



The painting above, George Washington and Lafayette at Valley Forge was painted by John Ward Dunsmore, and was published 1907. Dunsmore is known for his realistic paintings of the American Revolutionary era.

The largest collection of Dunsmore's art is at the Fraunces Tavern Museum. The Tavern, built in 1719, is best known as the site where Washington gave his farewell address to the officers of the Continental Army. It was originally built for the merchant Stephan Delancey as an elegant residence. Tavern-keeper Samuel Fraunces purchased the house in 1762 and coverted it into a most popular tavern. When the country's first capital was located in New York City the building was used to Departments of War, Treasury and Foreign Affairs.

In 1904, the Sons of the Revolution in the State of New York purchased the tavern and hired preservation architect William Mersereau to return the building to its colonial appearance. Fraunces Tavern® Museum opened to the public in 1907.

Dr. Christopher Hammons is the Director of the Center for Law and Liberty and a professor of Government at Houston Baptist University. He teaches courses in constitutional history, political philosophy, and presidential politics.

Dr. Hammons received a B.A. in Government and History at the University of Texas at Austin in 1991 and an M.A. and Ph.D. in Political Science at the University of Houston in 1997.

The Robert Rankin Chapter primarily serves the area proscribed by the Cypress-Fairbanks ISD and the Katy ISD, an area of 360 square miles, a student population of 210,000 and an estimated population exceeding 1.1 million, larger than 8 states.

On Saturday August 26th, 2017 Hurricane Harvey made landfall along the southeast Texas Gulf Coast as a Category 4 hurricane. Harvey was the most intense hurricane to make landfall since 2005 and the wettest ever recorded in our country's history.

In a four-day period, many areas of Southeast Texas received more than 40 inches of rain as the system slowly meandered and stalled over the metropolitan Harris County region.

As a result, the Cy-Fair and Katy communities experienced catastrophic flooding and unprecedented damage causing thousands of residents to be displaced.

In February we will recognize those who serve the Katy ISD area. This evening, we say thank to just a few organizations who assisted the community within the Cy-Fair community.

We will start with CFISD.

Tonight, we recognize and say thank you to the employees of Cypress Fairbanks ISD for their community support during the wake of Hurricane Harvey. The individuals present eschewed individual recognition and are here emblematically.

Representing the men and women of the CFISD Police Department are Assistant Chief Mike Baker and Captain Matthew Williams.

Representing the men, women and students who were volunteers at the Berry Center are Director of Marketing and Business Relations Leslie Francis and Courtney Abney from Facilities and Construction.

Ms. Francis helped design, coordinate, and implement the Berry Center Relief and Ms. Courtney Abney helped coordinate efforts with Ms. Francis at the point of distribution.

I would ask Leslie Francis, Director of Marketing and Business Relations to briefly describe the CFISD Contributions:

Award/Recognition Script

Representing the Cy-Fair Volunteer Fire Department are

Captain Chris Garcia made a presentation to the Board about his investigation for obtaining a high profile water rescue vehicle for service to the District. Mr. Garcia also shared with the Board that the rescue boats purchased should be received by the District by October 15, 2016.

On the third day of Harvey four fire fighters were called to face risk and uncertainty and answer a call for help. Included in this group were District Chief Larry Landriault, Captain Christopher Garcia, Captain Ronald Fangmann, and Lieutenant Chad Corliss.

These courageous firefighters faced unimaginable odds against Mother Nature and Hurricane Harvey. It was the 3rd day of Harvey – the fire department was well into the thick of the Event and the end was unclear. In the early morning on Tuesday, approximately 4:30 am, a call came in for a capsized boat in the Black Horse Subdivision near the Golf Course. Boat 3 was quickly dispatched, along with the Rescue Coordinator and a District Chief. Travelling around impassable roads and through-ways, and in the pitch-black of night, the Team finally arrived only to find out that instead of 1-2 people needing to be rescued, the call was actually for 11 people and Service Dog in swift water conditions.

Through patience, experience, training and persistence the Team was successful in saving all 11, as well as the Service Dog. This type of save, which is all too often met with sadness and regret was 100% successful and a truly remarkable situation.

"The landfall of Hurricane Harvey was just the beginning of a long, but rewarding week for CFVFD. Like so many areas, we faced torrential rain and inland flooding. Late one night, our rescue team was dispatched to a reported capsized boat near Black Horse golf course. The team consisted of a district chief, a rescue boat with a crew of three, and an engine crew. The rescue boat was launched north of Big Cypress Creek from where the distress call had come. Lt. Chad Corliss and I did a guick safety check of the rescue boat, donned our gear, and proceeded to search for the boat. "We soon located the boat and secured two adults and two children. We then learned about a stranded adult hanging onto a tree in the rapidly moving waters of Cypress Creek. The crew of Rescue Boat 3 and I decided to enter the water. Our plan was to ferry upstream, enter the current in a small opening of a tree clearing, travel downstream to the victim, and execute a "J" turn that allowed us to snatch the man from the water. We executed the plan and soon had our first of what would soon be 11 people out of harm's way. The man rescued from the tree was extremely emotional, saying he had felt death was imminent. Once on land, he tearfully thanked us. "The Rescue Boat 3 crew then resumed searching the flooded area. Daylight had not arrived. Lighting was limited. We soon saw a flash of a light deep into the flooded area. As we navigated toward the light through the debris, we saw several more people hanging onto trees in the rushing water. The first person we came to was a mother with her a young boy who was about seven years old. From there, we rescued another child and three men. As we headed back to shore through the flooded water, I asked the boy what his name was and he said, 'My name is Christopher.' At that moment the situation took on a surreal feeling for Lt. Corliss and myself. We had seven victims on shore, with the original four that were rescued on a nearby bridge. Once all 11 were on shore, a military crew was waiting to take them to a medical facility All of this happened under the illumination of a helicopter light requested by our fire chief." One of the rescued citizens mentioned that her service dog was lost. The crew of Rescue Boat 3 and I, with the assistance of a Texas Department of Public Safety helicopter crew, resumed searching the flooded area for the service dog. We listened carefully for barks or unusual noises. After several passes in the rescue boat, we heard a faint dog bark from the woods. The water was thick with debris and it remained difficult to navigate. After several passes near the dog, we decided to place the handler in the boat to help with our search. On our last attempt to locate the dog, a very loud dog bark echoed in the wooded area. We then saw the dog tangled in a tree. He was covered in ants and shaking. We soon were able to get him into the boat take him and his handler to shore. "This rescue was the best possible outcome. Our team helped 11 men, women and children and a service dog survive dangerous floodwaters in the dark of night. This incident reflects the best of what we're trying to do for the community. I could not be prouder of the people of CFVFD.





ANCESTOR PRESENTATION:

Jeremiah Woodcock

Jeremiah Woodcock was born October 11, 1731 in Needham, Massachusetts. He was the son of Jeremiah Woodcock, Jr. and Elizabeth (Bacon) Woodcock. He was the second of six children. Jeremiah's Grandfather Deacon Jeremiah Woodcock was one of the founders of Needham, MA and he was one of the signers of the Petition for the Incorporation of Needham, MA.

On Dec. 26, 1753 when he was 22 years old, Jeremiah married Sarah Morse and they had 6 children before Sarah died Aug. 3, 1766. On Nov. 5, 1767 Jeremiah married the widow Susannah Whitmore (Chick) and they had 6 more children.

The History of Needham says that both the East Company and the West Company of Militia from Needham MA responded to the Lexington Alarm on April 19, 1775. The book "MASSACHUSETTS Soldiers and Sailors Revolutionary War." has the following listing: Woodcock, Jere, Needham. Private, Capt. Robert Smith's co., Col. William Heath's regt.; service, 4 days, probably on the alarm of April 19, 1775.

The History of Needham also has Samuel Woodcock in the list of men who "marched in consequence of the Alarm Made on the 19th of April". The book

"MASSACHUSETTS Soldiers and Sailors Revolutionary War" lists Samuel Woodcock from Needham, MA as responding to the alarm of April 19, 1775, which was probably Jeremiah's Brother Samuel.

"MASSACHUSETTS Soldiers and Sailors Revolutionary War" lists Jeremiah Woodcock (Hatick) and Jeremiah Woodcock, Jr. (his son) as enlisting Jan 30, 1776; service to time marching, 22 days. [my genealogy shows 7 generations of Jeremiah Woodcock's]

Jeremiah Woodcock enlisted 16 July, 1780 in the Continental Army for a term of 6 months and served in the 3rd Regt. Massachusetts in Capt. Job Summers Company of the 3rd Massachusetts Regiment commanded by Col. John Greaton. Jeremiah was described as "age, 48 yrs. ; stature, 5 ft. 10 in.; complexion, light; engaged for town of Needham; marched to camp July 16, 1780, under command of Lieut. Zebulon King." Additionally, the book states: ... "men belonging to the town of Needham raised for service in the Continental Army during 1780; entered service July 12, 1780; discharged Dec. 6, 1780; service, 5 mos. 5 days, including travel (220 miles) home."

Jeremiah Woodcock died on March 4, 1824. He is listed in The History of Needham under "Residents of Needham who have lived Ninety Years" as: "Jeremiah Woodcock, March 4, 1824, aged ninety-two years, four months." His burial location is unknown

This Day in History, February 4, 1783

King George III declares a permanent ceasefire to the American Revolution

On this day in history, February 4, 1783, King George III declares a permanent ceasefire to the American Revolution. After the surrender of General Charles Cornwallis' army at Yorktown, Virginia in October, 1781, many members of Parliament decided it was time to end the war. The House of Commons first voted to end the war on February 27, 1782 and in March, Prime Minister North resigned.

By April 4, General Henry Clinton was replaced as Commander of British forces in North America by Sir Guy Carleton, who was charged with implementing a withdrawal Informal peace negotiations began in April in Paris between Ben Franklin and Richard Oswald, the representative of the new Prime Minister, Charles Watson Wentworth, and the Marquess of Rockingham.

By September, 1782, John Jay had arrived in Paris from Spain and John Adams had arrived from Holland. They joined the now formal peace negotiations and on November 30, a preliminary peace treaty is signed, in which Britain acknowledges the sovereignty of the United States, the boundaries of the United States are determined and Britain agrees to withdraw its forces from US territory.

The preliminary treaty is ratified by Parliament on January 20, 1783 and a ceasefire is declared by King George on February 4. The American Congress declares a ceasefire on April 11 and ratifies the preliminary treaty on April 15, 1783.

On September 3, 1783, the final Treaty of Paris is signed in Paris by representatives John Jay, John Adams and Ben Franklin from America and Representative David Hartley from Great Britain. Congress ratifies the Treaty of Paris on January 14, 1784 and Parliament ratifies it on April 9, 1784. The final act of the road to peace is a formal exchanging of the signed documents in Paris on May 12, 1784, finally bringing the American Revolution to a close. Announcements:



THIS DAY IN HISTORY: March 01, 1781: Articles of Confederation are Ratified

On this day in 1781, the Articles of Confederation are finally ratified. The Articles were signed by Congress and sent to the individual states for ratification on November 15, 1777, after 16 months of debate. Bickering over land claims between Virginia and Maryland delayed final ratification for almost four more years. Maryland finally approved the Articles on March 1, 1781, affirming the Articles as the outline of the official government of the United States. The nation was guided by the Articles of Confederation until the implementation of the current U.S. Constitution in 1789.

The critical distinction between the Articles of Confederation and the U.S. Constitution — the primacy of the states under the Articles — is best understood by comparing the following lines.

The Articles of Confederation begin: "To all to whom these Present shall come, we the undersigned Delegates of the States"

By contrast, the Constitution begins: "We the People of the United States ... do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

The predominance of the states under the Articles of Confederation is made even more explicit by the claims of Article II:


"Each state retains its sovereignty, freedom, and independence, and every power, jurisdiction, and right, which is not by this Confederation expressly delegated to the United States, in Congress assembled."

Less than five years after the ratification of the Articles of Confederation, enough leading Americans decided that the system was inadequate to the task of governance that they peacefully overthrew their second government in just over 20 years. The difference between a collection of sovereign states forming a confederation and a federal government created by a sovereign people lay at the heart of debate as the new American people decided what form their government would take.

Between 1776 and 1787, Americans went from living under a sovereign king, to living in sovereign states, to becoming a sovereign people. That transformation defined the American Revolution.

Ratification of the Articles of Confederation by all thirteen states occurred March 1, 1781. The Articles created a loose confederation of sovereign states and a weak central government, leaving most of the power with the state governments.





The Death of General Warren at the Battle of Bunker's Hill (painted 1786) by John Trumbull (1756 – 1843). Trumbull was a soldier of the Revolution and sketched the British works at the Battle of Bunker Hill, which he witnessed. He was a personal aide to Washington and deputy adjuntant-general to Gates. Trumbull resigned from the army in 1777.

The paiting hangs in the Boston musuem of Fine Art and depicts a charge by the British up Breeds Hill. The two details show the death of two leaders of the battle. Colonial leader General Dr. Joseph Warren is shown dying after being hit by a musket ball. In the lower insert, Major John Pitcairn, falling back dying in the arms of Lieutenant Pitcairn's, his son.

Patriot rider William Dawes is born

On this day in history, April 5, 1745, Patriot rider William Dawes is born. He is known for being the "other" rider who rode with Paul Revere to warn the patriots that the British were coming. Dawes was born in Boston, the fifth generation of English immigrants who came early in the 1600s to America. He was a tanner by trade and was a member of the Old South Church in Boston.

Dawes married in 1768 during the height of tensions with Britain and was applauded for wearing a suit at the wedding which was made completely in America, instead of one made in Great Britain. He was involved in the militia prior to the Revolution, but was not as central a figure in the Boston patriot movement as Paul Revere, Samuel Adams or John Hancock. He was well-known enough, however, that when Dr. Joseph Warren learned of British plans to confiscate the patriots' ammunition stores at Concord, one of the people he turned to was William Dawes.

Dr. Samuel Prescott was one of the High Sons of Liberty who served as a courier to Patriots in the Lexington and Concord area during the American Revolution.

He met with his fiancée on the evening of April 18, 1775 in Lexington, and at 1 a.m. on the 19th, left by horseback for Concord, where he met with Paul Revere and William Dawes. With those two, he carried the message that the British were coming; but unlike Revere, did not get captured. Prescott was the primary courier of the message.

Prescott served as a physician in the Continental Army and served in General Arnold's disastrous Lake Champlain Campaign. He was captured and held in Fort Ticonderoga, where he died at a young age

The Real Story of Paul Revere

In the spring of 1860, Harvard professor and well-regarded romantic poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow began working on a poem about an otherwise obscure messenger ride by American patriot Paul Revere on the evening of April 18-19, 1775. Longfellow hoped to use the story of Paul Revere's ride as a vehicle to warn the American Union that it was in danger of disintegrating (which it was). Even though there is good evidence that Longfellow knew the real story of Revere's ride (from Paul Revere's 1798 letter to Dr. Jeremy Belknap of the Massachusetts Historical Society, published in a magazine Longfellow had almost certainly read), Longfellow chose to simplify and re-arrange parts of the story in the interests of creating a better and more effective poem. In particular, Longfellow reversed the story of the famous signal lanterns hung in Christ Church tower to indicate that British troops had left Boston. According to Longfellow, Paul Revere was waiting "booted and spurred" in Charlestown across the river from Boston for the signal, whereas in fact Revere was still in Boston when the signals were shown. The signals were not "for" Paul Revere, but "from" Paul Revere to the Sons of Liberty in Charlestown, because Revere was apprehensive that he would be prevented from leaving Boston.

Longfellow also records Revere as arriving in both Lexington and Concord, when in fact Revere was captured outside of Lexington and never reached Concord (although his companion Dr. Prescott did). Perhaps most important is the fact that Longfellow presented Revere as a lone rider in opposition to the might of the British Empire, when in fact Revere was just a cog, although an important one, in an elaborate warning system set up by the Sons of Liberty to spread an alarm quickly and efficiently.


Unlike some historical events, a great deal is known about Paul Revere's ride, derived largely from his own accounts – the draft and finished version of a deposition taken soon after the Revolutionary War broke out, and the 1798 letter to Dr. Jeremy Belknap referred to above. On the evening of April 18, 1775, Paul Revere was sent for by Dr. Joseph Warren, the last major patriot leader left in Boston and a personal friend of Revere's. When he arrived at Dr. Warren's surgery, Revere found out 1) that British regular troops were preparing that evening to march into the countryside, probably to Concord, Massachusetts, to capture or destroy military stores that had been gathered there. This was no surprise, as such a movement had been expected for several days. 2) Dr. Warren informed Revere that he had just received intelligence from his own spy network that the troops planned to stop in Lexington, Massachusetts, on the road to Concord and arrest Samuel Adams and John Hancock, patriot leaders who were staying in a house owned by one of Hancock's relatives (As it turned out, this intelligence was inaccurate). Dr. Warren "begged" Revere to stop in Lexington and warn Adams and Hancock to get out of the way of the British troops. Warren also informed Revere that he had already sent one messenger to Lexington – a Mr. William Dawes – who had taken the longer land route out Boston Neck, around Back Bay, and over the bridge into Cambridge, Massachusetts, by Harvard College.

After Revere conferred with Warren, he returned to his own neighborhood, where he contacted a "friend" (Revere was very careful not to identify anyone he did not need to, in case his deposition fell into the wrong hands) to climb up into the bell tower of Christ Church (today known as the Old North Church) to set the famous signals. The "friend" hung two lanterns, meaning the British planned to leave Boston "by sea" across the Charles River, as opposed to a single lantern, which would mean the troops planned to march entirely "by land," by the same route William Dawes had taken. Presumably the water route would be shorter, although as it turned out the troops were so slow it really mattered very little which way they went. Revere then stopped by his own house to pick up his boots and overcoat, then made his way to the North End waterfront, where two "friends" waited with a small boat to row him across the mouth of the Charles River. Successfully passing by the British warship HMS Somerset, that had been anchored close by where the ferries normally crossed to Charlestown, the two men dropped Revere off near the old Charlestown battery just outside of town. Making him way into Charlestown, Revere met with the local Sons of Liberty, who verified that they had seen his lantern signals (which by then were no longer necessary). Revere then borrowed a horse from Charlestown patriot John Larkin (who actually had to get the horse from his father, Samuel Larkin) and then set off through the countryside northwest towards Lexington and Concord.

Narrowly escaping capture by a British patrol just outside of Charlestown, Revere charged his planned route somewhat and arrived in Lexington just past midnight. We do not know what he said at each of the houses along the road. We do know exactly what he said when he got to Lexington, however, as there was a sentry on duty outside the house where Adams and Hancock lodged, and that sentry, a Sergeant Monroe, later wrote down what happened. As Revere approached the house, Monroe told him not to make so much noise, that everyone in the house had retired for the night. Revere cried "Noise! You'll have noise enough before long! The regulars are coming out!" Despite this, Revere still had trouble convincing the sentry to let him pass until John Hancock, who was still awake and heard the commotion, recognized Revere's voice and said "Oh, you, Revere. We are not afraid of you" after which Revere was allowed to enter the house and deliver his news.

About 30 minutes later William Dawes arrived. The two messengers "refreshed themselves" (probably got something to eat and drink) and then decided to continue on to the town of Concord, to verify that the military stores had been properly dispersed and hidden away. Along the road they were joined by a third man, a Dr. Samuel Prescott, who they recognized as a "High Son of Liberty." Soon afterwards they were all stopped by a British patrol. Dawes, who had probably turned aside to alarm a house, noticed what was going on and made his escape. The British herded Prescott and Revere into a nearby meadow, when Prescott suddenly said "Put on!" (meaning scatter) and the two patriots suddenly rode off in different directions. Prescott, a local man, successfully eluded capture, and alarmed the militia in Lincoln and Concord; Revere chose the wrong patch of woods to head for and was recaptured by more British soldiers. Held for a while, questioned, and even threatened, Revere was eventually released, although his horse was confiscated. Making his way back into Lexington on foot, Revere assisted Adams and Hancock to leave for Woburn, Massachusetts. Revere and Hancock's secretary, a Mr. Lowell, were engaged in carrying away a trunk of papers that Hancock had left behind when the British troops marched onto Lexington Green. Revere reported that he could hear the gunshots and see the smoke from the musket fire when the skirmish of Lexington Green began, but he could not identify who had fired first, as a building just then obscured his view. This is probably why Revere's deposition was not included with the others when they were published soon after the war began. Revere's deposition (draft and final copy) can today be found in the Revere Family Papers at the Massachusetts Historical Society, along with Revere's 1798 letter to Dr. Jeremy Belknap.

Depicted in this painting is the surrender of British General John Burgoyne to American General Horatio Gates at Saratoga, New York on October 17, 1777.

The British surrender occurs after two previous battles lost by the British while they awaited reinforcements that never arrived. This turning point in the American Revolution brought the French into the war and prevented the British from carving off the New England.






Stephen Hopkins, shown above, is considered the father of Rhode Island independence.

The month of May is special for our smallest state. On May 29, 1790 Rhode Island achieved statehood. Rhode Island independence was declared two months before the other 12 colonies got around to formally breaking ties with King George III. On May 4, 1776, the General Assembly of the Colony of Rhode Island declared its absolute independence from Great Britain. They voted nearly unanimously, thus making Rhode Island the first independent sovereign state in the western world. The colony drew on its traditions of radical religious dissent as well as protecting its commercial interests. Newport and Providence, both prosperous centers of transatlantic trade, sheltered pirates and smugglers. Merchants chafed at Britain's attempts to tighten control over commercial shipping in Narragansett Bay.

Parliament passed the Sugar Act of 1764 raising the tariff on molasses. That provoked Rhode Islanders into attacking the customs ship HMS St. John in 1764, the HMS Liberty in 1769, and the HMS Gaspee in 1772. Abraham Whipple and John Brown led the Sons of Liberty in attacking, looting, boarding and burning the vessel. A Royal Commission of Inquiry charged the men with treason, and the prospect of Americans going to England for trial sent an alarm through the colonies. Ultimately the Commission dropped the matter.



The Carriage House above. "We try and collect at least one thing from every county and parish in the United States," Kaufman says. "We've gone beyond that. In our international collection we try and collect things from Great Britain, Germany, Canada, Mexico. Our strength is the Gulf Coast." Theirs is a fact-based system, and information can be gleaned from wills, deeds, marriages, divorces, deaths, court minutes and records, church and cemetery records, tax information, colonial collections, and directories from the 19th and 20th centuries. Kaufman says they also have unusual resources including microfilm and documents that aren't digitized due to copyright issues. Kaufman says it's the mission of her team to help interested persons get started by understanding the method behind the pursuit. For example, Harris County only began sending birth records to Austin in 1908, and marriage records weren't sent prior to 1965. So, one place to start would be the federal census, which is made available to the public after 72 years.



Manuscripts and Special Collections

Introduction

Often searching for family history takes us to the computer to see "what's out there." We find a collection in our geographic area of research, and we put a name in the box and see what we get. Or, if we do find a digital image of a manuscript collection, it isn't indexed and we must look through the whole thing. Or worse yet, we can't find anything online, and the only copies are at a brick and mortar building. Often all we get is a finding aid, not the "stuff."

Searching and finding digital collections, finding out where collections are held and what is in them can be challenging yet rewarding. This research might not be 30 second research, meaning we might not find the "answer" right away, we might have to spend time reading and searching, but in the long run, manuscripts and special collections might help answer the "why" or "how." At the very least, it will add information to your genealogy, making it a family history.

Definitions

Manuscript Collection

- Often a collection of papers in an archival collection
- The Society for American Archivists defines manuscript collection as: n. ~ A collection of personal or family papers.
- Although manuscript literally means handwritten, 'manuscript collection' is often used to include collections of mixed media in which unpublished materials predominate. They may also include typescripts, photographs, diaries, scrapbooks, news clippings, and printed works.
- The kinds of records are extremely diverse: letters, diaries, notebooks, speeches, lectures, drafts of books and articles, research or reference files, cutting books, photographs, drawings, minute books, agenda papers, logbooks, financial records, maps and plans.

Special Collection

- A special collection is a group of items, such as rare books or documents, that are either irreplaceable or unusually rare and valuable.
- For this reason, special collections are stored separately from the regular library collections in a secure location with environmental controls to preserve the items for posterity.
- Special collections also include rare items that are focused on a single topic, such as aviation or women's history.
- Special collections are created to benefit scholars by grouping related materials together in one repository.
- Often a repository will specialize in a limited number of subject areas for their special collections, to distinguish the institution from other libraries. (Purdue Univ Libraries)

Finding Aid

- A tool that facilitates discovery of information within a collection of records.
- A description of records that gives the repository physical and intellectual control over the materials and that assists users to gain access to and understand the materials.
- Finding aid includes a wide range of formats, including card indexes, calendars, guides, inventories, shelf and container lists, and registers. - Finding aid is a single document that places the materials in context by consolidating information about the collection, such as acquisition and processing; provenance, including administrative history or biographical note; scope of the collection, including size, subjects, media; organization and arrangement; and an inventory of the series and the folders.

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

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American General Benjamin Lincoln dies

On this day in history, May 9, 1810, American General Benjamin Lincoln dies. Benjamin Lincoln was born into a prominent family in Hingham, Massachusetts, 16 miles southeast of Boston, in 1733. His father was wealthy and politically active and Benjamin followed in his footsteps, becoming the town constable at the age of 21 and the town clerk at the age of 24. Lincoln also joined the Suffolk County militia as an adjutant under his father who was the colonel.

Lincoln held town posts for 20 years leading up to the Revolution and became known for his administrative ability. He did not serve in combat during the French and Indian War, but was involved in procuring supplies, recruitment and training of his father's regiment. Shortly before the outbreak of the Revolution, Lincoln was elected to the colonial assembly and became a lieutenant colonel in the militia.

When British Governor Thomas Gage dissolved the colonial assembly in 1774, the representatives continued to meet as a provincial congress. Lincoln became the Congress' secretary and held several key administrative positions supplying the army. When the war broke out he became a Major General over the militia. After the British abandoned Boston, Lincoln was given command of a Massachusetts regiment sent to join the Continental Army at New York. They saw action at the Battle of White Plains, but soon returned to Massachusetts, as their enlistment terms had expired.

In 1777, Lincoln was appointed a major general in the Continental Army on the advice of George Washington. He was sent to assist in repelling the British invasion from Canada and took part in the Battles of Saratoga, where he was shot in the ankle, an injury that would plague him for years.

In 1778, Lincoln was given command over the Southern Department of the Continental Army where the British were attempting to take over Georgia and South Carolina. His efforts were

constantly plagued by the unwillingness of local authorities to cooperate with the Army. He was constantly short on soldiers and supplies. He successfully repelled an invasion attempt on Charleston in May, 1779, but failed to capture Savannah in October. Lincoln's worst failure occurred in May of 1780 when his entire army was captured at the Siege of Charleston, the largest American defeat of the entire war.

In spite of this failure, Lincoln retained his good standing in the eyes of Washington and the Congress, largely because he had obeyed the civilian authorities in Charleston who didn't want him to abandon the town. After being exchanged as a prisoner of war, Lincoln was given command of one of three regiments that marched with George Washington to Yorktown, Virginia. Lincoln was the overall general in charge of the siege and, as second in command to Washington, received the surrendered sword of British General Cornwallis from his second in command, General Charles O'Hara.

After Yorktown, Lincoln was made the first Secretary of War by the Confederation Congress until the end of the war. Returning to Massachusetts, Lincoln invested in land in Maine and retained his position as first Major General of the militia. In this position, Lincoln led an army that put down Shay's Rebellion in 1787. Lincoln then served at the Massachusetts Constitutional Ratifying Convention where he supported the Constitution's adoption and served a term as lieutenant governor.

Once George Washington became President, he appointed Lincoln to the influential post of Customs Collector for Boston. He held this lucrative position for the rest of his life. Washington called on him a few times to conduct sensitive negotiations with Indian tribes as well. Lincoln finally passed away in 1810 in Hingham and is buried in the Old Ship Burying Ground.



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

THIS DAY IN HISTORT: Washington reports to Congress on Battle of Harlem Heights

WASHINGTON REPORTS TO CONGRESS ON BATTLE OF HARLEM HEIGHTS

On this Sept 18, 1776, General George Washington writes to the president of the Continental Congress, John Hancock, reporting on the Battle at Harlem Heights and relaying the unfortunate news of the death of Captain Thomas Knowlton.

In the early morning hours of September 16, 1776, General Washington ordered the Continentals to hold their line at Harlem Heights while he sent Captain Thomas Knowlton and a volunteer group of Rangers to scout British movements and possibly lure the British into combat. While Captain Knowlton and the Rangers engaged the British in a frontal assault, Washington sent a second force of Patriots to attack the British from their right flank. During the short but intense fighting that ensued, the Americans were able to force a small British retreat from their northern positions.

Despite the American failure to stop the British invasion of New York City the previous day at Kip's Bay, the successful Battle of Harlem Heights restored public confidence in the American troops and lifted the spirits of the Continental Army. The Americans and British each lost approximately 70 troops in the fighting. One of the Americans lost was the Ranger leader, Captain Thomas Knowlton.

In his letter to Congress, General Washington wrote, "The Parties under Colonel Knowlton and Major Leitch unluckily began their Attack too soon, it was rather in flank than in Rear. In a little time Major Leitch was brought off wounded, having received three Balls thro' his side, and in a short time after Col. Knowlton got a Wound, which proved Mortal." Despite his premature action, Washington memorialized Knowlton as "a brave and good Officer."

John Adams was a Founding Father, the first vice president of the United States and the second president. His son, John Quincy Adams, was the nation's sixth president.

John Adams was born on October 30, 1735, in Quincy, Massachusetts. He was a direct descendant of Puritan colonists from the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

At age 16, Adams earned a scholarship to attend Harvard University. After graduating in 1755, at age 20, Adams studied law in the office of James Putnam, a prominent lawyer. In 1758, he earned a master's degree from Harvard and was admitted to the bar. In 1774, he served on the First Continental Congress and helped draft the Declaration of Independence. Adams became the first vice president of the United States and the second president.

Adams quickly became identified with the patriot cause, initially as the result of his opposition to the Stamp Act of 1765.

In 1770, Adams agreed to represent the British soldiers on trial for killing five civilians in what became known as the Boston Massacre. He believed that every person deserved a defense, and he took the case without hesitation. During the trial Adams presented evidence that suggested blame also lay with the mob that had gathered, and that the first soldier who fired upon the crowd was simply responding the way anyone would when faced with a similar life-threatening situation.

The jury acquitted six of the eight soldiers, while two were convicted of manslaughter. Reaction to Adams's defense of the soldiers was hostile, and his law practice suffered greatly. However, his actions later enhanced his reputation as a courageous, generous and fair man.

That same year, Adams was elected to the Massachusetts Assembly and was one of five to represent the colony at the First Continental Congress, in 1774. When Congress created the Continental Army in 1775, Adams nominated George Washington of Virginia as its commander-in-chief.

In May 1776, Congress approved Adams's resolution proposing that the colonies each adopt independent governments. He wrote the preamble to this resolution, which was approved on May 15, setting the stage for the formal passage of the Declaration of Independence.

In 1779, Adams was one of the American diplomats sent to negotiate the Treaty of Paris, which brought an end to the Revolutionary War.

In 1796, Adams was elected as the Federalist nominee for president. Thomas Jefferson led the opposition for the Democratic-Republican Party. Adams won the election by a narrow margin, becoming the second president of the United States.

Adams found himself regularly away from his family, a sacrifice that both he and his wife, Abigail saw as important to the cause, though Abigail was often unhappy.

After his presidency, Adams lived quietly with Abigail on their family farm in Quincy, where he continued to write and to correspond with his friend Thomas Jefferson. Both Adams and Jefferson died on July 4, 1826, the 50th anniversary of American independence.

<u>John Quincy Adams</u>, Adams's son, would eventually become the sixth president of the United States, though he was a member of the opposition party, the Democratic-Republicans.




A moderate in the French Revolution, Lafayette sought reforms in French society but was distrusted by French radicals. Captured and imprisoned by the Austrians for a year, he was freed by Napoleon in 1797. In 1824, Lafayette returned to the United States for a year long triumphant tour that included a stop at Yorktown. It was reported that Lafayette was met by "demonstrations of frenzied enthusiasm without precedent or parallel in American history."

Marie Joseph Paul Yves Roch Gilbert du Motier, Marquis de Lafayette, left France in early 1777 to seek service in the American Revolution. Offering to serve at his own expense, the 19 year old was commissioned a major general in the Continental Army. He was wounded slightly at the Battle of Brandywine and served in the army until January 1779. He briefly returned to France where he helped lay the groundwork for sending a French expeditionary force to serve under Washington.

Ending on October 19, 1781, at Yorktown, Virginia, was a decisive victory by a combined force of American Continental Army troops led by General George Washington and French Army troops led by the Comte de Rochambeau over a British Army commanded by British peer and Lieutenant General Charles Cornwallis. The culmination of the Yorktown campaign, the siege proved to be the last major land battle of the American Revolutionary War in the North American theater, as the surrender by Cornwallis, and the capture of both him and his army, prompted the British government to negotiate an end to the conflict. The battle boosted faltering American morale and revived French enthusiasm for the war, as well as undermining popular support for the conflict in Great Britain.

ANCESTOR PRESENTATION: Marquis de Lafayette

Marquis de Lafayette

Lafayette was born into an ancient noble family in France. Orphaned in his early teens, he had already inherited an immense fortune. He joined the circle of young courtiers at the court of King Louis XVI but soon aspired to win glory as a soldier. Hence, he traveled at his own expense to the American colonies, arriving in Philadelphia in July 1777, 27 months after the outbreak of the American Revolution. With no combat experience and not yet 20 years old, Lafayette was nonetheless appointed a major general in the Continental Army, and he quickly struck up a lasting friendship with the American commander in chief, George Washington.

Lafayette served on Washington's staff for six weeks, and, after fighting with distinction at the Battle of the Brandywine, near Philadelphia, on September 11, 1777, he was given command of his own division. He conducted a masterly retreat from Barren Hill on May 28, 1778. Returning to France in February 1779, he worked with American emissaries Benjamin Franklin and John Adams to help persuade the government of Louis XVI to send additional troops and supplies to aid the colonists. Lafayette arrived back in America in April 1780 with the news that 6,000 infantry and six ships of the line, would soon arrive from France. In 1781 he conducted hit-and-run operations against British commander Lord Charles Cornwallis across Virginia, trapping him at Yorktown in late July.

A French fleet and several additional American armies joined the siege, and on October 19 Cornwallis surrendered.

In 1824 Lafayette accepted an invitation from his old friend Pres. James Monroe to visit the United States, where he was received with adulation. Crowds by the thousands greeted him, and he was lauded in cities across the land. Lafayette became the first foreign citizen to address the U.S. House of Representatives, which he did on December 10, 1824.

Lafayette died in 1834 and, in accordance with his wishes, was buried with dirt from Bunker Hill that he and his son had collected during his last trip to America. In 2002 Lafayette became the fifth person in U.S. history to be granted honorary citizenship.



Elijah Luce Born: 23 June 1746 Died: 29 October 1819


One of 7 siblings, four brothers and two sisters, Elijah Luce was born in 1746. Elijah married Lydia Cleveland and together they had six children. Many years after Lydia's passing, Luce married Love Cleveland. Together, he and Love had a daughter, Mary Luce, who would go on to marry Kohn Barnard Opin. Mary Luce is Allan's 2nd Great Grandmother.

Elijah Luce commanded the Massachusetts Privateer Brigantine *Eagle*. In May of 1778 the *Eagle* was captured by HMS *Portland's* tender, three short months after the *Eagle* had been commissioned.





Steven Graves (pictured above) spoke on Lord Dunmore's Proclamation.

When Royal Governor Botetourt died suddenly in 1770, a replacement was needed, and rather than wait for someone to be dispatched from England, Lord Dunmore was sent to Virginia from New York.

Dunmore's Proclamation, is a historical document signed on November 7, 1775, by John Murray, 4th Earl of Dunmore, royal governor of the British Colony of Virginia. The proclamation declared martial law and promised freedom for slaves of American revolutionaries who left their owners and joined the royal forces.

On this day in history, November 14, 1754, Mercy Otis and James Warren are married. Mercy Otis Warren became one of the first female authors in the United States.

She was an advisor on politics and a correspondent with such people as John Hancock, Patrick Henry, George Washington and John Adams. Mercy's 3 volume "History of the Rise, Progress, and Termination of the American Revolution" became one of the first published works about the American Revolution and also one of the first works published by a woman in America. *******

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
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Mercy published liberty and anti-British themed poems and plays during the years leading up to and including the American Revolution, but never under her own name, which would have been highly unusual for a woman at the time. Instead, she used pen names. Her understanding and insight into politics was unusual for a woman in that day as well, since politics was considered to be the realm of men only.

In 1790, she published her first book using her own name, "Poems, Dramatic and Miscellaneous."

In 1788, Mercy published "Observations on the new Constitution," under the pen name "A Columbian Patriot." This work was critical of the new Constitution. Both she and her husband were anti-Federalists and did not trust centralized power in the new government.

Massachusetts Privateer Brigantine Eagle was commissioned on 10 March 1778 under Commander Elijah Luce of Boston, Massachusetts. She was listed as having a battery of eight guns and six swivel

guns and a crew of forty-five men. Her \$5000 Continental and £4000 Massachusetts bonds were signed by Luce and by John Hinkley and Dimond Morton, both of Boston.¹ Josiah Arnold served aboard as First Lieutenant.²

Eagle was captured by HMS *Portland*'s tender (Captain Thomas Dumaresq) in the West Indies on 16 May 1778. She was listed by Vice Admiral Young as a 60-ton brig, with eight guns and a crew of thirtynine men at her capture. Admiral Young notes she was sailing out of Boston and was owned there. She had a cargo of provisions and war material and was sent in to Antigua, in the British West Indies.³ Luce was committed to Forton Prison at Gosport, England on 20 October 1778. He was pardoned for exchange on 11 December 1779.⁴



- I. Sophienburg Museum & Archives This important stop is the ideal place to do a quick review of German influence on Texas History and Culture. It's located at 401 West Coll Street and operates Tuesday through Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Admission fees are \$8.00 per adult, \$4.00 for students and \$2.00 per person for children ages six through 12.
- II. New Braunfels Conservation Society This stop will allow you to walk down streets among original buildings preserved in perfect condition from the early immigration days. "Old Town at Conservation Plaza" is the one stop, see it all event. It's located at 1300 Church Hill Drive and the museum is operational Tuesday through Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. Operating hours are 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays, and this is the best part; Tours are free.
- III. Gruene Historic District The town of Gruene, Texas, is just across the Guadalupe River and this stop is a whole town of old historic homes and businesses, which are now filled with specialty shops, wineries, antiques, art work, pottery, restaurants and Gruene Hall, the oldest dance hall in Texas.
- IV. Landa Park and Golf Course This beautiful 51 acre natural park and eighteen hole municipal golf course is located in the near downtown area at 110 Golf Course Road. It is filled with wild life, majestic trees, historic monuments, brooks and streams as well as a miniature golf facility. Also, for a small fee, you may take a miniature train for a scenic ride around the park. The park is filled with an abundance of playground equipment and paddle boats abound on the head waters for the Comal River, the nation's shortest river. Admission and self guided tours are free.

- V. *Naglin's Bakery* If you have a sweet tooth, then this is a must stop at 129 South Seguin Avenue. Austin, Texas—Jesús F. de la Teja, Ph.D. is the Chief Executive Officer of the Texas State Historical Association.

"Frank" de la Teja was TSHA President 2007-2008 as he concurrently served as the inaugural Texas State Historian (2007-2009). For seventeen years, July 1997 to April 2014, de la Teja was the book review editor of the Southwestern Historical Quarterly, responsible for hundreds of reviews of scholarly books on Texas and the Southwest. He has written numerous books and articles on history and contributed research articles to the Quarterly. His most recent book is Faces of Bexar, a Early San Antonio and Texas. Perhaps one of his greatest legacies is shared with his wife, Magdalena H. de la Teja, Ph.D. Together they have established the Catarino and Evangelina Hernández Research Fellowship to support further research in Latino history in Texas. Named a TSHA Fellow in 2001, de la Teja has demonstrated remarkable abilities in research and knowledge as he has published extensively on Spanish, Mexican, and Republic-era Texas. He participated on the content development team for the Bullock Texas State History Museum. In addition, he is a recipient of the Americanism Medal from the Daughters of the American Revolution, a Fellow of the Texas Catholic Historical Society, and a member of the Philosophical Society of Texas and of the Texas Institute of Letters. Always eager to use new ways to promote Texas history, de la Teja delivered TSHA's inaugural Texas Talks, an interactive distance-learning program. He welcomed the opportunity to share his knowledge of Texas history. The celebrated historian is not from Texas; he was born in Cuba and raised in New Jersey. He earned both his bachelor's degree in political science and his master's degree in Latin American history from Seton Hall University. When he came to Texas to earn his doctorate in colonial Latin American history from The University of Texas at Austin, his interest in Texas history began. An instructor recommended de la Teja as a researcher for novelist James Michener, who was then writing Texas. He worked for Michener for more than two years. Retired since 2017, he loves to share his passion for Texas history De la Teja's scholarly passion for Texas history coupled with his acquired knowledge of the inner workings of TSHA will serve him well as he joins Chief Historian Walter L. Buenger in leading the Association

FALL LEADERSHIP OCTOBER 2018




September 28th, Friday. Louisville, KY Sons of the American Revolution, Brown Hotel. Twice a year I got to Louisville, KY for Leadership meetings.




SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT AUGUST 24-26, 2018
















BROADSIDES

President General (2009-2010) Judge Edward F. Butler Sr. of San Antonio was awarded the DAR's highest honor, the DAR Medal of Honor, in March.



from their homes in Acadia, Canada and moved to Louisiana by the English. To that mix, he added native Americans and free men of color. Soon after the arrival of Bernardo de Gálvez in New Orleans in late 1776, a steady flow of Spanish army reinforcements began arriving from Spain. Carlos plan was to reinforce Cuba, Puerto Rico and other bases in the "American Sea"

powder to the colonists. By year's end he had shipped \$70,000 worth of gunpowder. In that directive, he was also instructed to send secret commissioners to the English colonies. These commissioners were to collect information.

A Royal Order dated December 24, 1776, instructed all Spanish officials, including the Governors of Havana and Louisiana, "to quickly supply the 'Americanos' with count of Galveztown.

He was also made Governor and Captain-General of Louisiana, with a salary of 10,000 pesos per year for the duration of the war.

Further, he was authorized by the king to place a crest on his coat of arms with the words "Yo Solo", meaning that he alone was responsible for the victory at Pensacola. To England, the loss of Pensacola meant loss of current Louisiana). He started with a force of 667 men, which included 170 veteran Spanish soldiers; 330 Spanish recruits newly arrived from México and the Canary Islands, and an assortment of Cubans, Dominicans, Puerto Ricans, militiamen, free Blacks and Mulattoes, and 7 American volunteers, including Oliver Pollock. Part of the force traveled in a flotilla of four



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




GOLD GOOD CITIZENSHIP MEDAL




YOUTH LUNCHEON


AWARDS



About the SAR Library

The SAR National Headquarters, Genealogical Research Library, and SAR Center are located at 809 West Main Street in Louisville, Kentucky.

The need to establish a Library for the National Society was recognized by the founders of the Society, who specified provisions in the Constitution for the acquisition and preservation of Revolutionary War records, documents, and relics.

From 1889 until 1926, the Society acquired 225 books, which were kept by the Secretary General or Registrar General. On March 1, 1926, the Society established a Washington, D.C., Registrar General's office at 609 Hill Building at Seventeenth and I Streets N.W. This office contained the "permanent records of the Society membership and genealogical records and reference library." The 1927 Congress in Richmond, Virginia, approved plans to purchase the Sixteenth Street Headquarters Building. With that came the creation of the first Library Committee, and by 1933, the collection was up to 914 books. The collection continued to grow over the next few decades.

In 1978, the SAR purchased the South Fourth Street building in Louisville as its headquarters. Over the next year the second floor of the building was redesigned to accommodate a fully functional Library. It officially opened its doors to the public on January 17, 1979, and included a professional staff. In 1988, a 544 square-foot book vault was added to the floor space of the Library, and the collection had grown to approximately 25,000 items. During this time the microfiche and microfilm holdings also grew.

In October 2010, the Library began operations in its new facility on West Main Street in Louisville's historic Museum District.

Located on the north side of the mezzanine in the Library is the Mary & James S. Craik Special Collections Room which features museum quality pieces relating to the early history of the Unites States and the American Revolution. Dr. James Craik was George Washington's personal physician and the room features a James Craik miniature, a piece of Martha Washington's wedding gown, and silhouettes of George and Martha Washington, ca. 1797. The room may also be used for other exhibits.

The Library's growth depends upon cash gifts as well as donations of family genealogies, American Revolutionary War histories, county and state histories, and other books and items of genealogical content. Donors should check the Library catalog to ensure the item is not a duplicate or check with the Librarian. They must also complete a donor gift form available at the Library and at Leadership and Congress meetings. Each book donated is given a bookplate with the name of the donor. Members, chapters and state societies are encouraged to provide memorial funds to purchase memorial books to honor deceased members. Members are also encouraged to join or donate to the Friends of the SAR Library (FOL), the monies of which are deposited in the Library Endowment Fund and Library Special Operating Fund and used to purchase non-budgeted items.

The primary focal point of the collections is the Revolutionary War era but the collection includes other materials of a genealogical nature. To date the library collection has grown to over 55,000 items and includes family histories, local, county and state records and genealogy materials, and access to the online databases of Ancestry, Heritage Quest, Fold3, and the New England Historical and Genealogical Society. The online catalog allows you to see what is available.

The SAR Library is a non-circulating, reference facility only. The SAR Library does not sell any of the books listed in its catalog, nor does it loan them out.

The Library is open to the general public for a nominal fee of five dollars per day. Free use of the library is provided to Friends of the SAR Library (FOL); SAR members and their spouses; and members of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), Children of the American Revolution (C.A.R.), and Sons of the Revolution (SR).

The Friends of the SAR Library (FOL) was organized to assist the SAR Library in fulfilling its collection development objectives. These objectives include those books, manuscripts, microforms, and online services needed to enhance and expand the current collection.

FOL membership dues are distributed as follows:

- 60% to the Library Endowment Fund, from which only the interest income may be used by the Library, and,
- 40% to the Library Special Purpose Operating Fund.
- Income from these funds is used to purchase non-budgeted items such as equipment, supplies, new technology, in addition to books, manuscripts and microforms.
- Recognition programs of the Library for donations above \$25 include:
 - Robert Morris Benefactor for a one-time contribution of \$2,000 or more.
 - Library Endowment Fund Contributor for gifts of \$500 or more.
 - Benjamin Franklin Subscriber for gifts of \$300 or more from an individual, Chapter, State Society, or non-SAR organizations.
 - These monetary gifts are also invested by the Society. Benjamin Franklin Subscribers and Robert Morris Benefactor monies are deposited in the Library Special Purpose Operating Fund; Endowment Fund Contributor monies are deposited in the Library Endowment Fund.
