He has agreed to be our NSSAR Representative at the Audie Murphy VA Medical Center.

Compatriot Larry Luckett is our Registrar, and Larry and Bob are working together to assist prospective members, and our Chapter members who are assisting potential new members, with their applications. This is a critical part of our Chapter's health, and we continue to add new members, thanks to our Chapter members who help with applications, and Larry and Bob working diligently to approve, submit, and track applications. A great job being performed by many of our members.

We are actively seeking someone to take on the position of Publicity Chair. This position will require someone to "tell our story", by seeking the cooperation of newspaper, radio, and television professionals to assist him in getting out the word about our Chapter.

With the move of our ROTC/JROTC Committee Chairman Paul Reynolds to Ohio last summer, we are pleased to have Compatriot John Bell take on this great responsibility. He has already contacted 43 high schools and 3 universities. He will be seeking members to present our SAR Awards in person during April and May at these Awards Programs.

A sincere "thank you" to Compatriot Frank Rohrbough, for all he does for the Chapter, including producing six Newsletters, such as this January-February issue, every calendar year. Frank's Newsletters capture all of our Chapter's activities, and the Newsletters have become our "corporate memory" when names, dates, and Events are needed for our various Chapter Annual Reports.

Speaking of Annual Reports, Frank produces the "USS Stark Report" every year. The NSSAR authorized, in 1988, the USS Stark Memorial Award to memorialize those brave men and women who continue to stand at the forefront to preserve the freedoms our patriotic ancestors fought so long and hard to achieve. Its purpose is to recognize outstanding chapters and the most outstanding state society within the NSSAR for their participation with the Veteran community, and supporting activities of the NSSAR Veterans Committee. For 2021, Frank reported 20,835 points for service to the Veteran community, and in 2022 topped 2021 by reporting 25,626 points, thanks in large part to the many hours reported by Frank Kebelman. Our Chapter has won the USS Stark Award for several years, which cannot be won in consecutive years. Thanks Frank!

Another critical Annual Report is the "Americanism Report". The NSSAR considers this Report to be the "road map" for the Chapters, since the 12 "Tabs" of the Report run the gamut of all of our Chapter's activities. For 2021, we reported 6,560 points, which made our Chapter #7 Nationally, and #1 in Texas, in the "151+ Members" category. For 2022, we reported 10,095 points, up considerably from the 2021 total. I suggest all of our members become familiar with the Americanism Report and the Tabs in the Report. We'll provide the links to the reading material in the very near future.

In closing, we will continue holding our monthly chapter meetings at the Petroleum Club featuring many interesting speakers who have agreed to enlighten us with many topics that you may find informative and interesting.

#### THIS DAY IN HISTORY

(**Photo Right**) Our Historian Larry Loop provided an Historical Vignette on "First Blood" of the American Revolution shed on January 19, 1770 at the Battle of Golden Hill. The Liberty Pole in

New York City was first erected on the Commons in 1766. Soldiers in a barracks on the north side of the Commons saw this sign of defiance every day and tore it down in August, only to have 3,000 angry citizens confront them. Both sides were armed, but no one was hurt. The citizens erected another pole, but it was torn down in September. A third pole was erected, and this one stood until March 18, 1769, when it was torn down after that month's Stamp Act repeal celebrations.



Yet another pole was raised, this one sheathed in iron to protect it. On March 21, soldiers attempted to blow it up with gunpowder but failed. Two more attempts were made, but thwarted. This pole stood on the Commons until December, 1769, when the new Assembly complied with the Quartering Act by giving some money for the upkeep of the soldiers, an act which previous assemblies had refused. This caused a new round of protests at the Liberty Pole and soldiers tried to blow it up on the night of January 13, 1770. They stopped when citizens from the local Montagne's Tavern sounded the alarm and ransacked the tavern instead. The Sons of Liberty called for a meeting at the pole the next Wednesday, but the soldiers finally succeeded in blowing it up the night before. When it was discovered, a mob of citizens approached the nearby barracks. The soldiers lined up with drawn bayonets, but officers corralled them back inside.

On January 19, several soldiers began posting handbills around town which demeaned the local citizens. Sons of Liberty leader Isaac Sears and others stopped them, but some escaped. (Continued on Page 4)

Sears took 2 prisoners to the mayor's house and a large crowd gathered. Soon a group of 20 soldiers showed up to rescue their friends. The 2 soldiers

in the house were alarmed by the crowd and told their friends to leave, which they did, but the crowd followed them, harassing them with epithets.

When the soldiers reached Golden Hill, a small hill where wheat was grown, another group of soldiers arrived. This emboldened the first group and they turned to face the angry crowd. At this point, one of the soldiers cried out, "Draw your bayonets and cut your way through them!" They attacked the crowd, which began to flee, lunging at anyone who came across their path. Francis Field, an innocent bystander, was slashed across the face when he stepped into his doorway to see what was the matter. A food vendor and a fisherman were injured and another man took a near fatal bayonet stab.

Finally, British officers arrived and were able to get control of their men. None of the victims died, however. The following day, violence flared again and a sailor was stabbed with a bayonet. The Battle of Golden Hill is often called the "First Blood" of the American Revolution. The Boston Massacre would happen six weeks later.

The Battle of Golden Hill was even more significant than the Boston Massacre in that it was a protracted skirmish that lasted several days. The Boston Massacre would earn the greater place in history though, because of the actual casualties that occurred... and because of the more skillful propaganda machine of the Boston Sons of Liberty.





## **GUEST SPEAKER FOR FEBRUARY CHAPTER MEETING**

Once again we were delighted to have Professor Arnold Alvarado, a chapter

member, return as our Guest Speaker. A noted teacher of American and European history, he spoke to us at our November 16, 2022 Meeting about "The Constitution — its Origins and Framework." He continued with that topic speaking on "Political Theory and the Constitution."

Compatriot Alvarado provided a very interesting history on the "Balance of Nature" referring to Plato's support the balance of nature concept that proposes that ecological systems are usually in a stable equilibrium. Our founding fathers were well-educated and well-read. They wanted a system of government that provided "checks and balances" which provided protections of government from the people and protections of people from the government. The first consideration provided a central government at the federal level and the state level — federalism versus states rights.

Thus the Constitutional Congress convened in the summer of 1787 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania to form a document starting with the Preamble to the Constitution. It reads in part "form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, ensure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessing of Liberty". Compatriot Alvarado remarked that the Framers understood that human nature would drive political divides — matters based on the "heart" would be more supportive in House of Representative and such matters would receive a more deliberative review in the Senate. The Framers wanted to divide the power among the different branches of government which would ensure that no single branch would become too powerful. Article I outlines the powers of the Congress, Article II the powers of the Executive Branch and Article III the

powers of the Judicial Branch.

Compatriot Alvarado spoke without any notes thus showing his extensive knowledge of American history and the insights the Framers considered when drafting the U.S. Constitution. During the First Congress in 1789, James Madison introduced a bill to add a Bill of Rights to the Constitution. Compatriot Alvarado noted that the Constitution was later modified to include the Bill of Rights, which protects the people from the government, that was ratified by the states and added to the Constitution on December 15, 1791. (**Photo Right**) President Weitzel presented Compatriot Alvarado the SAR Bronze Good Citizen Medal and Chapter Coin.
