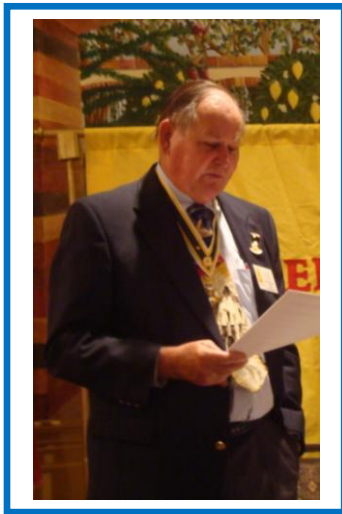
Our May Meeting

This meeting was my second as Chapter President of the Rankin Chapter and my second stint as President of an SAR chapter.

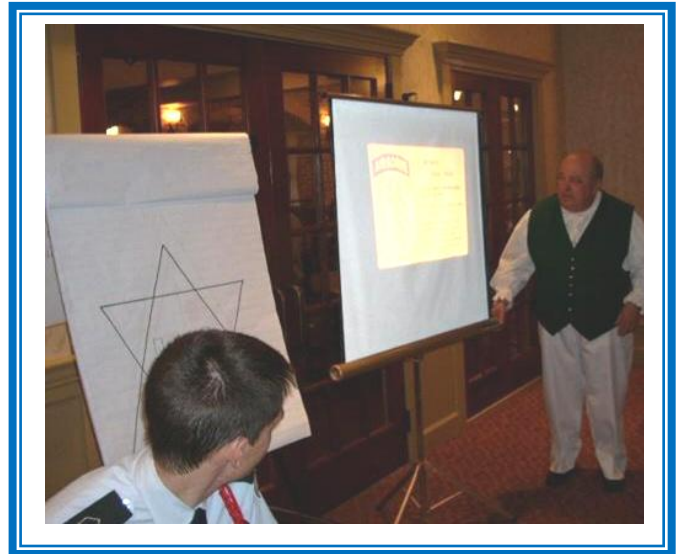
The Rankin meetings are full and complete with something to capture everyone's attention.

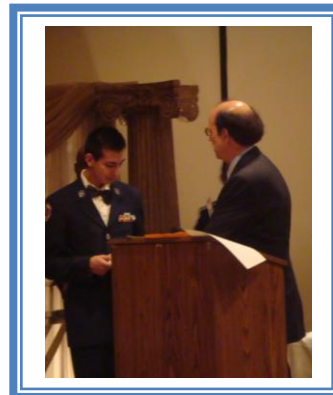

Member Spotlight



Frederick Jackson, Jr. Robert Rankin Chapter

Personal:

At Garfield Hospital in Washington, DC, Frederick Monterey Jackson Jr. joined the human race with an emphatic use of his lungs. Later in October, 1934, Fred and his parents, Fred Sr. and Jo, moved to Colonial Village in Arlington, VA. Fred Sr. worked for Walworth Valves in Sales and moved the family to Newton Center, MA and then in 1940 to Old Greenwich, CT, along with a sister, Connie. At home Fred liked to build model airplanes and cities, construct train sets, read books from the library, collect postage stamps from around the world and work in the victory garden. He played sandlot sports and took his first golf lesson at age twelve. Dance lessons and boy-girl parties rounded out teen activities.

One particular girl, Brenda Heistad from Sarasota, FL, a gorgeous blonde airline flight attendant, knocked his socks off. A whirlwind romance ensued and Brenda and Fred got to the altar in Manhasset, NY in 1959. Their first house, purchased in 1961, produced two children born in Bronxville, NY, Lori and Rick. The third child, Kathi, was born in Houston, TX, where the family moved in 1966. Seven grandchildren have appeared, including two sets of twins. This entire family celebrated the 50th wedding anniversary in Gruene, TX floating on the Guadalupe River and kicker dancing at Gruene Hall.

Educational:

Elementary School in Old Greenwich segued to Greenwich High School and Fred graduated in 1952 with high honors and election to the National Honor Society. He was a member of the Thespian Society, served as president of the Key Club, and founded and captained the school golf team. Fred attended Lehigh University and graduated in 1956 with a BS in Mechanical Engineering. While in Bethlehem, PA, he participated in the Inquisitors, intramural sports, belonged to Sigma Phi Society, worked on the Epitome year book, became a major in Air Force

ROTC and was inducted into the honorary journalism society.

Military:

January 1957 found Fred in San Antonio at Lackland Air Force Base, reporting for duty as a 2nd Lt. Soon the career moves began: Moody Air Field in Valdosta, GA to work as a Petroleum Officer and then as a Maintenance Officer in the 3551st Flight Line Squadron. Fred published articles for Air Force Maintenance Magazine and played on the base golf team. He returned to civilian life at the end of 1959 and was honorably discharged in 1971 as a Captain.

Professional:

Esso Standard Oil hired Fred as a sales trainee in June, 1956 where he returned in 1959 after his military stint. By 1962, Fred had moved from Esso to Humble Oil, and Fred had a new territory as an industrial salesman of wax, solvents and lube oils. Excellent retail sales results provided an award for "1965 Man of the Year", complete with a weekend at the Plaza Hotel in New York. In 1966 Fred moved to Humble Headquarters in Houston and joined the Aviation Sales Department. His primary focus was renegotiating jet fuel and aviation lube oil contracts. In 1969 Fred and his associates negotiated the largest jet fuel contract in the company's history with United Airlines. Humble became Exxon and Fred moved to the Retail Marketing Department. Working on the Car Care Center program, Fred wrote many of the technical specifications and marketing procedures. In 1974 Fred was hired by Kelley Manufacturing Company as National Accounts Manager where he developed successful sales programs for large chain stores such as Kmart, Handy Dan and Ace Hardware. By 1978, Kelley had become the free world's largest wheelbarrow manufacturer and Fred became the VP of Marketing. In 1986 Fred went into the marketing consulting business and founded Best Solutions. His clients were manufacturers, software developers and computer service companies.

Volunteer:

In the 1970s Fred was president of the Lehigh Club of Texas, led his son's BSA Troop as Committee Chairman, and marshaled at several national golf tournaments held at Champions Golf Club. In New Hampshire, Fred became a docent at the Squam Lakes Natural Science Center in Holderness, NH, participating in activities such as Hawk Watch, Kirkwood Gardens Day and as a regular trail helper. In Houston Fred has served as a Smithsonian guide, teacher at Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church, a member of the Houston Genealogical Forum and the Houston Audubon Society. Fred helped found Timely Topics, a discussion group with 12 couples.

In 1999 Fred joined the Houston Chapter of the SAR and served as its Essay Committee Chair. He transferred to the Robert Rankin Chapter where he is the Membership Chair and Registrar.
