The theme this year is: WINTER AT VALLEY FORGE


Mrs. James Taylor has graciously volunteered to head up this effort.

TEXAS STATE PRESIDENT TOM GREEN AND TXSSAR COMPATRIOTS PARTICIPATED IN THE SOLEMN PILGRIMAGE TO THE ALAMO

On a humid and unpleasantly warm afternoon, Monday the 24th of April, nine members of the Sons of the American Revolution paid homage to the brave men who, in 1836, defended the Alamo and by their bravery and supreme sacrifice did their part in securing the independence of the Republic of Texas from Mexico. This grand event took place but a scant sixty years from the time of our nation's Declaration of Independ-

ence from Great Britain. That Declaration of Independence being a peculiar, idealistic and yet a very pragmatic act inspired and stirred the inalienable right to freedom in men's hearts and minds the world over. It was in this solidarity with freedom that members of the Texas Society of the Sons of the American shrugged off the petty and annoying nuisance of heat and humidity to honor the sacrifice made by true heroes and real patriots who in two distinct, yet directly related expressions of man's drive for freedom and self governance, the American Revolution and the fortunes and even their lives. addition to those identified in the photograph above, John Weir, Stephen Rohrbough and George Harcourt participated in the pilgrimage. We all, each and everyone of us, were humbled and honored to be a part of this tribute to heroes and patriots who by their sacrifices provided us with the freedoms we so enjoy, cherish and protect.

APRIL GENERAL MEETING

- Wednesday afternoon-A variety of optional tours, ranging from visiting the site of President Kennedy's assassination to both large and boutique tours.

SPOTLIGHT ON SAN ANTONIO CHAPTER COMPATRIOTS

MYSTERY COMPATRIOT

This Compatriot is a Texas native who served his country during wartime. He was in the 9th Army Combat Engineers in Europe during World War II.

He went on to earn a degree in Chemical Engineering from the University of Texas at Austin after the war and has lived in San Antonio since 1952. After 35 years of service in the U.S. Army, active duty and reserve, he retired as a Lieutenant Colonel.

He and his wife of 38 years, Beverly, have two daughters who are teachers and one grandson who is serving in the Army. They like to travel and he has been to 23 countries and 42 states.

Throughout his shooting career he has shot pistol, international pistol, and high-power rifle. He is a life member of both the National Rifle Association and the Texas State Rifle Association.

Within the San Antonio Rifle & Pistol Club, he serves as the Statistics officer for both Rifle and Pistol divisions.

He is also an active member of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) and Sons of the Republic of Texas (SRT).

JUDGE ED BUTLER HONORED

The 2006 Minuteman Selection Committee announced Judge Ed Butler will be awarded the prestigious Minuteman Award at the 2006 National Congress in Dallas in July. It appears Compatriot Butler is the first member of the San Antonio chapter to receive this award.

The medal is rectangular in shape, struck in sterling silver. It depicts a Minuteman holding a rifle with a plow in the back-ground. The Liberty Bell appears on it also. On the reverse is inscribed "Highest Award of the National Society Sons of the American Revolution." The medal is worn suspended from a neck ribbon of light blue silk. It is awarded only to individual members on a one time basis.

The Minuteman Award is the highest award presented to a member by the National Society. It is presented for distinguished service rendered to the SAR on the national level. Members are selected by the Minuteman Committee which is appointed by the President General from previous recipients of the medal. The medal is presented by the President General at an Annual Congress to not more than six recipients. It is not presented inabsentia. It was authorized in 1952.
