

NOVEMBER CHAPTER MEETING

Our Chapter Meeting was held at the Petroleum Club on November 15th. Our Guest

Speaker for the November Chapter Meeting was Dr. Bryan Howard, Ph.D., Curator, Ft. Sam Houston Museum. Dr. Howard provided a wonderful overview of the Museum's History and its many artifacts telling how the practice of Medicine changed over the course of time during the years of the US Army Medical Department. He also noted that AMEDD Museum Foundation was formed to promote the promulgation and preservation of Army medical legacy and heritage. It works to provide financial support for enhancing the artifact collections and museum infrastructure; holding appropriate ceremonies in honor of AMEDD personnel, units, and events; and educating a diverse and worldwide audience of the significance of AMEDD contributions.

President Weitzel presented Dr. Howard a book authored by Compatriot Judge Edward F. Butler entitled "The Warriors". It is a novel based on historical facts about Bernardo Galvez and Spain's involvement in the American Revolution and its influence on the events leading up to our Independence.

CHAPTER HONORS WWII WARRIOR

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) announced that

U.S. Army Pfc. Clinton E. Smith, Jr., 19, of Wichita Falls, Texas, killed during World War II, was accounted for Sept. 28, 2022. In January 1945, Smith was assigned to Company D, 1st Battalion, 157th Infantry Regiment, 45th Infantry Division. The unit was engaged with German forces during the Battle of Reipertswiller in France and was surrounded, along with four other companies. Smith was killed in an artillery strike on Jan. 14, but his body could not be recovered because of the fighting. Beginning in 1946, the American Graves Registration Command (AGRC), the organization that searched for and recovered fallen American personnel in the European Theater, searched the area around Reipertswiller, finding 37 unidentified sets of American remains, none of which could be identified as Smith. He was declared non-recoverable on March 29, 1951. DPAA historians have been conducting on-going research into Soldiers missing from combat around Reipertswiller, and found that X-6985 St. Avold, which had been buried at Lorraine American Cemetery, an American Battle Monuments Commission site in St. Avold, France, could be associated with Smith. X-6985 was disinterred in August 2021 and transferred to the DPAA Laboratory at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, for analysis. To identify Smith's remains, scientists from DPAA used dental and anthropological analysis, as well as circumstantial evidence. Additionally, scientists from the Armed Forces Medical Examiner System used mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA) analysis. Smith's name is recorded on the Walls of the Missing at Epinal American Cemetery, an American Battle Monuments Commission site in Dinozé, France, along with others still missing from WWII. A rosette will be placed next to his name to indicate he has been accounted for. Smith was buried in San Antonio, Texas, on November 7, 2023.

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WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA (WAA) EVENT HELD AT SAN ANTONIO NATIONAL CEMETERY

Volunteers remembered over three million veterans this year. We celebrated National Wreaths Across America Day at the San Antonio National Cemetery locate just east of downtown.

Teach" about the many ways veterans have served our country. Throughout the year WAA works in a number of ways to show veterans and their families that we will not forget — we will never forget — those who have served.

During this event WAA Wreaths were placed at the foot of each gravestone to honor each veteran for their service. The person placing a wreath respectfully recited the veterans name and stated "Thank you for your Service" while rendering a hand salute.

Over 3100 wreaths were placed this year which covered all of the headstones in the Cemetery. With over

300 more wreaths remaining Volunteers were invited to take them to the Confederate Cemetery a short block away to place them at the headstone of other veterans.

Our chapter became a Participating Organization of the Wreaths Across America this year which prompted many of our members to purchase 73 Wreaths for placement at the headstone of each veterans interred at the historic San Antonio National Cemetery and the Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery.

HISTORICAL VINGETTE

Our Chapter Historian Larry Loop provided an historical vignette at the December 13th Chapter Meeting addressing the Boston Tea Party Event that sparked a movement which lead to the American Revolution.



(**Photo Left**) The Vignette reads: "On December 16, 1773, the **Boston Tea Party** took place when a group of angry patriots dumped the tea from three ships into Boston Harbor to protest Parliament's tax on tea. In 1767, the **Townshend Acts** placed a tax on tea and other items for the first time, leading to boycotts of English goods in the colonies. The **Townshend Acts** were finally repealed in 1770, except for the tea tax, which Parliament left in place to assert that it did indeed have the right to tax the colonists.

By 1773, the British East India Company, the main importer of tea to England and the colonies, was suffering a severe financial crisis. The **Indemnity Act of 1767**, which removed certain taxes on the Company, had expired, causing the price of tea to go up. Tons of tea that could not be sold at the higher price sat in warehouses in London. In order to rescue the Company, Parliament passed the **Tea Act of 1773**, which removed taxes on the Company, allowed it to export directly to the colonies, thereby bypassing middlemen who raised the price and raised the tax on end-consumers.

The **Tea** Act actually lowered the price of tea in America, but the colonists stood on the principle that it was unjust for Parliament to tax them at all because they were not represent-

ed in Parliament. Seven (7) tea ships left England for America that year. Patriots at Philadelphia and New York successfully prevented the ships from unloading, while the ship at Charleston, South Carolina was confiscated by patriots and the goods resold to aid the patriot cause.

In Boston, the *Dartmouth*, arrived on November 27 and was prevented from unloading by local patriots. The *Eleanor* and the *Beaver* arrived over the next few weeks, but they could not unload either, while a fourth ship was lost in a storm. By law, ships arriving in the Americas had 20 days to pay the required customs duties, meaning the taxes due on the *Dartmouth's* cargo had to be paid by December 17. The owners and captains of the ships volunteered to return the goods to England, but Royal Governor Thomas Hutchinson would not allow them to leave until the taxes were paid. Local citizens posted sentries around the ships to prevent them from unloading.

On the 16th, a mass meeting of 7,000 people met at the Old South Meeting House in Boston. After the meeting, which was led by **Samuel Adams**, several dozen men, some dressed as Mohawk Indians, marched to Griffin's Wharf and boarded the ships. Approximately 42 tons of tea, enough to fill 18.5 million tea bags, from all three ships was dumped into the harbor; so much that the water of Boston Harbor was reportedly brown for a week!

The present-day value of the destroyed tea has been estimated at around \$1 million. The dumping of the tea on this date was important because it meant the tea could not be resold to pay the taxes.

The term **Boston Tea Party** was not used for nearly another century. In fact, many Americans looked down upon the event for the first several decades after the Revolutionary War because it involved the destruction of private property. Eventually, though, the event came to represent a moment of pride in American history as a revolt against tyranny. Parliament responded to the **Boston Tea Party** by passing the **Coercive Acts**, which ended self-government in Massachusetts by disbanding the colonial assembly and **shut down the port** of Boston until the price of the tea was repaid. Theses "**Intolerable Acts**," as the colonists called them, were the direct cause of the calling of the **First Continental Congress**, which met to coordinate the joint response of the united colonies."

Massachusetts DAR is participating in the grand commemoration of this anniversary by hosting a 2-day event. On Friday, December 15th, Daughters from across the country and special guests will tour the Old South Meeting House, the Old State House, and the Museum of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery located on the top floor of Faneuil Hall. We will also tour the Boston Tea Party Ships and Museum, and have lunch with a tea-tasting of the five teas that were destroyed. An America 250! Marker will be dedicated at the Boston Tea Party Ships and Museum, since many Tea Party participants are proven DAR patriots. There will be a banquet in the rooftop ballroom of the Omni Parker House Hotel. The speaker, Michele Gabrielson, will present a program on "A Bittersweet Victory: The Role of Chocolate in the Revolution.

On Saturday, December 16th, the Boston Tea Party Chapter is holding a high tea with Samuel Adams coming to rally us to take the trolleys down to Griffin's Wharf so that we may watch the Boston Tea Party Ships and Museum reenactment of "Huzzah! Make Boston Harbor a Teapot Tonight!

P.S. Compatriot Loop was recognized by the Green Mountain Boys DAR Chapter with the presentation of the new DAR Hannah White Arnett Medal. It is awarded to a member in good standing with the Sons of the American Revolution for unselfish devotion, tireless efforts, and assistance to the DAR.

MEMORIAL OF COMPATRIOT LT. COLONEL WILLIAM BUELL



William Collins Buell V, age 89, of San Antonio, Texas passed away on Tuesday, 28 No-

vember 2023. Until his death, Bill had been the longest serving active member of the San Antonio Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution having joined the SAR in May 1956

Bill Buell was born in Mount Vernon, Ohio. He had enlisted service for two years before earning an appointment to the US Military Academy at West Point, NY, in 1954. He was a cadet at West Point when he joined the SAR and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant upon graduation from USMA in 1959. His military career included service in Korea, Hawaii, Spain, Vietnam (2 tours), Germany, Panama, and the Dominican Republic, as well as an assignment as Assistant Professor of Spanish at USMA in 1965-1968. His military awards and commendations included Airborne/Ranger; 2 awards of The Legion of Merit; 2 Bronze Star Medals; the Purple Heart; Defense Meritorious Service Medal; Air Medal; Joint Service Commendation Medal; Army Com-

mendation Medal w/3 OLC and V device (valor); RVN Cross of Gallantry w/silver star and palm. He retired from military service in 1981 at the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. Following his military retirement he was a Spanish and Latin teacher, a Vice Principal, and the Dean of Faculty and Instruction at high schools in San Antonio, Texas, 1982-1997. During the period 1998-2005 he was a Home School Latin and Spanish teacher.

In addition to the Sons of the American Revolution, Bill was an active member of numerous hereditary societies, including: The Society of the Cincinnati; The Crown of Charlemagne; The Plantagenet Society; Descendants of the Ancient & Honorable Artillery Company; The Mayflower Society; Sons of the Republic of Texas; Colonial Wars; Founders and Patriots; The War of 1812; and Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. He served as Registrar, Huguenot Society of Texas, 2012-2017. At the time of his death, he was serving as Registrar General of the National Huguenot Society beginning in 2017, as well as Corresponding Secretary, Texas Division of the Magna Charta Dames & Barons, and Flag Bearer of the San Antonio Colony. He was a long time member and former officer of the San Antonio Genealogical and Historical Society. In 2020 he was co-author of 2020 UPDATE to The Register of Qualified Huguenot Ancestors of The National Huguenot Society

A Military Funeral will be held at Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery on February 12, 2024 at 11:00 A.M.
