NSSAR CONGRESS IN DALLAS JULY 7-13, 2006

Report by Judge Ed Butler

Some 467 compatriots and their wives registered for the 116th Annual NSSAR Congress in Dallas. Some 25-30 others participated in one or more events without registering.

On Thursday evening, July 6th, incoming President General Judge Nathan White, and his wife Wanda, opened up their new three story home in McKinney to the General Officers, Executive Committee members and members of the Texas delegation. The invitation read the "McKinney White House".

The Congress was kicked off on Friday, July 7th, with an all day genealogy seminar, conducted by our chapter's Ed Butler, who was ending his second tour as SAR Genealogist General. The speakers were Lloyd Bockstruck and Don Raney from Dal-

That evening, busses took several hundred SAR members and wives to the Mesquite Rodeo. Everyone attempted to dress western, but some of our Yankee friends wore farmer's straw hats, thinking they looked like a cowboy.

On Saturday, while Texans relaxed and caught their breath, the out of towners enjoyed a tour of Dallas. That evening we all enjoyed a Texas Society Welcome Reception at the Storybook Ranch in McKinney. After a great western Bar-B-Que, we were entertained by a comical western folk singer, who was hilarious.

The Congress was opened on Sunday morning. That afternoon, about 80 SAR Color Guardsmen, led by our own drummer, Ed Butler, led the procession for the SAR Annual Memorial Service at the SMU Chapel. It was a hot day, and many jumped into the pool to cool off afterwards.

The Congress began to handle routine reports from general officers and committee chairman on Monday. That evening was Awards and Recognition Night. The highlight was the Minuteman Ceremony. Six members were inducted into the very select Minuteman group. It is the highest award that SAR can bestow upon a member. The new class included:

The "*" indicates those who were reelected to the same position. As Chancellor General, Judge Butler automatically become a member of the Board of Directors of the SAR Foundation.

The ladies auxiliary toured the grounds of the new Gaylord Hotel in Grapevine, where there was ample time for shopping. That afternoon, Judge Butler sponsored three one hour workshops:

1) SAR Cox Application Software; 2) DNA Workshop; and 3) How to Form a New Chapter. All were well attended, with standing room only.

Congress attendees participated in a tour of Ft. Worth on Wednesday afternoon.

At the banquet that evening, about 15 members of the TXSSAR Congress Committee were awarded the Sam Adams Convention Medal. Judge Ed Butler was awarded this medal for his work as chairman of the Genealogy Seminar.

The night of the final banquet was Robin Butler's birthday. About 435 members and guests sang happy birthday to her. Robin is serving her second year of a two year term as Vice President of the National SAR Ladies Auxiliary, and is schedule to take the reins of that organization at the 2007 Congress in Williamsburg, VA.

On July 22, Judge Ed Butler threw his hat into the ring as a candidate for NSSAR Treasurer General.

At the Mexico Society Meeting, President Douglas Stansberry announced that the \$395 member's price per person at the Faro Mazatlan Resort in Mazatlan, Mexico, would include the \$30.00 fee for the genealogy and history seminar. I BID YOU FAREWELL

THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

For hundreds of years the world had been governed by hereditary kings, despots, religious prelates, and a parliament of unlimited power, but with the coming the American Revolution their era began to ebb, and a new order of the ages began to ascend on the north American continent.. A new era in which the common man, for first time could choose the type of government under which he would live and the leaders that would serve him. In 1776 Thomas Paine spoke the thoughts of many Americans when he wrote in *The Crisis*:

“We have it in our power to begin the world anew ... America makes a stand, not for herself alone, but for the whole world.”

Over the next two hundred years the common man came to America by the millions to partake of the liberty, freedom and opportunity beckoning in her cities, villages, and wilderness. They became ordinary Americans, civil, military, religious, and world leaders.. They still come today.

America has sent men to the moon and returned them safely home; we are the economic role model of an envious world; and we are the world's only superpower; these things, born of the American Revolution we must never forget. Yet we must live humbly, be gracious in victory, never forget that there are many places in the world hostile to liberty and freedom, and that many would gladly see us fail.

These are your rallying points:

To have courage that liberty and freedom will prevail when others do not, to have faith in liberty and freedom when there seems to be little cause for faith, and to have hope for liberty and freedom when the situation seems hopeless

These words dictate what the Sons the American Revolution ought to be, what it can be, and what it must be:

The preserver and standard bearer of our heritage and an humble messenger to the world of the blessings of freedom, liberty, and opportunity

The SAR of the Past

What sort of men have composed the Sons of the American Revolution of the past?. Their deeds are well known to all of us; they gave their lives, their love, loyalty, and strength to America, all that mortality can give.

When I think of their unbending patience, their courage in the defense of our freedoms, I am filled with an admiration I cannot put into words. My estimate of them was formed many, many years ago, and has never changed. I regard them then as I regard you now – **as and standard bearers of our heritage and / a brave messenger to the world of the blessings of liberty, freedom and opportunity, and I hold you as some of the world's noblest people.**

The Tasks Ahead of Us

We now face a new world - a world of change. We reach for a new and boundless frontiers. Satellites, missiles, and space journeys mark a new era - the Space Age. And through all this welter of change, your mission remains fixed, determined:

To be brave and patriotic, to preserve for future generations the trials, tribulations, defeats, and victories of the men and women who gave us our independence and made America a land of liberty, freedom and opportunity, and to humbly spread throughout a modern, hostile, and unbelieving world the blessings of liberty, freedom and opportunity.

To accomplish these tasks your character must be like that of our Revolutionary forefathers, the men and women who fought hard, and bravely for eight long years to give America and the world freedom and opportunity, and who were willing to give all their “tomorrows,” so that their ancestors may live as free men and women.

We have many specific tasks ahead of us to preserve our heritage, two of them are:

(1) to build and operate the Center For Advancing America's Heritage,

(2) to fight like the devil against the demagogue, the cynic, the hypocrite, and the trouble maker who would destroy America rather than participate in the greatest democracy the world has ever known; and to be on guard against the misguided apologists who would have us believe the destroyers of our heritage are motivated only by high ideals and a noble desire to reform our social, governmental, and financial institutions, when their hidden goal is total destruction.

President General and First Lady

My wife, Ursula, and I shall never forget the singular honor you bestowed upon us as your President General and First Lady. Being President General and First Lady is the most important undertaking of our lives. It has immensely enriched us and you have made us the most blessed two people in the world.

My wife and I shall never forget the celebrations in Paris, France, the graciousness of our French SAR hosts, the ceremonies honoring French and American Revolutionary heroes, the re-lighting of the flame of the tomb of the Unknown French soldier beneath the Arch de Triumphe; nor shall we ever forget Normandy-American cemetery, Omaha beach, the cliffs at Pointe du Hoc, and St. Mere Eglise, the swearing in of the famous American historian Stephen Ambrose, the exciting exchange of letters with President George W. Bush, and the memorial ceremonies we conducted to honor the heroes of September 11, 2001 at Louisville, Kentucky, Trinity Church N.Y.C, the Pentagon, the fire department of Alexandria, Virginia, the heroes of United flight 93 at Somerset County, PA and the five flags emblazoned with "let's roll", and laying of the wreath on the tomb of he Unknown American in Arlington National Cemetery.

Conclusion

The good Lord has decided that my days of the good fight in our courtrooms, legislative halls, and SAR caucuses, and my days of enjoying the company of patriotic men and women deeply in love with their country, are drawing to an end. We listen for the haunting melody of marching drums, thirst for the sight of men in Revolutionary war uniforms, the proud procession of colonial and American flags, the President General's command: "Color Guard Commander post the Colors," his reply "Colors posted, Sir," the spine tingling pledge to the American flag, and the companionship and high drama of it all.. We miss the many friends we have made, a special blessing that will sustain us forever. We can only add we have dedicated our lives to the noblest of all causes: America and the Sons of the American Revolution.

God bless each of you, the Sons of the American Revolution, and these United States.
