### GUEST SPEAKER FOR SEPTEMBER CHAPTER MEETING WAS COMPATRIOT BILL COVINGTON

(Photo Right) Compatriot Bill Covington was our guest speaker for our September 15th Chapter Meeting. His topic: "The Churches and the American Revolution" addressed religion and its impact on the American Revolution. Following his retirement as a public school teacher he became an adjunct instructor of Western Civilization, US History, Texas History and World History at Navarro College, in Waxahachie, Texas.

His remarks are summarized as follows: "America was founded upon several key principles among which was the principle of religious freedom or freedom from religion. The first clergyman documented as arriving in the colonies came with the first settlers to the Jamestown colony in 1607. Numerous European sects sought refuge and land in the New World due to the all-encompassing nature of religious freedom as it was manifested in the British North American colonies. The Pilgrims and Puritans in Massachusetts; the Quakers, Moravians, and Dunkards in Pennsylvania; and the Shakers in New York are just a few of these important religious groups that further shaped US history. The American Methodists, with their emphasis on circuit riders, were formed immediately after the American Revolution in an effort to prove their loyalty to the newly independent country."



Based on his presentation it's understandable why Compatriot Covington was selected as the Texas Society Daughters of the American Revolution's 2017 Outstanding Teacher of US History Award.

## SAR'S BRONZE GOOD CITIZENSHIP AWARD PRESENTED TO ALFRED "A. J." CHANEY

District, Alamo Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, from 1 January 2019 to 30 June 2021. Mr. Chaney performed his duties as professional Scout Executive for the newly created Coyote District in a consistently noteworthy fashion. Consisting of some eighty-five units including Cub Scout Packs, Scouts BSA Troops and Venture Crews, and formed by combining three different districts into one larger diverse organization, Mr. Chaney used his expertise, dynamic management ability and sterling "Scout Spirit," to mold Coyote District into a cohesive and highly successful operation. When young ladies were finally accepted into full BSA membership, Mr. Chaney was instrumental in establishing girls troops which ultimately helped produce several of the first female Eagle Scouts in Bexar County.



As the COVID crisis struck, it was Mr. Chaney's leadership and enthusiasm that helped keep up the morale of both his Scouts and their leaders. His ability to find solutions to COVID's unique challenges insured the district and its units maintained their advancement, service and outdoor programs at near normal levels while at the same time meeting all the protocols demanded by the virus. His actions during one of the most difficult periods in the one hundred eleven year history of the Boy Scouts of America upheld the finest traditions of American citizenship and reflected great credit upon himself and the Boy Scouts of America."



Pridgeon is an Air Force veteran whose trade was as a "sign painter". In 2010 a father of a deceased soldier asked if he would paint a portrait of his son which would give his some solace as he grieved the loss of his son. At



the age of 75 Ken saw a new calling for doing many such portraits for other parents who saw the gift that Ken had given to others. Now at 86 he says "I still paint all the time about 13 to 15 hours a day, six days a week." He said that he makes a print of each portrait and presents it to the family of the fallen soldier. He doesn't get paid for his work but relies on donations from municipal organizations.

This recognition presentation was organized by former Texas Society President Tom Jackson based on the recommendation of Compatriot Scott Giltner, Chairman of the



National Society SAR Veterans Committee. Pridgeon brought four portraits for display with two shown here. He has done over 500 portraits of Texas

veterans and an untold numbers of portraits for other parents around the country.

His portraits are on display in the Fallen Texas Warriors Memorial Gallery located in Spring Texas.



### CHAPTER HISTORICAL VIGNETTE

Chapter Historian Larry Loop provided a vignette on the "Cornwallis Surrender at Yorktown" which coincides with this

months Chapter Meeting. The vignette reads: "On this day in history, October 19, 1781, British General Charles Cornwallis surrenders at Yorktown. The Battle of Yorktown was the last major battle of the American Revolution. Although fighting did continue in various areas, peace negotiations began the following spring and eventually brought the war to an end.

The British had successfully conquered Georgia and South Carolina in 1779 and 1780. When General Cornwallis invaded North Carolina, however, things didn't go so well. In the spring of 1781, Cornwallis was forced to the coast for resupplying and regrouping. He marched to Virginia instead, thinking it would be easier to conquer than North Carolina had proved to be.

After arriving in Virginia, Cornwallis received orders from his superior, General Henry Clinton, in New York, to make a deep water port on the Chesapeake, where supplies

and reinforcements from New York could be landed. Cornwallis marched to Yorktown in the summer of 1781 and began reinforcements.

George Washington, meanwhile, left New York with French General, the Comte de Rochambeau, with 7,000 soldiers. They met with the Marquis de Lafayette and his army in Virginia, while French Admiral, the Comte de Grasse, fought off a British fleet bringing reinforcements to Cornwallis and landed thousands more French soldiers. In all, 17,000 French and American troops surrounded Yorktown.

The allies began bombarding Yorktown after digging a siege trench. For days, bombs rained down on Cornwallis who began running out of food and ammunition. After nearly two weeks of resisting, Cornwallis knew reinforcements from New York would not arrive in time and he reluctantly sent out a drummer with a white flag on October 17.

Negotiations were held over the next two days at the home of Augustine Moore, which is still standing. On the 19th, the official surrender ceremony was held. The American and French soldiers marched into town and the British soldiers marched between the two allies and laid down their arms. British drummers and fifers played a popular British song called "The World Turned Upside Down," as the troops surrendered.

At the formal surrender ceremony, General Cornwallis refused to attend, feigning illness. He sent his second in command, General Charles O'Hara, to surrender his sword to George Washington instead. At the ceremony, O'Hara tried to give the sword to the French General, Rochambeau, but he refused it and directed him to General Washington. As O'Hara was Cornwallis' second, Washington refused to honor this breach of protocol and he directed O'Hara to surrender the sword to his own second, General Benjamin Lincoln.

The surrender at Yorktown finally convinced Parliament that war with the colonists was futile. Peace negotiations began the following spring. Fighting did continue in the colonies and around the globe after the Battle of Yorktown, but the war finally came to an end when the Treaty of Paris was signed on September 3, 1783." <a href="http://www.revolutionary-war-and-beyond.com">http://www.revolutionary-war-and-beyond.com</a>

### MEMBER EARNS EAGLE SCOUT AWARD

Benjamin has earned nearly 40 BSA Merit Badges while working toward the Eagle rank. He has been in scouting for 9 years and achieved the rank of

Eagle Scout soon after his 16<sup>th</sup> birthday. Benjamin is a junior at the STEM Academy located at Legacy of Education Excellence (LEE) High School in San Antonio, Texas.

Compatriot Bowles' Eagle Scout Project was building a train playscape at the Texas Transportation Museum in the spring of 2020. The project required raising hundreds of dollars for materials and over 300 man hours to cut the wood and build the engine and tender.

### SAR BRONZE GOOD CITENZENSHIP AWARD FOR COMMANDER MENDOZA

Commander Loreto "Manny" Mendoza, Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery, Honor Guard Detachment was presented the SAR Bronze Good Citizenship Medal and Certificate for his dedicated service as Commander. The Citation reads in part: "For outstanding leadership and noteworthy citizenship while serving as Commander, Memorial Services Detachment (MSD), Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery, San Antonio, Texas, from September 2019 to September 2021. MSD was founded in 1991 to provide funeral honors for veterans being laid to rest at this national cemetery and has earned a reputation for dedication and service that few veteran organizations can match. Commander Mendoza implemented a series of management actions that significantly improved the overall efficiency of the 120 member detachment. When the



COVID crisis struck, all veteran funeral honors were halted. Recognizing the importance of providing support for grieving families, Commander Mendoza proposed a plan to provide these honors using a reduced force of MSD members. The plan was accepted and allowed MSD to resume operations and function throughout the worst of the crisis. His actions have upheld the finest traditions of American volunteer citizenship and reflect great credit upon himself and the Memorial Services Detachment."
