


Robert Rankin Chapter #62 Meetings: Chapter, State, National

The painting above, George Washington and Lafayette at Valley Forge was painted by John Ward Dunsmore, and was published 1907. Dunsmore is known for his realistic paintings of the American Revolutionary era.

The largest collection of Dunsmore's art is at the Fraunces Tavern Museum. The Tavern, built in 1719, is best known as the site where Washington gave his farewell address to the officers of the Continental Army. It was originally built for the merchant Stephan Delancey as an elegant residence. Tavern-keeper Samuel Fraunces purchased the house in 1762 and coverted it into a most popular tavern. When the country's first capital was located in New York City the building was used to Departments of War, Treasury and Foreign Affairs.

In 1904, the Sons of the Revolution in the State of New York purchased the tavern and hired preservation architect William Mersereau to return the building to its colonial appearance. Fraunces Tavern® Museum opened to the public in 1907.







J. Kent McGaughy

Kent McGaughy (pronounced Ma-goy) is a professor of history at the Katy Campus of Houston Community College where he has taught now for 21 years. He is an Associate Chair for the Department of History and teaches a variety of courses, including a survey on Revolutionary America.

He received his B.A. in history from the University of Texas at Austin and his M.A. and Ph.D. in history from the University of Houston. In addition to writing *Richard Henry Lee of Virginia: A Portrait of an American Revolutionary*, he has published articles in *New York History*, and The *Encyclopedia of Conspiracy Theories* and has also appeared on C-Span's *Washington Journal* to discuss Richard Henry Lee as one of America's forgotten founding fathers. He is currently completing a book manuscript that shares the same title as tonight's presentation: "George Washington and the Forgotten History of the American Revolution."









Above (L-R) Allen Greene, new member Edward Semler, and Fred Jackson.






The Death of General Warren at the Battle of Bunker's Hill (painted 1786) by John Trumbull (1756 – 1843). Trumbull was a soldier of the Revolution and sketched the British works at the Battle of Bunker Hill, which he witnessed. He was a personal aide to Washington and deputy adjuntant-general to Gates. Trumbull resigned from the army in 1777.

The paiting hangs in the Boston musuem of Fine Art and depicts a charge by the British up Breeds Hill. The two details show the death of two leaders of the battle. Colonial leader General Dr. Joseph Warren is shown dying after being hit by a musket ball. In the lower insert, Major John Pitcairn, falling back dying in the arms of Lieutenant Pitcairn's, his son.







THIS DAY IN HISTORY: John Paul Jones attacks Whitehaven, England

On this day in history, April 23, 1778, John Paul Jones attacks Whitehaven, England, the only attack of the American Revolution on the British homeland and the first successful invasion of England in more than 700 years.

Jones put 30 men into two small boats and rowed toward the shore. Two forts guarded the entrance to the harbor. Jones' boat headed toward the southern fort, while the other ship headed to the northern fort. Each ship was supposed to capture its fort, then set the nearby ships ablaze.

Heavy winds caused the short journey to shore to last for hours. The sun was already coming up on the 23rd when Jones reached his fort. He quickly captured the small security force and began to spike the cannons to prevent them from being used against them on their retreat. He sent the others to burn the ships, but their only light had gone out and they were forced to get a light from a nearby house. The small force boarded the nearest ship, called the Thompson, captured its crew and set the ship on fire. The under parts of the ship were soon in flames and Jones' sailors threw "matches" made of canvas and sulphur onto other nearby ships.

Unfortunately, one of Jones' crew snuck off and warned the townspeople, who soon came running to put out the fire. Jones and his men escaped with several prisoners, but the townspeople were able to put out the fire on the Thompson before it spread to other ships. When the other boat from the Ranger landed at the northern fort, the sailors went into a nearby pub and helped themselves to the liquor. By the time they came out, the sun was already shining and their light had also gone out. Rather than getting another light and trying to set the ships ablaze, they abandoned their mission and rowed back to the Ranger.

The entire Whitehaven raid caused little damage to the British mainland in the end. It did, however, have a major impact on the British consciousness. Britons realized their island was not safe from attack and that their navy was not invincible. Great strides were made across England to strengthen harbor defenses and increase the size of local militia groups to deal with future attacks. John Paul Jones was celebrated in America after the attack, but excoriated as a villainous pirate in England. He would go on to perform other exploits in the war, including the taking of the HMS Serapis at the Battle of Flamborough Head, and be celebrated as one of America's greatest naval heroes.





Celebration of our Constitution

September 11, 2019

On September 11, 1777, the American loss at the Battle of Brandywine opened the door for the British to take Philadelphia, the American capital. President General William Howe, with 17,000 troops, opposed Washington and his 23,000 troops. Washington defended Chadd's Ford and other crossings within a few miles up and down the stream. Howe split his forces in half, with one half to oppose Washington to oppose Washington at Chadd's Ford and the other half to travel 19 miles to an undefended crossing to circle back and hit Washington's exposed right flank. The strategy worked and the Americans fought a retreating action. Had the redcoats been more aggressive, they could have destroyed the entire army and reduced the revolution to a rebellion.



I give a brief program presentation on the Battle of Brandywine, which the Americans lost, and also the forming of the Constitutional Convention, which started in September.

On September 5, 1774, the Continental Congress meets for the first time. The First Continental Congress met in response to Parliament's Coercive Acts. The delegates were stymied between a faction who advocated rebellion and those who sought reconciliation. The logjam was broken with the arrival of the Suffolk Resolves. The Resolves laid out a game plan to include an active boycott of Britain and the gathering of military munitions and supplies. The Congress agreed to meet next in May of 1775, and did so just as news of the battles of Lexington and Concord reached them.



PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 72)

"The constitutional amendment permitting a person to hold more than one office as a municipal judge at the same time."

» EXPLANATION

The Texas Constitution (Article 16, Section 40) prohibits a person from holding more than one public office at the same time but has many exceptions, including county commissioner, justice of the peace, notary public, postmaster, etc. The proposed constitutional amendment would add elected municipal judge to this list of exceptions. A municipal judge oversees pre-trial hearings, small claims proceedings, and misdemeanor cases in a city or town. Proposition 1 would allow municipal judges to hold more than one paid public office at the same time, meaning they could simultaneously preside over multiple municipalities, regardless of whether they were appointed or elected.

» ARGUMENTS FOR

- A municipal judge oversees essential local proceedings, such as pretrial hearings, small claims proceedings, and misdemeanor cases. Often smaller municipalities do not have municipal judges or attorneys qualified to serve as judges. Prop. 1 would make it easier for smaller municipalities to fill empty judgeships with qualified individuals.
- The proposition could benefit public safety by making it easier to obtain search warrants and streamlining other proceedings, such as ordinance violations, misdemeanor offenses and other types of cases.

» ARGUMENTS AGAINST

 This proposition is unnecessary as Texas law already permits a person to be appointed as a municipal judge in more than one municipality at the same time. This law would only allow a person to be elected in more than one municipality.

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 If the municipal judge were elected to a community where he or she was not a resident, he or she may not have an understanding or interest in that community.

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 79)

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$200 million to provide financial assistance for the development of certain projects in economically distressed areas."

» EXPLANATION

Proposition 2 would allow the Water Development Board to issue general obligation bonds for the Economically Distressed Areas Program (EDAP). The outstanding bonds could not exceed \$200 million. The bonds would be used to develop water supply and sewer projects in economically depressed areas of the state.

EDAP assists water infrastructure projects when the median income of a region is less than 75% of the state's median income. The proposed amendment would give the Water Development Board the money to finance water and wastewater infrastructure in economically distressed areas.

» ARGUMENTS FOR

- All citizens deserve clean water, regardless of their income. Socioeconomic factors should not determine access to safe water. It's a basic right.
- This program needs to be replenished so it can continue funding existing and future projects for communities that could not otherwise afford it.
- Financing with bonds will provide more reliable funding over a longer period of time. Using general revenue would strain limited resources.

» ARGUMENTS AGAINST

- The net impact to the general revenue fund will be \$3,375,000 through 2021.
- This is another constitutionally dedicated fund which the state should avoid. Infrastructure improvements should be funded using general revenue.
- This is a local issue and should not be handled by the state.

» WHERE AND WHEN TO VOTE

Vote early!

- Early Voting begins Monday, October 21, through Friday, November 1, 2019.
- All registered voters may vote early in person at any early voting location in their county.
- Check with your local newspaper or your county clerk or election administrator for early voting times and locations.

Where do I vote?

- Contact your County Election Official. They can tell you where you can vote.
- Use VOTEI1.org. Enter your address and find where to vote.

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PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 34)

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a temporary exemption from ad valorem taxation of a portion of the appraised value of certain property damaged by a disaster."

» EXPLANATION

Proposition 3 would allow the Texas Legislature to give a temporary property tax exemption in a governor-declared disaster area. The exemption would be 15%, 30%, 60%, or 100%, depending on the amount of property damage. The local government would choose whether or not to adopt the temporary exemption and would determine how long the exemption would last.

» ARGUMENTS FOR

- In the event of environmental disasters, a tax exemption would bring quicker and easier relief to those affected.
- Proposition 3 would be easier and more affordable for the local government than the current property reassessment process, which is both lengthy and expensive.

» ARGUMENTS AGAINST

Since Proposition 3 relies on the local government to decide whether or not to
adopt the tax exemption, it does not guarantee it will help as many people as
intended. Any such relief should be mandatory.

Though there would now be predetermined damage categories, the property
may still have to undergo an extensive reappraisal process.



"The constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of an individual income tax, including a tax on an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income."

» EXPLANATION

» ARGUMENTS FOR

- A 2019 poll by the University of Texas at Austin and the *Texas Tribune* found 71% of respondents oppose an individual state income tax.
- Texas has a low-tax, pro-growth approach to economic expansion, and that is dependent on having no personal income tax.
- This amendment could support population growth in Texas, as families and businesses may move to Texas because there is no state income tax.
- An income tax would also increase the size of government by requiring a large bureaucracy to administer it.

» ARGUMENTS AGAINST

- This amendment is not necessary because the Texas Constitution now prohibits the Legislature from imposing an income tax without a statewide referendum (Art. 8, Sec. 24, adopted in 1993). In addition, any net revenue from that tax must be used for the support of education.
- Revenue from an income tax could reduce the tax burden on businesses, which pay a higher proportion of taxes in Texas than in other states.
- The current Legislature and today's voters should not make taxation decisions for future Texans. The needs of Texans change over time, so future Texans should make their own choices on taxation.
- One reason Texans pay high property and sales taxes may be because Texas has no income tax. If Proposition 4 passed, these taxes would likely continue to increase, so Proposition 4 would not necessarily decrease the size of state government.

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PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 24)

"The constitutional amendment dedicating the revenue received from the existing state sales and use taxes that are imposed on sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Commission to protect Texas' natural areas, water quality, and history by acquiring, managing, and improving state and local parks and historic sites while not increasing the rate of the state sales and use taxes."

» EXPLANATION

Proposition 5 would require the Legislature to allocate the money raised from state sales taxes on sporting goods (i.e., hunting, fishing, outdoor equipment) to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) and the Texas Historical Commission (THC). Revenue from such taxes would be used to improve and manage state and local parks and historic sites, and to acquire new sites.

Proposition 5 closes a loophole in the current law that prevents all the revenue raised by these sales taxes from being given to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Commission, thus allowing some of the money to be used to balance the state budget.

» ARGUMENTS FOR

- State and local parks are essential to industries such as fishing, hunting, and tourism that benefit Texas economy. Proposition 5 would require the government to support this vital economic sector more fully. It would allow these agencies to make long range plans based on a reliable funding source.
- Many parks and historic sites of Texas are decaying, and new parks are needed due to population growth in the state. Proposition 5 would provide a sustainable source of funding for their preservation and new park development so they could be enjoyed in the future.

» ARGUMENTS AGAINST

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase by \$3 billion the maximum

bond amount authorized for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas."

- Having a dedicated account, a fund used for a specific purpose, eliminates budget flexibility for the Texas Legislature.
- Dedicated accounts can cause unnecessary growth of the state budget by demanding funds in one area even though needs could be greater in another.

» EXPLANATION

PROPOSITION 6

(HJR 12)

The proposed amendment would increase the maximum bond amount for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) from \$3 billion to \$6 billion. CPRIT provides grants and supports programs that advance cancer research. The organization, begun in 2007, is currently set up to receive \$3 billion in funding until 2022. » ARGUMENTS FOR

- The state is the second largest source of public funding for cancer research in Texas, behind the federal government. Increasing the bond amount would ensure that the state maintained its status as a hub for advancements in the cancer field, and continue Texas' national leadership in cancer research and prevention.
- CPRIT has created thousands of jobs and brought in more than 170 researchers, including a Nobel Prize winner, to Texas. It has generated billions of dollars of economic activity.
- Increasing the bond amount would protect CPRIT's future, because current funding for awards will run out in 2021.

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» ARGUMENTS AGAINST
 Current funding of CPRIT is in place until 2022, so the issue is not an urgent

- matter. Voters may not have to consider it right now—three years in advance. Instead the Legislature should develop a plan to make CPRIT become financially self-sufficient.
- CPRIT has a history of mismanaging funds. A ban was put on CPRIT grants in 2012, and was lifted in October 2013 after restructuring of the organization.*
- The proposed amendment would cost the government \$12.5 million in general revenue funds during the first two years, assuming debt service payments based on the issuance of this new debt.

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PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 151)

"The constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions to the available school fund."

» EXPLANATION

S Security

The School Land Board, an independent entity of the General Land Office, oversees the management, sale and leasing of more than 13 million acres of land for the Permanent School Fund. The State Board of Education can then make distributions from this fund to the Available School Fund. The revenue generated from the land is used to purchase real estate and make investments to help fund public education through the Available School Fund.

This proposition would increase from \$300 million to \$600 million the amount the General Land Office could distribute to the Available School Fund each year. Watch a short video on Prop. 7: https://youtu.be/UHA7JNAeONQ

» ARGUMENTS FOR

- This proposition will improve funding for public schools by doubling the distribution from the School Land Board to the Available School Fund.
- Were it not for the \$300 million cap in the Texas Constitution, this could have been happening already, making more money available for public education.
- As more money is available to school districts from the state Available School Fund, they should need to rely less on local property taxes.

» ARGUMENTS AGAINST

- Both the School Land Board and the State Board of Education have responsibilities for managing the Permanent School Fund. If the School Land Board makes larger deposits directly to the Available School Fund rather than into the Permanent School Fund, it changes the amount the State Board of Education is required to distribute from the Permanent School fund.
- The State Board of Education is required to make a percentage-based biennial distribution to the Available School Fund. If they have less money in the Permanent School Fund, it might result in lower overall school funding.
- In the past, the School Land Board made questionable investments at the expense of public education funding. With the opportunity to make larger contributions, it might increase the lure of debatable investments.

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 4)

"The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the flood infrastructure fund to assist in the financing of drainage, flood mitigation, and flood control projects."

» EXPLANATION

Proposition 8 would create the Flood Infrastructure Fund (FIF) as a special fund outside of general revenue. A one-time distribution from the Economic Stabilization Fund, also known as the "rainy day fund," would establish the FIF. The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) would distribute FIF funds to local governments through loans or, in some cases, as grants. The money would be used to establish and maintain flood control structures and drainage infrastructure throughout the state, especially in economically distressed areas.

If passed, Proposition 8 would require cooperation among all impacted parties. A local government would receive money from the FIF only if it worked with other governments in the region and listened to stakeholder concerns in public meetings. The local government would also have to submit a technical analysis of the plan, comparing it to other possible projects in the region, and a proposal to repay the loan.

» ARGUMENTS FOR

LWY

- Severe flooding events such as Hurricane Harvey show the necessity of being
 prepared to prevent future damage.
- Access to federal funding and grants often requires local governments to
 match the amount of money the federal government would provide. The proposed amendment would allow the TWDB to give loans to local governments
 so they could access federal funds.
- Because removing money from the Economic Stabilization Fund to create the FIF would be a one-time expense, rather than ongoing, it would not drain the "rainy day fund."

» ARGUMENTS AGAINST

- A local government could default on a TWDB loan, thereby costing the state income meant to replenish the FIF. Taxpayers might ultimately be liable for repayment of loans.
- Historically, state government has not played a heavy role in funding floodcontrol infrastructure. Flood control is the responsibility of both local and federal governments, rather than state government.
- Using money from the "rainy day fund" to establish the FIF could be inappropriate because only one-time expenses or funds for disaster response should be removed from the "rainy day fund." Because the FIF itself is an ongoing project, funds to create it should be taken from general revenue.

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PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 95)

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state."

» EXPLANATION

Texas opened a precious metals depository in 2018, run by a private company but overseen by the state government. The Constitution requires all real and tangible personal property to be taxed on its value unless exempted. These ad valorem (property) taxes are imposed at the time of purchase or exchange of precious metals. » ARGUMENTS FOR

- Other states do not tax precious metals, so creating this exemption would allow Texas depositories to be more competitive.
- The proposed amendment would increase chances that the Texas depository could join COMEX, the leading marketplace for precious metals exchange.

(SJR 32)

» ARGUMENTS AGAINST

- Texas counties do not enforce the property tax on precious metals, so a constitutional amendment is unnecessary.
- The proposed amendment gives preference through a tax break for precious metals over other investment choices.

PROPOSITION 10 "The constitutional amendment to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to a qualified

caretaker in certain circumstances."

» EXPLANATION

Proposition 10 would allow law enforcement animals to retire, and their former handlers or other qualified caretakers to adopt them with no fee. Law enforcement animals are currently considered as surplus property of the county, which means the county can only auction, donate, or destroy them. Proposition _____ would change the property laws to allow the animals to retire and be transferred to their original handler or another qualified caretaker with no adoption fee. » ARGUMENTS FOR

- Proposition 10 would ensure the wellbeing of law enforcement animals in their later years by allowing them to retire.
- Proposition 10 would remove the legally required fee for law enforcement officers, or other qualified caretakers, who generally adopt their own retired law enforcement animals.
- Proposition 10 recognizes the longstanding bond developed between a law enforcement animal and the animal's handler, a bond that would be ignored in a government auction.

» ARGUMENTS AGAINST

- Proposition 10 may reduce state income. A government auction might raise more money than the free adoption of a law enforcement animal.
- If the animal's handler retires before the animal is ready to retire, it might be difficult to determine which of the animal's handlers had priority.
- It is unfortunate that such a common sense action would require a constitutional amendment.

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TX Secretary of State Explanatory Statements for the November 5, 2019 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 72)

HJR 72 proposes a constitutional amendment permitting an elected municipal judge to serve as a municipal judge in more than one municipality at the same time. Unlike an appointed municipal judge, an elected municipal judge may not concurrently hold another municipal judge office. This amendment would allow an elected municipal judge to serve as a municipal judge in more than one municipality at the same time, in the same manner as appointed municipal judges.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting a person to hold more than one office as a municipal judge at the same time."

Proposition Number 2 (SJR 79)

SJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds, in an amount that does not exceed \$200 million, for the economically distressed areas program. These bonds can only be used to provide financing for the development of water supply and sewer service projects in those economically distressed areas as defined by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$200 million to provide financial assistance for the development of certain projects in economically distressed areas."

Proposition Number 3 (HJR 34)

HJR 34 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to temporarily exempt from ad valorem taxation a portion of certain property located in an area covered by a disaster declaration of the governor. The proposed amendment would allow the legislature to prescribe the method of determining the amount of the tax exemption and the duration of the exemption and also would allow the legislature to create any additional eligibility requirements for the tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a temporary exemption from ad valorem taxation of a portion of the appraised value of certain property damaged by a disaster."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 38)

HJR 38 proposes a constitutional amendment prohibiting the state from imposing or collecting an individual income tax, including an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income. There is no current constitutional bar on imposing or collecting an individual income tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of an individual income tax, including a tax on an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 24)

SJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would automatically appropriate the net revenue received from the portion of the state's tax revenue received on sales of sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) and the Texas Historical Commission (THC). The legislature would maintain the authority to determine the specific uses of the funds and their allocation between TPWD and THC.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment dedicating the revenue received from the existing state sales and use taxes that are imposed on sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Commission to protect Texas' natural areas, water quality, and history by acquiring, managing, and improving state and local parks and historic sites while not increasing the rate of the state sales and use taxes."

Proposition Number 6 (HJR 12)

HJR 12 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase the maximum bond amount for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) from \$3 billion to \$6 billion to be issued by the Texas Public Finance Authority. CPRIT was created in 2007 to promote and fund cancer research in Texas. CPRIT uses bond proceeds to award grants for cancer research and prevention.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase by \$3 billion the maximum bond amount authorized for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 151)

HJR 151 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions from \$300 million per year to \$600 million per year to the available school fund and also allowing the State Board of Education, the General Land Office, and other entities that manage revenue from land or other properties held in the permanent school fund to distribute certain revenue to the available school fund.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions to the available school fund."

Proposition Number 8 (HJR 4)

HJR 4 proposes a constitutional amendment creating the flood infrastructure fund as a special fund in the state treasury, using money appropriated from the economic stabilization fund. The flood infrastructure fund would provide additional resources to implement plans to mitigate flood damage. The proposed amendment would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to use money in the flood infrastructure fund for drainage, flood mitigation, or flood control projects. The proposed amendment also would authorize the creation of separate accounts in the flood infrastructure fund as necessary to administer the fund or authorized projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the flood infrastructure fund to assist in the financing of drainage, flood mitigation, and flood control projects."

Proposition Number 9 (HJR 95)

HJR 95 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to create a property tax exemption for precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state."


Proposition Number 10 (SJR 32)

SJR 32 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to allow a state agency or political subdivision to transfer a law enforcement animal to the animal's handler or another qualified caretaker in certain circumstances. Currently, the Texas Constitution prevents the transfer of certain public property, such as law enforcement animals, to a private person or organization at no cost. This amendment authorizes the legislature to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to the animal's handler or another qualified caretaker at no cost, upon the animal's retirement or at another time if the transfer is determined to be in the animal's best interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to a qualified caretaker in certain circumstances."

As one of the fifth generation of John Macombers in Taunton, John Macomber, the patriot was born in May, 1760 to John and Abigail Padelford Macomber, who were farmers and land holders in Taunton, a town in Southeastern Massachusetts quite close to Rhode Island.

In his 17th year, John enlisted in the Rhode Island Line, serving six years in the Revolutionary War, became a sergeant, and served with Lt. Col. Jeremiah Olney and in Col. Israel Angell's regiment. His battlefront career carried him to Red Bank, Monmouth, Fort Dartmouth, and the Rhode Island Battle in 1778 and then he was discharged in Saratoga, NY in 1783. One of nine siblings, John persuaded a brother to join the army. Unfortunately, this brother was killed in his first encounter with the Redcoats. John's father was so furious; he willed him just \$1 with which, reportedly, John bought a bible.

The Battle of Rhode Island was fought August 29, 1778, during the American Revolution (1775-1783) and was an early attempt at a combined operation between American and French forces. In the summer of 1778, a French fleet led by Admiral Comte d'Estaing arrived on the American coast. It was decided this force would join with Major General John Sullivan's command to recapture Newport, RI. Due to intervention by the Royal Navy and damage sustained by a storm at sea, d'Estaing withdrew from the operation leaving Sullivan to confront the British alone. Unable to execute the operation without French support, he withdrew up Aquidneck Island with Newport's garrison in pursuit. Assuming a strong position, Sullivan fought a successful defensive battle on August 29 before his men departed the island.

Victoria Smith, President (2019-2020) Texas Children of the American Revolution is the principal speaker for the evening. She identifies the National CAR Project and also the Texas CAR Project. Her Texas Project in short is to Raise funds towards The Battleship's audio wands for tours, which will tell the story of its service and historic relevance.



The British took New York City in the battle of Long Island as General Sullivan commanded one of the American patriot forces. Sadly, he was captured resisting the Hessian invaders, eventually paroled and became an intermediary between the British and the Congress. Later in 1776, he led a division in capturing the bridge that cut off the enemy's escape route from Trenton. In January, 1777, he performed well in the battle of Princeton.

Major General John Sullivan

John Sullivan's military career had several unfortunate conclusions on battlefields but his first success came at Fort William and Mary in Portsmouth as he successfully led a patriot force to take cannons and gunpowder away from the British controlled fort in December of 1774. This action may have fired the first shot in the upcoming war. Commissioned as general in the Revolutionary army in1775, he served under General Washington, with whom he became a fast friend. After the British left Boston in 1776, General Sullivan led troops on Saint Patrick's day into the deserted city and used as their password "Saint Patrick". Soon he was posted to Quebec to lead the retreat of the sick and faltering invasion force, leading the casualties in a withdrawal to Crown Point, New York. This led to the first of several controversies between him and the Continental Congress. This one resulted in his exoneration and then promotion to Major General in August, 1776.

General Joseph W. Ashy and his wife Sue grew up in Beaumont, Texas. He graduated from Texas A&M University with a degree in mechanical engineering and obtained a Master's degree in public administration from Auburn University. His Air Force career spanned thirtysix years.

General Joseph W. Ashy served as commander in chief of NORAD, United States Space Command and commander of Air Force Space Command headquartered at Peterson Air Force Base, Colo. At NORAD he was responsible for the air sovereignty of the United States and Canada, as well as for providing tactical warning and attack assessment. At U.S. Space Command he directed the unified command responsible for directing space control and support operations including theater missile defense. With Air Force Space Command, he directed satellite control, warning, space launch and ballistic missile operations missions through a worldwide network of support facilities and bases.

He is a command pilot with over 3500 hours in fighter and attack aircraft. Decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal with oak leaf cluster, the Silver Star and the Distinguished Flying Cross with oak leaf cluster. He retired from the USAF in 1996. As president of Ashy and Associates, L.L.C., he consulted for aerospace firms, was a member of boards and USAF advisory groups, and mentored a Department of Defense course for newly promoted US flag offices and senior civilians for 20 years.



Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution Internal Audit Sub-Committee Report September 26, 2019

To: The Executive Committee Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution

The Internal Audit Committee met to conduct its review of the books and records of the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution (the Organization) using the review procedures and guidelines as enumerated in the audit guide and herein and such other procedures as deemed necessary and appropriate by the Review Committee. This review was scheduled for September 7, 2019 at the Holiday Inn Express located in Brenham, Texas.

Typically, this review would have included but would not limited to the following transactions for the period January 1 through July 31, 2019.

- · Cash, cash receipts, cash disbursements, donations, and Pay Pal
- · Select review of all bank statements and monthly bank reconciliation reports
- Review of the dues account:
- Review of Patriot Fund donations & distributions were reviewed and traced to appropriate bank account. Distributions over \$500.00 were reviewed. Deposits were reviewed.
- Review of Pay Pal procedures, posting, and controls. Not tested this cycle.
- Review of Registrar transactions. 100% of all transactions were reviewed. The Inland Registrar's bank statements and reconciliations were reviewed for July-December 2015, no exceptions noted.
- The NSSAR Annual Reconciliation Report was not reviewed.
- Review of the operating account.
 - o Disbursements over \$500 from the operating account were examined.
 - o No deposits to the operating account were examined.
- Investment accounts were examined and traced to statements.

However, the committee observed that the Treasurer was not prepared to participate in this effort, so the Committee spent its time discussing what the role of the Treasurer is within Texas SAR and provided the Treasurer with a printed copy of the Treasurer's Manual.

Recommendations from the Audit Committee:

- 1. The Treasurer should become very familiar with his duties as described in the Treasurer's manual and should not hesitate to contact the previous Treasurer or members of the Audit Committee with any questions he may have.
- 2. The Committee recommends strongly that Texas SAR seriously consider outsourcing the bookkeeping requirements of the Treasurer to include the processing of dues remittances to the Society. We all believe that this is economically feasible. In fact, the Committee is

in receipt of three proposals solicited for firms that do this type of work. A summary of the results of this effort is as follows:


- a. Four firms were solicited for proposals: Better Bookkeepers, Inc.; MacFarlane and Associates, P.C. Certified Public Accountants; All Accounted For, Inc. and Walton CPA, P.C. Responses were received from all but Walton who gave reasons for declining to participate.
- b. The firm's cost proposals are:

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- i. Better Bookkeepers, Inc. \$3,600 payable \$300 per month.
- ii. All Accounted For, Inc.\$4,760 payable \$750 per month October-December and \$220 per month January-September.
- iii. Macfarlane and Associates P.C, \$4,800 or \$400 per month plus \$75 per hour for dues remittance processing November through January.

Based upon the proposals received and our evaluation of risks associated with not outsourcing, we would recommend Better Bookkeepers, Inc. be engaged to provide bookkeeping services and dues remittance processing beginning with October 2019 business.



- f. VPG McMurray (MO) called for State Society Reports.
 - 1) EVP James Osbourn (MO) presented the Missouri's report:

MISSOURI SOCIETY SAR (2018-2019) REPORT

From the end of April 2017 to the end of April 2018 the Missouri Society SAR was under the leadership of President Dennis J. Hahn and from the end of April 2018 to the present the

Society has been under the leadership of President J. Wayne Merrill. At its board meeting in July 2018 it was reported that the Missouri membership stood at 769 with 13 dual members. The Society's Annual Convention was held in St. Charles, Missouri, and was hosted by the Fernando de Leyba Chapter. There were 99 in attendance plus guests which included President General Larry Guzy and Vice President General Robert Capps.

Thirteen Missouri Society SAR members attended the NSSAR National Congress in Houston, Texas. The Missouri Society was recognized with a large number of participation certificates and streamers. Nine Missouri members received the Liberty Medal or oak leaves. Missouri had the Eagle Scout candidate who won the Arthur M. King Eagle Scout Award and he delivered his oration on General Henry Knox at the Awards Banquet. Missouri also had the winner of the Sargent Moses Adams Award for Americanism for his entry in the Brochure Contest. SAR men from Missouri who were sworn into office for the 2018-2019 year were: Richard T. Bryant, Chancellor General; Daniel R. McMurray, Vice President General of the South-Central District; and Clifford C. Olsen II as our National Trustee.

The Missouri Color Guard is the face of the Missouri Society SAR in our state. They were under the leadership of William L. (Bill) Groth, Jr. for the first half of the year and Douglas (Doug) Neff for the last half. At the time of the Convention in April there were 36 members in the Color Guard and they had participated in 61 events. They also work closely with the DAR in Missouri and help open a number of their events as well. Among the events they participated in were grave markings, parades, wreath laying, veterans' events, and Wreaths Across America in several places. Perhaps the most outstanding event of the year came with the unveiling of the plaque marking the anniversary of Winston S. Churchill's Iron Curtain Speech at the National Churchill Memorial at Fulton, Missouri, on March 10, 2018. It was noted that Winston Spencer Churchill and Harry S. Truman were both members of the SAR. A large number Missouri Color Guardsmen and some from other states added to the impressive occasion. Another impressive event during the year was the Grave Marking of President Dwight David Eisenhower in Abilene, Kansas, on June 2, 2018. President Merrill and Missouri Society's Sergeant-at-Arms, Charles McMillan laid wreaths during the ceremony and participated in the Color Guard. Charles had also laid a wreath during the commemoration at the George Rogers Clark Memorial at Vincennes, Indiana. Another national SAR event that a number of the Missouri Color Guard participate in is the Commemoration of the Battle of Fort San Carlos in St. Louis, Missouri, Our Color Guard reporter, Dennis J. Hahn, has worked tirelessly to see that the Missouri Color Guard are represented in each of the issues of The Color Guardsman issued quarterly by the National Society."

2) President Ron Painter (OK) presented Oklahoma's report:

Oklahoma Society of the Sons of the American Revolution South Central District Report August 24, 2018

The Oklahoma SAR is comprised of five chapters located in Ardmore, Bartlesville, Norman, Oklahoma City and Tulsa with a current membership of 342. Since January 1, 2018, there have been 24 new members approved, 10 reinstatements, 4 reinstatement transfers and 3 deaths.

The chapters of the Oklahoma Society are continually involved in events and programs to carry out the missions of the national society.

This past year, members of the Oklahoma SAR have assisted, supported and honored the state's veterans by furnishing hospitals and nursing facilities with nonmedical needs such as clothing, shoes and toiletries. Oklahoma SAR members have attended meetings of the Tulsa Mayor's Veteran Advisory Council, Send-off and Welcome Home Ceremonies at Oklahoma-Arkansas Honor Flight events and have attended various veteran organization meetings such as the All Veterans Association and the Vietnam Veterans Association. Oklahoma SAR members participated in the annual Wreaths Across America, the annual Tulsa Medal of Honor Ceremony and along with the local DAR chapters, have sponsored a float in the annual Tulsa Veterans Day Parade.

The Tulsa Chapter SAR is a registered partner in the U.S. Department of Defense Vietnam Veteran Commemoration and has conducted seven honor ceremonies to date. The most recent ceremony was held on June 9, 2018 in Claremore, Oklahoma at the traveling Vietnam Wall, entitled "The Wall That Heals." Oklahoma SAR State President Ron Painter presented eight Certificates of Honor from the Commemoration, in the memory of their loved one, to two sisters, two brothers, two widows, a son and a daughter of four different Oklahoma men who were killed in action in the Vietnam War and whose names appear on the Vietnam Wall.

Members of the Oklahoma SAR have assisted, supported and educated our youth by providing contributed financial support to JROTC units in need of funds for training events and equipment, by giving annual financial donations to the National and Oklahoma C.A.R., by distributing history books to elementary school students, by providing contributed funds for financial awards to elementary historical essay contest winners and by supporting educational events such as the annual Revolutionary Day for fifth graders held in northeastern Oklahoma.

Additionally, the Tulsa Chapter SAR conducted its 92nd annual Outstanding Citizenship Award Ceremony on February 24, 2018 at which 18 outstanding junior class young men from 18 area high schools were presented SAR pins and certificates for their achievements in community service.

The Oklahoma SAR Color Guard is active in all of our missions with veterans, youth and historical events under the direction of State Commander Henry Baer. Since last year's meeting of the South Central District, the Oklahoma Color Guard has presented at numerous patriotic events statewide on Memorial Day, Independence Day, Veterans Day and at the annual Wreaths Across America. The Oklahoma SAR Color Guard has presented colors at many Oklahoma DAR functions and also at other organization events as requested throughout the year.

The Oklahoma SAR has recognized and thanked the Oklahoma DAR with medals, certificates and monetary awards for their support and referral of new members through the State DAR Referral Award Program.

Kansas Society of Sons of American Revolution South Central District Report for August 25th, 2018 Meeting By Dennis Nelson, Kansas Society President

Kansas membership as of 6-30-18 is 848 compared to 752 as of 6-30-17 or a net increase of 96.

There are 12 chapters, 2 that have become active again (Bennington in Salina with 45 members and fort hays in hays with 9 members).

Youth contestants at Houston congress – orations 2nd, JROTC and essay and eagle scout top 10, poster and brochure.

Kansas finished first again in the Allene Groves award for Americanism, receiving honorable mention.

Our newsletter the "liberty bell" won the Smallwood award for best news publication for more than 10 pages. Received cash award of \$250. Brook Lyles editor.

Kansas DAR society was third in total number of referrals and first for highest percentage of referrals compared to state SAR society membership. \$400 in cash award for the KS DAR.

Highlight of our year was the Eisenhower compatriot grave marking ceremony at the Eisenhower Museum and library in Abilene, KS.

Two western regional meeting banquets were held in Ellinwood and great bend, KS. New members from three chapters were installed at this joint meeting from sons of the plains, Bennington and fort hays. Over 20 new members were inducted at these joint meetings.

Notable personal achievements -

- Brooks Lyles received gold medal for distinguished service for chairing education committee from Larry Guzy, President General.

- Bob Capps completed his term as south central district vice president general and brooks Lyles completed his term as international Vice President General.

- John Schatzel, Kansas genealogist received 6 liberty bell oak leaf clusters for sponsoring 60 new members.

- Kansas society will continue to grow and increase chapter participation in youth contests.

4) SCD Color Guard Commander Burns (AK) presented Arkansas' report. The numbers of members in Arkansas continues to increase. Arkansas reached 300 for the first time in many years. A focus has been to work with the CAR with a focus to bring in young members.

5) President Thomas Jackson (TX):

Report of Texas Society, Torn Jackson, President

The Texas Society has had a robust year since our last SCD meeting. Our membership currently stands at 3,072 which includes 237 new members during 2018.

Our membership goal is to have a 5% year over year sustained growth. We plan to achieve this in part by continuing to encourage participation with the DAR, last year we led the nation with 162 referral finder forms. Our District VPs are encouraged to hold a genealogy event in cooperation with the DAR. We have a medal policy to award a medal to a DAR for every 3 new members.

On the Education front we are pushing knowledge of State educational requirements for formative American History by grade level. This permits our presenters to demonstrate our

academic relevance. Public ED teachers have to document how our presentations tie into state mandated curriculum. This information will be posted on our state website.

On Grave markings we are proceeding with recognizing Presidents of the Texas SAR. This past month we recognized two of these men. These men were Titans. This included a former Lt. Governor, whose son and SAR Compatriot became a Governor, and also a man who was a co-founder of one of our universities and cofounder of the Dallas symphony orchestra. We are compiling information on each of our Presidents and have a spot on our website dedicated to this initiative. We hope to erect a centopah in the state cemetery for our first President, a medal of honor winner who was a white officer leading an all African-American unit who went on the found a university to serve Americans of African descent and the youngest speaker of the house. There are also a handful of Patriots, including two Hispanic ancestors of mine, who have not had their graves marked.

In support of the PG's initiative we plan to have our district VP's encourage individual chapters to not only recognize public service, but also to report this activity!

And then there was Congress. On the Volunteer Texain front we had 139 compatriots from 22 different chapters augmented by 39 spouses or DAR friends to work all facets of the event. We had four tables of CAR at the luncheon.

We received Best in Class accolades from National attendees for Signage, Registration organization, food served at Host Events, the Volunteer Reception, the Bush 41 tour, worker identification, centerpiece decorations, spending of national dollars on flowers/hospitality and the lady's hospitality room itself.

We treated 430 to our Host Reception at the George Ranch, a covered rodeo arena air cooled by Big Ass Fans and replete with longhorns, a working chuck wagon, a branding pit, green screen photo booth, a step and repeat logo banner, serving Texas Barbecue, Texas Wine & Texas Beer at no cost to our attendees, a snarkly wine banner, the raffle of a Texas ranch which made our new PG a Texas Rancher and induction of a sitting judge.

The volunteer reception with 125 attendees was held at the Czech museum in downtown Houston with a nod to our Moravians who served George Washington, the Czechs Astronaut, and the Czechs who fought for Texas Independence. We featured Tex Mex food from a nationally recognized restaurant and served Texas Wine and Beer at no cost to our attendees.

Our Saturday tour had 100 going to NASA and 100 going to Bush 41 while our Wednesday tour had 100 going to San Jacinto and 60 to the Museum District.

Our Board of Managers authorized \$38,000 for the event and we will have spent \$35,000. Our best estimate is that we had \$15,000 of donations in the form of services, beverages, and the like.

He suggested changing Bylaws to include making annual donations to support the fund. He also asked that individuals donating books donate digital versions.

3) VPG McMurray (MO) asked the State Presidents to work as a committee to revise the SCD Bylaws and present them at next year's annual meeting. Compatriot Thompson (OK) asked from the floor if a vote needs to be taken to have the Bylaws revised. VPG McMurray (MO) stated to have the committees submit revisions was within his purview as the VPG. Acceptance of the revised Bylaws will require a vote to accept.

I. Past VPG International Division Lyles (KS) briefed the group on the use of the American Revolution Patriot Chest Digital Video Disk, which has presentations, techniques and methods that can be used in teaching environments, which was produced by the Colorado Society.

"The Patriot Chest Program is an interactive presentation, intended to compliment Elementary and Middle School lesson plans on the Revolutionary War and Colonial Period of American History.

SAR Outreach Education will be serving as the source for State Societies and their chapters to obtain a Patriot Chest DVD and receive reimbursement up to \$375 for identified contents purchased to develop their own Patriot Chest. The contents include period clothing, toys, household, hunting and military items. The average cost of a complete Patriot Chest is about \$500. Reimbursements will be made according to the following guidelines.

- One \$375.00 reimbursement per State Society
- Maximum of \$375 for the life of the program
- Reimbursements will be at 75% of total receipts up to \$500.
- Only identified items pertaining to the presentation of the Patriot Chest Program will be reimbursed. No exceptions.
- Reimbursement requests must include itemized list of objects that reflect the submitted receipts will qualify to be reimbursed.
- Receipts and itemized list must accompany the submitted request for reimbursement.
- Please mark all submitted material "Patriot Chest Reimbursement."

- All reimbursements will be made payable to the State Society

m. President Jackson (TX): On August 18, 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued new rules for nonprofits: "Accounting Standards Update 2016-14 "Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958), This is the first major set of changes to nonprofit financial statement presentation standards since 1993. The new rules take effect for fiscal years starting after December 2017.

1) What are the goals of the new rules? The FASB's goals for the new rules are to provide better information to donors, grant makers, creditors, and others who read nonprofit financial statements.

2) What organizations are affected by the new guidance? The new rules affect substantially all nonprofit organizations, including charities, foundations, private colleges and universities, health care providers, cultural institutions, religious organizations, and trade associations, among others.

3) What do the new rules do? (Simplify and clarify): The new rules simplify the treatment of net assets in financial statements by focusing on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions, as opposed to the types of restrictions (i.e., temporarily restricted vs. permanently restricted). The classification of temporarily restricted versus unrestricted assets has long been an area of confusion. Under the new rules the Statement of Financial Position will only have two classes of "Net Assets" – net assets with donor restrictions, and net assets without donor restrictions. The footnotes will also be changed to explain these classifications.

4) The new rules also replace the current <u>three</u> required classes of net assets (unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted) with <u>two</u> new classes (those with donor restrictions and those without donor restrictions).

5) Clarify cash on hand/available assets: The new rules require quantitative and qualitative information to explain how an organization manages its liquid resources available to meet cash needs for general expenditures within one year of the balance sheet date. The requirement for qualitative information will be satisfied by "classified" presentation on the statement of financial position. The requirement for quantitative information will be satisfied by disclosure of whether or not a financial asset's availability is limited by a.) its nature, b.) external limits imposed by donors, grantors, laws or contracts, or c.) internal limits imposed by governing boards.

6) Ensure consistency in the reporting of investment expenses and investment returns: The new rules require investment income to be reported net of related internal and external investment expenses (this is currently optional). n. Chancellor Stu Conrad (KS) stated that he wanted to share some information and challenge members. He stated that he has worked with the Boy Scouts of American for 60 years. All First Class Scouts must hear about their rights. Chancellor Conrad (KS) said when he meets with these Scouts he will ask them where their rights come from. Most often they respond by saying the Government, which concerns Chancellor Conrad (KS). His challenge is for members to look for opportunities to engage with youth and share American History with them since they are not getting as much as we would like in their school setting.

o. Invitation to the 2019 SCD Meeting to be held in Oklahoma City, OK on 23 through 24 August 2019 was presented by VPG Elect Painter (OK).

s. The Sons of the American Recessional was led by President Jackson (TX).

The Color Guard consisting of Compatriots Robert Grover (MO), Steve Sullins (MO), and Donald Turner (MO) retired the colors.

The Texas Society has added 270 new members since the last meeting, bringing our membership to 3,152. We have actively encouraged recruiting assistance from members of Texas DAR chapters and our efforts in filing 279 DAR Finder Forms led to receiving the DAR/SAR Membership Award at Congress last month. Those forms were filed when we had knowledge of the DAR assistance. We will work diligently this year to recognize more assistance. We have found the DAR members very much enjoy receiving medals when they assist us with 3 new member applications so we will continue to award them.

This year the Texas Society has a focus on recruitment, retention and reinstatement in an effort to grow our society membership. Not only do we want to add new members but we want to do a better job of involving them in our activities and giving them reasons to maintain their membership. Reducing the need for reinstating memberships is obviously financially better for us.

We are fortunate in Texas to have 47 chapters that can be divided into several districts around the state. As not all members can travel to our two state meetings each year the districts have been encouraged to meet at least annually. Their time in those meetings is used to provide: updates on state society news and business, training for chapter level officer positions, and a forum for discussing issues that arise in chapters. Members can share problems they encounter and possible solutions that have worked in other chapters. The districts have also been encouraged to hold at least one genealogy event in conjunction with the DAR.

The Color Guard continues to be active though out the state garnering attention wherever they appear. At least a few can be found in parades, at football and baseball games, opening city council meetings, honoring the fallen at grave side or in churches and at the DAR Constitution House during the State Fair of Texas to list a few. Numerous photographic opportunities attract adults and children alike and provide opportunities to discuss the Revolutionary War period..

Our Texas Society history has been a focus as we near our 125th anniversary. We are marking the graves of former State Presidents and posting biographical information for each online.

I want to recognize a few of the awards from this year's Congress celebrating the hard work of our society membership under then President Tom Jackson's leadership. The Texas Society garnered a number of awards including:

- The Senator Robert A. Taft Award for enrolling the most new members with 405
- The Robert L. Sonfield Award for the largest numerical membership increase at year end
- The Len Young Smith Award for the most new members under 40

- The Arthur J. Trimble Award – 1776 Trophy for reinstating the most dropped members with 251 Our Robert Rankin Chapter won a President Generals' Education Outreach Streamer

The Independence Chapter won a streamer and check for the President General's public service award initiative

The San Antonio Chapter won the USS Stark Memorial Award for chapters with 100-199 members



Constitution of the South Central District

Sons of the American Revolution Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Kansas Ratified by all States on: TBD Adopted by the South Central District on: TDB

ARTICLE 1 – SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT NAME AND STATUS

1.1 The name of this organization shall be the "South Central District, National Society, Sons of the American Revolution." The South Central District is a part of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution. The South Central District shall consist of the following State Societies: Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Kansas.

ARTICLE 2 - SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT MISSION & GOALS OBJECT

2.1 The Mission & Goals of the South Central District are the same as the stated in Article 2 of the Mission & Goals Constitution of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE 3 - SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT MEMBERSHIP

3.1 Any member in good standing in one of the State Societies listed in Article 1 shall be a member of the South Central District, National Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE 4 - SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT OFFICERS OF THE DISTRICT

4.1 Vice President General: The Office of Vice President General shall be rotated through the constituent States in the following order: Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Kansas. A member of the State to host the following year South Central District Annual Meeting shall be nominated by that State Society for the position of Vice President General for a one year tenure. The State Society President, endorsed by the State Society Secretary, shall provide a nominating letter to the South Central District Annual Meeting, shall be nominated at the next National Society Congress where the new Vice President General will assume the position. His duties shall consist of the following:

4.1.1-Preside at the South Central District Annual Meeting.

4.1.1 The Vice President General will preside at the South Central District Annual Meeting in his State.

4.1.2 Promote the interest and the activities of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

4.1.3 Assist and represent the State Societies of the South Central District at the National Trustees' Meetings.

4.1.4 Visit local State and Chapter meetings throughout the South Central District.

4.1.5 Support the President General's initiatives.

4.1.6 Promote the formations of new Chapters, the recruiting of new members and the retention of current members within the South Central District.

4.1.7 Establish annual Vice President General initiatives.

4.1.5 (4.1.8) Perform additional duties within the South Central District as may be delegated or assigned to him by the President General, the Executive Committee or the Board of National Trustees.

4.1.9 He shall submit all required reports to the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution 10 business days before the Spring and Fall Leadership/Trustee Meetings and the National Congress.

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4.1.6 (4.1.9) Call a meeting of the State Presidents by telephone or online methods concerning on-matters of great urgency.

4.2 South Central District Secretary -Treasurer: He shall be appointed by the Vice President General, South Central District. His duties shall be as follows:

4.2.1 He shall be responsible for keeping the minutes of the South Central District Annual Meeting.

4.2.2 He shall be responsible for notification of the time and place of the South Central District Annual Meeting to the State Society Presidents and Secretaries.

4.2.3 He shall maintain the funds of the South Central-District. He shall send out the notices for the annual assessment for the District. He shall account for the funds in a report to the Annual meeting. He shall turn over to his successor all funds remaining in the account at the time his successor is appointed or the Vice President General appoints a replacement.

4.2.3 He shall prepare the endorsement letter to the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution nomination committee based upon the results of the South Central District election.

4.2.4 He shall ensure the minutes and endorsement letter are signed by Vice President General.

4.2.5 He shall endorse all South Central District Awards approved by the Vice President General.

4.2.6 He shall send the endorsement letter to the Immediate Past President General, Nominating Committee, National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, 809 W. Main Street, Louisville, KY 40202 no later than December 31 of that year.

4.2.7 He shall ensure the South Central District Annual Meeting Minutes are distributed to the Vice President General, National Officers of the South Central District, South Central District Parliamentarian, Immediate Past Vice President General, State Society Presidents, State Society Secretaries, South Central District Officers and ensure the minutes are posted to the South Central District Website no later than 90 days after the South Central District Annual Meeting. 4.2.8 He shall ensure that the South Central District website is accurate and updated.

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4.3 South Central District Parliamentarian: He shall be appointed by the Vice President General at the South Central District Annual Meeting.

4.3.1 The Parliamentarian shall be well versed in parliamentary procedures, experienced and well respected.

4.3.2 The Parliamentarian will use the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution Constitution and Bylaws, the South Central District Constitution, and the Robert's Rules of Order 11th edition in rendering opinions and advice when points of order arise. Each beforementioned document must be on hand for immediate reference during the South Central District Annual Meeting.

4.4 South Central District Color Guard Commander: He shall be the State Society Color Guard Commander of the Vice President General's State. His duties shall consist of the following:

4.4.1 He will serve as the South Central District's Sergeant-at-Arms, ensuring a quorum is present and maintained during all South Central District Annual Meeting business sessions.

4.4.2 He shall take charge of, and responsibility for all flags, banners, and associated equipment.

4.4.3 He will ensure that all flags, banners, and associated equipment are at the location of the next South Central District Annual Meeting, or event.

4.4.3 He will be responsible to see that all flags, banners, and associated equipment be properly displayed, assembled, and ready for use by members of the South Central District Color Guard, or other Compatriots of the South Central District, as directed by the Vice President General.

4.4.4 He shall take charge of the South Central District Color Guard in all official South Central District activities.

4.4.5 He shall appoint a Deputy Color Guard Commander if he is unable to attend a South Central District function to act in his stead.

4.4.7 He shall make recommendations to the Vice-President General for his consideration of the appointment of a replacement if he is unable to fulfill his assigned duties.

4.4.7 He shall work with the Vice President General and South Central District Secretary in tracking events of service by members of the District Color Guard, and duly log participation by each member. Said log to be endorsed by the South-Central District Color Guard Commander.

4.5 South Central District Historian. He shall be appointed by the Vice President General, South Central District. His duties shall be as follows:

4.5.1 The South Central District Historian shall be in charge of securing and interpreting the records required to document the history of the South Central District.

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4.5.2 He shall keep a record of the South Central District accomplishments and activities for the year.

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4.5.3 He shall collect items such as photos and news articles about the South Central District and its members.

4.5.4 He shall organize all South Central District social media postings to tell the story for the year.

4.5.5 He shall compile a presentation consisting of digital photos from each State of key events, which shall be presented during the South Central District Meeting Banquet.

ARTICLE 5 - DELEGATES TO THE SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT ANNUAL MEETINGS

5.1 The following shall be members of the South Central District Annual Meetings and shall be entitled to vote therein:

5.1.1 All past and incumbent National Officers of the South Central District.

5.1.2 One delegate-at-large from each State Society and the President or a Vice President of each State Society.

5.1.3 One delegate for every fifty members of such State Society and one for each fraction of twenty-five or over, such delegates to be elected and accredited by the State Society in such a manner as its Constitution and Bylaws provide.

5.1.4 No delegate shall be entitled to cast more than one vote. If entitled to vote under more than one of the foregoing subparagraphs, he shall elect under which category he wishes to cast his vote.

5.1.5 Voting delegates can only be certified as such by the State Society, which receives and forwards to the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution the National dues of the Compatriot.

ARTICLE 6 - ANNUAL SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT ANNUAL MEETINGS

6.1 The South Central District Annual Meeting, Sons of the American Revolution will be held prior to the National Congress of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution. The South Central District Annual Meeting shall be held between 01-August and 01-December on the last Friday and Saturday of August of each calendar year, separate and apart from any other meetings being-held within the South Central District. The annual South Central District Annual Meeting will consist of the following items:

6.1.1 A registration table each day of the South Central District Annual Meeting.

6.1.2 Host a Candidates Forums for National Society, Sons of the American Revolution positions. Each candidate seeking a contested position shall have five minutes to speak and non-contested positions three minutes. Candidates not present shall be allowed to have a member in good standing speak on their behalf.

6.1.3 A Flag Ceremony shall be conducted when appropriate as determined by the South Central District Vice President General and Color Guard Commander.

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6.1.4 Shall conduct a banquet the first evening of the South Central District Annual Meeting.

6.1.5 Conduct a Business Session to be called to order by the Vice President General.

6.1.6 Opening Prayer by the host State Society Chaplain.

6.1.7 Pledge of Allegiance.

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6.1.8 Pledge to the Sons of the American Revolution.

6.1.9 The South Central District Secretary shall conduct a rollcall of all State Societies in attendance.

6.1.10 The South Central District Secretary shall provide a report of the South Central District Annual Meeting attendance by State to include guests.

6.1.9 Presentation of the minutes of the last South Central District Annual Meeting.

6.1.10 Vice President General's report and State Societies reports shall be presented to the South Central District delegates, and a written report provided to the South Central District Secretary.

6.1.11 Reports of Standing Committees.

6.1.12 Reading of any changes, alterations or amendments to this Constitution.

6.1.13 Old Business and Unfinished Business.

6.1.14 New Business, including nominations of the Vice President General and election of other officers of the South Central District.

6.1.15 An election process shall be held to nominate candidates for National Society, Sons of the American Revolution positions. The Vice President General, South Central District shall read the candidates for each office separately for the declared candidates who are running unopposed and then asked three times if there are any nominations from the floor.

6.1.16 The Vice President General, South Central District shall read the uncontested candidates and ask if there are any nominations from the floor three times before closing nominations for each position.

6.1.17 The Vice President General, South Central District can ask for a motion from the floor to nominate all uncontested positions by acclamation.

6.1.18 The Vice President General, South Central District shall appoint at least two "Tellers" and one Supervisor to oversee the casting of ballots and counting of ballots for contested positions.

6.1.19 Candidates shall be allowed one observer to oversee the voting process.

6.1.20 An invitation for the next South Central District Annual Meetings shall be announced.

6.1.21 The Closing Prayer.

6.1.22 The Sons of the American Revolution Recessional and adjournment.

ARTICLE 7 – SOUTH CENTRAL DISTRICT ANNUAL MEETING QUORUM


7.1 A quorum shall consist of not less than eleven delegates.

ARTICLE 8 - AMENDMENTS

8.1 This Constitution may be changed, altered or substituted in whole or in part by a two-thirds vote at the Annual South Central District Meeting by accredited delegates of the South Central District.

8.2 Any proposed change to this Constitution must be published a minimum of 30 days before the Annual Meeting by the South Central District Secretary. The proposed changes will be emailed to the South Central District Vice President General, State Society Presidents, the Secretary of each State Society Commander and presented to the South Central District Secretary to be made part of the Minutes of the South Central District Annual meeting minutes.

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

Dr. Katherine Carté is an Associate Professor of History specializing in early American and Atlantic history, particularly the history of religion. She earned her doctorate in history at the University of Wisconsin, and her bachelors at Haverford College. Prior to coming to SMU in 2012, she was Associate Professor of History at Texas A&M University.


Prof. Carté is the author of *Religion and Profit: Moravians in Early America* (University of Pennsylvania Press, 2009), which was awarded the 2010 Dale W. Brown Award for Outstanding Scholarship in Anabaptist and Pietist Studies.

Prof. Carté's research and teaching interests center on the role of religion in the eighteenth-century Atlantic world, especially as it intersects with political and economic developments. Her current project, *Religion Transformed*, examines the impact of the American Revolution on religion and politics in the Anglo-American world.

Prof. Carté's articles have appeared in the William & Mary Quarterly; Common-place; Church History; the Journal of Moravian History; and Early American Studies.

Prof. Carté has been a Charles A. Ryskamp Fellow of the American Council of Learned Societies, an affiliate fellow of the Center for the Study of Religion at Princeton University, a Franklin Fellow of the American Philosophical Society, and a Barra Postdoctoral Fellow at the McNeil Center for Early American Studies.

Of special note to the SAR, Prof. Carté served as the 2018 SAR Visiting Professor at King's College London, and spent an aggregate of eight weeks with the Georgian Papers Programme at the Royal Archives at Windsor Castle. Prof. Carté will serve as the SAR Distinguished Scholar in 2021, and will lead the 2021 SAR Annual Conference on the American Revolution, "Religion and the American Revolution."

The George Washington Endowment Fund (GWEF) Board was established by the Executive Committee and approved by the Trustees during the meeting of February 27, 1993. This action followed two years of work by a special Task Force that had been asked to evaluate and propose a plan for NSSAR to provide for the following:

(1) Establish a permanently restricted fund, the income of which will provide adequate financial contributions for support of NSSAR unfunded and underfunded committees and special projects, and

(2) Provide for the equitable distribution of funds.

The George Washington Endowment Fund is financed by gifts from members and friends of the Sons of the American Revolution. Remember 100% of your donation goes into a permanent fund. Only 80% of the net income (dividends and interest) from the fund will be spent each year.

Individuals donating \$1,000 or more are recognized as George Washington Fellows. Gifts may be paid in a lump sum amount or in installments of \$200 or more annually over a five-year period. Each person recognized as a GW Fellow shall receive a distinctive lapel pin and a certificate denoting his/her status.

The Howard Horne Award is awarded annually to the State Society with the largest increase in new GW Fellows as a percentage of the State Society membership. The Walter Buchanan Meek Award is awarded annually to the State Society with the largest numerical increase in new GW Fellows. The annual term of each award is from April 1 to the following March 31. The awards are presented at the Annual Congress.

Concept/Purpose

The George Washington Endowment Fund (GWEF) was established by the Executive Committee and approved by the Trustees during the meeting of February 27, 1993. The fund was created to establish a permanent restricted fund, the income of which would provide annual funding for support of NSSAR unfunded and underfunded committees and special projects. The GWEF is managed by a GWEF Board with responsibility for oversight of all aspects of the George Washington Endowment Fund.

The endowment fund has grown annually to continue support of approved NSSAR activities and projects. The corpus of the fund is never touched. Eighty percent of the earnings are withdrawn each year to support NSSAR projects with twenty percent being rolled back into the corpus each year.

Earnings from the contributions over the years have helped to finance a wide variety of programs and projects. Some recent projects:

Becoming a George Washington Fellow



The GWEF at Work

A brochure entitled *The American Revolution: Alabama* was partially funded by the GWEF. 20,000 copies of this brochure have been disseminated at the



Alabama Welcome Centers accross the state. The map indicates all counties in Alabama which were named in honor of Patriots of the American Revolution with a short entry about the Patriot. On the reverse side are locations in Alabama which have historical relevancy to the Revolution. This is an

outstanding method to encourage the study of the American Revolution and advertise NSSAR to a broader audience.

The GWEF has assisted the Illinois Society in a project to mark select Illinois graveyards where Revolutionary Patriots are buried. Although many of the individual graves are already marked, the Illinois Society is placing a castaluminum plaque at the entrance to the graveyard to allow visitors to honor the graves of the Patriots.





The SAR Presidents General Wall visually documents the 129 year history of the Society's chief executive officer. Currently 114 President General portraits with brass nameplates signifying their term in

office create this historic time line from 1889 to 2017. Funding by the GWEF provided the means whereby all original portrait photographs were scanned and placed in the Society's archives.



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
