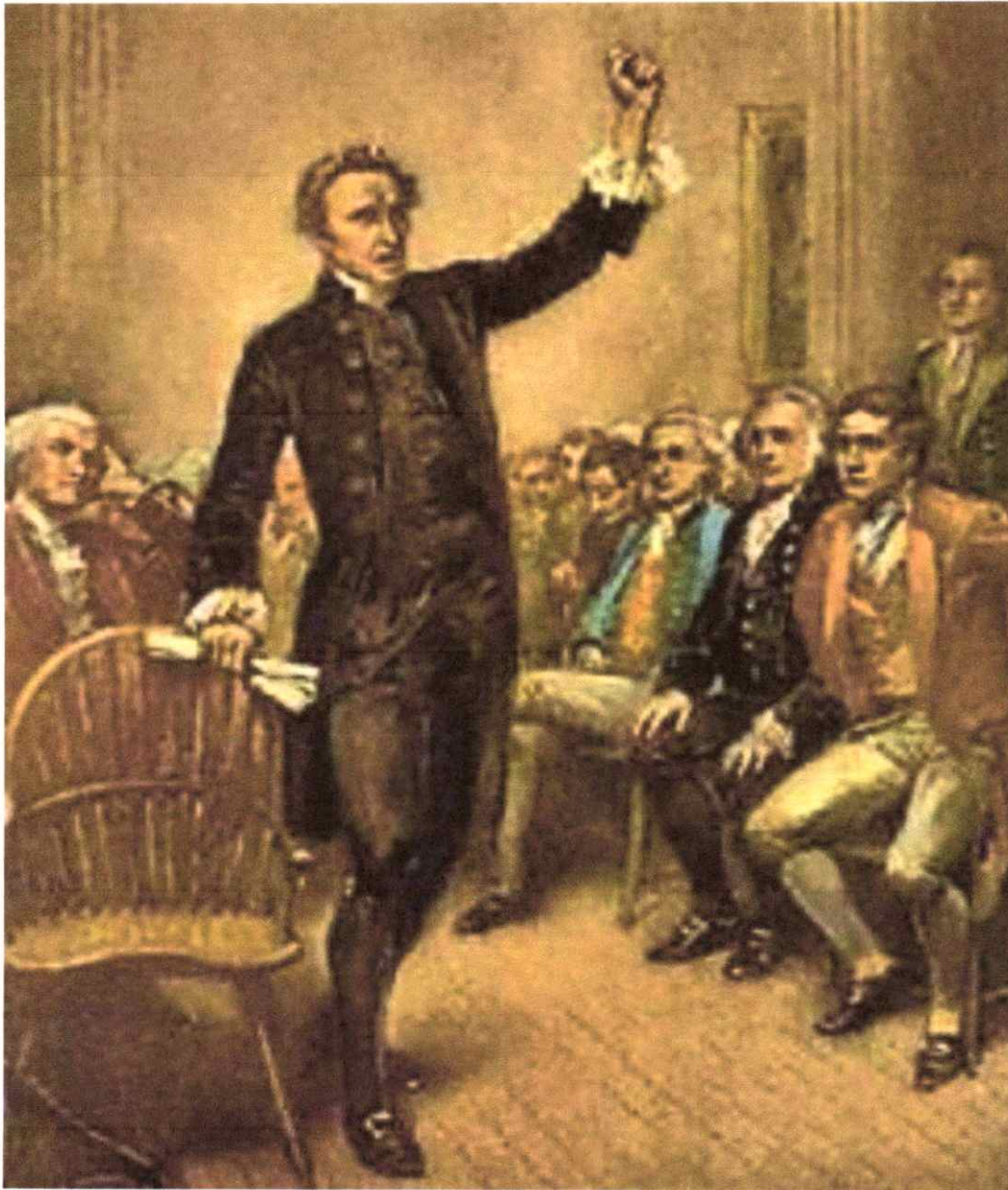
Commander Jones has served her country in multiple ways. She is in Law Enforcement and is in her twentieth year of service. She currently serves as an Immigration Officer/ Borders and Airports. Previously she was a past Deputy U.S. Marshall / Warrant Squad, prisoner transport, witness protection and court security. She started out as a Dallas County Police Officer working the jails as mandated by every officer. She processed the prisoner's chain going to Huntsville weekly, working with District attorneys and the court on each inmate's pending charges. All charges had to be adjudicated before inmate could be transported to Huntsville. All inmate transporting was strictly confidential and not made known to anyone until 1 hour before inmate was to board the bus to Huntsville, Texas.

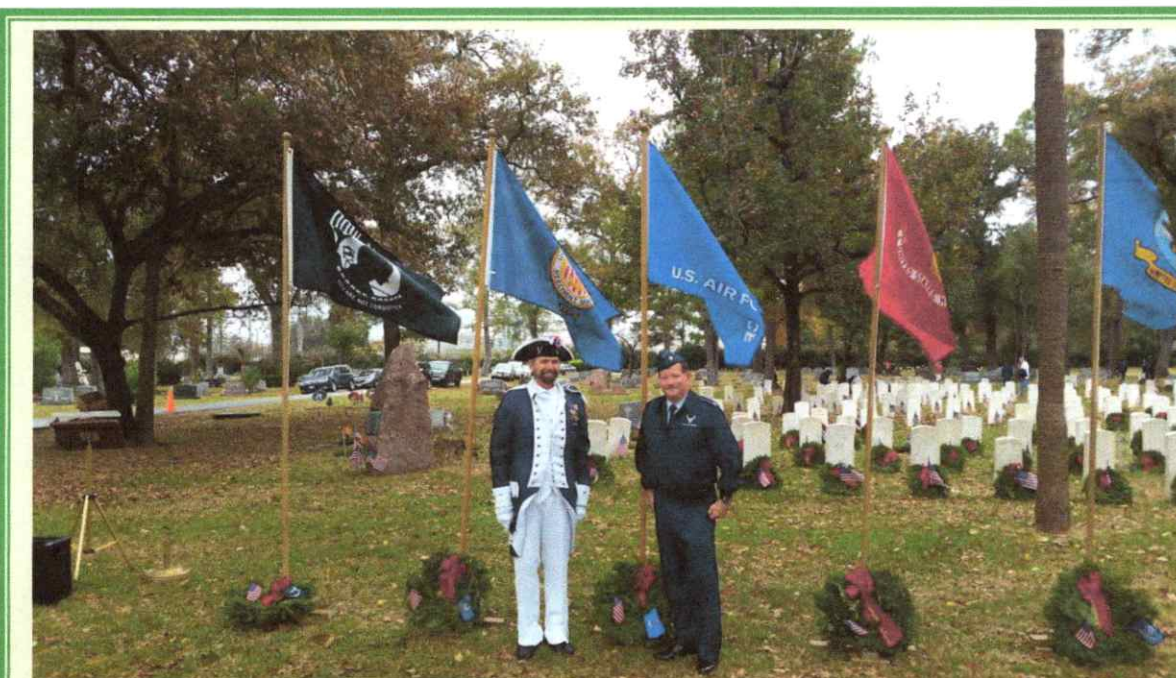
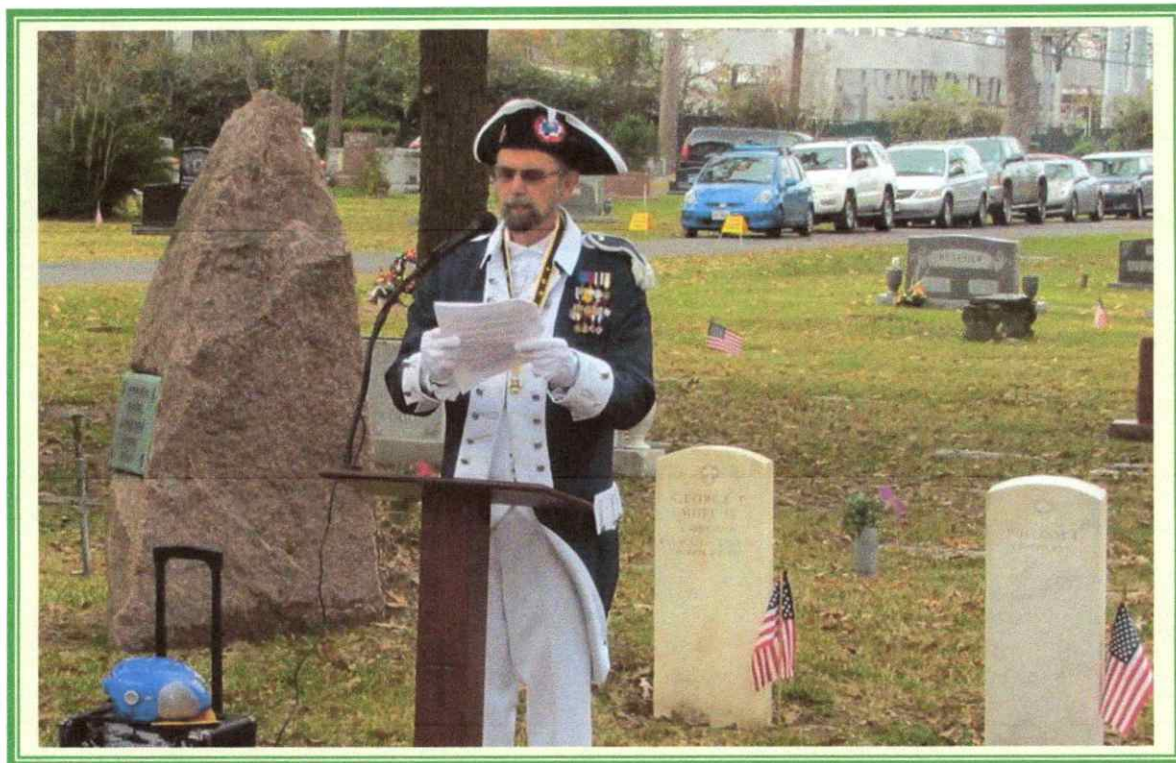

## Independence Day--July 4<sup>th</sup>

Independence Day commemorates the adoption of the Declaration of Independence 241 years ago on July 4, 1776. The Continental Congress declared that the thirteen American colonies regarded themselves as a new nation, the United States of America, and were no longer part of the British Empire. From 1776 to the present day, July 4<sup>th</sup> has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with festivities ranging from fireworks, parades, concerts and family gatherings.

During the American Revolution, the legal separation of the Thirteen Colonies from Great Britain in 1776 actually occurred on July 2, when the Second Continental Congress voted to approve a resolution of independence that had been proposed in June by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia declaring the United States independent from Great Britain's rule. After voting for independence, Congress turned its attention to the Declaration of Independence, a statement justifying the break from Great Britain. Congress appointed a *Committee of Five*, with Thomas Jefferson as its principal author. Other members of the Committee included John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania and Robert P. Livingston of New York. On July 2<sup>nd</sup>, the Continental Congress voted for independence in a near-unanimous vote (the New York delegation abstained, but later voted affirmatively). On July 4<sup>th</sup>, the Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence.

Following the first public reading of the Declaration of Independence, festivities including concerts, bonfires, parades and firing of cannons and muskets followed in celebration. Philadelphia held the first annual commemoration of independence on July 4, 1777, while Congress was still occupied with the Revolutionary War.

After the War of 1812, in which the United States once again faced Great Britain, patriotic July 4<sup>th</sup> celebrations became more widespread. In 1870, the U.S. Congress made July 4<sup>th</sup> a federal holiday. The most common symbol of the holiday is the American Flag, and a common musical accompaniment is the national anthem of the United States, "*The Star-Spangled Banner*".

Regardless of how you spend your Independence Day, at a parade, barbecue, picnic, concert, baseball game and or a family gathering, remember the reason behind this holiday. Many of our ancestors fought or gave aid during the war.

This is a day to be proud American and celebrate our country's rich history. Enjoy your 4<sup>th</sup> of July!
