Van Zandt Bestows SAR Life Saving Awards

On Monday, June 19th, at the Parker County Hospital District EMS Training Center in Weatherford, Texas, officers and compatriots of the Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter #6, Fort Worth, recognized and honored two EMTs with the SAR Life Saving Medal.

On February 14, 2023, "an 18-Wheeler rear-ended another 18-Wheeler at interstate speeds on I-20 in Weatherford. The driver of the vehicle was trapped inside; he was unconscious and barely breathing upon the arrival of our EMS crew. They inserted a rescue-airway device and started breathing for the patient until he could be removed from the cab. The driver had significant injuries to his lower extremities, including an amputated leg, requiring x3 tourniquets to be placed to stop the bleeding. Two of our Critical Care Paramedics, Mindy Lane and Jordan Tolliver, were sent to the incident. The patient was intubated, given two units of blood and one unit of plasma. The patient's breathing deteriorated, so the critical care medics performed bilateral finger thoracostomies."

"Their advanced training and expertise prevented a loss of life and allowed the victim to make a full recovery despite the loss of a leg."

The Parker County Hospital District provides emergency medical services in Parker County. EMS Units are all staffed with Paramedics in Mobile Intensive Care Units.

In addition, Mindy and Jordan received a Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Challenge Coin.

On Tuesday, June 20, 2023, chapter officers and compatriots recognized and honored three officers of the Fort Worth Police Department for saving the life of a kidnapped, abandoned infant.

On May 18th, officers responded around 7:00 pm to reports of a kidnapping. A woman reported that a man had jumped into her car and taken off with her 6-month old baby boy still in the car.

The search for the car was immediately bolstered with officers from other divisions including narcotics, gang, and direct response units. It took them an hour and 20 minutes to find the car, about a mile and a half away from the home of the mother, but the baby wasn't in it.

A suspect was taken into custody when police found the car and officers questioned him while they continued to search the area. By this time, darkness was quickly approaching. The suspect directed the officers to where the baby was abandoned. It took about five minutes for Sgt. Ronnie Chau and Officers Steve Smith and Wesley Davis to find the baby in a ravine located off a dead-end street in a residential area. The ravine was about half a mile away from where the car was located. Fortunately, the baby was unharmed but the outcome could have been much different if not for the swift response by the Fort Worth Police Department and especially the three officers involved.

For their actions, the Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter awarded the three police officers with the SAR Life Saving Medal. They also each received a Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Challenge Coin.

Unfortunately, Officer Wesley Davis was not able to attend the ceremony but will receive his medal, certificate, and Challenge Coin from FWPD management.

Following the ceremony, Texas SAR Vice President District 5 Ron Turner presented FWPD Chief Neil Noakes with a Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter Challenge Coin. In return, Chief Noakes presented each SAR Compatriot with his personal FWPD Challenge Coin.

Members of the Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter enjoy a great rapport with the Fort Worth Police Department and vice versa. They are very appreciative of our efforts to honor and recognize their officers with the SAR Public Service awards.

On June 10, 2023, Ten Texas Color Guardsman answered the call to serve as Color Guard for the DAR Houston Area Regents Council Flag Day Luncheon. Held at the Junior League in Houston Texas, Saturday, 10 June 2023, the sixteen local Chapters were represented by their Regents with over 200 DAR members in attendance. DAR President General Pamela Rouse Wright and Texas Society President Sam Massey were honored guests.

Led by Texas Southern Color Guard Commander David Hamaker, Compatriots from Freedom, Paul Carrington, and Bernardo de Galvez Chapters came together to present and retire the Colors for the Daughters. Color Guardsmen present included: Sam Massey (TXSSAR President), John K. Thompson (past TXSSAR CG Commander), Art Byram (Freedom Chapter President), Don Hayes, William Meyers, Ed Sellards, David Peavy (Paul Carrington Chapter Past President), Wesley Vick, and Michael Bierman.

Mrs. Marcy-Carter-Lovick, State Regent for the Texas Society DAR and guest speaker for the Luncheon, chose as her topic "Stars and Stripes Forever: Honoring Old Glory". She spoke on the history of an early 19 th Century American Flag variant of the Stars and Stripes, the Driver Flag, and was known affectionally by the name

'Old Glory' by its original owner. The flag was originally designed to unfurl grandly from a ship's mast. Driver received the homemade 17' x 10' flag with 24 stars in 1824, sewn for him by his mother and young Salem female admirers to celebrate his appointment, at the age of 21, as a master mariner and commander of his own ship, the *Charles Doggett*. The original flag now resides in the Smithsonian Museum of American History.

Thank you, Daughters, for this opportunity to serve and take part in this fine remembrance and celebration of our Nation's Flag.

The U S Flag code is read and then the flags are declared

no longer fit for display and are retired by burning in our open firebox, burning as directed by the Flag Code.

Taps is played by a bugler in honor of the retired flags, and our chaplain closes the event with a benediction.

- ♦ Law Enforcement Commendation Medal
- ♦ Fire Safety and Commendation Medal
- Emergency Medical Services and Commendation Medal
- ♦ Heroism Commendation and Medal
- ♦ The SAR Life Saving Medal

The Microsoft Word blank Public Service & Heroism Awards document is located on **NSSAR's website**. Do not type anything. Save the blank form to your computer. Then, open the file and click the radio button for the appropriate medal. Complete the fields with the pertinent information and save it.

Create a folder named **Public Service Awards**. Save the completed document (Save as) to the Public Service Awards folder.

Complete this same procedure for all five awards.

Then, email the file as an attachment to Wayne Brown engineerscorner@gmail.com. Wayne will send a confirmation that he has received your report. If you do not receive a confirmation receipt of the completed form in 3-4 days, contact the chairman of the PS & Heroism Committee.

This program is an excellent way to recognize deserving individuals in our community and the public sector. We do suggest that those individuals, in the public sector of Law Enforcement, Fire Safety, and Emergency Medical Services, who are being considered for a Heroism Commendation, be previously recognized by their division head for their heroism. Department heads generally welcome the opportunity to recommend deserving individuals for recognition.

The commendations may be presented at either chapter meetings, departmental meetings, or other suitable events. The presentation of NSSAR commendations is an excellent means by which our Society can receive recognition and broaden our exposure and recruitment of potential new members. This program is also an excellent vehicle for publicity. The presentation of PS&H commendations

at chapter and state meetings should be noted and reported by local media optimally; however, the recipient may elect not to have the commendation published for privacy concerns. Questions about the National SAR Public Service and Heroism Committee may be directed to a state's representative or the current chairman of the Public Service and Heroism Committee.

MOH Museum Topping Out Ceremony

During the last week of July, the Medal of Honor Foundation reached a major milestone in the construction of the National Medal of Honor Museum with the placing of the structure's final steel beam during a special "Topping Out" Ceremony. Prior to its placement, the beam was signed by over 400 individuals who helped make the project possible.

The Museum is set to open its doors in March 2025 and will contain more than 100,000 square feet of space, with 31,000 square feet of that area dedicated to Exhibition Galleries telling the history of the Medal of Honor and the stories of the American heroes who earned it. The Museum also will have dedicated spaces for classrooms, meeting venues, symposiums, memorials, and ceremonies.

and receive Patriot Grave Marking Credit. The credit can be obtained in two different ways;

- Participate in the Patriot Grave Markings at the Yellow Fever Cemetery in Washington, LA at 10:30 am, and receive credit for 5 Patriot Grave markings. Participate in the Patriot Grave Markings at the St. Landry Church Cemetery in Opelousas, LA at 1 pm, and receive credit for 5 Patriot Grave Markings.
- 2) Help purchase the Grave Stones. If you donate \$60.00 for the grave stone for the Opelousas Patriot Grave Marking you will receive one Patriot Grave Marking Credit. If you donate \$60.00 for the grave stone for the Washington Patriot Grave Marking you will receive one Patriot Grave Marking Credit. A total of 2 credits are earned if a member donates to both Markers.

I picked Michel Ritter 279577 from Germany a soldier in the Opelousas Militia buried in the St. Landry Church Cemetery and Pierre Savoie 284909 from Chipoudy, Canada a Fusilier in the Opelousas Militia buried in the Yellow Fever Cemetery. I used the National Society Patriot Research System (PRS) to identify 2 soldiers that I felt needed my assistance to honor their sacrifice in obtaining our freedom.

You may want to do the same. Log on to the National Society web page, go to PRS and find a Patriot that needs your help and assist the Louisiana Society in honoring their sacrifice to gain our freedom.

Please mail your check to Bill LeJeune 446 Vallery Road De Ridder, LA 710634 - make sure you indicate which cemeteries you are going to donate; Washington or Opelousas or Both. I identified my Patriot and the Cemetery.

There are two Certificates listed with this advertisement; one for the Yellow Fever Cemetery in Washington, LA and a second for the St Landry Church Cemetery in Opelousas, LA. Take your time and pick your Patriot.

Texas SAR Web Site Enhanced Search Capability

A comment I hear not infrequently is "I can't find (fill in your item) on the web site." This is understandable, because at any given time there are approximately 200 active pages on the public web site and approximately 70 active pages on the private web site. Those figures don't include the numerous additional pdf, doc, and xls files that are part of the site. It takes time to go through the menus or even the Site Map pages to find what you need if you aren't familiar with its location.

Your search has been made much easier by the enhanced search engine which has been added to the web site. As you may be aware, there are actually three web sites associated with the Texas SAR...the public site, the Ladies Auxiliary, and the private site. There are separate search indexes for the public site (which includes the Ladies Auxiliary), the private site, and another index for chapter web sites.

The easiest way to start your search is to click inside the search glass icon at the upper right of every web page. If

you are on the public site, you will be initiating a public site search. If you are on the private site, you will be initiating a private site search. Searching from the public site



will not give you private site results and vice versa.

Although the search glass looks too small to make an entry in, as soon as you click in it, it will enlarge so you can type your search terms.



Type the word(s) into the stretched search glass that are part of the page or document you wish to find and press **Enter** to get your results.

Using the search glass will result in a default search, which means that all words entered must be in the document in order to provide a search result and only web pages will be searched.

When your search results are presented, click on the link

of the desired page/file to go directly to that document. If you need to, you can further refine your search using the form at the top of the search results page. On the public site, you can select the number of results per page, whether you want results if "any" search words are found (or the default "all" words), and you can select from search categories of web pages, additional file types (pdf, doc, xls), and/or back issues of *The Texas Compatriot* (or any combination of these). Categories basically define what part(s) of the web site will be searched.

On the private side, search refinements are the same except the search categories which can be selected are web pages, State Meeting Minutes, State Officer Reports, State Committee Reports, Council of Chapter Presidents (CoCP) Minutes, and/or Member Rosters.

If you would like to go directly to the search selection form before initiating a search via the search glass, just click inside the glass and press **Enter** without typing anything and you'll immediately go to a page with the search enhancements on it so you can refine your search.

There is a Search Tips page available on both the public and private sites with lots of information about how you can set up an effective, efficient search. You'll find it by mousing over **Home** in the top menu and in the drop list that appears, select **Search Tips**.

Earlier in the article, I mentioned that chapter web sites could also be searched. That search is initiated slightly differently. Mouse over **Home** in the top menu of the public site and select **Search Tips** (Chapter). Then at the top of the next page you see, click the link "**Click here to enter your search!**" You are then taken to a Chapter Search form, and the category that you select from the drop list will be the chapter web site that you want to search. Since the chapter is the category for the chapter web search index, there are no further categories which can be selected.

All sites are re-indexed at least once a month and more often if significant changes are made to a web site.

Vanzant Cousin Joins SAR

On July 18th, Mrs. Kathy Hanlon, Elizabeth Crockett Chapter (Granbury), NSDAR, contacted me asking me if SAR ever expedited the application process. I assured her that SAR did have procedures in place to handle such situations. Mrs. Hanlon then requested we expedite a gentleman's SAR application. She was working on documenting a new member application for Fred Arlis Vanzant of Lowell, Arkansas.

Mrs. Hanlon advised me that Mr. Vanzant was 98 years old and in failing health. Mr. Vanzant expressed a desire to join the Sons of the American Revolution before he died and expressly desired to join the Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter in Fort Worth, Texas, as he thought he was related to Maj. Van Zandt.

Mrs. Hanlon transferred the application and supporting proof documents to me via Dropbox that same day and I began my review process. I contacted Jerry Pinkerton, Inland Registrar, Texas SAR, on July 24th and requested expedited processing from Gary Green, Genealogist General. We received approval quickly, in fact, the next

day (July 25th).

Mrs. Hanlon also included Mr. Vanzant's daughter, Katharine Vanzant Arno, of North Carolina. Mrs. Arno is also a member of the DAR. Following my review, I expedited the application on July 21st to Mrs. Arno who was visiting her father in northwestern Arkansas. Unfortunately due to the weekend, it did not arrive in Lowell until Monday, July24th. She returned the signed application to me via overnight delivery since Jerry was leaving on a cruise later in the week. I met Jerry in the lobby of his high-rise on July 26th and witnessed his signing the application. He mailed it the next day to Lexington, Kentucky.

I was notified that Mr. Vanzant's application was approved and registered on August 9th. The national office mailed Mr. Vanzant's membership certificate and new member packet the same day to the Texas SAR Secretary for processing.

I contacted Mel Oller, Texas SAR Secretary, to alert him to expedite the certificate directly to me once he concluded his processing of the new member. I received the packet on August 16th.

At the August Chapter Meeting, the membership approved the awarding of the SAR War Service Medal to Mr. Vanzant for his service during World War II. I printed the certificate and fortunately, we had a medal in stock. I also included the SAR Rosette in the presentation case with the medal.

On August 17th, I sent the entire packet to Mrs. Arno who received it on Monday, August 21st. She framed the two certificates that day as she was leaving for Northwest Arkansas the next day.

It is such a satisfactory feeling to know that individuals from the DAR and the SAR worked so closely to get a very elderly gentlemen into the SAR and to fulfill one of his last wishes before he departs this earthly life.

Fred Arlis Vanzant

Fred Arlis Vanzant joined the Navy in early 1943 when he was 17 years old. Fred boarded a train to Camp Perry outside Williamsburg, Virginia (today it belongs to the

CIA "the Farm") for intensive training before heading to Port Hueneme in California. While there, he attended technical school, which the Navy calls "A-school". Fred was a Navy seaman — also known as an Army engineer or Seabee — in the Construction Battalion and wore both the Marine and Navy uniforms depending on his assignment. From 1943 to 1945, Fred spent his time in the sweltering jungles of the South Pacific islands. Seabees in the Pacific theaters-built airfields, supply depots, advance bases for men and materials, training areas, repair bases, and bridges. They often worked on these projects while under enemy fire and in record time.

After 28 months in the jungle, Fred was admitted to the hospital on Midway Island with lymphoreticulosis fever. After his hospital stay, he was invited to a USO show with Bob Hope, Boris Karloff, and Frances Langford and was seated at their table. Towards the end of the war, Fred trained to invade Japan and had just taken their physical at Aeia Naval Hospital in Hawaii when news came that the war ended, and Japan surrendered. He returned as a Navy Petty Officer 2nd class (same rank as a Staff Sergeant in the Army).

After WWII, Fred wanted to live life to the fullest. With his love of flying, he built a Piper Cub airplane and began crop-dusting cotton fields. Fred returned to Northwest Arkansas to pursue a young lady, Kahylene Graham, whom he met before the war at a small community church while her parents performed with their singing group. He was just 17 years old, and she was 15. Kahylene wrote to Fred for the entire time he was in the Pacific, and he carried her photo with him. He planned to marry her and if she refused then he would move to Saudi Arabia, become a pilot for Standard Oil and perform aerial inspections of their pipelines. Fred used to fly over Kahylene's farm and under the electric wires. She agreed to marry him provided he stopped his daredevil stunts! Fred and Kahylene went on to be married for more than 68 years and had six children, 17 grandchildren, and 20 great-grandchildren. They remained in Northwest Arkansas for the rest of their lives and served their community.

In 1949, Fred and Kahylene purchased their first farm and began planting apples, peaches, and grapes while remodeling its old home built in the 1850s. Both of their families had grown produce since the early 1800s in that area and Fred and Kahylene wanted to carry on their family legacy. They built a successful business and packed

produce for large grocery stores across the country. Fred has served in his church and community for the last 70 years. He was a gifted singer and often sang at church, community gatherings, retirement homes, and funerals until was diagnosed with throat cancer diagnosis when he was 88 years old. He never would take payment and enjoyed performing for others and their loved ones. Food donations to the local food pantries were important to him and he encouraged other farmers to donate. He and his family supported many migrant workers by providing food, water, books, and other items they needed to better their lives. Today, at 98 years old, he continues to be active in the community and donates to food pantries.

As a farmer, he served as a board member of Welch Foods, Inc. for 13 years. Welch's is owned by 1,054 family farmers across America and Canada. Best known for their grape jelly, their products are sold throughout the United States and in over 50 countries around the globe. He also served on the National Grape board for 20 years of the National Grape Cooperative. Fred also served as the President of the Arkansas Horticultural Society and served on their board. In 1980, Fred and his family were

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recognized as the Northwest Arkansas Farm and District Farm Family of the Year. Fred and his family were invited by Governor Bill Clinton and Hillary Clinton to the governor's mansion and recognized for their work in the community for better health and food. This program was started in 1947 and is still running today and is the oldest farmer recognition program in the country.

In July of 2023, Fred was recognized by the daughters of the American Revolution with a certificate and DAR Distinguished Citizen Medal for his service. Fred is honored to become a member of the SAR through the Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter of Fort Worth, Texas. He is the third cousin once removed of Maj. K.M. Van Zandt.


Throughout his 98 years, Fred has served his country and community with his many talents. He often says that he simply "strives to leave every endeavor better than he found it."



So, just what is Mr. Vanzant's lineal connection to Maj. K.M. Van Zandt? It took me less than 30 minutes to work out the connection. The common ancestor is Garrett Vinsant, born about 1726 and died in 1787.

FLAG PRESENTATION EVENT HONORING GENERAL RICHARD E. CAVAZOS

On August 5, 2023, the Sons of the American Revolution, Texas Society, conducted a Flag Presentation Event at the Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery to honor General Richard E. Cavazos, a true American Hero. Four small US Flags and four Bouquet of Flowers were placed at the foot of the headstone. In January 2023, Ft. Hood, Texas, was renamed in honor of this gallant distinguished Texas Soldier.

Richard E. Cavazos was born in Kingsville, Texas, on 31 January 1929. He was raised on the King Ranch where his father, a World War I veteran, served as a foreman. He graduated with distinction from Texas Technical College (now Texas Tech) and was commissioned a 2nd Lt. through the Army ROTC Program. After completing his

basic officer training, and jump school, he deployed to Korea and served as an infantry platoon commander in the 2nd Battalion, all-Hispanic segregated 65th Infantry Regiment. In June 1953, while attacking and later defending Hill 412, he was wounded and then rescued several of his wounded comrades for which he received the Distinguished Service Cross (DSC).

His record continued to shine and in 1967 he deployed as a Lieutenant Colonel to Vietnam as commander of 1st Battalion, 18th Infantry Regiment. Later that year during a fight against NVA forces, he personally led a counterattack, then called in artillery fire, earning a second DSC.

In 1976 the Army chose him to become the first Hispanic Brigadier General and in 1982, he was chosen to be the first Hispanic 4-star general. Throughout his career and life he was a teacher, a mentor, and a proven combat leader. His Soldiers loved him and he loved them back. Among his countless decorations are two Distinguished Service Crosses, second only to the Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Medal, two Silver Stars, two Le-

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gions of Merit, the Distinguished Flying Cross, five Bronze Star Medals with Valor Device, the Purple Heart, The Meritorious Service Medal, the Air Medal with Valor Device as well as numerous unit, campaign, and foreign awards and personal decorations.

General Cavazos retired from the Army in June of 1984 and resided in San Antonio, Texas, with his wife, Caroline Greek Cavazos, and their four children. He passed away on 29 October 2017, and was laid to rest at Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery in section PG, site 51. It is said that "no finer man ever wore the uniform of a United States Soldier" and all who knew or served with him would agree with that quote.

Battle of Medina Memorial Event

The 210th Anniversary of the Battle of Medina Memorial Ceremony was held on Saturday morning, August 12, 2023, at the Old Leming Elementary School located 5 miles north of Pleasanton, Texas, in remembrance of those Texians who fought the Spanish Army on August 18, 1813. According to writings of Judge Robert H. Thonhoff, author, historian, and former Karnes County Judge, the Battle of Medina was fought between approximately 1,800 men in the Royal Spanish Army and approximately 1,400 men in the Republican Army of the North, which included about 400 Spaniards, 400 Tejanos, 200 Native

Americans, and about 400 men from the Eastern States of the newly established United States of America. Peter Sides, the only proven casualty who also fought in the American Revolution, was honored by his descendent, Southern Region Color Guard Commander, David Hamaker.

The Color Guard presented the colors at the event and participated in a musket volley. Following the event, the Color Guard proceeded to the Applewhite site a few miles away to silently remember the fallen (fire ban prevented a musket volley). Participating in the Color Guard were the State Commander, Regional Commanders, and members of multiple chapters across the state.

Texas SAR looks forward to welcoming this new Chapter into the organization!










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Arlington Chapter Meeting

- Using the Form that is now on your computer, follow the Instructions provided on the Form
- When the entries are completed, click the button to "Save to Your Computer".
- To send the Form to the NSSAR Veterans Recognition Chairman, click the button "Click to Email".

- (1) World War II Veterans Corps.
- (2) Korean Service Veterans Corps.
- (3) Vietnam War Veterans Corps.
- (4) Southwest Asia Veterans Corps.

- (6) Military Service Veterans Corps.*


The von Steuben Medal

The von Steuben Medal for Sustained Achievement in the NSSAR Color Guard is awarded for sustained service to the Society as a Color Guardsman at the National or District Levels. A Guardsman can receive it only once and must have already earned the Bronze and Silver NSSAR Color Guard Medals. Qualifications are 1) must serve at least five years after the date of application for Silver Colorguard medal was approved and 2) must participate in at least twenty-five National and/or District Color Guard events.

According to John Greer, Texas SAR Chairman of the Flag Certificate & Public Service Awards Committee, the following Texas Compatriots have received the von Steuben medal:

- William B. Watts, 2015, Color Guardsman of the Year
- John L. Greer, 2017, Color Guardsman of the Year

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Por 134 years, men throughout Texas, the United States, and internationally, make up one of the largest nonprofit, non-partisan societies dedicated to "promoting patriotism, preserving American history, and promoting education to future generations."

Today, over 40,000 members belong to the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (NSSAR). The fraternal and civic organization was founded in 1889 by William Osborne McDowell, a New York City financier, on the 100th anniversary of George Washington's oath of office.

The goal of this "patriotic and hereditary society" according to sar.org is "to honor and preserve the memory of the Revolutionary War ancestors and events leading to the founding of the U.S."

Galveston boasts the first chapter in the state, the Bernardo de Galvez chapter formed in 1896, originally organized as a Texas Society of Sons of the American Revolution.

The state has 48 chapters, and North Texas chapters span two districts, TXSSAR District 6, Dallas, Plano and East Fork Trinity, and District 10, McKinney, Denton, Sherman, and Greenville.

Founded in 1985, Plano SAR Chapter #7 has 125

"compatriots" who assemble the first Tuesday of every month at Outback Steakhouse in Plano for dinner and a business meeting.

There are 14 compatriots who serve on the executive board of managers, and appointees serve on any one of six committees: Community Activities, Veterans, Nominating, Finance, Yearbook, and Genealogy.

Plano SAR Chapter President Steven Driever said what he likes best about the SAR is its "many activities that can make its members better people and our communities better places in which to live."

"Members not only can learn a lot about American history at monthly chapter meetings," he continued, "but also can help teach American history to high-school classes, participate in essay contests for youth, judge science and history fairs at schools, honor veterans, financially contribute to veterans' organizations, recognize outstanding community leaders, and maintain a Color Guard to participate in parades and present, retrieve, and retire flags at various ceremonies."

Members join SAR chapters for a variety of reasons, but Compatriot Bob Johns said it was the SAR Color Guard

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he observed at the funeral of his wife's friend, that caught his eye.

"I thought that was about the coolest thing I've ever seen," Johns said, adding that his wife, Judy Gilreath Johns, is a longtime member of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), the sister organization of SAR formed in 1890.

Johns said his wife told him, "I didn't know you're interested in it. I can get you in. I have all of the records."

The records were the genealogical proof required for him to join the organization. Men must be lineal descendants of a Revolutionary War patriot or someone who aided in the revolution providing food, money, and supplies.

If you can prove the lineage on the application form, with documents backing it up, said Johns, then that information is forwarded to the chapter you want to join.

"Every chapter has a registered genealogist who investigates your paperwork," he added. "If that gets approved, it goes to the state registrar in Austin. If that's approved, it goes to our national offices in Louisville, Kentucky, and if national approves it, you're in."

In Johns' case, he said because his wife's genealogy is "so deep and wide," he had no problem getting in.

He now serves on the chapter's executive board as Color Guard Commander and Vice President of Veterans Affairs.

Johns refers to the Color Guard as the "public face" of SAR, adding "we get a lot of attention and that helps us educate."

The Plano Chapter's Color Guard is available to appear at schools, churches, concerts, parades, and other patriotic events.

"It's great and the uniforms are kind fun to wear," he said, referring to the replica Revolutionary War Continental Army uniforms



they don for events.

"There was no one uniform worn at that time, Johns said, "but if you can determine, with factual reference, what the relative you are connected to wore, that could be your very first choice."

Johns said most men wear what became the Continental Army official uniform George Washington liked—the red and blue coat and the tricorn hat.

In 2022, the Plano SAR Color Guard Unit participated in 51 events including parades, educational classes in high schools, flag programs at retirement homes, and much more.

The cities of Plano, Irving and Dallas invite the Plano SAR to their naturalization ceremonies, and Johns said they'll show up in uniform, carrying the flags.

When the Color Guard is asked to educate students, Johns said, "We'll go in our uniforms and carry eight, or 10 flags, and we talk about the American Revolution and the history of it. We talk about patriots and veterans, and we use those flags as demonstrations and a reason to have a conversation."

In parades like the recent Audie Murphy Day Parade in Farmersville, Johns said, SAR Color Guards from Plano, McKinney, Dallas, Garland, Athens and Fort Worth, rode or walked carrying flags.

"We always carry the Betsy Ross flag, which was the first official national flag of the United States," he said, along with SAR, U.S. National flag, state of Texas flag, among others, because there were numerous flags flown during the Revolution.

"And we have them all," he said. "We've got 30-40 flags."

Aside from the Color Guard, the chapter has a Speakers Bureau. Compatriots Dan Reed, Howard Taylor, and Mike Radcliff, speak on a variety of topics including Firearms of the Revolutionary War, Barbecue during the Revolutionary War and Valley Forge during the Revolutionary War.

Compatriot Alan Roach serves as vice president of youth activities and handles Eagle Scout support and recognition, school contests they sponor, Junior ROTC units in high schools and much more.

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In addition to serving as vice president of Veterans Affairs, Johns also serves on the committee responsible for organizing, hosting and supporting veterans' activities including donating food and clothing to the Bonham VA Health Center and the Texas State Veterans Home.

"We spend a lot of time and a fair amount of money supporting veterans and their activities," he said.

There is a chapter officer in charge of medals and awards, said Johns, and because SAR is a commemorative partner with the Department of Defense, the chapters are authorized to distribute eagle lapel pins to Vietnam veterans, often at American Legion ceremonies to thank them for their service.


The SAR also honors those who lost their lives and fortunes to found and protect the U.S. by cleaning and maintaining graves and marking the graves of American Revolution patriots.

"It's a big ceremony," he said of the grave markings that occurred at Bonham and Lancaster.

"We put a plaque on their tombstone, acknowledging them as veterans," he said. "That's one of the main three main goals of SAR—to honor our patriots."

Additionally, the chapter participates, in conjunction with the John Abston DAR, in the Wreaths Across America ceremony at Pecan Grove Cemetery in McKinney each December to honor those who served our country.

Three years from now, on July 4, 2026, the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution and the establishment of



the United States will be officially celebrated. National, state, and local SAR chapters are counting down the days and planning activities to celebrate and commemorate the historic event.

"We recognize the contribution our Patriot ancestors made to the principles expressed in the Declaration of Independence," the Sons of the American Revolution proclaimed at a past national Independence Day celebration. "As you celebrate America's founding you may inspire others to share in the SAR mission."

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Alexander Hodge Youth Awards

In recognition of outstanding leadership qualities, military bearing, and excellence, thus exemplifying the high ideals and principles which motived and sustained our patriot ancestors, the Alexander Hodge SAR Chapter #49 awarded scholarships to students in three of the School Districts in its' area.

The Chapter distributed \$1,600.00 in JROTC Scholarships donations raised by District 7 Vice President Richard Zdunkewicz. The scholarships for college were awarded to two Lamar Consolidated JROTC cadets and two Fort Bend JROTC cadets.

The Chapter also distributed 17 Bronze SAR JROTC Medals and Certificates to 17 JROTC cadets from Fort Bend ISD (FBISD), Lamar Consolidated ISD (LCISD), and Stafford ISD. The medals and certificates were presented at their JROTC year-end banquets. We will have a new school added this coming school year—Crawford High School.

None of this would be possible if not for the efforts of our District 7 Vice President Richard Zdunkewicz. He raised the \$1,600.00 in donations for the JROTC Program for 2023 and has announced a goal of collecting \$10,000.00 for JROTC scholarships for next year, 2024. Chapter #49 will have \$2,000.00 of that scholarship monies to be awarded in 2024.

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For a JROTC candidate to qualify for these scholarships, they must 1) have a 3.0 average on a 4.0 scale, 2) planning on attending College, and 3) be recommended by their JROTC leader.

The first award of the year was presented at the 2023 SAR Annual Convention's Youth Award Luncheon to Cadet Captain Elyse H. Garcia, a Junior at Cypress Ridge High School. She has the highest GPA in the AFJROTC. Cadet Captain Garcia represented the Alexander Hodge Chapter in the SAR JROTC Enhanced Program where she placed 3rd and received a certificate from both the State Society and from the Alexander Hodge Chapter along with a check for \$100.00.

Scholarships were awarded to Cadet Myla Martinez of Willowridge High School, Cadet Mya Brigance of Elkins High School, Cadet Brianna J. Shamer of George Ranch High School, and Cadet Bladimir A. Saralay of Lamar Consolidated High School. Cadets Martinez and Brigance are in FBISD. Cadets Shamer and Saralay are in LCISD.

Alexander Hodge Chapter awarded 17 cadets with the JROTC Bronze Medal and SAR Certificates. The awards were presented at each JROTC School Banquet. These 17 recognized cadets and their schools are listed below:
