Robert Rankin - Our Namesake

Lieutenant Robert Rankin served in the Third Regiment of the Virginia line of the Continental Army in 1776. His participation in the battles of Germantown, Brandywine, Stony Point, and the siege of Charleston earned him the commission of Lieutenant, which he received on his release as a prisoner of war.

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
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He continued to serve until the war's end. After the war, he served in the Virginia legislature as one of nine trustees for the newly established town of Washington, in Bourbon County, Kentucky. He also served as an elector to the Kentucky Senate in 1792.

Robert Rankin was a friend and ally of Sam Houston during the war for Texas Independence. He was instrumental in maintaining good relations with the Indians, in the spring of 1836, during the Texan retreat toward San Jacinto.





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Robert Rankin was born in Colonial Virginia in 1753. On October 1, 1781, he married Margaret Berry while on military furlough. Four of his sons served in the War of 1812. On November 13, 1834, he received land grants in Joseph Vehlein's Colony in Texas. He was issued the necessary certificate of character on November 3, 1834, by William Grimes.

The town of Coldspring, Texas, was founded on Lieutenant Rankin's original land grant. Robert Rankin died November 13, 1837, in St. Landry Parish, Louisiana.

In 1936, his body was re-interred at the State Cemetery in Austin. Robert Rankin was a soldier, patriot, and good citizen.

Sons of the American Revolution Charter New Katy Chapter

Katy, TX - - The Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, met on the evening of April 10, 2002, at the Cinco Ranch Golf Club to establish a new chapter for the Katy area. Attending the ceremonies, in addition to the members of the new chapter, were officers of the Texas state society, a representative of the national society, and officers and members of the other society chapters in the Greater Houston area. The new chapter will be called the Robert Rankin Chapter # 62, Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

The chapter honors Robert Rankin, a cousin of George Washington, who fought throughout the Revolutionary War. He served as both an officer and enlisted man and participated in all the major battles. He wintered with the army at Valley Forge and was present at the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown. After the war, he and his family moved to western Virginia, now Kentucky, and helped to establish the town of Washington. He and other veterans established the Cinncinatus Society to provide aid to impoverished Revolutionary War veterans and their families. The Rankins relocated again to Mississippi Territory and finally to Mexican Texas in the early 1820's. While in Mississippi, he and several of his sons served with distinction under General Andrew Jackson in the War of 1812. After arriving in Texas, he received a land grant from the Mexican government and settled in the area that is now Cold Spring, Texas, northeast of Houston. Robert Rankin was highly regarded as a statesman and man of honor by Anglos, Mexicans and Indians. He was a personal friend of Sam Houston. During the Texas Revolution, General Houston asked Robert Rankin to intercede with the Caddo and Cherokee tribes in East Texas to persuade them to remain neutral during Texas's Revolution. Mr. Rankin was able to accomplish this task, which assisted Houston's victory at San Jacinto. Robert Rankin died in 1837, at the age of 83. He was buried in the family cemetery in Cold Spring. In 1936 in connection with ceremonies of the Texas Centennial, he was re-buried in the State Cemetery in Austin with full honors. While there are 48 known Revolutionary War veterans buried in the state, Robert Rankin is the only officer and the only one buried in the State Cemetery.

Attending the meeting on the 10th were two descendants of Robert Rankin, Dan Taylor of Tomball and Sue Zann Myers Boone of Richmond. Mr. Sam Houston, IV, a descendent of General Sam Houston and recent recipient of the Lifetime Service Award from the Sons of the Republic of Texas, was also in attendance. In a presentation given by Mr. Taylor and Ms. Boone about their ancestor, Ms. Boone thanked Mr. Houston for a personal service done by the General on behalf of Robert Rankin's widow in 1837. General Houston insured that Mrs. Rankin received the full share of her late husband's bounty land from the Republic for his services during the revolution. This gesture illustrates these historic personages were real human beings with warmth and concern for their fellow man, not just characters from a history book.

The Honorable James Robertson, State President, Texas Society of the Sons of the Revolution, installed the new officers of the Robert Rankin Chapter and presented the chapter's charter to the new Chapter President, Ed Raines. Other chapter officers are Kameron Searle, Vice President; Hank Maupin, Secretary Treasurer; Richard Shanks, Genealogist; Charles Miller, Sergeant-at-Arms; Gus Mistrot, Chaplain; and Allan Henshaw, Chancellor.

The Sons of the American Revolution is a patriotic society open to all descendants of veterans of the American Revolutionary War and to descendants of persons that materially aided the founding of the United States of America. The programs of the society promote patriotism in the community by working with the school systems, scouting associations, and others via oration and paper competitions leading to scholarship awards. They also present awards and certificates of achievement to recognize members of the community, whose efforts promote patriotism and the values of our Founding Fathers. Robert Rankin: A Revolutionary War Officer Who Joined The Westward Migration to Texas

During his lifetime Robert Rankin saw the birth of two republics, helped found at least two towns and helped write one state's first constitution. He was born in Virginia in 1753 to William Robert Rankin and Mesena (Peggy) Marshall Rankin. Peggy's brother, Thomas was the father of John Marshall, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. At the age of seventeen Robert began to learn surveying from his uncle, Thomas Marshall, and from George Washington on the Fairfax estate. In Aunt May Myers Callaway's papers, she says specifically that family tradition has the young Robert accompanying the older George Washington and Thomas Marshall on surveying trips throughout the northern neck of Virginia. I do not yet know her source. At the age of twenty-three, on July 26, 1776, he enlisted in the Seventh Virginia Infentry as a private. Robert Rankin participated in the battles of Germantown, Brandywine, Stoney Point, the siege of Charleston and Yorktown. For a time he was in John Marshall's company at Valley Forge.

We know certain things about his military service. Robert Rankin entered the Virginia Seventh as a private on July 26, 1776. He served as a private under the command of Colonel Hugh Stevenson of the Virginia Line during the battles of Brandywine and Germantown and while at at Valley Forge he was in John Marshall's company. The Revolutionary War Service Records of the Continental Army list him as being paid \$10.00 per month on February 1779 while serving as a sergeant in Captain Charles Porterfield's Company in the Seventh Virginia Regiment Commanded by Colonel Daniel Morgan. These same records further state that he was promoted to Ensign on July 4, 1779. Although the rank of Ensign is no longer used by the U.S. Army, during the Revolutionary War an ensign had the responsibility of carrying the flag. Since the battle of Stoney Point began on July 16, 1779, only twelve days after Robert's promotion, we can make a reasonably safe assumption that Robert Rankin, then a newly promoted Ensign, carried the colors at the Battle of Stoney Point.

In January 1780, during the Siege of Charleston, he became a Lieutenant. While at Charleston, he served under Major General Benjamin Lincoln and was with him on May 12 when Lincoln surrendered his 5,500 men command to the British General Henry Clinton in order to save the city of Charleston from further destruction. On July the first, 1780 the Revolutionary War Service cards show that Robert Rankin was commissioned as a Captain Lieutenant. At that time this rank was given to the First Lieutenant in a battalion having the greatest seniority. It is no longer a recognized rank in the U.S. Army. At the surrender Robert Rankin along with his Uncle Thomas Marshal, became prisoners of war. They remained prisoners until they were exchanged later that year. On his release Rankin was given a two month furlough during which he traveled home to marry his sweetheart, Margaret Berry, of Frederick County, Virginia, on October 1, 1781. Margaret was the daughter of Captain Frances Kendall Berry. In due course, Robert was called back to active service at Yorktown where he was serving once more with Major General Lincoln when General Lincoln, acting as General Washington's deputy, accepted the sword symbolic of surrender from Cornwallis' second in command, Lieutenant Colonel Robert Abergrombie.

At the war's close Robert was one of the Virginia line officers who formed the original membership of the Society of the Cincinnati. This organization was formed to honor George Washington, to provide for the wounded and the widows of the Revolutionary War veterans, and to perpetuate the friendship of officers of the Continental army. Robert Rankin was one of those who signed the parchment roll. Not everyone did.

I found some inconsistencies in the dates in Robert Rankins activities while confirming the research material available to me. For example:

In 1780 Colonel Thomas Marshall was sent to Kentucky by government administrators to look over the land set apart by the government for Virginia Line Officers for their services in the army during the war. Marshall was accompanied by Daniel Boone, Robert Rankin, and a David Rankin. I cannot identify David Rankin, but the name also appears on the monument at the San Jacinto battleground. The date 1780 bothers me. Rankin did make the trip. He was in the Siege of Charleston. He was a Prisoner of War and did marry Margaret Berry on October 1 1781. He was also at Yorktown. All of these are confirmed facts and yet there are several references to the trip. The dates seem to overlap in a way I do not understand. A little more research is needed here.

In 1784, Robert Rankin and his family moved to a part of Kentucky that was then a part of Virginia. When they moved, they did so with a great many Virginia line officers and their families. These families included the Marshalls, Scotts, Keiths, Randolphs, Washingtons, and Ishams, all of which settled on land granted to them for services previously rendered during the war.

Two years later in 1786 Robert Rankin was named by the Virginia Legislature as one of the nine trustees of the town of Washington, Bourbon County, Kentucky. Bourbon County became Mason County. The first county court met in the Rankin home in May 1789. Rankin, Edmond Lyre and Daniel Boone, were some of the trustees elected. Aunt May indicates in her papers that she believes Rankin selected the name for the town. I do not yet know her source.

Three years later Rankin served as a delegate from Mason County to the Danville Convention which drafted Kentucky's first constitution. He also became an elector of the Kentucky Senate in 1792, the first year Kentucky was a state. The Mason County Kentucky Court House Deed Book 1789-1810 records numerous land transactions by Robert Rankin. His uncle, Thomas Marshall, was the county clerk at this time. Additionally, the deed book records other forms of contracts and reveals that Robert Rankin apprenticed himself to Richard Soward for four years as an apprentice hatter while the lived in Mason County.

The last mention of Robert Renkin in Mason County Kentucky is in the 1800 densus.

Catherine Sims in her June 6, 1982 article in the Baytown Sun says the Rankins moved to the Mississippi territory in 1804. The New Handbook of Texas, Volume 5, published in 1996 gives a different date saying they moved to Logan County Kentucky in 1802 and to the Tombigbee River in the Mississippi Territory in 1811. Aunt May Callaway says they moved in 1808. Whatever the date, they did move, and they did build their home on land that would eventually become Washington County Alabama.

In the War of 1812 Robert and three of his sons, John Keith, Joseph, and James served with distinction. Joseph, along with 400 other American soldiers, was massacred at Fort Mims by the Creek Indians.

The family suffered a severe financial reversal around 1819-20. probably in conjunction with land speculation and the panic of 1819.

In 1828, now an old man of seventy-five, Robert Rankin finally applied for his Revolutionary War service pension.

In 1832 the family moved to Joseph Vehlein's colony along with the William Butler and Peter Cartwright families. Rankin was issued a certificate of character by Jesse Grimes on November 3, 1834.

This certificate reads:
 Municipality of Austin
 November 3, 1834

I certify that Robert Rankin, a native of Virginia of the United States of the North, is a man of good moral habits and industrious and a good citizen and friendly to the laws of religion of the country.

Given at the instance of the party interested.

Jesse Grimes, Primary Judge
Municipality of Austin

The original can be found in the Spanish archives in the General Land Office in Austin.

On November 13, 1834, he applied for a land grant to George Antonic Nixon, agent for the colony of Joseph Verlein. This original application, in Spanish, is also in the General Land Office. In it Rankin stated that he arrived in Texas in 1834 with his wife and three orphans. While we do not know whether or not these children were orphaned members of the extended Rankin family. We do know, from May Callaway's letters, that two of these orphans died.

He received title to a league and a labor on October 30, 1835. The town of Cold Springs, in San Jacinto County, is located on the original land grant.

He was a friend of Sam Houston and his influence with the Indians of the region was well known to all. Houston is said to have called upon Rankin in the spring of 1836 to encourage neutrality among the Indian tribes during the crucial retreat of Anglo Texan settlers just prior to the battle of Sam Jacinto.

Toward the end of 1836 Robert Rankin became ill and moved, along with his wife Peggy, to Saint Landry Parish, Louisiana, where he died at age 84 on November 13, 1837. His body was brought back to the family home near Cold Springs in the new Republic of Texas, and buried in the old Butler Cemetery.

Robert Rankin was clearly a man who kept growing and planning for the future. He was, after all, seventy-five years old when he came to Texas to start a new life and build a new home near some of his sons.

Robert Rankin's story is so typical of the many, many who weren't satisfied to stay in the East but rather recognized the challenge and the attendant opportunities that came with moving West again and again. So long as there remained a new west to settle, they moved on until death overtook them or they had to "settle in".

On February 24, 1936 a State Marker was placed on Robert Rankin's grave in Cold Spring, San Jacinto County. More that 100 decendents were present. On Sunday, June 16,1939, the only officer of the Continental Army of the American Revolution to be buried in Texas was interred in Austin at the Texas State Cemetery, the official burial ground of the state's illustrious dead.

Colonel Carmiechael was responsible for the ceremonial arrangements. The Reverend Charles F. Smith, a pioneer Methodist minister and a cherished family friend from Brandon, Mississippi gave the official prayer, a copy of which is attached. Among the Texas

descendants of Robert Rankin listed in the official news release are Judge B. Hansbro and Judge William McMurray of Cold Spring, Dave and Carl Rankin of Portland, Eldridge Rankin and Mrs. Frank Tuscany of Fort Worth, Mrs. Alexine Pitts of Roscoe, Rev. Charles Martin Myers of Rosenberg, Robert Covey of San Antonio, Wendell Fields, F.E. Stanaker, May Myers Callaway and Lee Rankin of Houston.

Direct descendants acted as pallbearers at the Austin services. They included Wendell Fields, Jr. of Houston, Frank Stanaker of Houston, Mr. Covey of San Antonio, Eldridge Rankin of Fort Worth, Frank Tuscany, Jr. Of Fort Worth, and Ned Williams of Ennis.

This was a man who lived major portions of his life in four communities, each quite distant from all of the others. It is through the impact he had on the quality of life in these four locations that his real character and sprit is revealed. In Virginia, as a proud youth, he was among the first to volunteer to fight for the freedom of the colonies from an oppressive foreign government. In Kentucky, as a newly wed leader of his family, he sensed the need for strong, fair local government and became active in the creation of a new state constitution. In Mississippi, and later Alabama, as he saw his children mature into adulthood and start families of their own, he was ready and, at age near fifty years, promptly departed with his boys to once more defend the country from British imperialism. And finally in his declining years, at an age exceeding eighty, he was sought by a personage of no less stature than Sam Houston for council and advise immediately before moving his small but dedicated Texan Army south for its decisive encounter with Santa Ana at San Jacinto.

Certainly it should be easy for one to recognize why the many, many proud descendants of this single American Revolutionary War veteran look upon his contributions as a an effective model against which they should measure the way they are living their own lives.

HE ALSO BECAME AN ELECTOR OF THE KENTUCKY SENATE OF 1792. THE LAST MENTION OF ROBERT IN MASON COUNTY, KENTUCKY, IS IN THE 1800 CENSUS.

IN 1602. THE RANKIN FAMILY MOVED TO LOGAN COUNTY, KENTUCKY, THEN TO MISSISSIPPI TERRITORY ON THE TOMBIGBEE RIVER IN 1811, AN AREA WHICH BECAME WASHINGTON COUNTY, ALABAMA. FOUR OF THE RANKIN SONS FOUGHT IN THE WAR OF 1812. THE RANKIN FAMILY SUFFERRED A SEVERE FINANCIAL REVERSAL AROUND 1819-20. PROBABLY IN CONJUNCTION WITH LAND SPECULATION AND THE PANIC OF 1819. IN JULY, 1828, ROBERT FIRST MADE APPLICATION FOR HIS REVOLUTIONARY WAR SERVICE.

IN 1832, THE RANKINS MOVED TO JOSEPH VEHLEINS COLONY IN TEXAS, ALONG WITH THE WILLIAM BUTLER AND PETER CARTWRIGHT FAMILIES. ROBERT WAS ISSUED A CERTIFICATE OF CHARACTER BY JESSE GRIMES ON NOVEMBR 3, 1834, AS REQUIRED BY THE MEXICAN GOVERNMENT. ON NOVEMBER 13, 1834 HE APPLIED FOR A LAND GRANT IN VEHLEIN'S COLONY AND RECEIVED A LEAGUE AND A LABOR IN OCTOBER 22, 1835. THE PRESENT TOWN OF COLDSPRINGS, SAN JACINTO, TEXAS IS LOCATED ON RANKIN'S ORIGINAL GRANT. ROBERT HAD THE REPUTATION OF BEING A JUST AND DIPLOMATIC MAN. HE WAS A FRIEND OF SAM HOUSTON, AND HIS INFLUENCE WITH THE INDIANS IN THE REGION WAS WELL KNOWN. HOUSTON REPUTEDLY CALLED UPON ROBERT IN THE SPRING OF 1836, ASKING HIM TO ENCOURAGE NEUTRALITY AMONG THE INDIANS DURING THE CRUCUAL TEXAS RETREAT TOWARD SAN JACINTO. TWO OF HIS SONS SERVED IN THE TEXAS ARMY, AND DAVID WAS LISTED ON THE INSCRIPTIONS ON THE SAN JACINTO MONUMENT AS BEING IN THE BATTLE, AS HE WAS ON DUTY GUARDING THE BASE CAMP.

TOWARD THE END OF 1836, ROBERT BECAME ILL, AND HE AND HIS WIFE MOVED TO SAINT LANDRY PARISH, LOUISIANA. WHERE HE DIED AT THE AGE OF 84. HIS BODY WAS BROUGHT BACK TO THEIR HONE NEAR COLDSPRINGS, IN THE NEW PEPUBLIC OF TEXAS, AND HE WAS BURIED IN THE OLD BUTLER CEMETERY. IN 1936, HIS BODY WAS REINTERRED AT THE STATE CEMETERY IN AUSTIN AS THE ONLY OFFICER OF THE CONTINENTAL ARMY WHO IS BURIED IN THE STATE BURIAL GROUND...

ROBERT, AT THE AGE OF SEVENTEEN, BEGAN TO LEARN SURVEYING UNDER HIS NEAR KINSMEN, THOMAS MARSHAL(WHO LATER BECAME CHIEF JUSTICE OF THE U.S. SUPREME COURT) AND GEORGE WASHINGTON(PRESIDENT). TRADITION SAYS HE COMPANIED MARSHALL AND WASHINGTON ON SURVEYING TRIPS.

ROBERT ENTERED THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION IN THE SERVICE OF THE CONTINENTAL ARMY IN 1753, AS A PRIVATE WITH THE THIRD REGIMENT OF THE VIRGINIA LINE. HE WAS COMISSIONED AS A OFFICER ON SEPTEMBER 14, 1776, AND PARTICIPATED IN THE BATTLES OF GERMANTOWN, BRANDYWINE, AND STONY POINT, AND IN THE SIEGE OF CHARLESTON, WHERE HE WAS CAPTURED ALONG WITH HIS UNCLE THOMAS MARSHALL AND REMAINED A PRISIONER OF WAR UNTIL EXCHANGED, AT WHICH TIME HE RECEIVED A PROMOTION TO LIEUTENANT OF TROOP DESIGNATED AS 7TH VIRGINIA, 1776. IN STEVENSON'S REGIMENT, CAPTAIN JOHN MARSHALL'S CO.

ON OCTOBER 1,1781, DURING A FURLOUGH, ROBERT MARRIED MARGARET BERRY IN FREDERICK COUNTY, VIRGINIA. THE SILVER BUCKLES WORN BY MARGARET ARE NOW IN THE POSSESSION OF DESCENDANTS OF JOHN KIETH RANKIN. HE RETURNED TO ACTIVE DUTY ON OCTOBER 15 AND SERVED UNTIL THE WAR'S END. LISTED AS COLONEL IN REVOLUTIONARY WAR. SERVED DIRECTLY UNDER GENERAL GEORGE WASHINGTON AS A CAPTAIN AND WAS WITH GENERAL WASHINGTON AT THE SURRENDEROF CORNWALLIS AT YORKTOWN.

AT THE CLOSE OF THE WAR, ON OCTOBER 6, 1783, HE WITH A LARGE GROUP OF VIRGINIA LINE OFFICERS MET WITH GENERAL GEORGE WASHINGTON AND FORMED THE SOCIETY OF CINCINNATI IN THE STATE OF VIRGINIA. THIS SOCIETY WAS FORMED TO PERPETUATE THE FRIENDSHIP OF OFFICERS TO THE CONTINENTAL ARMY AND AID THE WOUNDED AND WIDOWS OF FELLOW OFFICERS. ROBERT GAVE ONE MONTH'S MILITARY SALARY TO BECOME AN ORGINAL MEMBER SIGNING HIS NAME AS FEW DID. GEORGE WASHINGTON WAS MADE THE FIRST PRESIDENT-GENERAL OF THE SOCIETY AFTER THIS GATHERING. LISTED IN "ROOSTER OF REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS AND PATRIOTS IN ALABAMA" AS RESIDENT OF WASHINGTON CO., ALLIT SRD REGULAR VA LINE; ENROLLED ON 9/8/1828 UNDER ACT OF CONGRESS OF 5/15/1828. PAYMENT FROM 3/3/1828

THE RANKIN FAMILY MOVED TO KENTUCKY IN 1784 ON A GOVERNMENT LAND GRANT WHILE IT WAS STILL PART OF VIRGINIAT, ALONG WITH MANY RELATIVES.. IN 1786, ROBERT WAS NAMED BY THE VIRGINIA LEGISLATURE AS ONE OF NINE TRUSTEES FOR THE NEWLY ESTABLISHED TOWN OF WASHINGTON, IN BOURBON COUNTY (LATER MASON COUNTY), KENTUCKY.

He was an original member of the Society of the Cincinnati, organized by General George Washington. Colonel Rankin received a land grant in Kentucky in 1789. He had two brothers, William and Christopher. The following article was printed in 1936, by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

On July 26, 1776, when Robert Rankin was 25 years of age, he enlisted in the Continental Army. He served first as a private, then Ensign, later Lieutenant in the Virginia troops, under Captain Thomas Berry. He took part in the battles of Brandywine, Stony-point, Germantown, and the siege of Charleston, where he was taken prisoner. He remained in prison until exchanged, after which he returned home on furlough, then returned to the army and served until the end of the war.

He fell in love with his captain's daughter Margaret (Peggy) Berry, and on October first, 1781, Lieutenant Rankin and Captain Thomas Berry, with their troops on the move, rode by the Berry home in Virginia and he and Margaret were married. (Silver shoe buckles which were worn by Robert Rankin at his wedding to Miss. Berry, are now in the possession of Claire Covey Carver, Mrs. Arthur R. Carver, Palestine, Texas). After the wedding Lieutenant Rankin and Captain Thomas Berry rejoined their troops and were with General George Washington at Yorktown when Cornwallis surrendered.

The following is the will of Captain Thomas Berry, dated 20th. February, 1805:

In the name of God amen. I, Thomas Berry of the County of Fredrick and state of Virginia, being far advanced in life and infirm in body, but of sound mind and memory calling to mind the certainty of death and the uncertainty when it may happen do make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following:

Ist. I commend my soul to the Almighty and beneficent God who gave it and my body to the earth to be decently buried at the discretion of my executors herein after named.

2nd, I give and bequeath to my beloved and affectionate wife Frances Kendell during her natural life or widowhood all my estate both real and personal, which I die, possessed or be entitled to within the State of Virginia.

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After paying my just debts, which I may owe at my death and the legacies herein after mentioned.

3rd. Whereas I have heretofore given to my daughter Peggy Rankin, wife of Col. Robert Rankin, one Negro boy and one Negro girl which gift I hereby confirm, the Negro boy named Wilford and the Negro girl named Milley, now in her possession.

4th., Whereas I have heretofore given to my daughter Betsy Calmes, one Negro boy named Moses, now in her possession, which gift I hereby confirm to her and further I give and bequeath to her and her heirs one Negro girl named Mariah.

5th., Whereas, I have heretofore given to my son Joseph Berry and opportunity of procuring to himself advantages in Kentucky at a considerable expense to myself, which could not at the time be offered to my other children, I therefore deam it fully sufficient or as much as I ought, in justice to my other children, to give him, but in consideration of the affection I have for his children I do hereby bequeath to his said children one moretly? of a tract of land on the north fork of Licking Mason County Kentucky which was purchased by my friend Edward Doblyne for me from Col. John Grant, it being part of Bartletts preemption. I also give and bequeath to my said son Joseph's children two negros to wit: one Negro man named Moses and one Negro man named Wilmore, to be held in trust for their use and benefit by his sons Joseph and Samuel Berry, reserving the use of the said negros for the support of the said Joseph Berry's wife during her life or widowhood should she live longer than her husband and remain a widow but should she marry again the reservation for her support in this bequest to cease and on her death or marriage it is my will that the Negroes hereby devised shall be equally divided among the children of my said son Joseph, legally begotten.

6th., Whereas my son in law John Kercheval, husband to my daughter Jane hath been unfortunate in trade by which he had become much embarrassed, I therefore give and bequeath to the children of my said daughter Jane Kercheval one Negro girl named Patience and her increase to be equally divided among them to be held in trust by my grandsons Thomas B. Kercheval and Lewis C. Kercheval for the use and benefit of their mother during her life, on whose death the division aforesaid shall be made among the children.

7th, Whereas my son William Berry from accidents and bodily afflictions is rendered unable to procure a comfortable living by his own

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industry and exertions and having it in my power to make such provision for him as will with prudence and care and the blessing of God enable him to live independent and clear of wont, I do therefore hereby bequeath to him the other morety of land: on the north fork of Licking in Mason County, Kentucky purchased for me by my friend Edward Dobyns from Col. John Grant: I do further give and bequeath to him one Negro man named Ambrose now in his possession also one Negro girl named Mary and her 8th, Whereas I gave to my daughter Sally Kerman, wife increase also. of William Kerman a tract of land in Kentucky Lying on the brushy fork of ------- which hath been conveyed to her husband by a special power from me for that purpose, which gift and conveyance I hereby confirm to her and her heirs forever and whereas I put into the possession of my said daughter Sally, wife of William Kerman, a Negro girl named Lucy which Negro girl it is my will and desire shall be free at the age of twenty five years, but I reserve to myself the exclusive right to all the children she may have previous to her arising to the age of twenty five years, all of which is to be considered as a part of my undivided estate until the death of my wife who is. to have the direction of them during her life or widowhood except the first she has which I hereby give and bequeath to my granddaughter Fanny Kerman. I further give to my said daughter Sally one Negro boy named Nelson and one Negro girl named Delphia which she now has in possession.

9th, Whereas I have heretofore given to my son Samuel Berry a Negro boy named Hampton which gift I hereby confirm to him, I further give and bequeath to him eighty pounds to be paid to him or his heirs by my executors of the first money which they may be able to raise out of my Estate after paying my just debts.

10th, I give to my daughter Caty Berry one Negro boy named Juboy, also one Negro girl named Clarly and her increase, also a good feather bed and furniture and a riding horse.

Ith, I give and bequeath to my daughters Peggy Rankin, Betsy Caines (could be Calmes), June Kercheval, Catly Berry and my son Samuel Berry the residue of my tract of land on the brushy fork of Henchston in Kentucky patented in my name to be equally divided among them according to quantity and quality to them and their heirs forever. It is further my will and desire that all the rest of my lands in Kentucky which I may die seized or possessed of not herein devised shall be equally divided in the following manner, to-wit:, one eighth part to my daughter Peggy Rankin and her heirs, one eighth part to the children of my daughter Jame Kercheval with the reservation of the

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use of said lands to my said daughter Jane Kercheval during her life, one eighth part to my son William Berry and his heirs, one eighth part to my daughter Sally Kerman and her heirs, one eighth part to my daughter Caty which several parts I hereby give to my said children and grand children herein mentioned to them and their heirs forever my further will and desire is that the balance of my estate herein left to my wife during her life or widowhood, shall at her death or marriage be divided as follows, one eighth part to my daughter Betsy Calmes and her heirs, one eighth part to the children of my son Joseph Berry and their heirs, one eighth part to my daughter Jane Kercheval's children and their heirs, reserving the use thereof of such part to her use during her life, one eighth part to my son Samuel Berry and his heirs, except the Negroes and in lieu of which I hereby direct my executors to pay him the value of his proportion of the Negroes to be estimated by persons mutually chosen by my son and my executors which money shall be raised by a sale of any part of my estate that my executors may deem most advisable,

12th, and whereas, I some time since gave to my grand daughter Matilda Kercheval, daughter of Jane Kercheval, a Negro girl named Charity and her increase which gift I hereby confirm to my said grand daughter and her heirs, it is my further will and desire that should any dispute arise between any of the divisees in this my last will and testament and my executors or between the divisees in this my last will and testament and my executors or between the divisees themselves that the dispute shall be settled, reference to impartial and disinterested persons should anyone of the divisees herein refuse to submit such dispute to reference of the offer of the other and resort to law to obtain what him or her might deem right all the right of him or her shall immediately cease to any part of my estate and such forfeited part shall be equally divided among the remaining divisees.

And lastly, I do hereby appoint my beloved wife Frances Berry my executor of this my last will and testament hereby revoking all other wills by me made no security required of any of the above named administrators. In Testimony, whereof I have here unto set my hand and affixed my seal this 20th day of February in the year of our lord one thousand eight hundred and six.

Thomas Berry

Later Robert Rankin became one of the original members of the _ Society of Cincinnati. This Society was organized by General George

Washington to perpetuate friendship between brother officers of the Continental Army, and to assist widows and orphans of the war. Robert Rankin gave a month's military salary as his fee for joining the Society of Cincinnati.

With his young wife, Lieutenant Rankin (later in life he was always referred to as Colonel Rankin) joined with other Virginia Line Officers and their families and journeyed to Kentucky to take up their large land grants, which were provided by the United States Government to Virginia officers.

In Mason County, Kentucky, Robert Rankin built a home, and it was in his home, on May 26, 1789, that the first County Court was held. History tells that Daniel Boone was present at this first Court. The Marshalls were close relatives of Robert Rankin-Robert's mother being a Marshall. Robert Rankin was a member of the Convention that formed the first Constitution of Kentucky.

In 1804, Robert Rankin's very real spirit of adventure came to the fore. He took his family, and with a large group of neighbors and friends, pioneered to Mississippi Territory to that part which later became Washington County, Alabama. Robert's brother, Christopher, later became one of Mississippi's outstanding statesmen.

Three of Robert Rankin's sons, Joseph, James and John Keith, served in the War of 1812. Joseph was among the more than 400 who were massacred by Creek Indians at Fort Mimms in 1813.

On September 8th, 1828, Robert Rankin received his first pension from the Revolution as an officer, a sum of \$2,880, followed by an annual payment of \$320 for the rest of his life.

The new country of Texas was calling for colonists, offering many inducements. In 1819, Robert Rankin's son, Frederick Harrison Rankin, went to Texas. He returned home and married, and went back to Texas in 1822, to receive one of the first grants in Harris County. This is the Frederick Rankin survey, east of the city of Humble. The present Rankin road was named after him. Frederick Rankin was one of Stephen F. Austin's Three Hundred. Other Rankin boys pioneered to Texas, and began writing back

home to their father, urging him to come out to Texas. At that time, Robert Rankin was 80 years of age, but his love of adventure was still alive, so he answered the call.

Colonel Robert Rankin came to Texas in 1833, and immediately applied to the Mexican Government for land. His original application in Spanish is on file in Austin. He received title to his land on October 30 1835, consisting of a league of land in the Vehlin Colony, which was known as Liberty Municipality, then as Polk County, and is now San Jacinto County. The town of Čold Spring is located on the Robert Rankin Survey, and much of this land is still owned by descendants of Robert Rankin and his wife, Margaret (Berry) Rankin. His son James Rankin married Mary Jones, niece of Oliver Jones, who was the designer of our Lone Star flag of Texas. He received a land grant north of, and adjoining the grant his father had received.

Rumblings of revolution were soon heard in Texas. The colonel was too old to take an active part in the Texas Army, but he was sympathetic in every way. His home was only a short distance from "Council Hill," where Sam Houston met with men of mature minds and broad experience, and at these gatherings Colonel Rankin's experience as an officer under Washington was felt in words of advice. He and Sam Houston were neighbors and friends.

Colonel Rankin died in 1837, living long enough to help establish the Republic of Texas. He was buried in Coldspring Texas. He was the only officer of the Continental Army to die and be buried in Texas. His grave at Cold Spring was so marked by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

In June of 1936, at the instigation of the Texas Centennial Committee, Colonel Rankin's body was removed from Cold Spring burial ground and reentered in Austin in the State Cemetery, the "Arlington" of Texas. His grave is near the grave of Stephen F. Austin.

CAPTION

CONSTITUTION of Robert Rankin Chapter, No. 62, Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

PREAMBLE

We, the members of the Robert Rankin Chapter, No. 62, Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, in order to provide for the governance of our Chapter and thereby promote fraternal and social intercourse among ourselves, hereby adopt this Constitution for our Chapter.

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this Chapter was chosen by action of the membership at a meeting on the 20th day of March, A. D., 2002, Robert Rankin Chapter, No. 62, Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, and shall henceforth be so known.

ARTICLE II - SITUS

The situs of the Robert Rankin Chapter, No. 62, Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, shall include Harris and Fort Bend Counties, Texas. The business address shall be that of the Chapter's Post Office Box, in Katy, Texas, unless changed by the Board of Directors or by the Chapter at a regular meeting.

ARTICLE III - PURPOSES

The purposes of the Robert Rankin Chapter, No. 62, Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, shall be to promote and accomplish the objectives of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution and of the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution, Inc., and no action or effort not embraced in these objectives shall be espoused by said Chapter. All activities of the Chapter shall be confined to the objectives for which the National Society and the Texas Society, as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws of each, were formed; and no member of this Chapter shall be committed to or be bound by any action outside of the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution or of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution, Inc.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

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Any man who is a member in good standing of the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution, Inc., shall be eligible for membership in this Chapter. In addition to the dues required to be paid to the Texas Society and the National Society, each member of this Chapter shall pay to its Treasurer, as annual Chapter dues, such sum as may be fixed by the Chapter's Board of Directors, and each member shall be required to pay an assessment to defray the expense of any meeting that he may attend, if called upon to do so. Any member who becomes delinquent in payment of dues to the Texas Society and National Society, or to this Chapter, shall thereby become suspended and shall not take part in the meetings of the Chapter.

ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

This Chapter shall hold at least two regular meetings in each twelve (12) month period, at times to be fixed by its By-Laws, the last of which meetings, at which officers shall be elected for the ensuing year, shall be held no less than thirty (30) days before the annual meeting of the Texas Society. Special meetings of the Chapter may be held at the call of the President or the Board of Directors; or the Secretary of the Chapter shall call a special meeting at the request of five (5) or more members. All meetings of the Chapter shall be held in the Kingwood/Humble area, and arrangements shall be made by those at whose instance the meeting is called for the accommodations of same. No member of the Chapter who is in good standing shall be denied admittance to a meeting

ARTICLE VI - QUORUM

Unless otherwise provided in this Constitution, a quorum for the transaction of any business at a regular or special meeting of the membership of this Chapter, including the taking of any action affecting the standing of a member or officer, or disposing of the property of the Chapter, shall require the presence of at least 6 members in good standing or 30 percent of all members in good standing, whichever is less.

ARTICLE VII - RULES

Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be used at all meetings as a parliamentary guide, except as may be otherwise provided in the By-Laws of the Chapter.

ARTICLE VIII - OFFICERS

The officers of this Chapter shall be a President, one or more Vice Presidents, as provided for in the By-Laws of the Chapter, a Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Chancellor or Parliamentarian, Genealogist, Historian, Chaplain, and Sergeant-at-Arms. The duties of officers of the Chapter shall be such as is usually incumbent upon such officers, but the Chapter may, in its By-Laws, increase or change their duties. The offices of Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Genealogist, and Chancellor, or any two of these, may be held by the same person. The Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian, and Chancellor may, with the consent of the Board of Directors, appoint an assistant, who must be a member of the Chapter and who may, with the consent of the presiding officer, in the absence of the Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian, or Chancellor (respectively), act for that Officer at meetings of the Chapter.

ARTICLE IX - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

In addition to the officers provided for in Article VIII of this Constitution, all past Presidents of this Chapter as well as Assistant officers, in good standing in the National Society, Texas Society, and this Chapter, shall compose the Chapter's Board of Directors, of which the President of the Chapter (or the President Elect, in order of seniority, if the President is absent or unable to serve) shall be the presiding officer, provided that if a past President is also a current officer, he shall have only one vote. The Board of Directors shall have general supervision and control of the business and activities of the Chapter, subject only to the action of the Chapter at a regular or special meeting.

ARTICLE X - ELECTIONS

Officers of this Chapter shall be elected by a majority vote of the members present and voting, provided not less than 6 members, or 30 percent of the entire membership, whichever is less, are present and provided further, that all members have been notified of the election date and place not less than ten days before. Officers to be elected shall be members in good standing of the National Society and Texas Society and of this Chapter, and when they, for any reason, cease to be members in good standing of these, or any of them, their offices shall thereby become vacant. Vacancies in office shall be filled by appointment by the Board of Directors until the next election and the successors of those appointed have been inducted into office.

ARTICLE XI - OBLIGATIONS

This Chapter shall create no indebtedness for its members to pay.

ARTICLE XII - RELIEF

The Board of Directors, or the Chapter, at a regular meeting, may for a specified time or indefinitely, for such reasons of financial necessity as may be deemed proper, or for other just cause, waive payment of annual dues to the Chapter by a member.

ARTICLE XIII - DISCIPLINE

Authority is hereby given the Board of Directors of the Chapter, in the exercise of its discretion, to discipline, suspend, or expel any member, or remove any officer, who by conduct disloyal to the ideals and/or prejudicial to the interests of this Chapter, or the Texas Society, or the National Society, shall render himself unworthy of membership therein or unfit to hold office. It is provided, however, that the disciplinary authority hereby given may not be exercised except on the conditions that the accused shall have had due notice and an opportunity to be heard; that no less than five members of the Board, concurring, can discipline, suspend, or expel a member; that the accuser or accusers must present to the Secretary a written charge at least ten days prior to the meeting which shall hear the charge or charges, and the accused must be sent a copy of the charges at least seven days prior to the Board meeting. Further, any member disciplined or officer removed by the Board may appeal from such action to the next regular or special meeting of the Chapter.

ARTICLE XIV - TERMS

No person can hold office provided for in Article VIII of this Constitution for three (3) consecutive terms, but such person may be elected to a different office at the will of the membership; provided, however, that the persons holding the offices of Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Chancellor, Genealogist, Historian, Chaplain, and Sergeant-at-Arms may be re-elected term after term at the will of the membership.

ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

Amendments or additions to, or proposals for repeal of, any or all provisions of the Constitution and/or By-Laws unless such amendments or additions or proposals for repeal shall have been proposed at a previous regular meeting, notice that same will be presented for action shall be given to all members in good standing, by mail, by the Secretary, at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting at which same are to be presented. The consent of a majority of the members of the Chapter, in good standing, shall be necessary to amend or repeal, or to make additions to, any or all provisions of the Constitution of this Chapter, but any or all provisions of its By-Laws may be amended, repealed, or added to by an affirmative vote of at least 25 percent of the membership in good standing. Each member, in advance of the regular meeting at which same are to be presented for action, may vote on amendments or additions to or proposals to repeal any or all provisions of the Constitution or By-Laws of the Chapter by written ballot, signed by him, by delivering his ballot to the Secretary of the Chapter.

BY-LAWS

Robert Rankin Chapter, No. 62

Texas Society

Sons of the American Revolution

ARTICLE I - MEMBERSHIP

- SECTION 1. A man cannot be a member of this Chapter unless he is a member in good standing of the National Society and Texas Society.
- SECTION 2. Each application for membership in this Chapter must bear the written endorsement of three members of the Chapter before being presented to the Registrar for action. Thereafter the Board of Directors must approve said application for membership before final acceptance.

ARTICLE II - MEETINGS

- SECTION 1. Regular business meetings of the Chapter shall be held during the months of February and September of each year, and special meetings may be called pursuant to Article V of the Constitution of this Chapter. The Secretary shall notify all members, by mail, of the time, date, and place of all meetings at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting date unless the Board of Directors shall direct otherwise. The hour for all meetings shall be seven o'clock in the evening unless otherwise directed by the Board of Directors.
- SECTION 2. The Board of Directors shall determine the place for each regular meeting and make arrangements for its accommodation.
- SECTION 3. In inducting new members the ceremony prescribed by the National Society shall be followed as closely as practicable.
- SECTION 4. The ceremony for each regular meeting, and for special meetings as far as practicable, shall be as follows:
- (a) Prior to convening, the meeting room shall be clear, but the needed chairs, tables, and other furniture and fixtures shall be in place. (b) Before taking their seats all members shall repeat the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and the Pledge to the S.A.R. Following this shall be the invocation by the Chaplain. Next, if desirable, the members, still standing, will sing the National Anthem (or the first verse of it). Then the President, using his gavel, will call the meeting to order and all members will be seated. The flag will remain standing in a holder during the meeting.
 - SECTION 5. The order of business at all regular meetings shall be as follows:
- (a) At the last regular meeting of the year, at which officers will be elected, the order of business shall be as follows:

Calling the Roll of Members Report of the President Report of the First Vice President Report of the Second Vice President Report of the Secretary Report of the Treasurer Report of the Genealogist/Registrar Reports of Other Officers Report of Standing Committees Report of Special Committees Induction of New Members Election of Officers Unfinished Business **New Business** Entertainment, Ceremonial Programs and Addresses Adjournment

(b) At other regular meetings the order of business shall be as follows:

Calling the Roll of Members
Report of Standing Committees
Report of Special Committees
Induction of New Members
Unfinished Business
New Business
Entertainment, Ceremonial Programs, and Addresses
Adjournment

SECTION 6. All business of the Chapter shall be conducted at regular meetings, or at special meetings called for the specified purpose.

ARTICLE III - ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND DELEGATES

SECTION 1. Nominations: Not less than thirty (30) days prior to the regular meeting at which officers are to be elected, the Board of Directors shall nominate candidates for officers of the Chapter. The Board shall nominate one candidate for each office of the Chapter, and deliver its report to the Secretary, who shall forthwith mail to each member a copy of same. Such nominations shall not preclude nominations by members of the Chapter who may make such nominations from the floor at the election meeting of the Chapter.

SECTION 2. Voting: If there be more than one candidate for an office, the voting at the election meeting shall be by secret ballot. If there be more than two candidates for an office, and no one candidate has received a majority of the votes cast, all candidates but the two receiving the highest number of votes cast shall be dropped, and the vote then taken on those two candidates. If there be only one candidate for an office, the President may call for a vote thereon in any way recognized by Parliamentary law.

- SECTION 3. **Delegates:** At the election meeting each year the Chapter shall elect delegates to the annual meeting of the Texas Society, and reasonable care shall be taken that they be ones who will attend the annual meeting of same.
- SECTION 4. **Induction:** Officers shall be inducted into office at the meeting at which they are elected, or at the next regular meeting, and this shall be done in accordance with the standard induction ceremony prescribed by the National Society Sons of the American Revolution, in the presence of the attending members. Thereupon each officer shall receive from his predecessor the portfolio of the office and begin his duties. If called upon by the members present, the officer may deliver a short address. The retiring President shall deliver the gavel to his successor and shall make a short address, and the latter will be expected to respond.
- SECTION 5. Insignia for President: The Board of Directors is hereby directed, from Chapter funds, to purchase the ceremonial badge prescribed by the National Society for chapter presidents within sufficient time before the annual meeting at which the officers of the Chapter are elected so that such ceremonial badge may be presented to the newly elected President immediately upon his induction into office.

ARTICLE IV - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

The duties of the officers of this Chapter, other than those usual under parliamentary law for the respective officials, shall be such as elsewhere provided in the Constitution and these By-Laws, and in the following sections of this article:

- SECTION 1. President: The President shall appoint all standing committees and such special committees as he deems necessary. He shall announce to the Chapter at meetings, or direct the Secretary to do so to the members by mail, all actions and decisions of the Board of Directors. He shall represent the Board of Directors in all its dealings. He shall countersign all checks written on funds of the Chapter.
- SECTION 2. **President Elect:** The President Elect shall fill the office of President of the Chapter when the President is absent or unable to act. In matters other than presiding at meetings, however, he shall act only if the matter will not reasonably await the return of the President or his renewed ability to act. Unless by Special Vote of the Chapter Membership, The President Elect will assume the Office of the President upon completion of his Term as President Elect.
- SECTION 3. Secretary: The Secretary shall have custody of all papers, books, files, and property of the Chapter, except such as pertain to the duties of other officers, and have same available for use of the Chapter at all meetings, or as it may direct. He shall keep the minutes of all meetings and present them for approval at the next regular meeting of the Chapter, after which he shall enter them in the minute book. Such minutes shall show the names of all members present at the meetings and the actions taken and other performances at same. This letter is in response to your correspondence dated November 14, requesting affirmation of your organization's exempt status.

In August 1944 we issued a determination letter that recognized your organization as exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. That letter is still in effect.

Based on the information supplied, we recognized the subordinates named on the list your organization submitted as exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Code. 



The USS Stark Memorial Award, authorized in 1988 (revised 2003), was established to memorialize those brave men and women who continue to stand at the forefront to preserve the freedoms our patriotic ancestors fought so long and hard to achieve. Its purpose is to recognize outstanding chapters and the most outstanding state society within the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution for their participation with the Veteran community, and supporting activities of the NSSAR Veteran's Committee.

The reporting period for the USS Stark Award competition is January 1 through December 31 of the previous year, the Contest Year. Total points for a participating chapter or society should be reported to the NSSAR Veterans Committee Chairman and Executive Director no later than February 1. This form must be completed for this competition. Supporting documentation may be asked for.

Awards will recognize the most active state society and/or most active chapters. One first place streamer and certificate award for Chapters will be offered by membership size: 1 to 49, 50 to 99, 100 to 199, over 200, and a first place award for State Societies will be offered by membership size: under 1,000 and over 1,000 members (will be judged using weighted equation on a per member basis). A USS Stark Streamer is awarded to the winner of each Chapter category and one State. A first place award may not be won for two consecutive years. An Honorable Mention Streamer may possibly be awarded at the discretion of the Veteran's Committee.

In 2002 the NSSAR authorized the creation of the SERVICE TO VETERANS Medal to be presented to the individual Compatriot that has supported the Veteran's program and is able to document 5000 points of support to our Veterans, using the point scale of the USS Stark Contest. An individual may count points for the LAST five years, BUT only the points that pertain to the current calendar year may be reported on the USS Stark Memorial Competition for the current year.

Note: Each submitter (Chapter or Society) may be requested to substantiate some categories. If you need to provide additional information use blank sheets of paper and attach to form. If you do something with the Veterans that is not listed above, please let chairman know so that it may be considered as a new item to include for points

Use caution in choosing the correct operating system for your computer. In addition, make sure you check for updates by going to the Adobe website or by opening up Reader, clicking on HELP and then click on "Check for Updates".

<u>BEFORE</u> starting this NSSAR Enhanced JROTC Program Nomination Form, follow the "Save" instructions.

Use the "Click to Save to Your PC" button. Add the Cadet's Name to the front of the Saved file Name.

For example, "George Compatriot Enhanced JROTC Form.PDF".

The folder you save the document in is your choice. Just remember where you saved it.

Click to Save to Your PC

Click to lookup your Zip+4 Code

Once saved, please <u>CLOSE</u> this page and <u>OPEN</u> the saved File on your PC to Continue.

Special Notice regarding a Failure to Complete an SAR PDF Form Successfully. The most frequent complaint that is received centers on the inability to fill-in forms successfully and save the completed form. Such a problem usually occurs because (1) Instructions are not followed. (2) The computer you are using does not have an authentic copy of <u>Adobe Reader</u> installed on it. (3) The computer you are using has not been programmed to associate PDF files with your authentic <u>Adobe Reader</u> software. And/or (4) the user does not realize that Microsoft Windows 10 uses Edge as the default internet browser.

To correct the inability to fill-in any Form correctly, we advises you to take the following steps, knowing that the first two steps will solve most problems. Steps to follow: (1) Open the form you want to use. (2) Immediately, save the PDF file to your computer with a file name such as <u>MY Form.pdf</u>. Make sure you remember what you named the file and where you saved the PDF file on your computer. (3) Open your newly named file and fill it out, following the instructions. (4) Once you have completed and saved the Form, you can attached the file to an email. It is important that you use an authentic copy of <u>Adobe Reader</u>, preferably version XI or later as your default PDF reader.

Please be aware that some computer software manufactures install alternative software instead of the <u>"FREE" Adobe Reader</u>. While these PDF viewers will open and let you read almost all PDF files / forms, they will NOT allow you to complete or fill in a PDF fillable Form. Again, let me say it is crucial that one's computer has an authentic copy of **Adobe Reader**, preferably Adobe Reader XI or later.

Notice we stated <u>"Authentic" Adobe Reader</u>. We did not say PDF Pro 10, which is not an authentic Adobe PDF reader—it is a cheap imitation reader bundle with some computers just so you think your system can do all things. Other PDF Readers that are not an <u>"Authentic" Adobe Reader</u> include Sumatra PDF, Nitro Reader, Foxit Reader, PDF-XChange, and PDF Preview for Microsoft. By now we trust you have gotten the point that you must have an <u>"Authentic" Adobe Reader</u>, preferably version XI or later, to complete or fill in a PDF Form.

Please ensure that <u>Adobe Reader</u> is the default PDF reader by verifying that it has been "associated" properly by following these instructions (Using Windows 10 as the Example): On the left end of the taskbar, Right click on the "Start Icon". Left click on "Search" and then at the very bottom type in "Default Programs". Then select "Choose a Default App for each type of file".

This will give you a screen that on the left gives you the file name like ".docx" for Microsoft Word. Scroll down until you find ".pdf" – Adobe Acrobat Document. The associated file type on the right should say "Adobe Acrobat Reader DC" – if you have the latest FREE version. If it does not say Adobe Reader but says Microsoft Edge or some other program, then Left Click on the file name and choose Adobe Acrobat Reader DC. If you are using the recent free Windows 10 software, know that your browser is EDGE and not Explore. The Edge and Explore icons look alike but on close examination it is not so. Edge does not work currently with certain PDF files, especially Adobe created files. The cure is to download Mozilla Firefox or Google Chrome or reinstall Explorer. Windows 10 does not tell you that Explorer is in the Windows 10 bundle, but it is there. Many feel that it is simpler to download Mozilla Firefox or Google Chrome than to uncover where Explore is hidden. The Bottom line – the Edge Browser will not work with PDF fillable forms. So download Mozilla Firefox or Google Chrome and use it.

If the default software used by your computer to read Acrobat (PDF) files is something other than Adobe's Reader, you can choose to open them with Adobe Reader anyway - this allows you to take advantage of fillable forms, hyperlinks, buttons and other features that Acrobat (PDF) documents often contain. To ensure that you are opening an Acrobat file (PDF) in **Adobe Reader**, first find the file in your computer. Instead of double clicking to open the file, you should right-click on the file instead. This will open a small action menu. Look down the list of options for a selection named "open with". If you hover over that selection, it will expand to show a list of options for opening the PDF. You should left click on **Adobe Reader** in the list. Your PDF will now open the the program it was intended to be used in. NOTE: This will not change the defaults of your computer. It will only use **Adobe Reader** this one time.

Mac users have also informed us that Apple has its own program to open Adobe Reader files. One problem in using OS X Preview to fill in form fields is that the filled in forms will probably not be viewable on a Windows system. They tell me the solution is to change the "Open With" default application to "Adobe Reader". You might also want to do an internet search on your favorite search engine like "Google" using the phrase "adobe reader for pdf files on a mac" to give you more information. You might also want to do an internet search for the phrase "how to configure Mac OS X to open PDF files with Adobe Reader". It has been suggested that to configure Mac OS X to open PDFs with Reader or Acrobat, do the following, but there may be other options:

- 1. Click the PDF file's icon in the Finder to select it.
- Choose File > Get Info.
- Click the triangle next to Open With.
- Choose "Adobe Reader" from the Open With menu (if it's not on the list, choose "Other" to select it).
- 5. Click Change All.

If you have followed the above instructions and still have a problem with PDF files and fillable forms, please contact the National ROTC/JROTC & Service Academies Liaison

The ROTC/JROTC Committee has oversight of the Chapter and State Society level ROTC/JROTC programs. The Committee conducts the National Society's ROTC/JROTC program and selects the winner of the National Society's award to the most outstanding JROTC Cadet and the first runner-up. The committee also serves as liaison with the United States Service Academies.

Instructions for the Senior Military Instructor

In order to enter this recognition program, the Senior Military Instructor must nominate an outstanding JROTC Cadet, using the Enhanced JROTC Program Nomination Form.

We are following the same guidelines as to the number of cadets from each school as we do for the Bronze ROTC Medal Program, namely we allow one cadet for JROTC units with fewer than 500 cadets. For larger units, one cadet may enter for each 500 students enrolled in the unit. Moreover, where a school has more than one JROTC unit, each unit is counted separately.

Questions regarding this program or assistance in completing the form can be addressed by email or phone call to the Committee Chairmen as listed toward the bottom of the Enhanced JROTC Program Nomination Form.

Senior Military Instructor's Checklist for the Enhanced JROTC Program Follows:

Place a "X mark" beneath "Yes" if true Is the Cadet enrolled in the JROTC Program? 2. Is the Cadet a High School Junior Student? Is the Cadet in the top 10% of his/her JROTC Class? (requires verification by the SMI) Is the Cadet in the top 25% of his/her High School Class? (requires verification by the Principal) Has the Cadet completed an original essay, of 500 to 700 words? The topic is - "How JROTC has prepared me to be a better citizen of the United States of America". Is the essay doubled spaced and contain a computer generated word count at the end of the essay? Does the first page contain the "Topic Title" as shown in #5 above, Cadet's name, rank, unit's name, and the name of the High School? The cadet's name should also appear on the upper right corner of each page. Is the Principal's Endorsement/Recommendation attached, with a verification statement concerning the cadet's "GPA", and Class Standing? Have the Recommendations/Comments of the Cadet's leadership potential been provided by the Senior Military Instructor and the JROTC Class Standing? Have all the above items been recorded on the SAR Enhanced JROTC Program Nomination Form?

"Hints for Success"

- 1. A typed essay is required
- 2. The SMI should complete the Nomination Form with input from the cadet
- 3. All lines of the Nomination Form should have an entry.
- 4. Be specific; list what the cadet has done (general comments do not assist your cadet). The more information you provide so we can learn about your cadet the better.
- 5. List the facts and accomplishments avoiding flowery adjectives. <u>Descriptions using just a few words do not carry much weight. We are looking for more information about the cadet, even if it requires the submission of additional pages.</u>

- 6. List awards earned i.e. Varsity Letter Football, All District Tennis, All State Chorus, VFW Medal
- 7. Ensure the cadet is a Junior (11th grade)
- 8. Ensure the cadet is in the 3rd year of a 4 year program or 2nd year of a 3 year program
- 9. Strong Endorsements (Recommendations) by the Principal and SMI are critical, example: full page recommendation by the Principal may score 10 points, where Principal's verification of class standing (Top 25% of his/her Class) and GPA (only) may score 2 points.

SMI Endorsement must verify that the Cadet is in the Top 10% of JROTC Class along with Recommendations/Comments of the Cadet's leadership potential.

For Schools that qualify to nominate more than one Cadet, there must be separate letters from the Principal and the SMI for each cadet Nominated.

- 10. Describe accomplishments like one was justifying a military medal, not the words for the citation.
- 11. Spelling and/or grammatical errors will detract from the total points awarded.
- 12. How the judges will look at your Nominee.

Endorsements from the School Principal and the Senior Military Instructor (Max 20 PTS).

Max Points 10: Principal's endorsement w/verification of class standing (1 PT) and GPA (1 PT). A letter fully describing his endorsement and why, up to a maximum of (8 pts)

Max Points 10: Senior Military Instructor's endorsement attached. SMI Endorsement must verify that the Cadet is in the Top 10% of JROTC Class (1 PT) and include Recommendations/Comments of the Cadet's leadership potential and describe his endorsement, up to a maximum of (9 PTS).

Max Points 10: Content and Flow of Essay.

Max Points 10: Grammar and Spelling.



My merry band and I sprinkle a little patriotism and American revolutionary history to the NAC students. Ever since the NAC program was created 13 years ago I have made one or more presentations on American History each and every year. With me this year is John Thompson and Mary Thompson who portray Ben and Debroah Franklin and Ginny Evans who portrays Betsy Ross. John is an engineer holding multiple patents; both Ginny (Lamar CISD) & Mary (Aldine ISD) are retired school teachers.

Compatriot Jackson make three separate presentations. The first is Who Are We and Why Do We Wear These Clothes. I show the pictures of the four Presidents with Texas connections and the seven Texas Governors, all of whom became members of the Sons of the American Revolution. 




Paul Revere Chapter #19 Tuesday, January 8, 2019



As a Major, Granberry was captured by Union troops in February of 1862. After an officers' exchange that same year, he was promoted to Colonel upon his return to duty. Granberry saw action in Louisiana and Mississippi was wounded at Chickamauga and saw further action at Missionary Ridge. He eventually commanded his own brigade and became Brigadier General in early 1864. He served in Cleburne's division of Gen. Johnston's Army of Tennessee and led his troops in General John B. Hood's invasion of Tennessee. It was at the battle of Franklin in late1864 that Granberry was killed in action. First buried near where he fell, his body was reinterred near Columbia, Tennessee and in 1893, twenty-eight years after the end of the war, his remains were brought to the Texas city named in his honor.

Granbury is the county seat of Hood County -named after Granberry's commanding officer. Hood County sits in a cluster of Texas counties named after Confederate generals Cleburne, Gregg, and Johnson.

The statue on the <u>courthouse</u> lawn was imported from Italy while the base was furnished by <u>Waxahachie</u> monumentalist James Youngblood. It was erected in 1913.

Inspired by these three decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day - the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 - was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30th, 1916. While Flag Day was celebrated in various communities for years after Wilson's proclamation, it was not until August 3rd, 1949, that President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th of each year as National Flag Day.

The idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the Flag is believed to have first originated in 1885 with school teacher BJ Cigrand. On June 14, 1892 the New York SSAR celebrated Flag Day. On June 14 of the following year the Pennsylvania SSAR helped Philadelphia schoolchildren to celebrate. Franklin K. Lane, Secretary of the Interior, delivered a 1914 Flag Day address in which he repeated words he said the flag had spoken to him that morning: "I am what you make me; nothing more. I swing before your eyes as a bright gleam of color, a symbol of yourself."



In November, the CFVD Ladder 2 crew was dispatched to a fire alarm at the Days Inn Hotel on Huffmeister Road. As the crew raced to the fire, the call was upgraded to a structure fire. The crew arrived first on the scene of the three-story hotel.

Captain Nicholas Buonarosa assumed command of the fire. As the Ladder 2 crew investigated, Engineer-Operator Carlos Lopez reported smoke on the second floor of the hotel. Lieutenant Michael Tamborello and Firefighters Collin Greuter and Firefighter Xavier Moreno then found the room with the fire.

When the firefighters attempted to enter the room, they were met with a chair and large suitcases blocking the door. They encountered smoke along the floor and moderate heat in the room. As the firefighter performed a search of the room, one notice hair on the bed under the bedcovers. The crew found an unresponsive female who they removed from the room and began treating with oxygen. The resuscitated woman soon began talking while under the care of the crew. She was transferred to a medic unit for transport to the hospital where she recovered.



What better way to pay homage to our constitution than by recognizing our First Responders who help preserve the spirit of this document. Today, we honored Investigator Shannon Hewett of the Cypress-Fairbanks ISD Police Department as the Chamber's September First Responder honoree.

In the summer of 2018 Investigator Shannon Hewett was tasked with the assignment of creating an interactive summer camp opportunity for students in Cypress-Fairbanks ISD. As such Investigator Hewett created the Cypress-Fairbanks I.S.D. Police Department's first ever Junior Police Academy. The CFISD Police Department hosted two Junior Police Academies during the summer of 2019. The JPA was a full-day learning experience specifically created for 9 and 10 year old students within our district. Camps were held Monday-Friday 7:00 am-3:00 pm each day at Cypress Ridge High School and then at Cypress Springs High School. In total 96 Cypress-Fairbanks ISD students participated and were served.

Investigator Hewett enlisted the help of 15 CFISD police officers to serve as mentors who interacted with each student on a personal level. The focus of each Academy was not only to familiarize our students with careers in law enforcement, but to also encourage global citizenship, respect for others, and foster positive interactions between the police, students, parents and the community we serve. Throughout the process, leadership and team building skills were emphasized, as well as a focus on integrity, equality, respect and problem-solving skills. Physical fitness was an integral part of the daily instruction, as well as safety, anti-bullying and first aid. The success of this year's first ever CFISD Police Department's Junior Police Academy undoubtedly was a result of Investigator Hewett's "Can Do" attitude and her passionate commitment to the students of CFISD. As a result of her efforts the CFISD PD will increase the number of students served and plans on holding three Junior Police Academies during the summer of 2020.

I would like to speak with you today about one of our Jersey Village officers, Detective Sergeant Devron Limerick. His story is one of hard work and perseverance, which is why we are here today. In 2004, Limerick, decided to pursue a career in law enforcement and returned to college at Sam Houston State University, changing his major from business to criminal justice. From 2004 to 2006, Limerick, attended over 100 hours of classes and maintained a cumulative GPA of 4.0 over that time until his graduation in December 2006, graduating Magna Cum Laude with a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice. During 2007, Limerick, applied to numerous agencies without success in finding a job as a police officer, only to realize that it was next to impossible to get your foot in the door at a police agency without having graduated a police academy and already having a peace officer certification. In 2008, Limerick put himself through the Lone Star Police Academy, graduating in 2009 as the class Valedictorian for top academic score and Class Top Gun for the class top shooting score.

Officer Limerick distinguished himself with his hard work and received commendations multiple times ranging from donating his time to civic and charity events, changing a flat tire for stranded motorists, domestic violence and burglary investigations, to saving the life of a suicidal man who had hung himself and stopped breathing. His work culminated in being awarded Jersey Village Officer of the year in 2011.

More recently, Sgt. Limerick investigated an identity theft ring, who used the stolen identities of local citizens to purchase over a dozen cars from a local dealership, valued at approximately \$750,000. That investigation resulted in ten people receiving multiple felony indictments, but also the recovery of numerous stolen vehicles. It is for these and many other reasons, why I have nominated Sgt. Limerick for Chamber of Commerce Officer Recognition.




Edison Saunders Kyle Fritsch October 9, 2019


Inspired by these three decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day - the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 - was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30th, 1916. While Flag Day was celebrated in various communities for years after Wilson's proclamation, it was not until August 3rd, 1949, that President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th of each year as National Flag Day.

The idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the Flag is believed to have first originated in 1885 with school teacher BJ Cigrand. On June 14, 1892 the New York SSAR celebrated Flag Day. On June 14 of the following year the Pennsylvania SSAR helped Philadelphia schoolchildren to celebrate. Franklin K. Lane, Secretary of the Interior, delivered a 1914 Flag Day address in which he repeated words he said the flag had spoken to him that morning: "I am what you make me; nothing more. I swing before your eyes as a bright gleam of color, a symbol of yourself."




