
PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

There are many stories as to its actual beginnings, with over two dozen cities and towns laying claim to being the birthplace of Memorial Day. It is now celebrated in almost every State on the last Monday in May (passed by Congress with the National Holiday Act of 1971 (P.L. 90 - 363) to ensure a three day weekend for Federal holidays).

As I reflect on the events coming up starting with Memorial Day, I think of those who have sacrificed in so many ways for this country and the price it takes for our freedom. At Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery we have over 100,00 service members who have passed away and are buried there. The Scouts honor
