Stephen F. Austin's Old 300 colony in Texas in 1821. Gates received land, now in Washington County in 1824, approximately 5 miles from Washington-on-the-Brazos. William's wife Catherine, died in 1826. William Gates died in Texas on August the 20, 1828 and is buried in the Gates-Perry Family Cemetery in Washington County, Texas.

After Benediction, the Color Guard closed the ceremony with a black power musket volley. Rankin Color guard members Commander Ralph and Jerry Martin attended the ceremony.

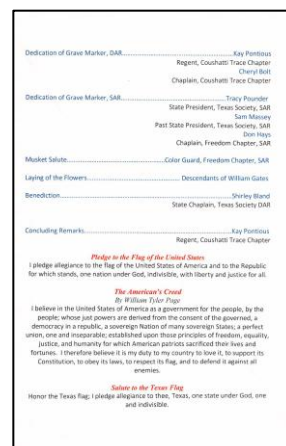
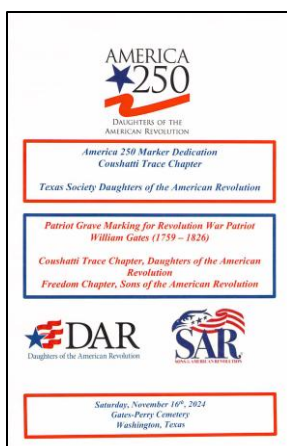

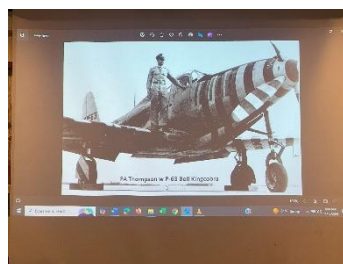

Capture of Fort William and Henry

The Capture of Fort William and Mary took place in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, on December 14, 1774, when local Patriots led by John Langdon stormed Fort William and Mary guarding the mouth of the busy seaport. They overcame a six-man caretaker detachment and seized the garrison's powder, which was distributed through several towns in the colony for potential use in the looming struggle against Great Britain. On December 15, 1774, patriots led by John Sullivan again raided the fort, this time seizing numerous cannons, later used in the pivotal Battle of Bunker Hill. The incident is significant as one of the first overt acts of the American Revolutionary War and the only battle to take place in the state of New Hampshire.

Sharing History With 5th Grade Students at Nottingham Elementary

In Texas, the 5th grade history curriculum TEKS (Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills) are all about the history of the United States from 1565 to the present. This includes the colonial period, the American Revolution, the establishment of the U.S. Constitution and American identity and westward expansion.

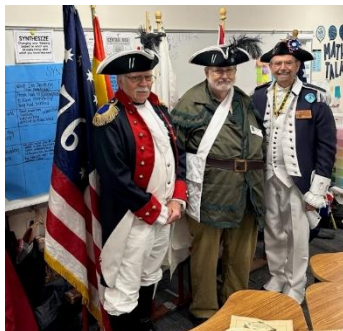
In support of this information, the TEKS recommend the use of a variety of rich source materials including museums, historical sites, and local and state preservation societies.

Compatriots,

We have received notification that invoices for 2025 dues have been mailed. 2025 dues calculations include a \$3.00 annual assessment to defray expenses which the state will incur in hosting the 2029 National Congress in San Antonio.

Texas SAR has voted that Junior Members will not need to pay dues for 2025.

Keep in mind that your dues are considered late on **January 1, 2025**. If they are still unpaid 30 days later - NSSAR will drop you from the rolls, you will start to show a gap in your service, and you will not get your magazine.

Online/Paypal (option 1) - We encourage everyone to use this option and pay your dues by credit card through Paypal. Log on to the state site, go to the online dues payment page and enter your National SAR # and Name as it appears on your Membership Certificate. Then select your primary chapter and any other chapters you maintain dual membership with and follow the checkout procedures. This is operational on the TexasSAR.org website NOW. PayPal fees have been removed for 2025 Dues payments. As mentioned, this online Paypal form also allows for secondary (dual) chapters to be added for those wishing to pay as a dual member.

US Mail (option 2) - You simply take the bottom section of the dues invoice you receive in the mail and send a check for the amount indicated with the pre-addressed envelope, stamp it, and return it to us by US mail.

US Mail (option 3) - Use this option if you want to pay by check, but did NOT get a dues notice in the mail or you want to pay NOW for whatever reason. Log onto the private site, grab your dues notice online, print it out, and mail it back in with a check. This option is available NOW on the TexasSAR.org website.
