Evening Speaker

The primary speaker for the January meeting was Sheryl Jones, Vice-Commander American Legion 22nd District and Commander American Legion Post 164, Katy. She spoke of the common bonds of our two organizations. She spoke of the contributions of women in defense of our country. Sheryl mentioned Deborah Sampson, born in 1760 in Plymouth, enlisted in the Continental Army in 1778 under the name of Robert Shurtleff Sampson. As part of the 4th Massachusetts regiment, Deborah fought distinctly in several skirmishes until she was wounded during her first battle in 1782. She was shot two times in the leg; she removed one of the two musket balls in her leg herself with a penknife and a sewing needle. She also spoke of Mary Hays McCauly, also known as Molly Pitcher, who took her husband's place loading a cannon in the battle of Monmouth, June 28, 1778, during the American Revolution.

Commander Jones has served her country in multiple ways. She is in Law Enforcement and is in her twentieth year of service. She currently serves as an Immigration Officer/ Borders and Airports. Previously she was a past Deputy U.S. Marshall / Warrant Squad, prisoner transport, witness protection and court security. She started out as a Dallas County Police Officer working the jails as mandated by every officer. She processed the prisoner's chain going to Huntsville weekly, working with District attorneys and the court on each inmate's pending charges. All charges had to be adjudicated before inmate could be transported to Huntsville. All inmate transporting was strictly confidential and not made known to anyone until 1 hour before inmate was to board the bus to Huntsville, Texas.

Commander Jones received the Law Enforcement Commendation Medal. In the picture at the top right she is in the process of receiving the medal and certificate.

Colonel Jimmy L. Mitchell, was born May 24, 1950 in Alvin Texas, and was a graduate of Jack Yates Senior High, Houston Texas, January 1969. In August of 1973 he received a Baccalaureate of Science degree majoring in Industrial Technology from Prairie View A&M College. Colonel Mitchell is married to the formed Bonnie M. Jones of Ames Texas. They have one son Brandon (Deceased) and one daughter DeAnderia. They reside in Fresno Texas. Jimmy Mitchell was hired by American General Life Insurance Company as Manager Supply Department and after 25 years retired in 2002.

Presently, he serves as Chairman-Board of Directors, Marine Corps Coordinating Council, Commander-American Legion Post 77, also holds the office of Commander 22nd District Department of Texas, American Legion, Correspondant - 40&8 Voiture 163, secretary for the Seigmund Fund a schorlarship awarding fund for JROTC recipients, reader for "Real Men Read", Houston Independent School District Volunteers Program, and a member of Fresno Mount Corinth Missionary Baptist Church.

Colonel Mitchell was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps in August 1973. In June 1974 upon completion of The Basic School, he was assigned Platoon Commander, Lima Company, 3rd Marine Division Okinawa, Japan. During this assignment, he participated in "Operation Frequent Wind", the evacuation of Americans, foreign Nationals, and refugees from the Republic of Viet Nam. Released from Active Duty November 1976, he joined the Marine Corps Reserves in Februray 1977. In February 1979 he promoted to Captain and promoted to the rank of Colonel in 1996. In September 2002 assigned duties as J-3, Task Force Consequence Management, 1 Marine Expeditionary Force in support of Operation Enduring Freedom/Iraqi Freedom. This Task Force was assigned to the Kuwaiti theatre to mitigate any Chemical, Biological, Nuclear, or High Explosive attack by the Iraqi Regime on the citizens of Kuwait. Following this tour duty, he was sent back to the states and released from Active duty, and retired from the United States Marine Corps September 1, 2003.

Colonel Mitchell's decorations include: Humanitarian Service Medal, National Defense Service Medal w/bronze star in lieu of second award, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Organized Marine Corps Reserve Medal, Armed Forces Reserve Medal, Navy Unit Commendation, Meritorious Unit Commendation, Navy Presidential Unit Citation, War on Terror Expeditionary Medal, War on Terror Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, and the Legion of Merit.

The star

The star, victory symbol of World War I, symbolizes honor, glory and constancy. The letters "U.S." leave no doubt as to the brightest star in the Legion's constellation.

The wreath

The wreath forms the center, in loving memory of those brave comrades who gave their lives in the service of the United States that liberty might endure.

The rays of the sun

The rays of the sun form the background of the emblem and suggest the Legion's principles will dispel the darkness of violence and evil.

Outer rings

The larger of the two outer rings signifies the rehabilitation of our sick and disabled comrades. The smaller inside ring denotes the welfare of America's children.

Inner rings

The smaller of two inner rings set upon the star represents service to our communities, states and nation. The larger outer ring pledges loyalty to Americanism.



This Day in History, February 9, 1775



John Terry, Plano Chapter, is telling the chapter what went on This Day in History.

On February 9, 1775 Parliament declared that Massachusetts was in a state of rebellion after the colonists formed the extra-legal Massachusetts Provincial Congress and began organizing militia units independent of British control.

The joint resolution of Parliament read, in part:

[W]e find, that a part of your Majesty's subjects in the province of the Massachusetts Bay have proceeded so far to resist the authority of the supreme legislature, that a rebellion at this time actually exists within the said province; and we see, with the utmost concern, that they have been countenanced and encouraged by unlawful combinations and engagements..., to the injury and oppression of many of their innocent fellow-subjects resident within the kingdom of Great Britain, and the rest of your Majesty's dominion.

That same day the New England Restraining Act was passed which provided that New England's trade be limited to Britain and the British West Indies and New England ships were barred from the North Atlantic fisheries.

This Day in History, January 11, 1775



A regular Feature of a Robert Rankin meeting is This Day in History. It was started by Compatriots Patrick Kerr and Tom Jackson.

Michael Bierman is telling the chapter what went on This Day in History from the January Meeting where we ran out of time. Francis Salvador, the first Jew to hold an elected office in the Americas, takes his seat on the South Carolina Provincial Congress on this day in 1775, January 11.

Born in 1747, Salvador was descended from a line of prominent Sephardic Jews who made their home in London. His great grandfather, Joseph, was the East India Company's first Jewish director. His grandfather was influential in bravely moving a group of 42 Jewish colonists to Savannah, Georgia, in 1733 despite the colony's prohibition on Jewish settlers. The Salvadors then purchased land in South Carolina.


After the Lisbon earthquake of 1755 destroyed their Portuguese property and the East India Company collapsed, draining the family's resources, the American property was all the Salvadors had left. In 1773, Francis Salvador left his wife and children in London to establish himself in South Carolina with the hope of rebuilding his family's fortune. Within a year of his arrival, Salvador won a seat in the South Carolina General Assembly. In 1774, South Carolinians elected Salvador to the revolutionary Provincial Congress, which began to meet in January 1775, and in which Salvador spoke forcefully for the cause of independence.

The Ambush of Francis Salvador, August 1, 1776 (Diorama)



Salvador and his men were ambushed by a group of Cherokees and Loyalists near present-day Seneca, South Carolina. Salvador was shot and scalped by the Cherokees. Although he survived long enough to know that the militia had won the engagement, he never learned that the South Carolina delegation to the Continental Congress in Philadelphia had taken his advice and voted for independence from Britain.

Salvador was the first recorded Jewish soldier killed in the American War for Independence. He died at the age of 29, never having managed to bring his wife and children from London to the new country for which he fought so bravely.





"Remember the Ladies:" Women in the American Revolution

In March of 1776, Abigail Adams wrote her husband, John: "I desire you would remember the Ladies, and be more generous and favorable to them than your ancestors." Until the 1970s women's history was not widely studied in school and nor remembered much at all. However in 1981, the U.S. Congress passed a resolution that established National Women's History Week. Congress changed the resolution to a month long event in 1987, and ever since, Presidential proclamation has declared March as Women's History Month.

Women made substantial contributions to the American Revolution on the home front and on the battlefields. Many people remember Martha Washington, the wife of General George Washington and the first, First Lady. But few realize that she was also a wealthy landowner (from her first husband's property) in an age when few women were even allowed to own property. When men went off to war, women not only had to continue their own chores, such as cooking, cleaning, and taking care of children, they also had to plow fields and harvest crops.



Many women even ran respectable taverns alone, which was basically housekeeping but on a larger scale.

Women often followed their husbands to war. It was a hard life, but they did so to keep families together and safe. Many camp followers washed clothes, cooked, sold cider and rum, and were nurses. They were given half rations and sometimes paid for their work. Children also helped the army by collecting wood, carrying messages, and playing the fifes and drums during marches.

Often women took on non traditional roles during the American Revolution. Many served the armies as soldiers and spies. Margaret Corbin took over her husband's cannon after he was killed at Fort Washington, New York in 1776. She was wounded and was the first woman awarded a pension by Congress for her service. Mary Ludwig Hays also took her husband's place at a cannon after he was wounded at the Battle of Monmouth



in New Jersey in 1778. In 1822, the state of Pennsylvania awarded her a pension, not for her husband's service but her own. Molly Pitcher was a nickname for women who carried water to the battlefield. Both Mrs. Corbin and Mrs. Hays are rumored to be the real "Molly Pitcher" of legend, however many believe that the legend comes from several real women who served on the battlefields. Deborah Sampson disguised herself as Robert Shurtleff and enlisted in the 4th Massachusetts Regiment in 1778. She fought in several skirmishes and was even wounded. Instead of having doctors discover her secret, she removed a musket ball from her own leg. Her husband was the only man during the American Revolution to receive a widower's pension.

Locally, several women also contributed to the Revolution. Emily Geiger supposedly was a messenger for the American General Nathaniel Greene after the Patriots had retreated from the town of Ninety Six, South Carolina. Rebecca Motte lived near Charleston, SC, but the British took over her home and fortified it, calling it Fort Motte. Rebecca actually helped to burn her own home to help the Patriots regain control. When Loyalists invaded her Georgia home, Nancy Morgan Hart supposedly killed one and captured several others. Grace and Nancy Martin were sisters-in-law who captured a British dispatch rider, and took his message to General Greene during the siege at Ninety Six.

During Women's History Month, "remember the ladies" who throughout history have served their country from the home front to the battlefields. Books on traditional and nontraditional women who served during the American Revolution, such as *Awesome Women* by Nicki Sackrison, are available at the Ninety Six National Historic Site's Bookstore.





He is the third President General from Georgia, Mike served as the SAR National Color Guard as Commander from 2012-2014. He has been recognized for his efforts and involvement in his community by the DAR. Mike is a member of several lineage societies including: Sons of the Revolution, The Society of the War of 1812 in Virginia and Georgia, Descendants of Washington's Army at Valley Forge, First Families of Georgia, Colonial Wars, Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims, Order of the Founders of North America 1492-1692, and Descendants of Sheriffs & Constables of Colonial & Antebellum America.



Get on IH-10 West toward El Paso. Go past 410 loop and 1604. Get off at Exit 551 (Boerne Stage Rd).


<u>Caution</u>: Construction at exit. Immediately get into center lane, because the left lane of 3 lane road empties back onto IH -10. Take the second left which will take you to a traffic light at the rear of a Compass Bank branch. Take a left and go under the IH-10 bridge. You are now on Boerne Stage Rd. Continue straight past a HEB grocery store on your left and Wal-Mart on the right. Travel one mile to Cross Mountain Trail. Turn left at Valero market and travel .9 of a mile on Cross Mountain Trail. This road winds up a hill. Be on the lookout for deer which periodically jump out of the underbrush along the road.

You will go by Walnut Pass subdivision on the right and a Catholic Church compound on your left. Go past North Line Camp St., and Goodnight Loving Rd. on the right and slow down as you pass Commanche Gap on the left. We have two driveways. The second drive is marked by a lighted mailbox with the house numbers. Handicapped only up that lighted drive! A few cars may park inside the first drive, which we hope to have lighted. Most of you will have to park along the road. If you park along the road, please come up the lighted driveway to avoid stumbling. Although our property is lighted, it is strongly suggested that you bring in a flashlight to assist you in getting back to your car.

June 10 - 11:

Health to the Company - Practice of Medicine in Colonial Virginia

Men, women and children living on the fringes of Virginia's frontier faced danger on a daily basis. The risk of being wounded was great and the slightest cut or burn could easily lead to death. The knowledge of medical treatment was invaluable but often scarce. Captain Martin's company surgeon has arrived at the station to evaluate the men and share his knowledge of health and healing.

July 4: A Declaration of Independence

News spreads across Virginia's frontier that on July 4, 1776, the Second Continental Congress, meeting in Philadelphia approved a Declaration of Independence, severing the colonies' ties to the British Crown. Witness the reaction of the men and women at Martin's Station as they receive this news of liberty and listen as Capt. Martin challenges his people to stand for Liberty or for King and Crown.

July 8 - 9:

The Woman Warrior - Bearing the burden of a Revolution

At the onset of the Revolutionary War many backwoods settlements were left unprotected as militias were formed and men marched to battle. In many communities the women not only became providers, but warriors, who found themselves defending hearth and home against British loyalist and Shawnee and Cherokee raiders. Like their male counterparts, when called upon they engaged the enemy and protected their families. Journey to Martin's Station, and take up arms with the women of Powell's Valley.

August 12 - 13 : All the Kings Men – Native Alliances to the Crown

Throughout the 18th century the Cherokee and Shawnee nations were often enticed by English and French monarchies to fight against American colonist. Such alliances were often met with broken promises and shattered hope. Travel to the Native Camp west of Martin's Station and visit warriors who eagerly wear the weight of the king's crown.

September 4 : Apprentices and Journeymen

During the 18th century, skills and labor were taught and conducted under apprenticeships by master craftsmen. This technique was invaluable to those lucky enough to become apprentices, and to a labor force supporting a new nation. Bear witness to the men of Martin's Station as they demonstrate and explain their crafts.

September 9 - 10 : "Forting Up" - A Living History Experiment

Imagine yourself living at a colonial fort located beyond the fringes of Virginia's frontier. There is nothing for miles, only a vast wilderness with danger lurking in the shadows. For a select few this will become reality as they are immersed into the life of a backwoods settler living at Captain Martin's station in 1775. This program is designed to take living history and experimental archology to a new level by giving paying participants an authentic 18th century experience. This is a first come first serve fee based program. If you are interested, please call the park office for more information.

November 11 - 12 : The Hunters Harvest – A Necessity of Survival

Famous pioneers traded the plow for a rifle and turned to the wilderness to seek their fortune, however it was the common market hunter that supplied food for backwoods settlements. The threat of starvation was very real on Virginia's frontier and experienced hunters were in demand. The hunters working for Captain Martin have returned to the station laden with deer, buffalo and small game. Visit with us as we stoke the fires and enjoy the hunter's harvest.



And as you leave the small frontier outpost you may find yourself looking back one last time, and if so, you have not only touched history, history has touched you.

About the Park

Wilderness Road State Park offers picnicking, hiking, and nature and living history programs. The park features the reconstructed Martin's Station, an outdoor living history museum depicting life on Virginia's 1775 frontier. Guests can enjoy the visitor center which also serves as a regional tourist information center and is complete with a frontier museum, gift shop and theater showcasing the award-winning docu-drama "Wilderness Road: Spirit of a Nation". Other ammentities include picnic shelters, 100-seat amphitheater, nature playscape, ADA-certified playground, sand volleyball court and horseshoe pits. Visitors can hike, bike or horseback ride on the 8.5-mile Wilderness Road Trail or get closer with nature on the .77 mile Indian Ridge Trail. The 1870s era Karlan Mansion, amphitheater, visitor center theatre and Surber Cabin are available for weddings, meetings and other group functions.





The Battle of San Jacinto Symposium 2017



Come to this hallowed battleground for a symposium on San Jacinto, the victory that gave us Texas!

"The battle at the Alamo is sacred, but victory at San Jacinto gave us Texas," says James E. Crisp PhD, who returns for his 15th stint as symposium moderator. "It's not often you can hear historians discuss one of the most important battles in history – then tour the actual battle site on the same day." Crisp is a Fellow of the Texas State Historical Association and Professor of History at North Carolina State University.

In the morning, hear scholars discuss the ordinary Texan and Mexican soldiers and their arms and battle tactics. After lunch, tour the battleground (tours optional). Teachers earn six CPE credits for the full day.

J. P. Bryan

Bryan, a descendent of Moses Austin, will discuss the legacy of San Jacinto. An avid collector of books, documents, artifacts and fine art documenting the history of the Southwest, this Texas oil man recently placed his 70,000-piece collection in the Bryan Museum in Galveston. He is an honorary life member of the Texas State Historical Association.

Gregg J. Dimmick

Dimmick will concentrate on the Mexican army. A "natural historian and avocational archaeologist," this Wharton pediatrician, in 1996, discovered that his town was on the path Santa Anna's army took on its return to Mexico. Dimmick subsequently researched and authored the awardwinning Sea of Mud: The Retreat of the Mexican Army after San Jacinto.

Stephen L. Hardin

Hardin, a professor of History at McMurry University, will view San Jacinto through the eyes of the ordinary Texian soldier. His numerous publications include the award-winning Texian Illiad: A Military History of the Texas Revolution and Texian Macabre: The Melancholy Tale of a Hanging in Early Houston.

Laura McLemore

McLemore, an archivist at the Noel Memorial Library, LSU-Shreveport, will discuss the roles of Andrew Briscoe and the Harris family during the San Jacinto campaign. Her most recent writing is *Adele Looscan: Daughter of the Republic*, Texas Biography Series of the TCU Press.

THE MINUTEMAN AWARD



The MINUTEMAN AWARD is the most prestigious award of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. The National Executive Committee established the award in 1951. Only those Compatriots who have made distinguished and exceptional contributions of service to the National Society may be recognized. The recipient may receive the award only once.

This beautiful medal is of sterling silver. It depicts a MINUTEMAN holding a rifle with a plow and the Liberty Bell in the background. The medal is suspended from a neck ribbon of light blue silk.

The MINUTEMAN AWARD was first presented at the 1952 National Congress. The first honoree was former President General Benjamin H. Powell of Texas. The award has been presented annually since 1952. Since 1967, a maximum of six awards may be presented each year. Through 2016, a total of three hundred and ninety-five Compatriots have been recognized with the MINUTEMAN AWARD.

C. Bruce Pickette — Alabama Society

Compatriot Pickette has served the National Society as the Librarian General for three terms. He has served as a National Trustee and an Alternate Trustee for the Alabama Society for one year each. Compatriot Pickette has served on the following committees: the Library & Archives Committee for nine years; the Americanism Committee for eight years; the Newsletters & Periodicals Committee for seven years; the ROTC/JROTC & Service Academies Committee for seven years, serving as Vice-Chairman for four of those years; the Membership Committee for six years; the Registration, Education & Reporting Committee and the Retention & Reinstatement Committee for five years each; the Bylaws, Rules and Resolutions Committee for two years. He developed the Friends of the Library Promotional Package consisting of a Lapel Pin, tri-fold brochure and video promotion. He is a recipient of the Lafayette Volunteer Service Medal for work on correction of the approximately 12,000 pages of scanned Family History files for the SAR Library. Compatriot Pickette is a first line sponsor on twenty new members and assisted in organizing a Chapter in Alabama. He has attended eight Congresses and eighteen National Leadership Meetings. He is a George Washington Fellow and a contributor to the SAR Center for Advancing America's Heritage and a member of the SAR Founders Circle.

James C. Taylor — Texas Society

Compatriot Taylor has served the National Society as Chaplain General for two different terms. He served as a National Trustee and Alternate Trustee for the Germany Society for one year each. Compatriot Taylor has served on the following committees: the Americanism, the Color Guard and the Veterans Committees for eleven years each; the Historic Sites & Celebration and the Medals & Awards Committees for seven years each; the Operation Ancestor Search and the Patriot Index Committees for six years each; the Spanish Patriots now referred to as the Foreign Patriots Committee for five years; the Chaplains Committee for four years, serving as Vice-Chairman for two years and Chairman for two years; the Genealogy Committee for four years; the Flag Committee for three years. He introduced the Wounded Warrior Tool Box Distribution Program to the National Society, which contributed \$800 toward the goals set for the purchase of tool boxes for wounded warrior families. He revised and updated the SAR Prayer book and has made it available on the SAR website. Compatriot Taylor is the first line sponsor on seventy-six new members. He has attended nine Congresses and twenty National Leadership Meetings. He is a George Washington Fellow and a contributor to the Americanism Committee, the Joseph S. Rumbaugh Historical Orations Committee, the George M. & Stella Knight Essay Committee and the SAR Center for Advancing America's 1 Cal OAD Daniel Chale
