CHAPTER CELEBRATES INDEPENDENCE DAY AT THE HYATT REGENCY HILL COUNTRY RESORT



This year we celebrated the 239th anniversary of our nations Declaration of Independence from England. For the fifth time, our chapter was invited by Ms Nicole Gravelle, Marketing Manager for the Hyatt Regency Hill Country Resort and Spa, to conduct our **educational and historical event** for hotel guests visiting the resort on July 3rd. The Master of Ceremonies was Compatriot Frank Rohrbough. Chapter President Bob Hancock opened the Program welcoming of the guest and explaining what "SAR" is and does.

(**Photo at Left**) For the second time we had our musician friends Kate Bolcar (Fifer) and her husband Gerard Cortese (Drummer) give their demonstration on the Role of a Fifer and Drummer in the Revolutionary War. This event, together with Compatriot Peter Baron's overview of the Revolutionary Period Uniforms and the use of Period Muskets and Rifles added greatly to our one hour program that proved very entertaining to over 100 hotel guests and staff.

Fourteen chapter members participated in the morning event. They included Bob Hancock, Stephen Rohrbough (Vice-President-General for NSSAR's South Central District), Compatriots Tom Small, Paul Reynolds, Jim Massingill, James Taylor, Fred Soupiset, Peter Baron and his young son Campbell, Frank Rohrbough, Schuylar Crist, Bud Davenport, Larry Luckett and Roy Leonard.

The National Colors and SAR Flags were presented by Acting Command Color Commander Peter Baron, Compatriots Stephen Rohrbough, Fred Soupiset and Paul Reynolds. Participating with the Color Guard were our Fifer and Drummer as noted above.

(Photo Below) Compatriot Peter Baron told the audience the evolution of the Patriot Uniforms during the

Revolution starting with the Minutemen of Massachusetts and



Mountain Men of Virginia and the Carolinas to the Regimental Uniforms that were approved by the Continentals Congress in 1778. Shown from left to right in early militia uniforms are Compatriots Hancock, Stephen Rohrbough and Fred Soupiset. In a Pastor's Attire at far right is Compatriot Paul Reynolds and in a Officers First Virginia Regimental Continental

Line Uniform (second from far left) is Compatriot Frank Rohrbough. Compatriot Baron continued describing the guns used by Foot Soldiers in the Militia and the Continental Line Army, a 75 caliber flintlock musket and a 50 caliber flintlock rifle. More specifically, he noted that a good soldier could load and fire a musket three times in one minute while a rifleman could load and fire once every 90 seconds. However, he conceded that the rifle is more accurate. Compatriot Baron described the position of soldiers when engaged in field battles. **More on Page 3**.

To help the guest better understand our member's connection to the Revolution, two of our Compatriots told their Patriot Ancestor Stories. 
between 77 militiamen and nearly ten times that number of British Regulars which resulted in the death of eight Lexington Minutemen. The Redcoats moved on to Concord to roundup the Stockpile of weapons and gun powder thought to be stored in the local Armory. When they got there, several thousand farmer-soldiers were assembled at the South Bridge and already knew of the bloodshed at Lexington. With their nerves steeled, the Americans drove the Redcoats out of Concord and back to Boston and placed the city under siege. The Revolution had begun.

Compatriot Larry Luckett spoke of his Patriot Ancestor Andrew Broga, 2nd Connecticut Regiment (later 22nd Continental Line), of his service at the Battle of Bunker Hill and the Siege of Boston, the Battle of Long Island and Washington's night time escape from Brooklyn Heights to Manhattan Island and later the evacuation of the Continental Army from New York City to New Jersey.




NSSAR CELEBRATES 125TH NATIONAL CONGRESS

MEMRIAL RESOLUTION RESPECTING COMPATRIOT GUNNERY SERGEANT JOHN ROBERT WILMETH, USMC (RET)

WHEREAS, The hand of death on 1 August 2015 entered our ranks and removed from our midst, COM-PATRIOT JOHN ROBERT WILMETH, our venerable and esteemed brother in arms, and

WHEREAS, COMPATRIOT WILMETH was born on 1 August 1921 in Dallas, Dallas County, Texas. He was the son of John Marion Wilmeth and Mabel Marie Green, whose ancestors were influential in the founding of the American Colonies. During much of his lifetime COMPATRIOT WILMET served in the United States Marine Corps. At the time of his death he resided in San Antonio, Bexar, Texas. A memorial service was held for him on 6 August 2015 at Sunset Memorial Park in San Antonio, Bexar, Texas, where his earthly remains were placed at eternal rest beside his loving wife, and

WHEREAS, by virtue of the proven patriotic service during the Revolutionary War of his ancestor Second Sergeant James Ferguson of Orange County, Virginia who received a Service Pension for his service, and

WHEREAS, COMPATRIOT WILMETH successfully proved his direct lineage from the above Patriot, and was admitted to membership in the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution on 27 March 1996 as member number 146242 and simultaneously was granted membership in the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, member number 7876, and

WHEREAS, COMPATRIOT WILMETH was an active member of the San Antonio Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, and during that time participated in the activities of the chapter, serving as Chapter President in 2000 & 2001 and receiving the SAR War Service Medal, the TXSSAR 2003 Patriot Medal, the Bronze Good Citizenship Medal, and the TXSSAR Silver & Bronze Service Medals, and thereby contributing to the chapter's continued success, and

WHEREAS, COMPATRIOT WILMETH was proud of his distinguished heritage and also recognized his lineage with active memberships in the Sons of the Republic of Texas, The Sons of Confederate Veterans, Hood's Texas Brigade #153, and Austin's Old Three Hundred, and

WHEREAS, COMPATRIOT WILMETH began his life of service by entering the Marine Corp in 1939. He was a drill instructor at the outset of WWII in San Diego before being deployed to the Pacific Theater. In 1947 John left the Marine Corps and married Goldie Mae Col. He returned to the Marine Corps in 1954 and served until retiring in 1968. He also worked for Morris Glass Company for over 30 years, and

WHEREAS, COMPATRIOT WILMETH was a man of GOD, having served the Lord as a deacon of the First Baptist Church, in San Antonio, and

WHEREAS, COMPATRIOT WILMETH left surviving him his loving and devoted family: his Children, Jeannie Wilmeth Best and John Wilmeth, his 5 grandchildren and his 9 great-grandchildren to whom we express our deepest sympathy on their respective loss, and

WHEREAS, upon his death, our country and state lost a loyal citizen and Patriot whose devotion never faltered. He was one of the most zealous and faithful defenders of the principles for which our patriotic ancestors fought in the battle against the British for American Independence. In his quiet and unassuming way he did much to promote the progress and development of his country and the happiness of those around him. He was a good, quiet and modest person and enjoyed the respect, esteem and admiration of all who knew him.

John Wilmeth Memorial Resolution (Cont'd)

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the San Antonio Chapter, Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution as follows:

FIRST: That this chapter has lost a loyal and devoted member. To his family and friends we express our thanks for sharing his life with us and extend our profound condolences at his passing from our ranks. That this country and state have lost and honorable, upright and honest citizen, who was always ready to spend his life and give his service for that which he believed to be right and for the best interests of his country and state. To that end we dedicate ourselves anew to the continuance of the service to the country which his lifetime so well performed. We further Resolve that we are pledged again to cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in Securing for mankind the blessings of Liberty.

SECOND: That this country and state have lost and honorable, upright and honest citizen, who was always ready to spend his life and give his service for that which he believed to be right and for the best interests of his country and state. To that end we dedicate ourselves anew to the continuance of the service to the country which his lifetime so well performed. We further Resolve that we are pledged again to cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in Securing for mankind the blessings of Liberty.

THIRD: That for the purposes of perpetuating the memory of his life and fidelity to the purposes of the Sons of the American Revolution, and his steady devotion to duty, duplicate copies of this Resolution shall be entered into the minutes of this chapter, which he loved so well, and delivered to his family. The Resolution will also be read to chapter members attending a regular monthly meeting and will be displayed on the chapter Internet web page. The Resolution may also be submitted to the Texas Society for publication in a future edition of The Texas Patriot, it's magazine.

FOURTH: That a duplicate of this Resolution shall be bound together with other similar Memorial Resolutions of the San Antonio Chapter, Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution into a minimum of three books. Copies of this book will be donated to:

- 1. The San Antonio, Texas Public Library,
- 2. The National Library of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution in Louisville, Kentucky, and
 - 3. Chapter Genealogist, San Antonio Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution.

FIFTH: As a token of our love and respect for our Compatriot, we have purchased a suitable book on the American Revolution or about one of its many patriots. That book will be donated to a local Public School Library in San Antonio with an inscription referencing COMPATRIOT JOHN WILMETH.
